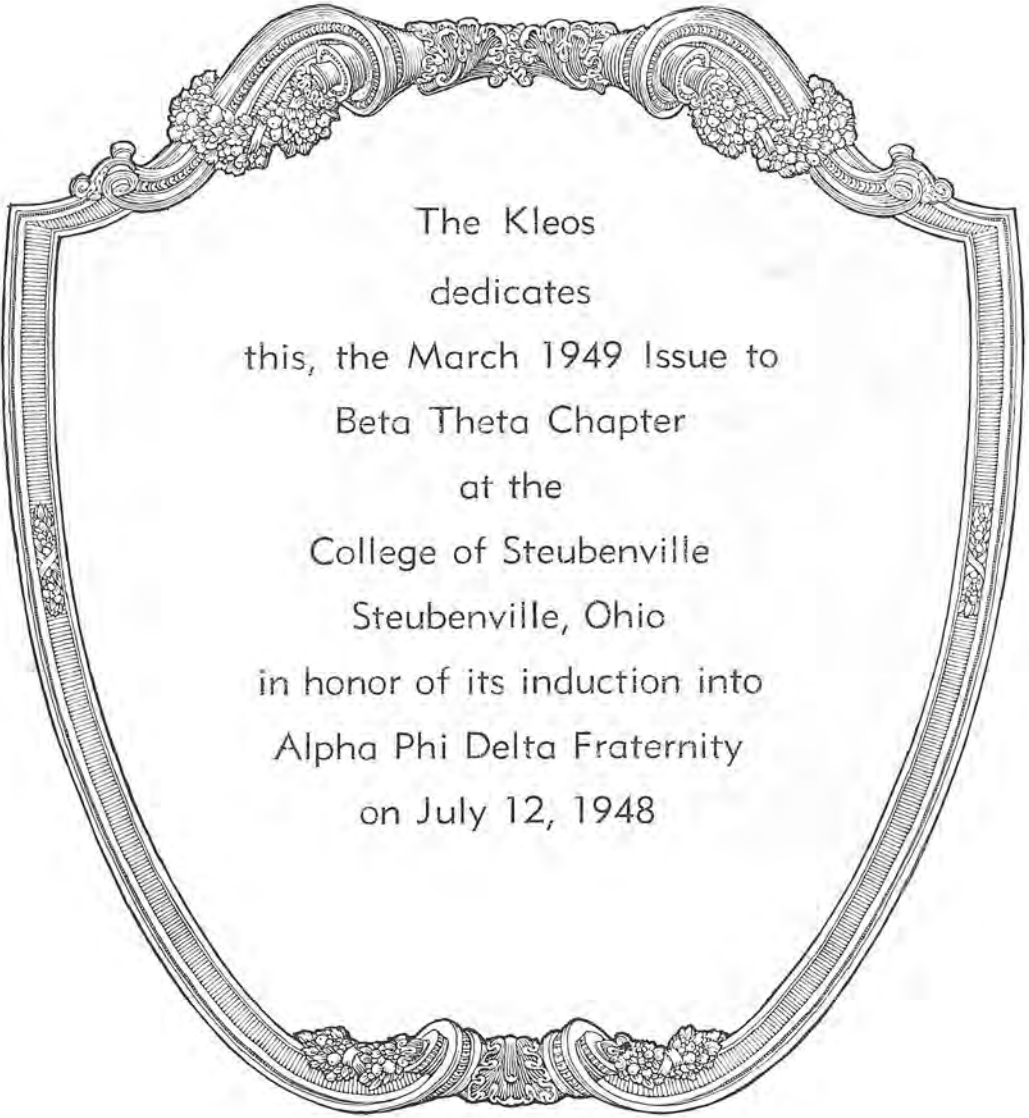

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# MORE YET

VERY REV. DANIEL W. EGAN, T.O.R.

THE invitation to write an article for this issue of the *Kleos* came as a very pleasant surprise, but placed me on one of the horns of the well-known dilemma: "What shall write about?,"

As President of the college at which the youngest chapter of Alpha Phi Delta has been established, I should no doubt be writing of the fraternity movement and its place in college life. Others have done that, however, better than I could hope to do it. I might write of our pleasure at having a chapter on the campus, but that is obvious since we gave permission. What we hope for in the way of growth on the part of the fraternity, paralleling our growing College, is possibly wishful thinking. None of these topics has a real appeal either to me or, I think, to my prospective readers. There should be a deeper, more significant message.

"I made me great works; I builded me houses...I got me servants...I gathered me also silver and gold. So I was great and whatsoever mine eyes desired I kept not from them...Then I looked on all the works that my hands had wrought and on the labor that I had labored to do: and, behold, all was vanity and vexation of spirit, and there was no profit under the sun." (*Ecclesiastes*)

The sacred writer in this passage points to a truth which we all acknowledge when it is called to our attention, but it too often fails to be present in our consciousness and to influence us in our everyday life. If education does not fulfill in any particular instance all these needful to make one's life a success, then it is a failure. It sometimes happens, and with disastrous consequences, that a man misuses or fails to use the opportunities for right development that are given him. In that case the responsibility for failure is his own. He has been properly formed but has not submitted to the influence which formed him. There are others who suffer wrong because of the neglect or incapacity of those directing their formative years to open for them the path to a successful life. These statements, hinging as they do upon a discussion of success, make us pause to consider just what we understand by success.

One of the common mistakes of men is to identify success in life with success in a career. We overlook the fact that, through talent and industry, a man may attain eminence in his profession and acquire wealth which places him beyond the reach of want, and yet have proved a failure in

life, for a career is not an end but a means to an end—a livelihood is not life. To fail as a man is to fail in life, and to fail in the ultimate purpose of living.

Schools and colleges have the acknowledged duty to train the faculties and powers of their students, to equip them with knowledge, so that when they have finished their period of training they may have every chance of succeeding in the work for which they have been educated. However important such training may be, it is only part of the duty of the college and university. Beyond this there is the duty to impart that cultural training by which the reasonable being in this world is properly equipped to play his part as a worthwhile citizen, not only of the "City of Men" but also as a citizen of the "City of God." This implies that education is a process concerned with the whole man, his intellect, his will, emotions and physical powers. If the college does not recognize this obligation and makes no attempt to fulfill this need, or if the principles which make up its philosophy do not provide this part of education which is beyond the acquiring of mere skill, and if these principles are not founded on right reason and revelation, the college is failing to fulfill its total function and some other agency must provide what the college does not.

Very often one is by force of circumstances compelled to seek his education or his professional training in an institution which gives only that training which fits one for his career in the "City of Men." Such a one will generally sense, as the years go by, that there is something missing, unless through some other means he has acquired that further education which gives him a true sense of values and gives him those principles which will guide him towards a full life outside of the needs of his profession. It is the obligation of him who lacks this fuller training to seek it, in order that being successful in his career he will not be a failure in life.

These added elements of education are very positive things and it is well worth examining oneself to see whether or not one has possession of the right principles of living and that motivation which leads to the steadfast and constant adherence to these principles in one's conduct. Self-knowledge is invaluable, and it only through self-knowledge, which teaches humility, that we learn to know and acknowledge our shortcomings. When we learn of these shortcomings we fail miserably if we make no attempt to do anything about supplying the want. It is to be hoped that we are not only good business men or professional men, but rather true and finished men of character. Let us ask ourselves frankly if we are satisfied, if we are content with the mere ability to make a living, and if the deeper and finer needs of our souls are incompletely filled with inadequate substitutes which are material instead of spiritual, which are pagan rather than christian. Should we discover a lack, let us look back upon our education and adopt a new slogan, which is the cry of the Army Cadet Corps when its football team makes a touchdown, "MORE YET."

Volumes could very easily be written on the occasion but we would rather illustrate the event by the following pages, with photographs taken at the Installation and Grand Ball.

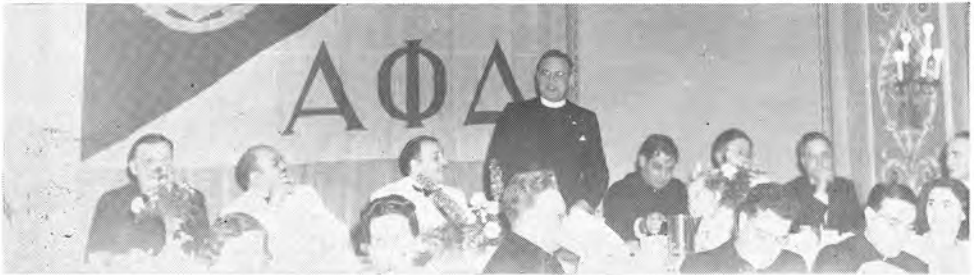
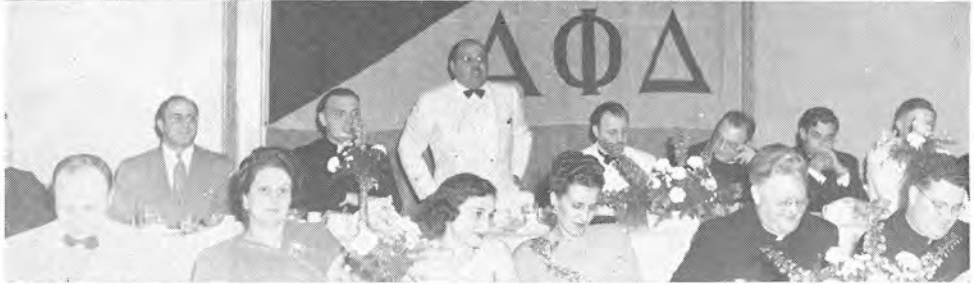
BELOW:—The charter members with escorts, including many loyal alumni.

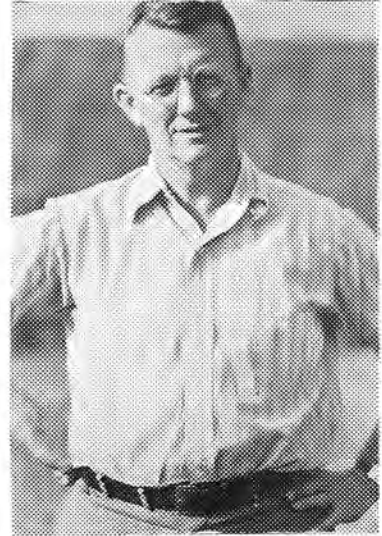

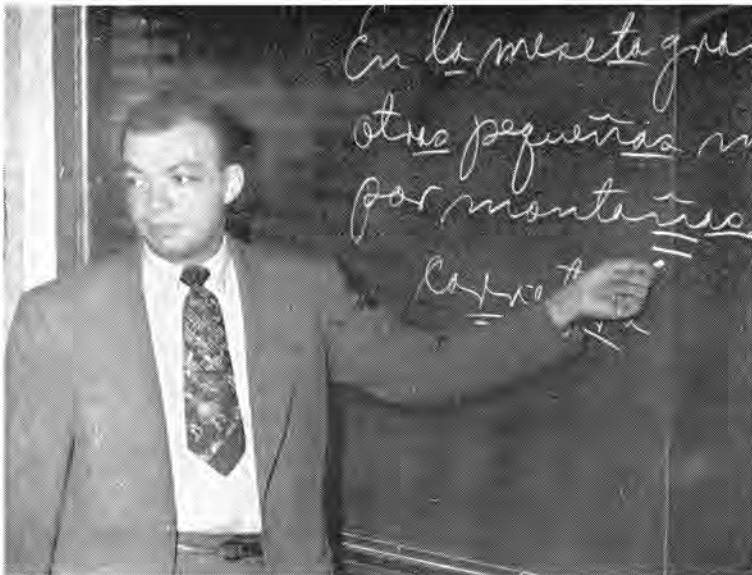

It is the intention of the New York Alumni Club to establish this year the "New York Alumni Memorial House Corporation" which will be a corporation set up to raise monies to purchase, maintain and operate a club house for the exclusive use of the members of Alpha Phi Delta in a centralized location in Metropolitan New York, namely, the borough of Manhattan.

Without full knowledge, it becomes impossible to fully appreciate life, fully serve oneself and fully serve America. Scholarship today makes possible leadership and influence tomorrow. Leadership and influence which must be exercised to keep America forever safe, strong, prosperous, just, and merciful, "unto the least of them."

Strengthening of our chapters can be accomplished by unity and democratic discipline. Each chapter should have programs of lectures, panel discussions, etc., to stimulate interest, be instructive and profitable. Business meetings should be brief and conducted in a manner to train the individual and afford him practice in expression and parliamentary procedures. Conduct of chapter meetings must be in the highest tradition of our Fraternity. The presence at each meeting of an outstanding member of the college or of the community is usually inspiring. Strong chapters on the campus will arouse respect and admiration of Alpha Phi Delta.

Aggressive expansion with discretion is vital. We do not want to establish a chapter on any campus where the proper authorities, right or wrong, have decreed, "No fraternities in this college." We will establish chapters where other fraternities exist. Our chapters by their way of life must reflect credit on the entire college fraternity system. Our deeds shall be our credentials. Each individual must take humble pride in his efforts. Expansion will make possible greater contributions to the cultural, social, economic and political life in these United States.

In the next issue of the Kleos, I will direct a few suggestions to the Alumni. For the present, I bespeak their continued interest in Alpha Phi Delta, and that they seek to lend a helping hand to the undergraduate.

## GIROLAMO TO CAPTAIN BIG RED IN 1949 Mu Consul Adds To His List of Achievements

Paul Girolamo, *Mu's* present Consul was elected to captain of the Cornell University football squad for the 1949 Season at the annual varsity football Banquet. Girolamo's outstanding game, which was no small factor in bringing Cornell its first Ivy League Crown since 1939, is only surpassed by his sincerity and modesty which have won for him the respect of all. His conduct off the field as well as on, always exemplifies the true spirit of sportsmanship and Americanism, and is indeed something for which our Fraternity can be proud.

Paul was initiated into Alpha Phi Delta in the fall of 1942, and played Freshman football with Cornell prior to entering Army Air Forces, where he served as a B-29 Pilot. After the war he returned to Cornell, and in 1947 he was elected Consul of *Mu* Chapter. An unfortunate injury in the Colgate game of that year, kept him out of play for the remainder of the season. The Brothers at *Mu* held Paul in such high regard as a leader as well as a man that he was re-elected to

the consulship for the following year. Throughout the 1948 season, in spite of several injuries incurred in the Syracuse, Army and Colgate games, he managed to play in every game, and his outstanding offensive play and his usual superb defensive game have won for him an honorable mention on the Associated Press choice for the All-American team.

Paul, a native of the Bronx, New York City, started his football career with Peter Stuyvesant High School. He is now enrolled in the College of Agriculture, and intends to go into teaching after he leaves college next February.

As soon as the money started to come in and the estimates reviewed, the work was contracted for and initiated. Our estimable Brother Walsh, who stayed here throughout the summer to devote full time to the plans, was in charge of this operation. Through his capable management most of the work was completed before the brothers arrived for the fall semester. When we arrived he put us to work immediately but no one begrudged it this time. In no time at all the dining room was done over, the tables and chairs shellacked, the china and silver unpacked and washed, etc.

It was with supreme satisfaction that the kitchen and dining room were finally opened. It was dedicated by our beloved founder, Brother Giorgio De Grassi.
