Brother Sarno has been moderator of Beta Pi Chapter and was instrumental in the recognition of the Chapter at the University.

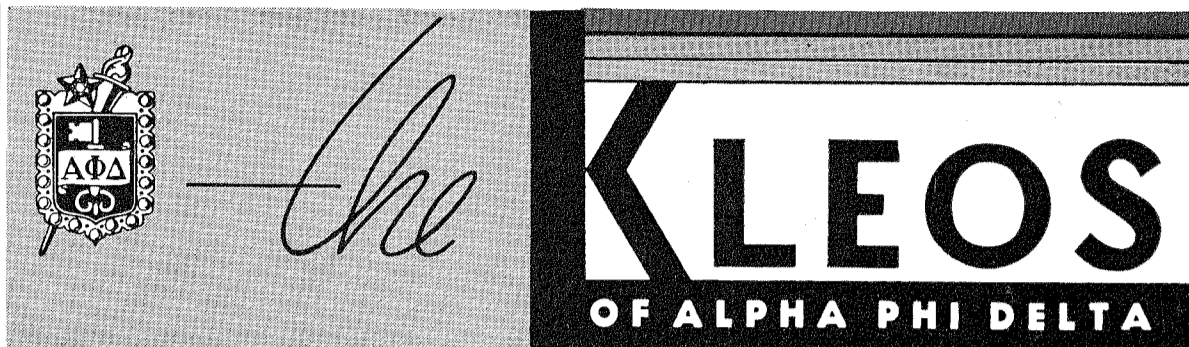
The new Dean of Men joined the faculty of St. John's College in 1946 after serving four years with the Marine Corps during World War II from which he emerged with the rank of major. In 1949 he was named chairman of the Department of mathematics at the College, and in September, 1953 was appointed to the rank of Associate Professor. He held the

post of Acting Director of the Evening Session during the 1955-56 academic year.

Previous to joining St. John's, Brother Sarno taught high school from 1932 to 1942 and served as head of the Mathematics Department. He was also Athletic Director and served as football, baseball, basketball and track coach. He is still active in sports, coaching the Knute Rockne Elmont Football team consisting of children between 12 and 15 years of age under 135 lbs.

Professor Sarno has been very active in educational service, particularly in the field of mathematics. He is listed in "Who's Who in the East" and also in "American Men of Science". He belongs to many educational organizations and has also published a book, "College Mathematics." His civic activities include service as Vice-president of the Citizens Committee for Public Schools in Elmont. He is also an officer of the Italian Sons and Daughters of America, Lodge 196, and the National Catholic Educational Association.

The Professor resides at 104 Village Avenue, Elmont, Long Island, with his wife, the former Rose Calderone, and three children, two daughters and a son. True to St. John's, Anna, 18, is a freshman at the University, and Michael 16, is a senior at St. John's Prep. Rosalie, 15, attending Elmont High School.

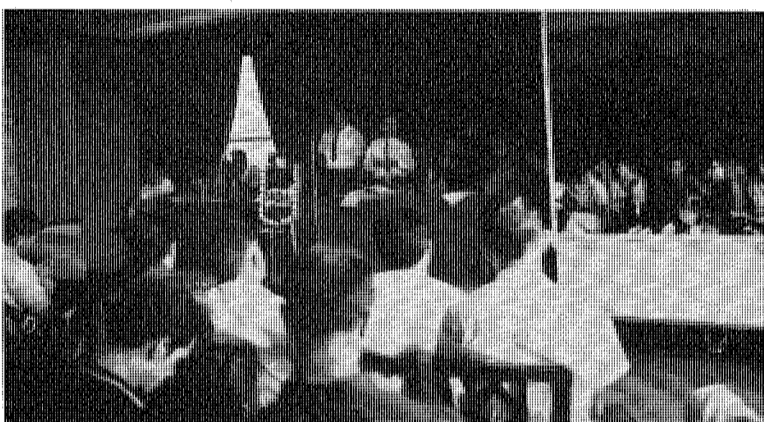

CONVENTIONEERS PACK GALEN HALL; D'URSO, TOSI RE-ELECTED; PEGNATO NAT'L SECRETARY

A large and happy crowd of Brothers and their families gathered at Galen Hall August 31 through September 4 to make Alpha Phi Delta's 39th National Convention the most successful resort convention yet held. Two hundred and forty-two Brothers, their wives, children and friends were officially in attendance, an increase of more than 15% over last year's high.

The Convention produced a change in the Fraternity hierarchy. Joseph DeGuglielmo, past National President, tendered his resignation as National Secretary after 15 years of service to Alpha Phi Delta in that position. Joe had announced his intentions at last year's Convention at Youngs Gap. The Executive Committee unanimously elected Fred Pegnato National Secretary. Pegnato has been Assistant National Secretary for the past two years.

Joseph M. D'Urso of Philadelphia and Dr. Frank Tosi of Steubenville were re-elected to their respective positions of National President and Vice-president by the Convention body to serve a second term.

Expansion was the keynote of this Convention. Both Beta Pi (St. John's University) and the Bronx Alumni Club received their charter. Also accepted was the Beta Rho Colony at Gannon College, Erie, Pennsylvania, and the revitalized Buffalo Alumni Club. With an eye to the future, two new Committees were established: a Policy Planning Committee, and a Committee for the 50th Anniversary of Alpha Phi Delta.

Resolutions adopted by the delegates included a revised monetary arrangement for Convention delegates. Undergraduates will now receive \$5.00 per diem (instead of \$2.50) as well as the usual one-way travel expenses to the Convention site. Travel expenses for the Executive Committee members to their mid-semester meetings have been eliminated. The Convention also adopted a resolution to continue the work of the Directory Committee headed by Dr. Tosi.

The Grand Council also elected two new members to the National House Fund, Joseph DeGuglielmo and Anthony Scotti who replaced Dr. Bissel and Joe Derrico.

As in past Conventions, sessions were held in the mornings to permit delegates to join their families in the varied resort activities. Though it rained intermittently during the first three days, this did not dampen the spirit of the Conventioneers who made full use of the indoor facilities of the Hotel as well as the tremendous outdoor Forest Glades Pool and 18 hole golf course between rain storms. In addition, the food was excellent, the hospitality genial and the accommodations comfortable. By the time fraternal goodbyes were being expressed everyone agreed that they had attended one of Alpha Phi Delta's most enjoyable conventions.

Beta Rho Colony At Gannon Accepted For Installation

The Alpha Phi Delta Colony established at Gannon College, Erie, Pennsylvania, was officially accepted at the 1959 National Convention held at Galen Hall. Designated Beta Rho, preparations are now being made for its formal induction as a Chapter of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity.

Colonization came to fruition through the efforts of 5th District Governor Joseph Scioscia who has been working with the group for the past two years. Arrangements were completed on April 24th. Petition for membership was presented to the Executive Committee at their Convention meeting.

National Award Winners Announced

Winners of Alpha Phi Delta's National Awards were announced at the Formal Banquet at the 39th National Convention held at Galen Hall, Pennsylvania. The awards are presented annually to deserving Chapters and Brothers for outstanding performance during the Fraternal year. Winners for the year 1958-59 were:

Most Outstanding Chapter: Psi, Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, Penna.

Most Improved Chapter: Beta Lambda, St. Francis College, Loretto, Penna.

Outstanding Undergraduate: John Palermo, Psi (Duquesne University) — Beta Pi (St. John's University, Long Island, N. Y.)

Outstanding Alumnus: Lewis DiRosario, Xi, Ohio State University, Columbus Alumni Club, Columbus, Ohio.

Other award winners included Chuck Rizzuti, Eta, runner-up for honors as Most Outstanding Undergraduate, Beta Eta, Brooklyn College, honorable mention in the Most Improved Chapter category, and Beta Delta, Temple University, which received honorable mention in the Most Outstanding Chapter category.

Psi In Top Form

Psi, this year's most outstanding Chapter, has always maintained a strong and active position on the Duquesne Campus. Last year was a particularly successful one for the Chapter. With ten new Brothers on their roster, the Chapter participated with honors in almost every campus activity including the Annual Carnival (most Outstanding Actor Award), the Homecoming Float Parade (candidate elected Homecoming Queen), Second Annual Greek Sing Contest (first prize trophy), and intramural football, basketball and softball. The Chapter also held its annual Christmas party for Orphans, annual Dinner Dance honoring the graduating seniors and their annual May Ball which featured the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra and was attended by a capacity crowd of over five-hundred couples. A Psi choir sings First Friday Masses at the University Chapel.

Individual Brothers also brought honor to the Chapter. They include the Presidents of such honorary fraternities as Rho Chi (Pharmacy), Kappa Phi Kappa (Education), Scabbard and Blade (Military), and Psi Chi (Psychology); also the Vice-president of the American Pharmaceutical Association at Duquesne, Secretary of Beta Alpha Phi (Business), treasurer of the Interfraternity Council, and positions in many other organizations. One Brother was installed in the Duquesne University Hall of Fame. Anxious to publicize their Fraternity, the Brothers also purchased spring and winter Fraternity jackets, distributed APD favors to the girls at the various socials, and published their own Fraternity year book for the third consecutive year.

Beta Lambda in Big Upswing

Beta Lambda, St. Francis College, Loretto, Pennsylvania, was having rough going during the 1957-58 school year. The Chapter had hit the bottom financially, incurring a large indebtedness to the National Housing Fund. In addition, the Brothers were suffering from low morale and a definite lack of spirit. The Chapter's condition being critical, an immediate plan was assumed by the Fifth District Governor, Joe Scoscia and Jules Zangrille, both of whom were appointed custodians of the Beta Lambda House by the Housing Committee.

Beginning in the second week in September and continuing for several months, meetings were held with the Chapter and a program was rigidly complied with. By the end of the school year, all debts were paid, the Chapter had money in the bank, and a strong Fraternal spirit had been imbued in the Chapter. Impressed with the Chapter's activities, the college officials were once again helping them in all phases of college life. The tremendous improvement shown by the Chapter won them the Most Improved Chapter Award.

Palermo Instrumental At Beta Pi

Brother John Palermo was inducted into Alpha Phi Delta by Psi Chapter at Duquesne University and one year later transferred to St. John's University in Long Island. Anxious to foster the name of Alpha Phi Delta, John requested permission from the expansion Committee to try to form a Colony at the University, a task which had been attempted for several years but without success. With the help of the expansion committee and his leadership on the campus, he gathered a group of forty-five men and secured permission from the University Officials to operate on a trial basis. He then led the group in a program of activity which impressed fellow undergraduates and school officials alike. As a result, the group won the approval of University officials and the colony was inducted as the Beta Pi Chapter of Alpha Phi Delta. The Chapter promptly elected John its first President.

For his leadership and contribution to the expansion of Alpha Phi Delta, Brother John Palermo was chosen the most outstanding undergraduate for the year 1958-59.

DiRosario Leads Columbus Alumni

When Brother Lewis DiRosario assumed the leadership of the Columbus Alumni Club it was at a low ebb. Although there was a potential membership of fifty Brothers in the area, actual membership was only ten. One of the first policies Lew put into effect was to reactivate this dormant potential. Membership in the Columbus group has now reached thirty, with a rigorous campaign underway to activate the other 20. Under DiRosario's leadership the club is also taking an active part in undergraduate activities at Xi Chapter (Ohio State), assisting them in their pledge program and in locating other housing facilities for the Chapter. The Club has now also initiated a scholarship award for the undergraduates at Xi Chapter.

Though there are others who have contributed to the progress made by the Columbus Alumni Club, the Brothers feel that Brother Lew has been the sparkplug of the drive. Not only has he called the plays, but also carried the ball; efforts which won him Alpha Phi Delta's Most Outstanding Alumnus Award.

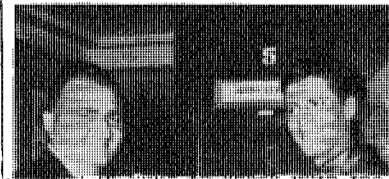

PAC Sets Fine Program For '60

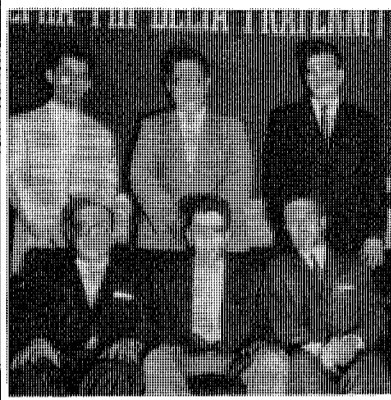
