

Pegnato, Newly Elected National Secretary, Dies; Great Loss To APD

It is with a deep sense of loss that we report the death of our National Secretary, Brother Fred P. Pegnato, Sigma. Brother Fred died of a heart attack on November 25, 1959. He was forty-three years old.

Brother Fred had served as National Secretary of Alpha Phi Delta for only two months, having been elected to that position last September at the Galen Hall Convention. Previous to that he had served as Assistant National Secretary for two years. In the short time that he held National Office he exerted tremendous effort for his beloved Fraternity. One of his last official functions was the induction of the Beta Rho Chapter at Gannon College. He passed away even as he was preparing to receive the December issue of the KLEOS for distribution.

Among the National Officers who paid their respects to Brother Fred and his family were National President Joseph M. D'Urso, District Governors Steve Rubino and Gus Sigismondi, National Treasurer Carlo M. Vannicola, Past National Secretary Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, Brothers Horace Goffredo and Walter Primerano of the Building Trustees and Brother Frank Cavallaro, Past National President.

On Saturday evening, November 28, the ritualistic memorial service was conducted at the funeral home in the presence of thirty-five members of the Boston Alumni Club.

The informal rituals commenced on Saturday afternoon and terminated Saturday evening with the future Brothers of Beta Rho Chapter giving a party for the Brothers from Psi Chapter, Duquesne University. During their brief stay in Erie, the brothers from Psi sojourned at the homes of the Brothers of Beta Rho. At 11:30 on Sunday morning, Brothers from both Chapters met at St. Thomas Chapel on Gannon's campus to hear Mass celebrated by Father Salvatore Federici, National Chaplain. Following the Mass, Beta Rho Chapter was formally installed.

Following the installation, a formal dinner was held presided over by the National Officers. Also at the dinner were Father Wilfrid J. Nash, President of Gannon College, Father Paul J. DeSante, the Chapter's Chaplain, Dr. Arthur B. Calabrese, the Chapter's faculty advisor, Joseph Scioscia and Steve Cocumelli, 5th and 6th District

Governors respectively, National Expansion Chairman Frank Cavallaro, four past National Presidents and Brothers from Boston, New York, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Steubenville. Speakers at the dinner were National President Joseph D'Urso, National Vice-president Dr. Frank Tosi, the late National Secretary Fred Pegnato, Father Nash, and Carl Giannelli.

Gannon College is located at Erie, Pennsylvania and was founded by Archbishop John Mark Gannon. It was chartered by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in November, 1944. It has grown from one building and less than 400 students in the early years to an enrollment of 1,570 at the present time and a physical expansion to 16 buildings. In addition, a \$4,000,000 development program was announced in November which includes four new structures. The college offers 18 fields of concentration in three divisions.

Central Office has announced that Alpha Phi Delta's 40th National Convention will be held at the Hotel Equinox, in Manchester, Vermont.

This year, the convention will be held Labor Day week. The Executive Committee will meet on Sunday September 4th; the Convention proper will commence on Monday and extend through Thursday morning. As usual, Conventioners will be entitled to accommodations Sunday night after dinner through Thursday morning including breakfast.

Convention regulars will please note that the Convention starts one day earlier than usual this year; that is, Sunday night instead of Monday night.

Prices for this year's convention are \$70 for all persons nine years old and over and \$40 for all children under nine. Prices include all gratuities and Vermont state taxes.

This will be Alpha Phi Delta's first official visit to Vermont and the Equinox. Convention-goers remember the area well, however, it being in the vicinity of several other Convention sites in the upper New York State and New England areas. Northeast ski enthusiasts know that Bromley mountain is just a few miles away.

The hotel boasts of some excellent facilities including a golf course, swimming pool, and magnificent trout fishing. It is also noted for its excellent food.

This will be Alpha Phi Delta's 10th resort-type Convention, a tradition that was started in 1951 at the Oceanside, Magnolia, Massachusetts. Each year has taken the Fraternity to new and exciting resorts with excellent and varied facilities. But as inviting as each convention site has been, the biggest draw of course, is the Convention itself. Each year Alpha Phi Deltans and their families make a pilgrimage to the chosen site to meet and combine business and pleasure in an atmosphere of fraternal kinship. Last year nearly two hundred and fifty Brothers and their families attended to set a new record for this type of Convention. It is expected that this year's attendance will be even greater.

Psi Foster Parents to 8-Year Old

Psi Chapter has recently adopted a foster child from Palermo, Sicily through the Foster Parents' Plan, Inc. The program was officially instituted by the Chapter on March 1, 1960.

The child's name is Antonino (Nino) DiVincenzo. He is 8 years old, stands 4' 2", weighs 59 pounds, has chestnut brown eyes and hair and is of fair complexion.

Nino lives with his mother, two brothers and a sister in a battered house of which they occupy one room. They are lacking in the things that we here in America take for granted such as a kitchen, toilet, running water, and electricity (with the exception of one light). Furniture and clothing leave much to be desired.

The Brothers of Psi have undertaken the support of the child which also means support to the family in general. The mother's present income is between twenty and twenty-five dollars a month and no doubt the fifteen dollars the Chapter sends each month will alleviate the family's needs to some degree.

Project chairman Brother Andy DeLuise, collects for the fund every two weeks from each Brother. The collection usually brings in more than the monthly total requirement, hence the excess is placed in a "kitty" for this cause. The Chapter writes to the boy and he in turn, writes to the Chapter with the letters being translated both ways by the Foster Parents Plan, Inc.

Foster Parent's Plan maintains its headquarters at 352 Fourth Avenue, New York 10, New York. It is through this organization that all funds, letters and packages are centralized and then shipped overseas in bulk. They provide the foster parents with a picture and a case history of the child and any other correspondence desired.

The contract for supporting the child is not legally binding, but Psi realizes that the moral contract involved is stronger than any legal ties. The Chapter intends to continue this project indefinitely with hopes of inspiring others to initiate something similar.

Besides monetary support, the Chapter intends to send Nino a fraternity jacket and soccer ball for his enjoyment.

Ohio House Fund Activities Keep Transfers Assets Psi On Top On To National Fund Duquesne Campus

The Board of Trustees of the Alpha Phi Delta Development Fund of Ohio has voted to transfer all of its available assets to the National House Fund. The unanimous decision was made at a special meeting of the Board of Trustees held on November 14, 1959, at the Xi Chapter House.

The Ohio Development Fund operates the Xi Chapter House at Ohio State University and is currently searching for a new house in the University area.

The move calls for transfer of all assets to the national fund until such time that a new chapter house would be made available to Xi Chapter by the National Housing Committee. The motion stipulated that all assets so transferred shall thereafter be irrevocably pledged for the use of Xi Chapter.

Board members present at the meeting were Hugo Alexander, President; Gene Deferro, Secretary - Treasurer; Chester Croce, Trustee at Large; George DiSabto, Xi Chapter President; Louis DiRosario, Columbus Alumni President; John Cianflona, Trustee at Large; and Sam Illama, Youngstown Chapter President. Proxies were sent in by Anthony D'Aurora, James Paolomilio, and Patsy DiNicola. Dr. Frank Tosi, National Vice-President represented Central Office.

Psi Chapter is rounding out another very active year.

Going back to the month of November, the Chapter took an active part in Duquesne University's Home Coming Festival in which Alpha Phi Delta took first prize in the Street Displays in conjunction with the Festival. Also, Psi's candidate for Home Coming Queen was selected for this occasion.

In December Psi held their annual raffle for the benefit of St. Paul's Orphanage. The winner received a New Year's Weekend in New York City or \$200 in cash. A party was then held for the orphans at St. Paul's in which the Brothers supplied food and toys for the children.

Opportunities Offered For New Graduates; Also Summer Placements

Applications for Training Assistantships in the College Student Personnel Graduate Studies Program at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois, for the 1960-61 class are now being received. The program is a two year (72 quarter hour) master's degree in education and is directed toward the development of the generalist who will be prepared to work in various phases of higher education — counseling, group activities, resident halls, financial aids, fraternities and admissions.

Applicants accepted into the program must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college, a "B" average or higher in undergraduate courses and be personally qualified to live with students as an adviser and counselor. Remuneration includes room, board, tuition, and \$80 per month or the equivalent for the two academic years of the degree program.

The selection committee is interested in the applicant's academic achievement, aptitude to complete graduate study successfully, student activity and community participation, work experience and sense of job responsibility, relationship with student peers and future professional colleagues, and personal qualities—ideals, honesty, integrity, and leadership.

The Dean of Women and the Dean of Men of the Ohio State University have announced the granting of graduate resident assistantships in conjunction with a two-year training program in student personnel work of their Department of Psychology. The assistantships in conjunction with a two-year training program in student personnel work of their Department of Psychology. The assistantships are steered to those desirous of becoming dean of men, head or director of residence, an advisor to international students, etc.

Recipients of assistantships in Ohio State's work-study plan will live and work with students as counselors, group advisers, and residence hall assistants. They will work approximately 20 hours per week under the supervision of the directors of residence and the student personnel staff.

The academic program, leading to the Master of Arts degree requires from 45 to 55 quarter hours depending on the student's background. The student may register for 10-12 hours per quarter. Academic course offerings include Psychology of Personality, Psychology of Learning, Psychology in Counseling, Theories and Curricula of Higher Education, etc. A thesis is required. Qualifications include a bachelor's degree from an accredited college and present a B average in undergraduate courses with the specific academic background required for graduate study and personally qualified to live with students as group adviser and counselor. Remuneration includes room, board and \$50 per month the first year (the equivalent of graduate assistantship) and room, board, and \$115 per month the second year (the equivalent of a teaching assistantship).
