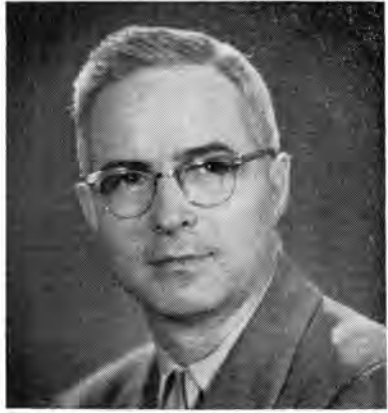

National President



JOSEPH A. SCIOSCIA
National Vice-President

Alpha Phi Delta's new National President has been one of the Fraternity's best known, dynamic personalities. National Treasurer for the past fifteen years, Carlo is a graduate of the College of Fine Arts of the Carnegie Institute of Technology (1929) where he was initiated into Rho Chapter in 1926. From Carnegie he moved on to the National Academy of New York where his artistic talents won him the Suydam Silver Medal award in 1931.

This was only one of many awards captured by Brother Carlo. Earlier, in 1924, he was top man in a field of 4492 entrants in the American Medical Association National Health Poster Competition. He was the winner of the U. S. Steel Corporation Industrial Safety Poster Council in 1925 and winner of the National Safety Council Safety Poster Contest in 1928.

Brother Carlo has also written many papers in English and Italian on Byzantinology, Monasticism and the Renaissance. He is listed in "Italian American Who's Who", "Famous Americans of Italian Descent", and "Who's Who in American Art".

An ardent worker for Alpha Phi Delta he has declined membership in other fraternal and social organizations to devote time to his Fraternity. Before serving as National Treasurer, Carlo was President of the Boston Alumni Club (1937-1941), 1st District Governor (1941-44) and Grand Tribune-Quaestor (National Secretary-Treasurer) (1944-45). He is also the recipient of the Outstanding Alumnus Award (1942) and a citation for expansion and improvement (1948).

Joseph A. Scioscia, National Vice-President has been continually active in Alpha Phi Delta since his undergraduate days.

Joe graduated from Massanutten Military Institute in 1946 and went on to receive his B.S. Degree at Duquesne University in 1951. There he was initiated into Psi Chapter (1947). From 1953-55 he served as Alumni Advisor to the Chapter. In 1955 he was elected Fifth District Governor, a position which he held until this year. As Governor of that District he installed Beta Rho Chapter at Gannon College.

Joe is a Korean War Veteran, having served as First Lieutenant in the U. S. Air Force (1951-53). His business activities include President of the Gateway Aerosol Company and Vice-President of Nu-Vita Products, Inc. He is a Resident Member of the Pittsburgh Athletic Association and is a member of the North Side Chamber of Commerce.

Joe is married and has three children. The Scioscias reside at 3555 Shadeland Avenue, Pittsburgh 12, Penna.

Formerly Art Director with the Radio-Keith Orpheum Theatres Corporation for Chicago, Cleveland, Indianapolis, Radio City and Boston (1929-1950), Carlo is now President of his own Company, the Cambridge Mailing and Printing Co. of Cambridge, Mass.

Carlo is married to the former Mary A. Picone. They have three children, Carole-Maria, Carlo, Jr., and David. The Vannicolos reside at 32 Eliot Road, Arlington, Mass.

**VANNICOLA, SCIOSCIA, ELECTED TO TOP POSTS;
DI VINCENZO, SCOTTI, NEW CENTRAL OFFICE;
ORGANIZATIONAL CHANGES MARK CONVENTION**

Carlo Vannicola, Rho, Past National Treasurer, and Joseph Scioscia, Psi, Past 5th District Governor were elected President and Vice-President respectively of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity at the 40th National Convention held at the Equinox House, Manchester, Vermont. The Grand Council voted in elections traditionally held on the last day of Convention, September 7th. They succeed outgoing President Joseph M. D'Urso and Vice-President Frank L. Tosi who served in their respective capacities for the past two years.

Two days earlier, the Grand Council in session had approved the Executive Committee's choice of a new Central Office. Adam DiVincenzo, past National President was elected National Secretary replacing Joseph DeGuglielmo who had agreed to continue in his old position temporarily after the untimely death of Fred Pagnato. Joseph Scotti, past President of the Pittsburgh Alumni Club was elected National Treasurer, replacing Carlo Vannicola. Both DeGuglielmo and Vannicola had served in their respective capacities for fifteen years.

Numerous other changes, many of them organizational, were recorded at this Convention which was attended by over 170 APD delegates and their families. In a re-shuffling of its organization, the National House Fund Trustees, with the approval of the Grand Council, elected its own Secretary-treasury thereby relieving Central Office of the administrative duties of this group. Dr. Domenic A. Macedonia, formerly chairman of the Trustees, was elected Secretary-treasurer while Joseph A. DeGuglielmo was elected Chairman. Elected to succeed himself to a three year term as trustee was Francis Palladino, LIAC, while Julius Zangrille, new Fifth District Governor, was elected to complete Joseph Scotti's term which has two years to run.

The National House Fund Trustees now consists of permanent members Hon. Joseph A. DeGug-

lielmo, Chairman, Dr. Domenic A. Macedonia, Dr. Walter Primarana, and Dr. Horace Gioffredo; rotating elected members Francis Palladino, 4th District Governor Augustus Sigismondi and 5th District Governor Julius Zangrille, and Adam DiVincenzo and Joseph Scotti by virtue of their position as Central Office.

Also semi-detached from Central Office's immediate duties is the Convention Committee operations which sets and negotiates the sites of each Convention. Joseph A. DeGuglielmo was named Chairman of this Committee.

The two above actions are taken as a move to decentralize some of the activities of Central Office thereby relieving it of some of its overburdening duties and provide a more efficient organization. Both actions were initiated by or sanctioned by the new Central Office.

In another move to streamline the organization, the Convention also established the position of two Travelling Secretaries. However, no monies were allocated for their activities and no individuals have been selected to fill these positions.

In other convention action, initiation fees for new members was increased to a total of \$30 in order to help meet the ever increasing expenses of the Fraternity.

The convention also unanimously passed a resolution condemning hazing of any sort thereby re-iterating the Fraternity's stand of many years on this matter.

AWARD WINNERS

Winners of the Alpha Phi Delta National Awards for achievement during the Fraternal Year 1959-1960 were announced at the 40th National Convention held at the Equinox House, Manchester, Vermont.

This year's Most Outstanding Chapter Award went to **Beta Theta, College of Steubenville, Steubenville, Ohio.** From September through June, the chapter enjoyed what is probably the most successful year in its twelve year history. The most active fraternity group on the school campus, no other organization on the Steubenville Campus is as highly regarded and respected by the students and faculty. The most outstanding event each year is the Annual Appreciation Banquet held in honor of the school's basketball team, generally regarded throughout the Tri State Area as the most elaborate sports affair of its kind.

Chosen as 1960's Most Outstanding Alumnus was **Dr. Horace C. Goffredo.** A familiar face at every convention, Horace has been one of the Fraternity's most active alumni for many years. Often called upon to serve on various committees, Dr. Goffredo is presently a permanent member of the National House Fund. He is no less active in his own area, the 4th District, where he is a hard working member of the Philadelphia Alumni Club and was among those instrumental in obtaining a Chapter House for Beta Delta Chapter at Temple University.

The year's Most Outstanding Undergraduate was **Samuel Lamana, Beta Omicron, Youngstown University.** Brother Sam has been highly instrumental in the rejuvenation of Beta Omicron Chapter which is presently enjoying rapid expansion to place it in its best position in several years.

Certificates to other outstanding undergraduates were awarded to **Eugene V. Benevenia, Beta Pi, St. John's University; Charles Augustine, Psi, Duquesne University; and Patsy DiNicola, Beta Theta, College of Steubenville.**

SOCIAL HIGHLIGHTS OF APD'S 40th NATIONAL CONVENTION: FUN, FROLIC AND FRATERNALISM

Alpha Phi Delta's 40th National Convention may have had a somewhat smaller gathering than last year's Galen Hall crowd but it was no way dimmed in its enthusiasm. Traditionally, it's always fair weather when APD men get together and the Equinox House gathering was no exception, this despite the fact that it rained on Sunday, the day of the Executive Committee meeting. (It's also a tradition that it rains on the first day.)

EARLY GATHERING

As indicated, the pre-convention proceedings started Sunday, September 4th with the Executive Committee meeting to review the status of the Fraternity and to recommend action to the Grand Council of some 35 chapters and alumni clubs. Social activity started that evening with an early bird reception to welcome the delegates, members, and their families. The next three days saw a happy combination of business and pleasure with the men participating in the business sessions in the morning, joining their wives and families in games and social activities both in the afternoon and evenings. Both men and women participated in the Memorial Services held for departed APD men on the first day of the Convention. This year's services were by far the most impressive yet held.

The business sessions in the morning, however, inevitably gave way to the social side of the convention. This year's highlights included a Dance Contest and a combination Barn Dance and Talent Contest. Prizes were awarded for all events.
