

MAKE RESERVATIONS NOW FOR APD TRIP TO ROME

As announced in the last issue of the KLEOS, the Convention Committee, Joseph A. DeGuglielmo Chairman, has chartered a round trip charter flight from New York to Rome, Italy, and return for 1963. The tentative schedule is roughly July, 1963 to August, 1963. Those eligible under CAB regulations are members of the Fraternity, their wives and children, parents and close relatives living with the member.

The Convention Committee has obtained a jet plane from Alitalia Airlines on which all meals and drinks will be served free of charge. The capacity of the plane is 134 people; the success of the flight depends on the Fraternity's ability to have sufficient reservations. Each passenger will have 55 pounds free baggage allowance.

Arrangements include dinner on the day of arrival at a famous Roman restaurant and get-together dinner the night before departure at another world famous restaurant. The Committee is in the process of attempting to arrange for a private audience with His Holiness, Pope John.

The cost of the above is \$350 per person. Reservations will be made on a first come first served basis. For a reservation there must be an accompanying deposit of \$50 per person. An additional \$100 will be required and the balance by March 15, 1963. Any reservation cancelled before February 1, 1963 will receive full refund of deposit. Any reservation cancelled after February 1, 1963 will receive a refund only in the event that the committee is able to obtain another passenger in its stead.

All reservations with deposits must be sent to Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, 1430 Massachusetts Ave., Cambridge 38, Mass.

The Committee has also made arrangements with a travel agency to make hotel bookings of all nature and descriptions, plan road tours and even obtain car rentals for those who are not of pioneer stock and wish to have all arrangements made for them.

This is the first such trip planned on an APD wide basis though it has been suggested at various occasions and with much enthusiasm. It is suggested, therefore, that reservations be made now as there will be many members who will want to take advantage of this opportunity.

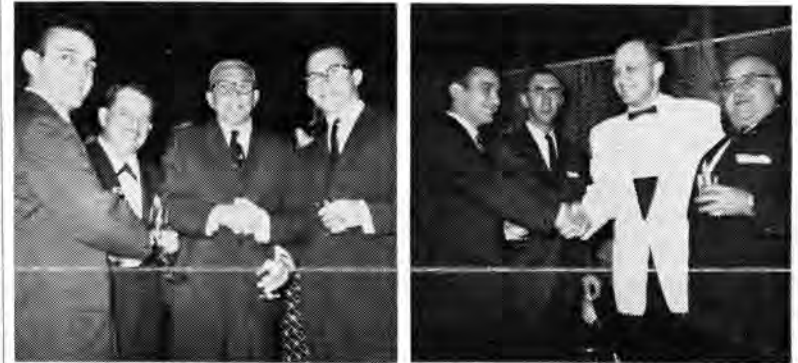
Highlight of the convention was the election of National Officers.

Joseph A. Scioscia, Psi, of Pittsburgh, was elected to the office of National President. Joe was formerly Fifth District Governor and for the past two years served as National Vice President.

Francis J. Paladino, Phi, of Flushing, New York was elected National Vice President. Frank has been a member of the National Housing Committee for the past three years. Frank will be remembered also for his interesting notes in the Dokime.

Julius J. Zangrille, Jr., Beta Lambda, of Pittsburgh was elected to a three year term on the National Housing Committee. Julius is the present 5th District Governor.

In legislative matters, one amendment to the Constitution was unanimously approved. The position of KLEOS Editor was made a member of

the Executive Committee with all the rights, privileges and penalties prescribed for other National Officers. The new National President re-appointed KLEOS Editor Stan Raffa to the position.

Outgoing President Carlo M. Vannicola was appointed as Supervisor for the First District.

The Convention officially opened Monday evening, September 3rd but many of the conventioners had already arrived the previous Saturday to enjoy the elaborate festivities of the

Labor Day Weekend. On Monday evening the delegation was entertained for more than two hours by Eddie Fisher. On Thursday evening the Grossinger Family gave Alpha Phi Deltan's an elaborate cocktail party. This was followed by the Fraternity's annual Grand Ball. Numerous activities and entertainment marked the entire convention period.

Business sessions were held in the morning. The Executive Committee and National Housing Committee met

Dr. Loiero has accepted a new position at Westfield State College in Westfield, Massachusetts as head of the Romance Language Department there.

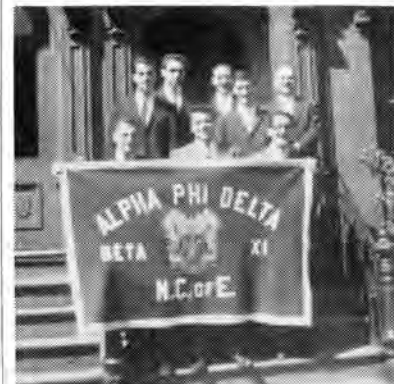

Buffalo AC Forms Convention Club

A novel idea was instituted by the Buffalo Alumni Club last year. This was the formation of a Convention Club, the purpose of which was to stimulate local interest and participation in the Fraternity's National Convention. The results were enthusiastic and the Club produced a fine representation at Grossinger's.

The plan has evoked a lot of interest among Alumni Clubs and Chapters in other areas, and in an effort to answer the numerous questions and assist others in formulating similar plans, we are presenting the Buffalo Convention Club's policies and format.

Membership

Club membership is open to all Alpha Phi Delta paying members of the local Alumni Club or undergraduate Chapter. (This is designed to induce and strengthen membership in local alumni clubs.)

Dues

Dues are five dollars per month per person. Twelve payments, September to and including August of the following year. The dues are designed to cover registration fee at the National Convention and also allow members to take advantage of advance registration at reduced rates.

Any member who at any time during the year and for any reason find it no longer possible to attend the convention are refunded the total dues they have paid in. Refunds are made at the end of the convention year.

Meetings

Meetings are held once a month. They may be held at members homes or at a public meeting place. The purpose is dual: First, to help plan and promote next year's convention in an effort to make it the best yet. This may be done by composing convention songs, creating costumes to identify your respective chapter or club, or plan a function to augment the convention program. Second, to keep meeting on a social level so all may have a good time in convention planning and generate a festive convention mood.

Fund Raising

Attempt to promote at least two money making projects. Two cardinal rules must be followed in selection of projects: No investment required and risk of loss of any funds. These rules must be observed because dues paid in are to be used for payment of registration fees or refunded to the members who do not attend. The Buffalo group sponsored a Night at the Philharmonic and were paid a commission on tickets sold. They also took orders for Easter candy upon which they also received a commission.

The funds raised on these projects are to be used for convention activities only and by those who attend. They may be used for group transportation, costumes, hospitality rooms or any other functions the group decides to sponsor at the convention.

Long Range Planning

The Buffalo group suggests that if there is national adoption of a Convention Club that a portion of the proceeds from the fund raising activities be allocated to either the Housing Fund, the Scholarship Fund or both.

Beta Xi Celebrates 10th Active Year; Dedicates New House Purchased by National House Fund

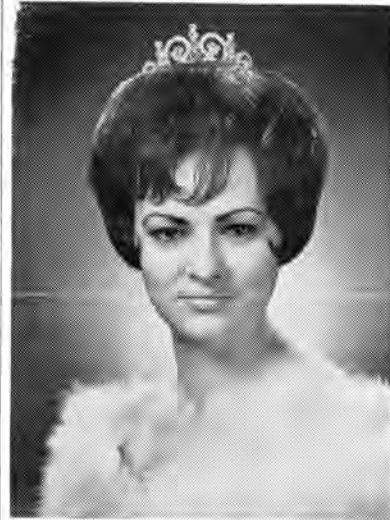
The post of President of the IFC is a very high and important one at the University of Buffalo and Brother Alessi is to be congratulated on his achievement.
