Another Fraternal Year Comes To An End

Now that we are in the month of May the realization dawns upon us that 1963 will soon mark the end of another fraternal year. It is timely, therefore, to give you just a brief outline of our accomplishments during the past year.

From our observations we find that our Alumni Clubs are taking a more active interest in our fraternity. When the Annual Report is published you will note that many good Alpha Phi Delta brothers have mailed in their \$5.00 annual per capita.

At this point we wish to mention that the following Alumni Clubs send in the \$5.00 per capita to the Central Office as a group; they are: Buffalo, Columbus, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, and Steubenville. We would like to see more Clubs operate under this same system.

INITIATIONS — We believe that our initiations are still keeping pace with the past three years. We regret that we must mention, at this time, that several Chapters insist on initiating new brothers and then fail to submit the reports until many months later. We do know that in some cases the boys are using the money for other reasons.

The Central Office is issuing a warning to Chapters who are in this category. If this system continues we are going to recommend expulsion for those involved. The initiation fee paid by a new member is not money for your Chapter to use for a social event. That money is to be mailed to the Central Office.

The 1963 National Convention of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity will be held on August 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30, 1963 at the Mount Washington Hotel, at Bretton Woods, New Hampshire.

Three and a half days and four nights in the Switzerland of America . . . for the sum of \$70 per person. All reservations paid in full by July 1, 1963 may take a discount of \$5 per person.

The price includes everything except gratuities. The package program starts after dinner on Monday, August 26 until after breakfast on Friday, August 30.

There will be special planned programs . . . Sightseeing trips — Franconia Notch — Old Man of the Mountain — Flume — Aerial Tramway — Antiquing Tour of the Old North Country — Cog Railway Trip to the Top of Mount Washington — Free Art Classes — Figure Control Demonstration — Silver Dollar Game — Unlimited Free Golf. The Golf Course is an 18 Hole P. G. A. Championship. Complimentary Dance Lessons Daily — Music by Two Orchestras — Floor Show Nightly — Midnight Snacks (Free) — Fashion Show and Tea — Planned Entertainment — plus Various Contests and Tournaments.

If you wish to go early the cost will be \$20 per day per person with double occupancy. Dinner on Monday evening, August 26 will cost \$6 per person.

Importance of College Fraternities

Your Central Office has just received a report on fraternities from Cornell University. The report was prepared by Assistant Dean of Students, Charles E. Warwick. It is a very interesting report and one which shows that a great deal of time was put into this project.

Mr. Warwick, in summary, writes: "Predicting the future of fraternities at Cornell is similar to the task of predicting the world situation in the year 2000. However, an article by President Malott of Cornell, in the December 4 issue of the CORNELL DAILY SUN, shed some light on the situation. President Malott reassured fraternities of their continued importance to the University. However, he cautioned that the system cannot exist in the form of gentlemanly dwellings, but must contribute to the intellectual development of all members."

In Memoriam**Dr. Charles J. Barone Passes Away**

On Friday evening, January 25, 1963, Dr. Charles J. Barone, Nu, passed away suddenly while visiting his sister, Rose Barone.

A beloved fraternity man and a most devoted friend, he served as National President of our fraternity from 1927 through 1929. During his tenure of office

the following Chapters were installed: Tau, Massachusetts Institute of Technology; Upsilon, Harvard University; Phi, University of Alabama; Chi, Penn State University; Psi, Duquesne University; and Omega, University of Rochester.

Dr. Barone was one of the nation's foremost obstetricians. He delivered more than 27,000 babies. He was born in Buffalo, New York and came to Pittsburgh, Pa. and Magee Hospital of Pittsburgh in 1915. In 1947 he became Chairman of Magee's Department of Obstetrics and two years later became the hospital's Medical Director. He also served as Chief of Obstetrics at St. Francis, St. John's and Montefiore Hospitals in Pittsburgh. For many years he was on the University of Pittsburgh teaching staff in the School of Medicine.

Among his many titles and appointments lies the biography of a man who believed that the birth of a baby was one of the greatest miracles. He said, "The creation of life is a function man hasn't much to do with. Embryological studies of a human cell show the marking of the future child — the landmarks that will be the eyes, or the legs, or the nose, or the lips. If this isn't Divine, I don't know what is."

Dr. Barone belonged to American and International College of Surgeons. He

also belonged to most State medical societies. He was the founder and past president of the Pittsburgh Obstetrical and Gynecological Society. He has written and presented several papers. He was recently preparing to make a tour of several countries to give lectures in Obstetrics.

The Dr. Charles J. Barone Lectureship and Infants Research were established through his efforts during the past two years.

Dr. Barone leaves his wife, Grace, a daughter, Mrs. Brown, his sister, Rose Barone, four grandchildren and a host of friends.

DEANS AGREE ON FRATERNITIES

The deans of nine men's colleges in the Northeast are agreed that fraternities have a place on the campus but must not interfere with the academic work of their members.

The deans met informally at Union College in Schenectady, New York, for the discussion of the role of fraternities in college life. Six national fraternities were founded at Union College.

A spokesman said the consensus was that fraternities should be retained so that students could continue to live together in small groups and share social experiences.

The spokesman also specified that the deans emphasized that fraternities must offer an atmosphere conducive to serious study, not provide obstacles to intellectual achievement. Without such an atmosphere, the deans said, the fraternities face the possibility that students will withdraw their local Chapters from the national organizations.

Colleges represented at the discussion were: Bowdoin, Wesleyan, Dartmouth, Lehigh, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Colgate, Hamilton, Trinity and Union.

- Plan his work and prepare his calendar.
- Confer with his predecessor.
- Confer with his secretary.
- Select committee chairmen.
- Prepare agenda for regular meetings and officers' meetings.
- Supervise program planning.
- Know the Chapter and Alumni Club By-Laws as well as National Constitution.
- Plan effective membership.
- Know the duties of all the other officers.
- Visit undergraduate Chapters in his area.
- Make sure each chairman makes a written report of his committee activity.
- Insist on good public relations between Chapters, Alumni Clubs and colleges and universities in your respective areas.
- Make sure all reports are completed and submitted to Central Office according to schedule.
