## GOLDEN JUBILEE CONVENTION PLANS SET; GRISWOLD TO HOST LARGEST CROWD IN APD HISTORY; VARIED PROGRAM TO HIGHLIGHT MOST MEMORABLE AFFAIR

Permanent Convention Chairman Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, PNP, and General Chairman for this year's convention, Dr. D. A. Macedonia, PNP, have announced that plans and preparations for Alpha Phi Delta's Golden Jubilee Convention have been completed. The Griswold Hotel and Country Club, located at Groton, Connecticut, is now readying to accept the largest crowd of Alpha Phi Delta Brothers and their families ever to gather under one roof for the yearly conclave.

This year, of course, the occasion is something special, it being the Fiftieth Anniversary of our beloved Fraternity. Convention chairmen "DeGug" and "Macey", therefore, are going all out to make it a memorable one. A full convention program has been arranged which includes an early bird reception on Monday evening, August

31st, an out-door New England Barbecue, a Talent Night and Masquerade Party, an old-fashioned New England Square Dance, and a New York floor show.

This year's Grand Ball, the annual closing highlight of the convention, will be a formal affair with the grand march to be led by Past National

Presidents and present National Officers.

The Talent Night and Masquerade Party are an old tradition with APD which has produced some of the more enjoyable convention moments. Over the years, the type of talent has been unrestricted, including not only some "legitimate" efforts by singers, dancers and comedians, but also grandiose spoofs of Fraternity life. As far back as the Rochester Convention of 1936, for example, Brother Joseph Alaimo, PNP, then an undergraduate of Cornell, had the leading role in "The Student Quince", a take-off on college life and fraternity pledging. At the conventions of the early fifties, we had the hilarious antics of those two inseparable baffoons. (Joe) Gentile and (Nick) Colassaco.

Past conventions have produced many other memorable moments. On many occasions we have enjoyed the marvelous monologue of Bro. Bob Santangelo's reminiscences of New York's lower east side, "Figli D'Italia". And who can forget the uproarious "ladies" fashion show put on by the alumni at the Magnolia Convention of 1951.

As for the masquerade parties, it will be hard to beat the costumes and impromptu transformation of APD men and girls into zulu dancers, Indians, Roman emperors, buddahs, shieks, beatniks, organ grinders and even bathroom showers at the Galen Hall Convention of 1959.

In this festive Fiftieth Year, it is anticipated that the regular attendees will be joined by many of the "old-timers" who may have missed recent conventions. It is hoped that every living Past National President will be able to attend and join in the festivities. Similarly, many past national officers and chapter founders are expected to add their presence to the occasion.

Certainly this year's event is one that no alumnus or undergraduate should miss. For the alumnus it should be a sentimental journey spirited by the fond memories of his college days. For the undergraduate it should be a pilgrimage, borne of fraternal vows, seeking a firmer grasp of his fraternal heritage.

What more splendid occasion could there be for ALL Alpha Phi Delta men to join in fraternal hand-clasp than this year's Fiftieth Anniversary Convention?

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## CONVENTION BUSINESS

On the business-side of this year's convention, several Constitutional amendments have been submitted to Central Office for consideration of the Grand Council. The following is an abbreviated digest of these amendments, the full wordage of which would be too long to quote here.

In accordance with Constitutional provisions, each proposed amendment was forwarded to Central Office by April 1st and have already been circulated among voting entities for their consideration prior to Grand Council action.

## ARTICLE III—Membership

Rephrase Section 3, Membership of the Grand Council, to provide that of the two delegates for each Chapter, one must be an undergraduate and if this one undergraduate is not present, then neither can there be designated any graduate-Alumnus to serve as sole representative for an undergraduate chapter. In other words, the chapter may elect an undergraduate and an alumnus to represent the chapter at Grand Council meetings but if the undergraduate delegate is not present the alumnus cannot solely represent the chapter.

With respect to alumni clubs, representation would consist of one delegate for each alumni club with twenty members or less in good standing plus one delegate for each twenty members or major fraction in excess thereof. The factor in determining this representation would be the actual payment of dues to Central Office as of June 1st each year.

Rephrase Section 5, Expenses of National Convention Members to provide for payment by the National Treasurer of half of the approved expenses of the undergraduate delegates and nothing to the alumni delegates whether representing chapters or alumni clubs.

The above amendments have been proposed by Central Office, Adam DiVincenzo, Secretary, Joseph Scotti, Treasurer.

## ARTICLE VII—Officers of the Grand Council

Amend Section 1 to permit the Grand Council to "provide one or more traveling secretaries whose duties shall include visiting the units of the Fraternity and assisting Central Office to improve the internal organization."

Amend Section 2 to include qualifications and restrictions for Traveling Secretaries. They include that they must be graduates of an accredited college and may be members of Alpha Phi Delta, and that they be under the direct supervision of Central Office.

Define the powers and duties of the Traveling Secretaries which would include frequent visitations at both meetings and social engagements, recommend ways and means for Chapter improvement, recommend action to Central Office directed toward any Chapter which is not meeting the high standards set in the Preamble and Purpose clause of the Constitution, and to present an annual report of his findings and recommendations on each chapter.

The above was submitted by Xi Chapter, Ohio State, February 29, 1964.

Another proposed amendment to this article, Section 10 provides for the selection of a National Traveling Secretary annually by the Executive Committee with the approval of the National Convention. Duties similarly described above are defined.

The above was submitted by Mu Chapter, Cornell University, March 28, 1964.

Another amendment to this Article, Section 2 would provide for the election of a District Mayor in each District having five or more active Chapters and/or alumni clubs, for each three or major portion thereof over the initial three entities. The District Mayors are to help the District Governors and may be graduate or undergraduate members. They are to be elected annually by the National Delegates from the entities in that District during the annual District Convention through the candidate need not be a delegate. He must be a Life Subscriber and shall be listed as a National Officer.

The powers and duties of the District Mayor would be defined in Section 10 of Article VII to include visitation and supervision of entities assigned him by the District Governor, the preparation of an Annual Report with penalties for not doing same, and the rights, privileges and obligations of a National Officer.

## Material Pours In For APD History; Rare Photos, Papers Received; Additional Information Needed As Fiftieth Anniversary Project Nears Completion

We are happy to announce that tremendous progress has been made in preparing the Fiftieth Anniversary edition of the History of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. Now ready for review and printing are approximately 100 items including biographical sketches of Past National Presidents, present National Officers, dominant and prominent personalities and chapter, college and alumni club histories. In addition, the already available history of the years 1914-1940 has been reviewed and additional information included. Presently being written are the years 1941 through 1964.

Response to recent requests for fraternal information has been very good. Our special thanks go to Brother Dr. Felix Ottaviano, PNP, who forwarded considerable material and photographs related to the years of the thirties. Included was a photograph of the 1935 convention (described in this issue) and a rare photo-

graph of the 1945 Executive Committee meeting (which we are saving for a subsequent issue). We are convinced that many other photographs of significant events and years are still available. All holders of same are urged to forward these pieces of memorabilia so that we may be able to share them with our Brothers.

Brother Ottaviano also forwarded copies of various Convention minutes dating as far back as 1929. Equally illuminating was Brother National Vice President Francis Paladino's information on Phi Chapter. Similar information is solicited from other Brothers.

We are still waiting to hear from many chapters, particularly about their schools. It is our intention to give a brief history of each school where Alpha Phi Delta is represented. If your chapter has not yet submitted this information, please arrange to do so immediately through your Chap-

ter Secretary or KLEOS reporter. A photograph is a must!

Alumni Clubs have also been lax in submitting material. This group should be a fertile source of information, not only about themselves but about individual chapters and prominent personalities in their areas. Quick response is requested.

As now envisioned, the Fiftieth Anniversary Edition of the History of Alpha Phi Delta will consist of more than 30,000 words of basic text, and more than 30,000 words of incidental and illuminating information. This latter portion represents the biographical sketches and material previously mentioned and will be interspersed throughout the publication. At least 150 photographs are expected to enliven the edition.

Though time is getting short, we are always eager to receive additional information whether it be about a chapter, school, alumni club or alumnus. Contribute to the history of your Fraternity by sending us whatever information you may have available NOW!

Just before press time, this office received additional material which greatly increases the amount of reference and usable matter.

Brother Carlo Vannicola, PNP, has forwarded some interesting information relative to the beginnings of Rho Chapter and some productive leads for contacts which could supply more information about Rho, Sigma and other Chapters. In addition, he has supplied a rare copy of a history prepared by Dr. Felix Ottaviano for the years 1939-41 and another prepared by Amleto Di Giusto, Past National Vice-president.

Mu Chapter has also submitted various mementos of its past history, namely a number of old photographs of past formals and activities dating back to 1937. It is an interesting collection and although there are some cracks in the photos, we will be able to rehabilitate them and make them usable.

Perhaps the biggest bonanza thus far is Dr. Horace Gioffredo, 4th District Governor. Brother Horace writes that he has located, in his attic, photographs of the 1937, 1939, 1940 and 1941 national conventions. With this acquisition, we will have a photograph of every convention of the thirties with the exception of 1936. In addition he is forwarding the two issues of the KLEOS of 1930. Also, he has commissioned some brothers to write the history of Lambda and Beta Delta Chapters.

We hope this kind of cooperation becomes contagious. Despite the considerable amount of material we have received, there is a great deal missing. The only convention photographs of the 1920's that we have are 1924, 1925 and 1927. Our collection from 1945 on is limited. There are, no doubt, many photographs of chapter or alumni club installations which we are not aware of. And we would like to complete our collection of KLEOS' (1929, 1931, 1932 and W.W. II years are missing) as these are an excellent source of material. Minutes of national convention or executive committee meetings are most welcome.

Our history will be as complete as the material we receive. Please help us to make it as thorough as possible.

## ARTICLE XII, Section 5—Annual Dues

Add: Any member of Alpha Phi Delta who has given to the fraternity full payment of a pledged sum of money and received from Central Office evidence that said full payment entitled him to paid up Life Membership in the fraternity is exempted from any future payments of annual Alumni Dues.

## ARTICLE XXVI—Definitions and Usage of Terms

Add: A paid up Life Member is any member who by virtue of his payment of a certain sum of money is exempted from Annual Alumni Dues. A paid up Life Member is also entitled to the rights and privileges of a Life Subscriber.

Both of the above proposed changes were submitted by Xi Chapter Ohio State, March 25, 1964.

## ARTICLE XI

Section 5 changed to read that each alumnus of the Fraternity be assessed the sum of \$10.00 annually.

## ARTICLE XVI—Assessments for the Support of the Grand Council

Amend to provide compensation for the Traveling Secretaries as determined by the Grand Council and that the Grand Council be re-imbursed and the means of paying shall be decided by the Executive Committee.

To approve Per Capita Tax to \$18.00 annually

## ARTICLE XXVII—Life Subscription Fund

This proposed amendment would define, constitutionally, the purpose, organization, meetings, powers and restrictions associated with the Life Subscription Fund. The aim of the Fund would be to provide participating Brothers with fraternity publications for the rest of their lives. The Fund would be controlled by a Board of seven Trustees: one would be the immediate past National President, the second the current National Vice President, the next two would be the current National Treasurer and National Secretary, and the last three as elected by a majority of the National Convention for a period of three years, one term expiring each year. These last three could not be members of the National Executive Committee or of the Building Fund Plan. The trustees would meet at least twice each year, once at the National Convention and coincidentally with the Executive Committee Spring Meeting.

The powers of the trustees would include: determination of the individual subscription rates needed to attain the purpose of the fund; to invest the principal of the subscription income in accordance with the Trust Laws of the State of New York; to utilize the interest and/or profit from investments to cover the expense of fraternity publications going to their subscribers whether by subsidizing the National Fraternity or publishing direct; to enter into agreement with the National Fraternity or any of its component parts for mutual benefit and accomplishment; to assume full control and responsibility over all funds ever collected by Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity in the name of the Life Subscribers Fund.

Restrictions would include: that the principal received as the price of subscription must be held in trust and never be spent; subscriptions once contracted, received and paid for must be honored by the Fund for the lifetime of the Subscriber; any changes made in the future must never be construed to be retroactive; and that no trustee receive personal financial compensation for his time or travelling expenses.

## The 1935 Convention

The 1935 National Convention, Alpha Phi Delta's Nineteenth, was held at the Hotel Seneca in Rochester, New York. Dedicated to the "old-timers" of the Fraternity it was hosted by Omega Chapter at the University of Rochester, and the Rochester Alumni Club under the chairmanship of Dr. Felix Ottaviano.

The world was still in the midst of a depression that year and the effects were no less evident in Alpha Phi Delta. With 32 chapters installed, the official record listed 30 as being active but with only a total active undergraduate membership of 320, a drop of 87 in three years. The number of men initiated were 165, a drop of 29 during the same period. Significantly, three chapters were suspended by convention time, indicating that at least several of those listed active were already on the verge of disintegration. Alumni Clubs were in somewhat better shape: thirteen chartered and listed as active, several of which were meeting regularly and maintaining an aggressive program.

The Rochester Convention will be remembered for the progressive action which removed the Grand Tribune-Quaestor (National Secretary-Treasurer) from the realm of convention floor politics by making the office appointive. A resolution was introduced and adopted, which, in essence, provided that the office be appointed by three-fourths vote of the members of the executive committee, that he be appointed from the graduate membership body, that he receive the sum of \$600 per annum for stenographic and clerical services, that he be not entitled to vote on any question, and that he be not eligible to become a candidate for any elective office of the fraternity for a period of two years from the termination of his office. It was also resolved that a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Executive Committee was necessary to discharge the Grand Tribune-Quaestor.

In addition, the practice of using the District Pro-Consul election merely as a soothing method of drowning the ambitions of the men who aspired to be head of the Fraternity was eliminated by having each district elect its own Pro-Consul, the present counterpart of District Governor. This, perhaps, was

an even greater concession to democratic processes since it now permitted the district constituents to exercise their desires for elective representation on the executive committee might be closer to and more understanding of its particular needs.

At the convention's end, Francis X. Pagano who had served as Grand Tribune-Quaestor for the fourth official year, was unanimously elected Grand Consul (National President). It was an honor well earned and deserved for Brother Pagano who had worked tirelessly for Alpha Phi Delta since his initiation at Eta Chapter in 1921. Lawrence Culiano was elected Grand Historian, Joseph Larca, Grand Chaplain, and Dr. Felix Ottaviano, Grand Delegate.

Interestingly enough, however, when it came time for the Executive Committee to choose a Tribune-Quaestor, neither nominees Philip Repino nor Frank Brescia could attain the three-quarter majority necessary for the appointment. After numerous ballots taken at more than four sessions of the committee called by the new Grand Consul during the last half day and night of the convention, the convention adjourned without a secretary. For failure of having a successor elected to his office, the Grand Consul had to retain his Tribune-Quaestor job and for a period was obligated to perform all the duties pertinent to the new offices of the Fraternity. It appeared, therefore, at least for a while, that although the office had been removed from the politics of the convention arena, it had moved into the politics of a more exclusive body.

Later, by mail ballot, Philip Repino was finally selected Grand Tribune-Quaestor after Frank Brescia convinced his supporters to vote for Repino. Repino held the position until 1939 during which time he performed tirelessly and diligently. His published report at the 20th National Convention the following year was a tremendous and thorough effort. Not surprisingly, the man who was equally qualified and was stubbornly supported against him at the 1935 Convention was chosen as his successor at the Buffalo Convention in 1939.

## LIAC HAS MOST PROGRESSIVE YEAR; ATTENDANCE, ACTIVITIES, ENTHUSIASM HIT NEW HIGH

The Long Island Alumni Club continues to function smoothly and soundly, according to the Club's President, Gene Cassiano. Financially, the club has met all national, Third District, and internal financial obligations promptly and without default. All members are current on their payment of dues. In addition, this year, the club has instituted the collection of National Alumni dues through L.I.A.C. These dues are forwarded by the treasurer to Central Office with due credit given to the individual member and the Alumni Club.

Most significant this year was the club's increase in attendance at the regular meetings, dinner meetings and functions. Whereas previous attendance averaged 17 Brothers, present average is 26 Brothers, with an all-time dinner meeting high of 56 Brothers and wives. Also attending the meetings for the first time this year were representatives from the undergraduate group of Beta Pi Chapter at St. Johns University.

Brother Cassiano believes that it would be naive to think that the enthusiasm the club has generated and the increase in attendance is due to any one thing accomplished this year. On the contrary, he feels that it is mostly due to the tremendous efforts of the club and members during previous years, in canvassing alumni living in the Long Island area, and the culmination of these efforts in their recently published Long Island Directory, a piece of work that rivals the National Directory. Outstanding in supervising and publishing this document was Brother LoCasto.

Recognizing that the office of Secretary is the life-line of its existence, the club elected Bob Rini last year

who had done a magnificent job in sending out the L.I.A.C. monthly newsletter which is both newsy and timely. The newsletter reaches the individual Brother within five days of the coming monthly meeting as a reminder. At the beginning of the club year, each Brother is sent, along with the first meeting notice, a copy of the club's Activity Program which lists, chronologically, each regular meeting (wives invited as noted), each dinner meeting, and each social event. Thus, each Brother knows exactly when, where and what the Long Island Alumni Club will be doing for the entire year. The Activity Program has been drawn and administered by Chairman Brother Joe Catapano. All dinners, parties and dances have been very capably arranged and managed under Joe's supervision—a veritable Perle Mesta of the Long Island Alumni Club.

To stimulate interest at the club's dinner meetings, the program calls for a speaker who may or may not be a Brother of Alpha Phi Delta. At their last dinner meeting, Speaker Chairman Vince Amico was instrumental in inviting Lt. Mario Biaggi, now Assistant Secretary of New York State, and

the most decorated officer in the New York City Police Department.

A recent innovation to the activities program this year was a Sunday afternoon cocktail party which was enthusiastically attended and acclaimed.

For family and friends, the club holds an annual Spring Dance and summer family picnic. Another gala affair is the Halloween party. For the playgoers, the club sponsors a theatre party.

This year, in order to make the guide lines and governing laws of L.I.A.C. more meaningful and accurate to the type or organization it is today, the members amended and clarified their By-Laws with the most capable assistance of Brother Noel Giambalvo under whose guidance several important revisions were made. One of the most important additions to the By-Laws was the institution of a Trustee Council, whose main interest will be the perpetuation and guidance of the Long Island Alumni Club.
