The Executive meeting was called to order by National President Francis Palladino. Present were National President Trent Ciarrochi, Central Office and all of the District Governors. Absent because of distance were National Chaplain Rev. Salvatore Federici and KLEOS Editor Stan Raffa, both of whom are in California. National House Committee members were all in attendance for their meetings.

The Executive Committee meeting was preceded by a Breakfast sponsored by Central Office that morning. Following the meetings, the committees journeyed to Brooklyn and enjoyed the hospitality of the Third District at the Beta Eta House. The officers were officially greeted by Third District Governor Armand DeRosa.

On Sunday morning, February 21st, the Third District sponsored their annual Corporate Communion and Breakfast which was attended by many of committee members.

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**THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

It has been significant that too many alumni repulse appeals for assistance with varying degrees of apathy, disgust, and what sometimes appears alien smugness, and friendly disdain. This is indeed a sorry demonstration of fraternalism, a picayune regard for ideals, and a voice raised with miniscule sentiments. Certainly, the ideals of fraternity, the preamble and the tenets of the national interfraternity council, and countless hundreds of Alpha Phi Deltans cannot be mistaken or illogical.

When numerous members ask: What is National doing for us?, can this honestly be lack of understanding toward their fraternity, or is this a dissatisfaction engendered by national office?. Let us look at this situation. With the system of taxation available to it, national office is able to, and must provide certain measures and guiding oversight.

In keeping with the dignity and status of a National fraternity, it is necessary to: maintain active membership as a senior member in the National Interfraternity Council. Maintain an office of National Headquarters. Maintain a system of correspondence with chapters, and alumni entities. Maintain and adequate supply of printed forms, questionnaires, and miscellaneous but necessary office paraphernalia. Maintain bookkeeping and accounting for the chapter, and also alumni records. Maintain the liaison with college officials, and/or by necessity or invitation participate in certain visitations. Maintain the control and certification with L. G. Balfour, fraternity jewelers. Maintain custody of the official seals, and insignia. Maintain supervision or knowledgeable status of the activities of the National Housing Trustees. Maintain the status of the Annual National Conventions, together with its principal functions and its financing. Maintain the status of the two called meetings of the Executive Committee as to purpose, time, place, and recording. Maintain the supervision and financing essential for the publication of Kleos, News letters, and the publications necessary to chapter operations. Bearing in mind these apparent necessary functions, also mindful of the fact that National Officers perform this mass of duties without salary or financial remuneration, and also mindful of the very important Constitutional and Legislative restraint upon these individuals; I submit, that an elementary examination in bookkeeping will establish both the veracity in this stewardship, and the course of action with respect to the expectations of the members at large. I further submit that no one knows just what it is that the undergraduate chapter requires of its National Office; but it is suspected that frequently solicitation for aid, raising of criticism of National's lack of service to the chapters, may very well be the smoke screen that covers and confuses the indolence, lack of initiative, and the absence of attitudes of self-reliance, and chapter enterprize.

Perhaps this is the panic button. I do not know. These have been observations, and certainly would be receptive to whatever information and help or advice designed to ameliorate conditions. It is not fully known wherein is the true and exact analysis of this situation. The fact does remain, that chapter activities as to progress and accomplishments are quite divergent. There is no standard formulae for treating these ills. There are standards however; for initiative, hard work, and self-reliance.

In the fraternity system at large; and, I refer to all denominations of the Greek Letter undergraduate chapters, the general practice of chapter and national office relationship is one wherein the chapters do for themselves—that is, graduate alumni and current undergraduate members are self-sustaining. These chapters are taxed by central office, and in return central office performs the tasks of a headquarters very much as does Alpha Phi Delta. In the majority of instances, chapter groups are not abandoned by their alumni brothers.

However, the housing committees together with the chapter's financial ability and chapter alumni associations aid and direct the establishment of fraternity houses, or new buildings. These national offices, guaranty convention delegates full travelling and hotel expenses, also provide for salaried officers. In addition, pre-convention meetings, executive meetings, and special conclaves are held. Chapter representation is mandatory, but expenses are paid. The apparent result of this is that convention, and/or special meetings representation becomes an incentive position.

The position of chapter delegates is thus placed beyond the mere influence of individual aspirations, personal financial ability, or a chapters reward to "A nice Guy", but totally lacking in that quality desired in a member representative. Publications offices of many fraternities are able to operate (Continued next page)

Nardone, M.D. The recipient of the 1964 Annual Loyalty Award was cited in recognition of the 33 years of continuous service as a founder and loyal member of the Graduate Club. Dr. Nardone also was cited for his service as a physician, soldier and citizen of the Italo-American community.

Dr. Nardone was born August 5th, 1905, the son of the late Antonio and Rosa Flocco Nardone. He is a graduate of South Philadelphia High School (1922) and the University of Pennsylvania (A.B., 1926; M.D., 1929). He is a founder of Lambda Chapter at the University.

Dr. Joseph A. Scarano, toastmaster of the evening, presented the speakers. Each speaker represented a different avenue of activity. The Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. R. Cumiskey, Pastor, St. Laurence's, Upper Darby, Pa., spoke of Dr. Nardone's contributions to the archdiocese's pre-marital lectures. Dominic J. Dr. Hazo's other books include "Discovery and Other Poems," "The Quiet Wars" and "Hart Crane: An Introduction and Interpretation."

## This Is Your Fraternity - - Moments From The History Of Alpha Phi Delta

### FIRST ALUMNI CLUB



Which was the first alumni club chartered by the Grand Council of Alpha Phi Delta? The Cleveland Alumni Club back in 1928. Its charter and by-laws adopted at that time became a model for other clubs. Leading founders were Victor S. Leanza (who became APD's National President, 1939-1941), Joseph Larca, John Cortelli and James Gaudio.

The photo comes to us by way of Brother Leanza who wrote the original Fraternity History 1930-1940 and who has taken a special interest in this edition. Although we

will not attempt to name all the Brothers in the photo, taken in 1940, many of the Fraternity's past activities are included. Leanza is fourth from right, seated.

Cleveland alumni club activity was limited until recently when the club was re-vamped. Newly elected officers who will serve until May 1966 are Edward Rinaldi, M.D., President; Guy Di Carlo, Vice President; and Flory Day, Secretary-Treasurer. They have already initiated an active program for the men in the area with a monthly publication.

### BETA XI — PRE-APD



Long before there became a Beta XI Chapter, Delta Sigma Zeta Fraternity had been operating at the Newark College of Engineering as a local with ideals parallel to those of APD. As a matter of fact, as early as 1930, negotiations were held between both Fraternities with a view toward the local becoming a chapter of the national. Unfortunately, this was not to come about until 1951.

This photo was taken February 22, 1931 at a banquet given at Deutsch's Restaurant, Newark New Jersey at

which National President Peter Sammartino and PNP Paul Salvatore were guests. The photo is of the members of the chapter and comes to us through the courtesy of long-time activity in both organizations, "Em" Faruolo.

Beta Epsilon? Of course! Organized at Bucknell University on November 16, 1930. Unfortunately it closed its doors about 1938 because there were not sufficient men of Italian extraction attending the University to sustain the organization.

Though brief, the chapter's history was lively, and, in the words of Brother Marc Shackatano who forwarded the rare photo, the chapter accomplished what it had set out to do: make boys of Italian parents acceptable and sought after by other fraternities.

in this expensive medium with freedom of movement and a frequency and variety of material, because sizeable sums of money are at the disposal of national headquarters. In short, all chapters on the local level have a constant feeling and reminder, in this liaison with National. Apart from the ordinary routine mass or corresponding literature, the good will and the continued parade of literature is like the everlasting advertising campaign.

Will it or not, this is a satisfying answer to individual ego; provides good will, is a constant reminder of the national status of the chapter, and unfolds to the pledge brothers, and new members the magnitude of their chapter on the national level.

Alpha Phi Delta, I am certain, could satisfactorily meet these standards. You have guessed at the solution; if I may repeat myself, they are within the realm dominated by undergraduate good will, enterprize, initiative, and intra-chapter cohesion. This calls for full cooperation and assistance from the chapter's alumni members; and above all, irrespective of the feelings and prejudices of many, it demands our reevaluation toward finances.

The majority of national fraternities operate as Big Business, and so are able to flourish and bring satisfaction to all individuals within the organization. According to several surveys they still fall short of attaining the maximum help and beneficial returns because of the vast numbers of lost alumni members. Would it be too severe a shock to our vanity to state that Alpha Phi Delta is operating under the handicaps of inadequate finances?; and that the initial solutions to these shortcomings remains at the discretion of alumni? If you do not think so; then examine if you please, the record. The other alternative, is an honest examination of the conscience. Your fraternity is Big Business. Its service must have the assurance of sufficient and continuing support.

This message to you seeks to exhort all entities of our fraternity, and to signal what is hoped the initiation of a new frontier. You and I would relish the thought that on all levels, we saw fit to enrich ALPHA PHI DELTA.

### In Defense Of Our Country

**Captain Russell J. Tagliareni**, Beta Xi, recently completed the rigorous U.S. Air Force survival and special training course conducted by the Air Training Command at Stead AFB, Nevada.

Captain Tagliareni, an electronic warfare officer, received combat-type escape and evasion training to enable him to survive under adverse climatic conditions and hostile environments. He was then assigned to a unit at Eglin AFB, Fla., which supports the Strategic Air Command mission of keeping the nation's intercontinental missiles and jet bombers on constant alert.

He is a graduate of St. Peter's Preparatory School and was commissioned upon completion of the ROTC Program at Newark College of Engineering where he received a B.S. degree in civil engineering. His wife Patricia is the daughter of retired colonel and Mrs. W. C. Barrett of Gulfport, Miss. Captain Tagliareni's parents reside in Jersey City, New Jersey.

**Arnaud R. LaPierre**, Mu, of Norwich, Connecticut, has been promoted to first lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force at Havre Air Force Station, Montana. He is presently personnel officer in a unit that supports the Air Defense Command mission of defending the continental U.S. against enemy air attack.

A graduate of Berkshire High School in Sheffield, Mass., the lieutenant attended Cornell University and received a B.A. degree from the University of Connecticut. He attended Fresno (Calif.) State College as a graduate student and is a member of Theta Sigma Chi. He was commissioned upon completion of Officer Training School at Lackland AFB, Texas. He is married to the former Sally Ann Borg of West Suffield, Connecticut.

**Captain Dominick J. Corea**, Psi, graduated last June from the U.S. Air Force Command and Staff College at the Air University, Maxwell AFB, Alabama. He was one of more than 500 graduates who marked the end of more than nine months of professional military education for career Air Force captains and majors. ## NIC & NPC EXHIBIT AT NY WORLD FAIR TO BE REPEATED THIS YEAR

Visitors at the New York World's Fair viewed the special fraternity and sorority exhibit on display in the Hall of Free Enterprise for a three-week period last summer. The exhibit was sponsored jointly by the National Panhellenic Conference and the National Interfraternity Conference in cooperation with the American Economic Foundation, which erected the Hall of Free Enterprise to dramatize the basic principles of free economics in our modern society in a simple, understandable manner for the average man.

To help explain the exhibit to visitors, 19 hostesses and hosts chosen from among the staffs of various national fraternity and sorority headquarters were assigned during the three-week period.

In keeping with the general theme of the Hall of Free Enterprise, the fraternity and sorority exhibit was entitled: "Young Partners in Free Enterprise." A leaflet explaining the six basic values of fraternal life was specially prepared for the occasion and distributed to visitors viewing the display. The six values—loyalty, training, scholarship, standards, management, and citizenship—formed the basis for the various display panels in the exhibit.

In its preface, the leaflet pointed out that "millions of men and women have shared in the educational experience of membership in a college fraternity or sorority—an experience that continues to pay dividends in later life. For these voluntary organizations, with chapters in hundreds of university and college campuses, represent the true spirit of free enterprise. They bring together young people of diverse interests, working towards a common goal."

The exhibit was limited to a three-week period since the space was donated by the American Economic Foundation on a rotating basis among a large number of other participating sponsors.

It is planned to display the fraternity and sorority exhibit again this summer during the final season of the New York World's Fair. While the exact dates have not been scheduled as yet, it is probable that the showing will be for a similar three-week period sometime during mid-summer of 1965.
