## THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

### THE STATE OF THE FRATERNITY

Tradition has it that an outgoing officer will his thoughts and recommendations, together with a retrospective appraisal for his administrative term. Factually, any appraisal would be better left to the judgment of my fraternity at large. I have a personal attitude of criticism which forever bans any feelings of satisfied smugness.

I accepted this office with the knowledge that certain things were wanting, and certain other phases of fraternity behaviour needed much uplifting together with serious emphasis in several areas. I have repeatedly preached these matters both to undergraduates and alumni. I have not enjoyed complete fulfillment of all these expectations, but I am prepared to admit that the seeds have been properly sown. Further patient and prudent cultivation must follow.

The overall picture creditably indicates that the undergraduates, individually, and through the offices of their respective district governors, have demonstrated an increased fervor and vigor in their many house and campus activities. Their scholastic record, as posted by the National Interfraternity Conference Statistics, rates Alpha Phi Delta among the top leaders. I have been fortunate indeed to have had the full and continuous cooperation from Central Office, and generally from most of the Governors. The results have shown that the average chapter entity has increased its cooperation with the fraternity on the National level. The Alumni activities indicate increased interests and the continued good will of several in their relations with the chapter groups, resulting in satisfactory *esprit de corps* between the undergraduates and the alumni.

Thanks to the energetic efforts of our National Expansion Committee Chairman, several potential contacts promise to result in the establishment of new colonies. One cannot appreciate the complexity and the volume of work necessary for the proper annexation of a new chapter. During the past two years the efforts of the Housing Trustees have been varied, increased in scope, and presently indicating added responsibilities marking their continued successful administration.

I wish to personally thank all the Officer entities, the undergraduate personnel, and the alumni groups who have shown continued or renewed interests. Perhaps no little thanks are due to the excellent stewardship of the Governors, This Office, and I personally, wish to thank our KLEOS Editor, not alone for his preparation and editorship of our national publication, but also for the monumental task which evolved in the preparation of the Alpha Phi Delta History volume.

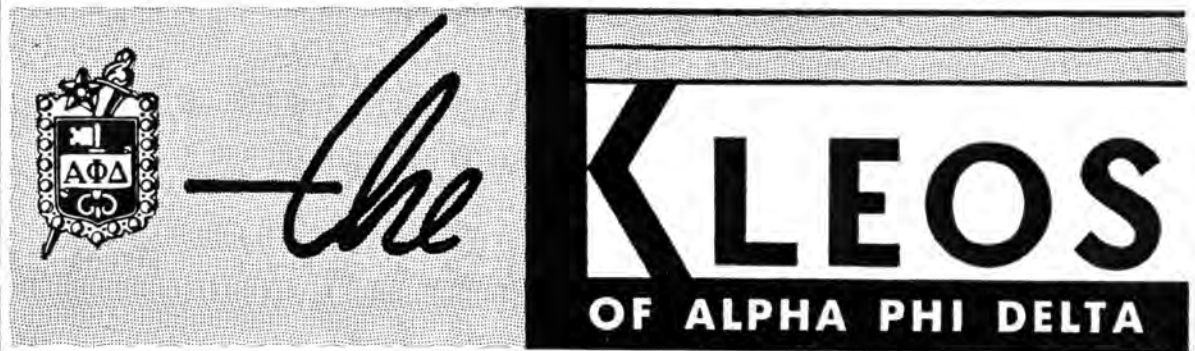
In my opinion, our Fraternity has progressed. The evidence points to increased interests on all levels, and the prospects shortly of several new colonies.

## TAMIMENT CONVENTION TO RIVAL LAST YEAR'S SUCCESS; EXPANSION TO BE KEYNOTE OF BUSINESS SESSIONS; SOCIAL PROGRAM TOPS IN ENTERTAINMENT

Final arrangements for this year's 46th National Convention at Tamiment in the Poconos have been completed. With the convention just about month away, it promises to be the largest ever held by Alpha Phi Delta.

### Early Reservations Requested

Traditionally a Monday to Friday affair, the Convention will again be held the week before Labor Day, this year starting August 29 after Dinner and ending with a farewell breakfast on September 2. Because of the ex-

pected large turnout, and in order to assure themselves of proper accommodations, all who expect to attend are urged to make their reservations by August 22 with the customary 50% deposit. Reservations should be made with Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, 119

Attendees to last year's affair at Tamiment need no reminders of the very excellent hospitality afforded by this extra-ordinary and modern resort. Combined with Alpha Phi Delta's own program, it was truly the finest convention the Fraternity has ever held. This year, in addition to the resort's fine program, the Fraternity shall hold such traditional affairs as a Barn Dance, a Fashion Show and the Formal Banquet on successive evenings. An early bird reception will be held Monday evening and a cocktail party will precede the Banquet.

### Convention Business

General convention business will be confined to morning sessions whenever possible and the Executive Committee will hold its meeting Monday, August 29. No constitutional amendments have been submitted for consideration this year but the business of operating a growing Fraternity has become more complicated and time-consuming with each passing year and those committees responsible for the various aspects of Fraternity interests will certainly be holding special or over-time meetings.

Among these is the National House Fund Corporation which has the responsibility of purchasing and managing the various chapter houses for the Fraternity. The corporation has made tremendous strides in the past few years and now has purchased eight houses most recent of which are the newly-built Beta Lambda House at Loretto, Pennsylvania and the Beta Rho House in Erie, Penna. An extensive modification and expansion program is presently underway for Chi House. Recent applications for chapter houses will also be considered.

The Life Subscribers Fund Trustees will also meet to hold their first organizational meeting since their election at last year's convention and to discuss the KLEOS Editor's proposals and recommendations for the publication of the History of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity, the first since 1940, and a project which has been in preparation for the past three years.

### Expansion To Be Keynote

Expansion will undoubtedly be the keynote of this year's convention business. Petition for charter is expected from embryo colonies at various universities. The Expansion Committee has been very busy as evidenced by the mid-year Executive Committee Meeting in Tonawanda last February.

All in all, it should be a banner year and a banner convention for Alpha Phi Delta. Plan to be there! It's the "in" thing to do this year,

## Gaylord Elected 6D Governor At Annual District Convention

Richard Gaylord, Beta Theta, was elected District Governor at the Sixth District Convention held May 15 at the Beta Omicron Chapter House. Gaylord, who served as Assistant District Governor during the past year, and the recipient of last year's Outstanding Undergraduate Award, replaces Rocco Salimbene who expressed wishes not to run again.

Present at the Convention were delegates from each of three undergraduate chapters of the District (Beta Theta, Beta Omicron and Xi) and a number of undergraduates and alumni. Various items of national, district and chapter interest were discussed. Among them was the district's desire to expand and include five more chapters. In its expansion program, District Governor Gaylord will concentrate on obtaining new chapters and Assistant Governor Pernado will work on reactivating the Youngtown Alumni Club.

In order to give his organization a unified impetus, Gaylord appointed an assistant to the Governor from each chapter. They are Thomas Di Nicola (Beta Theta), Anthony Cafaro (Beta Omicron) and David Monaco (Xi). Other appointments included Ronald

Pingatore, Sports Chairman, Patrick Macedonia, Housing Chairman, and Henry Pesieuneri, Secretary.

Chapter reports given at the Convention revealed them to be both healthy and vigorous. Beta Theta boasts of 51 active and with a scholastic average of 2.4; Beta Omicron, with an initiation of 22 this year, has 35 actives and a scholastic average of 2.75; Xi has 23 actives and is fourth scholastically on a campus of 45 fraternities. In addition, all chapters are financially sound. Xi, nearly on the rocks a few years ago, has reduced a debt of \$1300 to approximately \$200.

The Convention closed with words of praise for past Sixth District Governor Salimbene for his excellent efforts and for the Brothers, friends and Sweetheart of Beta Omicron who were excellent hosts.

Elected Sixth District Governor May, 1966. Attended Ohio State University for two years where he was initiated at Xi Chapter. Graduated from College of Steubenville with Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration May 29, 1966.

Served in many capacities as undergraduates. At C. of S. was president of the Society for the Advancement of Management, president of the Greek Council, parliamentarian of IFC, secretary of Beta Theta Chapter, and member of College Choir. For past two years served as Assistant Sixth District Governor.

Was named "Most Outstanding Undergraduate" by Xi Chapter in 1964, "Most Outstanding Undergraduate" by the National in 1965, and "Most Outstanding Member" by Beta Theta in 1966. On May 21, 1966, was presented with the National Hamilton Watch Award of the Society for the Advancement at the College of Steubenville. On June 10 the Pittsburgh Alumni Chap-

ter of the Society presented him with the "Outstanding Undergraduate Member's Award." He is listed in "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities".

**Domenic A. Macedonia, born in Steubenville, Ohio, October 8, 1909. Graduate of Ohio State College of Medicine in 1935. Served his internship at Metropolitan Hospital in New York City, took post-graduate study in ophthalmology and otolarungology and started practice in his native Steubenville as a specialist in his field in 1938.**

**Inducted into Kappa Chapter while attending Western Reserve University, he has been a bulwark of the Fraternity ever since. Serving as Sixth District Governor from 1939 through 1945, he was one of the small group of APD men who tenaciously held the Fraternity together during the war. Served as National Vice-president in 1945, was elected President in 1946 and again in 1947. Winner of the Outstanding Alumnus Award in 1951, he presently serves as Sec-Treas. of the all-important National House Corporation.**

**The recipient of many honors from his community and within his profession, his greatest was bestowed on June 22, 1952 when His late Holiness, Pope Pius XII, made him a Knight Commander, with Star, in the Order of Saint Gregory the Great.**

I would like to congratulate you on your pointed and rather stirring letter of January 31st. In response to your request Beta Pi has the following material which we would like to see in the next issue of KLEOS . . .

. . . . Beta Pi was overwhelmingly disappointed at your poor reporting of our selection as "Outstanding Chapter—1965". The only mention was a four line statement with no pictures nor accompanying writeup. I would like to point out, that while I agree with you on the fact that chapters should report their doings to KLEOS, this is a different case. We feel this honor is a great one, yet it seems that it doesn't rate with our national newspaper. Since this honor was conferred upon us by national, we feel it was national duty to do a proper reporting job.

We are therefore happy to print the article based on the first direct piece of news we have received from the chapter in several years.)*

Dr. D. A. Macedonia, M.D., PNP, of Steubenville, Ohio, was designated new Democrat party organization chairman in Jefferson County last May after his supporters won control of the party's Central Committee. He replaces Hugo Alexander, a Steubenville attorney and party leader for the past 16 years, who by the way is also an APD man.

Dr. Macedonia, who has served Alpha Phi Delta in many capacities, including as its Eighteenth National President during the difficult years immediately after World War II, is presently Secretary-Treasurer of the National Housing Corporation of the Fraternity.

For "Doc Macey", his election represents victory in a struggle for party leadership extending over recent years. He had contested Alexander's leadership in May, 1964 and lost by the close vote of 64 to 60. This year, both he and the incumbent had been defeated in the election for Central Committeeman of their respective precincts. As a result, neither were

able to participate in the biennial caucus of the Central Committee and control of the organization had to be decided by campaigns spearheaded by the contenders for Central Committee chairmen of the respective factions. The vote was 66 to 63 in favor of John A. Corrigan who led Dr. Macedonia's campaign.

Dr. Macedonia, no new-comer to the inner circles of the political arena, conducted an aggressive campaign to win over the party organization. An outstanding and respected member of his community, he has played an influential role in the Democratic organization and in county and municipal elections.

**Sarno Elected to Governing Body of St. John's University**

Prof. Anthony Sarno, Beta Pi, formerly Dean of Men at St. John's University, was recently elected to the University Senate. This is the present governing body of the University and is responsible only to the Board of Trustees.



Sarno has been with St. John's University since 1946. He has held many administrative positions including Director of Intramural Sports (1946-55) and Director of the Evening Session (1955-56). He was Dean of Men at the University from 1959 to 1964. He is an associate professor of mathematics and departmental representative for St. John's College.

He received his B.S. in math in NYU in 1932 and his M.S. at CCNY in 1941. He has also done graduate work in math at Columbia and NYU, and at Harvard and MIT (radar). A Major in the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II, he received a letter of commendation for his work on the Napalm Bomb. He served in the South Pacific.

He is a member of many professional and civic organizations including the National Catholic Education Association, Mathematical Association of America, American Mathematics Society and Pi Mu Epsilon Mathematics Honor Fraternity. He was a member of the Board of Education of Elmont, L.I. (1953-56) and since 1964 has been a member of the Board of Education and Vice president of the Island Trees School District in Levittown, New York.

He is a member of the Honor Society at St. John's University and holds honorary membership in Pi Alpha Sigma, Zeta Sigma Pi and the Roger Bacon Scientific Society at SJU. He is listed in "American Men of Science", "Who's Who is East", and "Who's Who in Education".

Brother Sarno was instrumental in organizing Beta Pi Chapter at St. John's University in 1958 and is currently the chapter's moderator. He is an active member of the Long Island Alumni Club.

He and his wife, the former Rose Calderone, live in Levittown, New York and have three children. Michael, a graduate of St. John's is presently a 1st Lt. with the U.S. Marine Corps in Vietnam. Anna is also a graduate of SJU, and Rosalie, following in the family's footsteps is a senior at the University.

## Beta Theta Holds Annual "Baron Appreciation"

Beta Theta, College of Steubenville, held their Eleventh Annual "Baron's Appreciation" banquet on May 1 at the Fort Steuben Ballroom in Steubenville, Ohio. The affair is sponsored annually by the Chapter in honor of the school's basketball team, The Barons, and various awards are presented to individual team members for their contributions and achievements during the past year.

Principal speaker at this year's affair was Joseph A. Mullaney, head basketball coach at Providence College in Providence, R.I. for the past eleven years. Mullaney, whose collegiate coaching career boasts of 242 wins and 66 losses, catapulted Providence to national recognition with twenty or more wins per season for the past eight years. He was named "Coach of the Year" in 1961 by the

Philadelphia Basketball Writers, was selected "New England Coach of the year" in the University division by the New England Basketball Writer's Association in 1964, received the same honor in 1965 and 1966 from the UPI Selection Committee, and has been named "Coach of the Year" by the sportswriters and Broadcasters of Rhode Island on three occasions.

Toastmaster for the banquet was William Chesson, sports director of WSTV radio. Chesson is better known to basketball fans as the "voice of the Barons."

Guests included Mayor and Mrs. Andrew W. Miller, the Rev. Dennis Sullivan, dean of students, the Rev. Theophane Scanlon, dean of the college, and Adam Giandomenico and Robert J. Garrity, Ph.D., both instructors at the college.

Other guests were John D. Bayer, head basketball coach, Robert Kloska, athletic director, John Mosblack, Sr., president of the Quarterback Club, John D. Kirker, Herald-Star sports editor, Wayne Van Dine, WSTV television, Paul Glover, Weirton Daily Times editor, and John Sorrenti, Jr., WEIR sports Director.

## Maltese Named To New York D. A. Post

Serphin R. Maltese, Beta Beta, Middle Village, New York attorney, was named Assistant District Attorney and sworn in by District Attorney Nat Hentel on February 21, 1966. Mr. Hentel, a Republican, took office on January 1.

Maltese, 33, has been active in Conservation Party affairs in New York. He is President of the Alexander Hamilton Conservative Club, a member of the Queens County Executive Committee, Chairman of the Queens County Law Committee and was the Conservative candidate for the State Senate in the 13th District in 1965.

A scholarship holder at Fordham University Law School, he is a graduate of Manhattan College and a member of the Queens County, New York State and American Bar Association and has served as Counsel to Parents and Taxpayers.

He is a delegate to the Associated Organizations and a member of the American Legion, the VFW, Queensboro Elk and the Juniper Park Civic Association.

As an undergraduate at Manhattan College, Maltese was Vice-President of Beta Beta Chapter, received the Beta Beta outstanding undergraduate award upon graduation in 1958 and the national's Certificate of Merit that same year. As an alumnus, he was a member of the Beta Beta Alumnus and the first President of the Bronx Alumni Club.

He and his wife, the former Constance Del Vecchio, have two daughters, Andrea and Leslie.

A June graduate of St. Francis College, he was awarded nine grants for post-graduate study. He has accepted an assistantship in Chemistry to study for his doctorial degree at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The grants, which in total value were in excess of \$200,000, including a \$15,000 grant to study at Fordham University from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and a National Science Foundation Traineeship to Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute.

He was also awarded a faculty fellowship to Columbia University; an assistantship to Princeton University; an assistantship to Carnegie Tech; an assistantship to Stevens Institute of Technology; and a faculty fellowship to Case Institute.

Most noteworthy is the achievement of individual Brothers. Graduating seniors have made their mark in the area of graduate fellowships. Robert DeMarinis, last year's chapter president was the first in his senior class to receive over \$200,000 in grants including one from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and one from M.I.T. He will attend M.I.T. in the fall where he will work for his doctorate in Chemistry.

Also awarded national grants are John Rollino and Paul Ferlazzo. Together with DeMarinis, they represent three of the five seniors who were honored for their achievements at the annual Charter Day Ceremonies at St. Francis on May 6th.

In the area of college leadership and participation, Beta Sigma again exemplified itself with three Brothers who were granted the St. Francis College Franciscan Spirit Award. They are: Bob Russo, Chapter Secretary, Tom Laqueria, and Paul Ferlazzo. Winners of the award are approved by the Student Council and the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs. Qualifications looked for in each applicant are individual leadership, contributions to their activities, support to other activities, involvement in the life and spirit at St. Francis, and apparent commitment to the college.
