



Publication of New APD History Authorized; Central Office and Life Subscriber Fund To Sponsor

By unanimous vote of the delegates, the 46th National Convention authorized the publication of an updated history of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. The publication will be administered and sponsored jointly by the Life Subscribers Fund Trustees and Central Office.

An official history of the Fraternity has not been published since 1940. A new edition has been in preparation by the KLEOS Editor for four years. Virtually complete, the work is now ready for the printer.

Handsome, Comprehensive Volume In Preparation

The history will be a definitive one. As noted in the preface by the KLEOS Editor: "History must keep us with the times. The facts do not change but their significance do and it is necessary to discuss these facts in terms of the present. History must acquire a perspective if it can be considered history at all." This history of Alpha Phi Delta will therefore be treated not only with sentiment but also with frankness. You can expect, therefore, a thoroughly readable and enjoyable document as it traces the evolution of Alpha Phi Delta through good and bad times, through moments of glory and moments of lesser light.

The history will be one of the most thorough ever prepared by any fraternity. In addition to the basic history, the publication will also contain brief histories of each chapter, each alumni club, and each school, plus profiles of many personalities dominant in Alpha Phi Delta including past national presidents and national officers as well as others. And, with consummate faith in the future, the profiles of two recent undergraduates from every active chapter who are expected to be the future leaders of Alpha Phi Delta.

The history will be thoroughly professional and handsomely prepared. Printed on 8 1/2 x 11 (or 9 x 12) glossy paper, it will contain some 175 photographs, many of them priceless to our fraternity. The artwork will be prepared by Carlo M. Vannicola, PNP. The book will be bound in a rich cover, using the fraternity colors and embossed with the fraternity emblem. It will be a volume that will long be cherished in every chapter and member's library, and one that everyone will be proud to see in their school library.

How To Get It

This new and updated "History of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity" will be a very costly publication. As a relative point of reference the volume will cost approximately the total of some 30 issues of the KLEOS. This is no mean sum and represents the costliest undertaking of the fraternity with the exception of chapter housing. (In some cases, it represents a greater expenditure than the individual house.) It is a credit to the Grand Council, in their faith in the KLEOS Editor, Central Office and the Life Subscribers Trustees who are sponsoring it, and the membership at large, that it has approved its publication.

In accordance with our constitution all "Life Members" and "Life Subscribers" will be eligible to receive the history free of charge. "Life Subscribers" are defined as all supporters who paid in total the sum of \$16 or \$25 to the fraternity and are eligible to receive all publications of the fraternity. "Life Members" are defined as all supporters who have paid \$100 to the fraternity who automatically become "Life Subscribers" and further, are exempt from annual dues. (Life Subscribers who paid their total sum before the 1964 convention are also considered "members for life" and are entitled to the benefits thereto.)

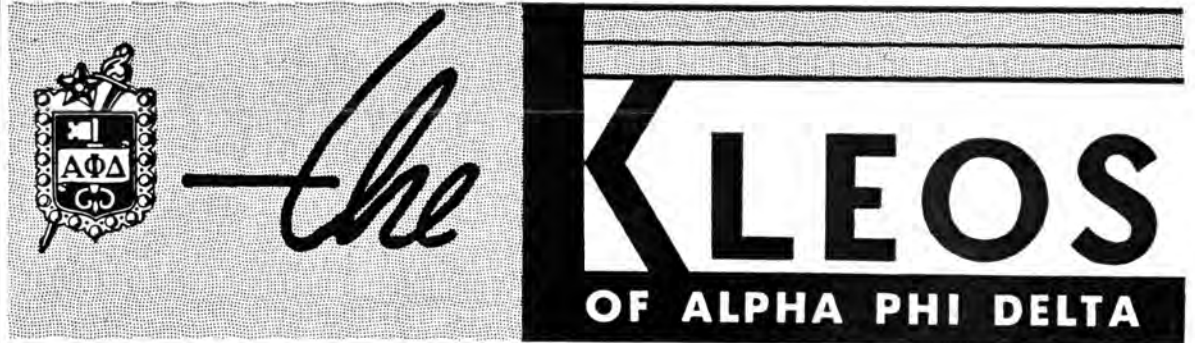
While the Fraternity will honor all of its agreements with its supporters, the need for increased support to defray the costs of the publication becomes evident.

Life Subscribers will readily recognize, for example that this volume alone will have more than compensated for their original contribution to the Fraternity. Made at a time when \$16 and \$25 was a lot of money, their support was no less appreciated than that of the Life Member who contributes \$100 today. But the economic facts are that the original sum of money can hardly cope with the costs of services today.

We therefore ask all of our Life Subscribers, even though they will receive this publication free of charge, to further enhance their support of Alpha Phi Delta by becoming Life Members for the additional sum of \$100. In recognition of this support, they will receive a special Presentation Edition of the history with slip cover and special gold page imprinted with their name, chapter, and year of initiation. We do not pretend that this special edition will monetarily compensate for their contribution, but all Life Members will share in the pleasure and special recognition that comes with the faith and support of their fraternal organization—something which, we submit, is worth much more than money.

46th NATIONAL CONVENTION CONCLUDED AT TAMIMENT; RECORD NUMBER OF RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED; CIARROCCHI ELECTED PRESIDENT, MUFFOLETTO VICE-PRESIDENT

With a rousing Grand Dinner and Ball befitting the traditional climax of past national gatherings, Alpha Phi Delta's 46th National Convention came to a close September 1st. Hosted once again by Tamiment in the Pocono's this year's affair, while not drawing the record-breaking crowds of last year, added another memorable chapter to the fifty-two year history of the Fraternity.

Highlight of the business sessions was the election of Trent J. Ciarrocchi, Psi, National President and Vincent J. Muffoletto, Epsilon, National Vice-president. Ciarrocchi had served as National Vice-president for the past two years; Muffoletto served as National House Fund Trustee and was Social Chairman of this convention.

Elected To Lead APD



TRENT J. CIARROCCHI
National President

Born September 30, 1917 in Dearth, Pennsylvania but has been living in Weirton, West Virginia since the age of one. Graduate of Duquesne University with a BS in Business Administration, 1939. Entered U.S. Navy as seaman in 1942, served overseas, and was honorable discharged in 1946 as a Lt. Jg. Presently Vice-president of the Weir-Cove Moving and Storage Company of Weirton West Virginia, in charge of sales, traffic and general management affairs.

Active with APD since undergraduate days; was a member of Steubenville Alumni Club and a founder of the Weirton Alumni Club. Served as National Vice-president 1964-66.

Married to the former Helen Czerepak since November, 1940. They have three children: Gloria Jean, Trent J. Jr., and David.



VINCENT J. MUFFOLETTO
National Vice-president

Native of Buffalo, New York and a graduate of Buffalo University (1952). A certified public accountant, he is a partner in the firm of Muffoletto & Kuehn of that city.

Initiated into Epsilon Chapter in 1949 he served as Chapter President (1951-2), treasurer of the IFC at Buffalo (1959-51) and as delegate to the National IFC in 1950. As an alumnus he served as President of the Buffalo Alumni Club (1961-62), was a prime-mover in the Buffalo Alumni Convention Club, was National Expansion Committee Chairman (1962-64) and a member of the National Housing Foundation for the past four years. Represented APD in the fight against the New York State University System attempting to abolish fraternities at Buffalo.

Married, the Muffoletto's have a son, James, who is following in his father's footsteps both at Buffalo University and in APD.

In a suspense-filled climax to the three-day event, National Secretary Adam DiVincenzo announced the recipients of this year's National Awards. Receiving their much deserved plaques at the dinner were: Beta Omicron, Youngstown University, Most Outstanding Chapter; Sigma, Boston University, Most Improved Chapter; Arthur Esch, Chi, Outstanding Undergraduate; and Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, PNP, Outstanding Alumnus. While much applause greeted each of the recipients, it was tumultuous for DeGuglielmo who has served the Fraternity in many capacities for nearly thirty-five years.

Important Resolutions Passed

The business of reviewing the state of the Fraternity and the implementation of legislation to direct its future course started early, on August 29, with the convening of the Executive Committee at which all national Officers were present. The Grand Council, consisting of chapter and alumni club delegates, District Governors and all other National Officers met in session on the morning of August 30, 31, and September 1. No constitutional amendments were proposed for consideration this year; however, an unusually large number of resolutions were presented before the body for action. The most important acted upon favorably were:

— the authorization for publication of the Fraternity History which has been in preparation by the KLEOS Editor for the past four years;

— the formation of a separate Awards Committee consisting of three or more past national presidents to be appointed at each convention for the consideration of petitions for National Awards;

This is a worthwhile project and one that every alumnus should be interested in. The success of our expansion program is not only dependant upon the effort put forth by the Expansion Committee; it depends on the cooperation of all of us.

Let us all band together and work together for Alpha Phi Delta.

— that an award be established for the Most Outstanding Alumni Club;

— that no chapter, undergraduate of a chapter, and no alumnus of an alumni club be considered for any of the Fraternity's awards unless that entity has submitted material at least once to the KLEOS during that fraternal year.

— reaffirmation of past year's resolutions of Alpha Phi Delta's position against hazing and actions which do not lend themselves to the general welfare of the community;

— that in the interests of increasing liaison between chapters and Central Office, Central Office designate specific hours each week during which time members can visit or contact them for Fraternity business;

— that the National President make sufficient appointments to assure proper representation at the annual meetings of the National Interfraternity Council.

More Resolutions

— that the Executive Committee be re-imbursed for their travel expenses when attending mid-year meetings;

— that a Constitutional Committee be appointed to review all Grand Council meetings starting with 1959 and that Central Office mimeograph all constitutional amendments in a supplement for distribution;

— that the executive committee closely supervise and scrutinize the pledge practices of each chapter and impose appropriate disciplinary measures for any infraction which they may deem repugnant to the standards of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity;

— that all funds turned over to the National Housing Corporation

thus far by the Convention Corporation have been done so irrevocably;

Other action taken by the Grand Council included the election of Vincent J. Muffoletto, Epsilon, to a three year term as Trustee of the National Housing Fund Corporation. Outgoing President Francis J. Palladino appointed KLEOS Editor Stan Raffa to serve a four year term as trustee of the Life Subscribers Fund.

Election for Vice-president evoked a competitive stir with both Vincent Muffoletto and Armand DeRosa, Third District Governor, campaigning for the office. Muffoletto won handily. Ciarrocchi ran unopposed for the presidency.

Social Success

Although this year's affair did not attract nearly as many conventioners as have the previous two conventions, the spontaneous activities and enthusiasm of the delegates, brothers and families that attended made it no less a social success. Besides the Grand Ball, other social highlights included a cocktail party that preceded it and the professional entertainment provided by Tamiment the previous evening. At least one record was broken at this convention: it didn't rain a single day, the first time in the memory of resort conventions.

The site of next year's convention has not yet been determined; however, Convention Chairmen Joseph DeGuglielmo and Carlo Vannicola have already appointed Richard Gaylord, Sixth District Governor, as Social chairman. Just as this committee is already making plans for next year's affair, so is every fraternity man urged to make his plans now to attend it.

And the cardplayers found themselves short at least a few men what with half the Derrico clan (Derrico, Cappadonna, Gallo and Russo) either coming or going to Europe.

Convention time is also birthday time for several of the Brothers. Adam DiVincenzo cleared 56 on September 1 and Father Federici, Na-

tional Chaplain, beat him there by four days. A little late this year was Stan Raffa who hit 41 on September 3. (This is the last time we'll announce their age.) . . . And so many doctors you never saw! But there wasn't one that could help Dr. Horace Goffredo who was suffering an attack of lumbago. (Carlo Vannicola kept insisting he go see a chiropractor.)

With all that good weather around (it didn't rain once) some brothers never got to see it. So much business seems to be transacted these days by the various standing committees and trustees of the fraternity that many of its members never even made it to the lake. Most hard-working of all, perhaps, was the Resolutions Committee headed by Frank Cavallaro who had to meet in four separate sessions to consider the many resolutions submitted. Other committees which devoted much of their time to fraternity business were the Ritual Committee headed by Father Federici, the Rules and Order Committee headed by Ernie Coletti, the Budget and Audit Committee headed by Arthur Esch, the Credentials Committee headed by Joseph Scotti (which had no easy job during the first session) and the Expansion Committee headed by Frank Cavallaro.

No less active were the trustees of the various separate funds and corporations. The Life Subscribers Fund Trustees met twice, reviewing the essence of the Fund and the means of encouraging and promoting its expansion. The trustees of the National House Fund Corporation met to review the position of the various chapter houses under its control. The members of the Convention Corporation, of course, remained just as busy during the convention as they had been for months before in preparing it.

Esch Elected Governor of Fifth District

Arthur Esch, Jr., Chi, was elected Fifth District Governor at the District's annual convention last May. He succeeds Julius Zangrille who resigned because of ill health.

Esch, born August 29, 1944 in Illinois, was initiated into Chi chapter in November, 1964. A born leader, he was elected president of the chapter in January, 1965 and re-elected in 1966. Showing an early interest in district and national affairs, he was elected Assistant District Governor in 1965.

Active on the Penn State campus, he has been a member of the IFC since January 1965, was its social chairman for the past year, and is presently serving in three other capacities, as assistant to the President, member of the executive board and member of the board of control. He is also a member of the Newman Club.

Because of his many activities and accomplishments he was named the Most Outstanding Undergraduate in Alpha Phi Delta for the year 1965-66 at this year's Tamiment Convention.

Art will receive his Bachelor of Science in Finance in December 1966. A Naval Reserve Officer Candidate, he expects to go into active duty in 1967.

NATIONAL AWARD WINNERS

This was an exceptionally competitive year for National Awards. At least seven petitions were received for the Most Outstanding Chapter Award and nearly as many for Most Improved Chapter and Outstanding Undergraduate. All chapters who petitioned showed considerably high scholastic standings in their respective schools and fine activity programs ranging from social affairs to school and community service. The choice, therefore, was an extremely difficult one for the Awards Committee, which, after some three hours of deliberation, finally made the following selections:

Outstanding Chapter Award: Beta Omicron, Youngstown University.

Some of the greatest accomplishments of Beta Omicron are centered around their newly acquired home. Purchased for them by the National House Foundation, the chapter has gone on to furnish it completely with their own funds. Besides panelling the kitchen, the painting of several rooms and the purchasing of new beds, kitchen furniture, storm doors and various other furnishings, they added newly purchased rugs to the first and second stories of their home at a cost of \$1500 from their own treasury. Accomplishments, however, are not limited to the house. In sports, they placed first in softball and second in football on the campus. They placed first in at least four campus socials and the chapter's float placed second at Homecoming. Scholastically they placed third with an accumulative 2.71 out of 4.0. Their 21 new initiates was highest in the Fraternity this year; they had also initiated an equal number the previous year and 17 the year before that.

Most Improved Chapter Award: Sigma, Boston University

Sigma Chapter has come a long way since its reactivation in 1962. Sparked by an enthusiastic group of undergraduates that has thrust the chapter to the forefront among fraternities on campus, initiations this year jumped to fifteen from the five of last year. The chapter held four highly successful dances this year all of which were attended to permissible capacity. This capacity has been limited to 500 by the college administration ever since two years ago when the Chapter, after a concentrated campaign held a dance attended by 1200 people with an estimated crowd of over three hundred unable to attend. The chapter also sponsored its second annual Alumni-Undergraduate Dinner Dance which was enthusiastically well attended and praised by the alumni and ladies auxiliary. Profits were donated to the Alpha Phi Delta Memorial Scholarship Foundation which was founded in that area in 1945. Most important, on the classroom level, Sigma is proud of its grade average of 3.2 out of a maximum possible 4.0, the highest Fraternity average on the campus.

Outstanding Undergraduate: Arthur G. Esch, Jr., Chi, Penn State

This year's outstanding undergraduate was initiated at Chi Chapter in November 1964. He was elected its president in January 1965 and re-elected in 1966. Thus, much of Chi chapter's resurgence is due to the efforts and personality of Arthur Esch. His many activities on campus include membership to the IFC at Penn State, serving as assistant to the President, member of the Executive Board, and member of the Board of Control. Not limiting his activities to his own chapter, he was elected 5th District Assistant Governor in 1965 and elected District Governor in May, 1966, an office which he took over with the end of the National Convention.

Outstanding Alumnus: Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, Upsilon, Harvard

This year's Outstanding Alumnus of Alpha Phi Delta certainly needs no introduction. Active for nearly thirty five years since his undergraduate days, Joseph A. DeGuglielmo served first as District Governor of the First District, as National President during the difficult years of WW II, as National Secretary for over fifteen years and presently as chairman of the National House Foundation and of the Convention Corporation. A former mayor of Cambridge, Massachusetts, he was recently elected City Manager by the City Council. A tremendously influential and guiding force within Alpha Phi Delta, the award comes belatedly only because award restrictions do not permit the eligibility of national officers while in office. The announcement was received with overwhelming enthusiasm by the entire convention body.

This is the last year that the recipients of the National Awards will be chosen by the members of the Executive Committee. Many new procedural changes and requirements were instituted at this Convention which become effective with next year's convention. Henceforth, the recipients of the National Awards will be chosen by an Awards Committee consisting of three or more past national presidents. A point system for standardization and guidance has also been prepared. An additional award has also been instituted for the Outstanding Alumni Club. Whereas all petitions previously had to be submitted to Central Office by May 15, they may now be presented anytime before the conclusion of the first convention session. Finally, no entity or member of an entity shall be eligible for awards unless the entity has submitted material to the KLEOS at least once during that fraternal year.
