Late this last Spring, Beta Mu presented Anthony Laterza its Outstanding Alumnus Award, Life Membership in Alpha Phi Delta. The Life Membership Award is a "first" and, we hope, the forerunner of what will become an annual tradition among all chapters.

There are many reasons why each chapter should consider instituting such an annual award for presentation to its most outstanding graduating brother:

... it is the most cherished gift that a chapter can give a graduating brother worthy of the honor;

... the meaningfulness of the award will induce a communion of fraternal spirit between the recipient and his brothers that transcends even the normally close bonds that already exist within the chapter;

... it would stimulate a new spirit of national purpose and meaning among all the undergraduate membership;

... it would give a young brother, who has already demonstrated his inclinations as an undergraduate, the opportunity to serve his fraternity as an alumnus free of the monetary burdens that often, mistakenly, are a deterrent to such activity immediately following graduation;

... it would be giving just and deserving recognition to a worthy Brother as exemplifying the finest traditions of the Fraternity; through him, the Brothers could

demonstrate their own determination to perpetuate the spirit of Alpha Phi Delta.

There is yet one other aspect associated with the award, and that is its presentation. It should be conferred at an affair commensurate with the chapter's resources, but always befitting the occasion. We suggest that it be formal, where possible. (When is the last time you attended a completely formal affair?)

Formal or not, we guarantee that Life Membership Award Night, whether intimate or opulent, will be the most satisfying and rewarding highlight of the fraternal year.

Central Office has just completed the first leg of its journey through Alpha Phi Delta. First stop in a series of visitations that will call on virtually every chapter in the Fraternity was the Second District, upstate New York.

Muffoletto and 2nd District Governor Ernest Coletti were first greeted Friday evening, October 6, at a joint meeting of undergraduates of Beta Iota Chapter, Utica College, and the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association. Anthony R. Iole, Psi, graduated from Westinghouse High School in Pittsburgh, 1942 and enlisted in the United States Air Force soon thereafter. He served as a radio operator and gunner for three and a half years. Discharged in 1946, he enrolled at Duquesne University in the school of Commercial Education. Besides being inducted into Alpha Phi Delta, he was also a member of the honorary teacher's fraternity and Scabbard and Blade, Military fraternity.

Following graduation he taught in the commercial department of the Business Training College, and in 1952 became registrar for the Dale Carnegie Course. In 1954 he decided to change careers and started as a salesman for the Sears Roebuck Co. He was promoted to Sales Manager in 1955 and in 1960 was transferred to Kansas City, Missouri as Merchandise Manager.

He left Sears in 1961 to start his own insurance and real estate agency. Employing several people, it enjoys a fine reputation in the community. He is a member of the East Suburban Multi-List Brokers, Greater Pittsburgh Board of Realtors and is Past president of the Uni-List Brokers, Inc.

Anthony has been married for nearly sixteen years. He and wife Marguerite have four children: Jamice 15, Judith 12, Jay Anthony 10, and Joni Marguerite 8.

John Fiore, Beta Mu, has actually been 7th District Governor since mid-1966 when his predecessor, John Davis, was forced to resign because of pressing business. Not new to the job, he has served as District Governor before and has served in either that position or as Asst. Governor since graduation from DePaul University, Chicago, in June, 1960.

John started with the Prudential Insurance Co. after graduation and completed all of their training courses by June, 1962. In 1967 he received a National Quality Award for his record.

He received his general Insurance Brokers License for Illinois in 1962 and is a member of the Chicago Association of Life Insurance Underwriters. He was part owner of an insurance agency but later sold but in order to devote more time to selling. He is now a general broker with contracts with several different insurance companies.

He was initiated in the Loyal Order of the Moose in 1963 and in the Legion of the Moose later that year. He has attended 7 of the last 10 National Conventions and is working hard to reactivate the Chicago Alumni Club.

Senate and was named chairman of the Senate's Committee on Student Activities. He is faculty moderator for Beta Phi.

Professor Sarno received his B.S. degree from New York University in 1932 and his M.S. from City College of New York in 1941. He has completed courses toward the doctorate in the graduate schools of Columbia University and New York University.

During the years 1932-1942, he taught mathematics at Jamaica High School, Benjamin Franklin High School and Bedford Park

Academy. In 1942 he entered the United States Marine Corps as a first lieutenant and served with the First Marine Air Wing. He left the service in 1945 as a major (ret.) in the Marine Corps Reserve.

He began teaching mathematics at St. John's College in 1946. From 1949 to 1959 he served as chairman of the mathematics department and since 1959 has served as departmental representative. From 1947 to 1956 he served as director of intramural sports. In 1955 he was acting director of the newly established Evening Session. He served as dean of men from 1959 to 1964.

Professor Sarno and his wife, the former Rose Calderone, are residents of Levittown, New York. They have three children and two grandchildren. All the Sarno children are St. John's alumni. Anna is a graduate from the School of Education with a B.S. in mathematics; Michael graduated from St. John's College with a B.S. in mathematics, and Rosalie graduated from the School of Education with a B.S. in education. Michael is a first lieutenant in the Marine Corps, recently returned from Vietnam.
