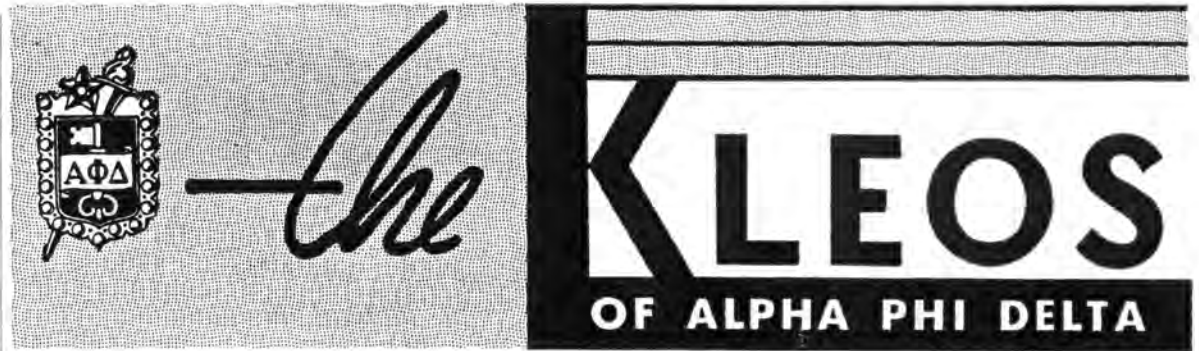
Enrollment Hits 64; Expect First Hundred By National Convention

FINE PROGRAM TO HIGHLIGHT APD'S 48th NATIONAL CONVENTION; EARLY RESERVATIONS URGED FOR GRANIT CONCLAVE, AUG. 26-30

The National Convention committee recently released details of its 1968 Convention Program. As evidenced in these columns, it provides fun and relaxation for all, intermixed with the serious business of convention sessions all entwined in a wonderful fraternal atmosphere that is characteristic of these yearly conclaves.

The Convention, Alpha Phi Delta's 48th, will be held at the Granit Hotel and Country Club, Kerhonkson, N.Y., located in the Catskill Mountain resort area that has played host to some of the fraternity's finest conventions. Accommodations cover after dinner on Monday, August 26, to after breakfast on Friday, August 30.

Business sessions are scheduled to start promptly at 10:00 AM on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings. Other meetings of national importance include: Credentials Committee, 9:00 AM, August 27; National Housing Corporation, 4:00 PM, August 27; pledging and housing workshops, 2:00 PM, August 27; and workshop for chapter officers, 2:00 PM, August 29. The Life Subscribers Fund Trustees will also meet, the time to be announced at the convention.

The remaining time will be dedicated to the many planned and unplanned activities that have become traditional at APD conventions. These include a Masquerade and Skit Night, a trip to the Monticello Raceway and the Awards Dinner and Convention Ball. This latter event will definitely be a private affair.

To avoid some of the problems encountered last year, the convention committee urges early reservations.

Dr. Campbell First Recipient of Dr. Macedonia Outstanding Teacher Award

Dr. Thomas Campbell, head of the Department of Biology at The College of Steubenville, Ohio, was the recipient of the "Dr. D.A. Macedonia Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award", presented at Theta Beta's Annual Dinner Dance held May 4 at the Esquire Supper Club in Wheeling, West Virginia. This was the first presentation of the award, named for the late Dr. Macedonia, Past National President of Alpha Phi Delta.

The members of Beta Theta selected Dr. Campbell because of the intensive professional interest he shows to students in pursuing their studies and the guidance given them in their quest for knowledge.

Dr. Campbell, who is also chairman of the Division of Natural Sciences, joined the faculty of The College of Steubenville

in the fall of 1961. A native of Toronto, Ohio, he received his B.S. in biology at the Ohio State University in 1946 and his master's degree at the same institution in 1949. His doctorate was earned in botany at the University of Wisconsin in 1952.

Upon receiving his doctorate, he joined the faculty at the University of Tennessee in the fall of 1952 as an instructor. After completing one year of teaching, he served for one year as a research biologist at the Lederle Laboratories of the American Cyanamid Company. The next fall, (1954), he returned to the teaching field at Tennessee, where in 1960 he held the rank of associate professor.

The author of a workbook for general plant pathology, Dr. Campbell has contributed a number of articles to various learned journals. He holds membership in both the Ohio and Tennessee Academy of Science, the Botanical Society of America, Mycological Society of America, the Association of Southeastern Biologists, the American Institute of Biological Sciences, the American Phytopathological Society, La Societe Mycologique de France, and the Medical Mycological Society of the Americas.

Pi Elects New Officers

Pi Chapter, West Virginia University, elected new officers the first week in February. At the helm are: Emil R. Imbro, Jr., President; James Hardin, Vice-president; Gary S. Badowski, Treasurer, and Michael Lutz, Secretary.

Gulotta Administrative Judge of Supreme Courts of Nassau County

Justice Frank A. Gulotta, Beta has been appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, Second Judicial Department, as Administrative Judge of and for all of the courts within the County of Nassau, New York. The appointment was effective January 1, 1968. The number of courts in Nassau are over sixty.

Justice Gulotta was elected a Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York for the Tenth Judicial District in November, 1968. He has served as an Associate Justice of the Appellate Term of the Supreme Court since 1962 and was recently appointed to serve in that capacity in the newly organized Appellate Term Court.

Frank Gulotta was born June 4, 1907 in Brooklyn, New York. In 1911 his family moved to Ridgewood, Queens County and in 1929 to Nassau County where he has lived ever since. He is a graduate of Columbia University where he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and St. John's University School of Law where he received the degree of Bachelor of Laws in 1931.

He was admitted to the Bar by the Appellate Division of the Second Department in March 1932 and established an office at Lynbrook, New York. He served that Village as a member of its Zoning Board of Appeals, and later as its Village Counsel.

On January 1, 1938, he was appointed an Assistant District Attorney of Nassau County. He served in that capacity until July 1949 when he was appointed District Attorney of Nassau County by the then Governor Thomas E. Dewey. He was elected for three separate successive terms — November 1949, 1952 and 1955. His judicial positions followed.

In May 1943, he applied for a leave of absence from the District Attorney's office and enlisted for service with the Allied Military Government Branch of the U.S. Army. He was honorably discharged with the rank of Major in February, 1946, having served overseas in Africa and Italy, attached to various forward combat units. He is the recipient of various citations and commendations and was decorated by the Italian Government for his outstanding work in re-establishing the orderly functions of government and the civil affairs of the war-torn areas over which he had jurisdiction as military governor.

He is a member of many professional, civic and fraternal organizations. He is a former director of the Nassau County Bar Association, a Past Exalted Ruler of the Lynbrook Lodge No. 1515 B.P.O. Elks, Past President of the Lynbrook Republican Club, Past President of the New York State District Attorneys Association, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Nassau County Cerebral Palsy Association and has served in various positions with the Knights of Columbus, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, AMITS, UNICO, Long Island Columbians, YMCA and Boy Scouts. He is a member of APD's Long Island Alumni Club.

He is the recipient of numerous awards. Amongst them, the Long Island Daily Press Distinguished Service Award cited him as a
