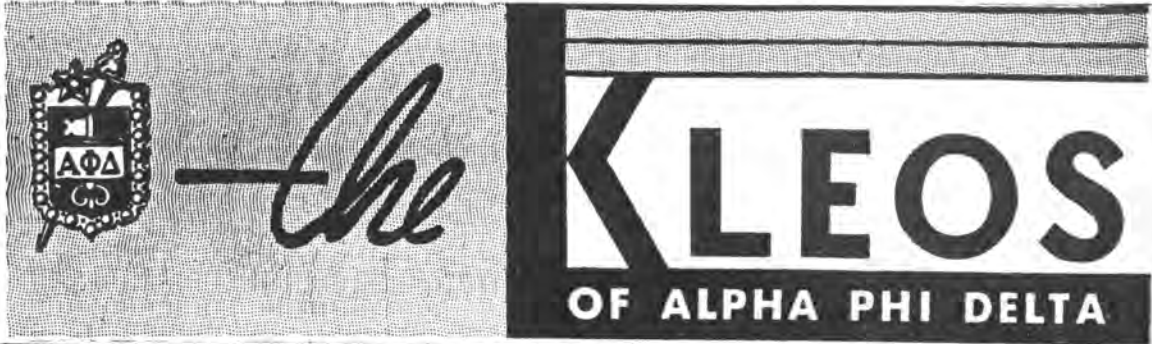


**Bro. Camillus, Beta Sigma Moderator

He has been Academic Dean and is presently Chairman of the Humanities Division of St. Francis College.
He has traveled frequently to Western Europe for research work in preparation for a critical edition of a Medieval French Romance which he expects to complete in the near future. Brother Camillus will spend the summer in Europe for additional work on his edition and will return in time for his first convention as National Chaplain. His hobby is stamp collecting and in 1967 he received the Distinguished Topical Philatelist Award. Brother Camillus is also active in the Middle States Association of Colleges and Universities as an examiner, visiting and judging the Humanities Division of various institutions.
Brother Camillus has been active with Beta Sigma since it was a colony. His presence has been a tremendous source of inspiration to the chapter. He has also served as chaplain of the Brooklyn Alumni Reactivation Group and received the Third District's Outstanding Alumnus Award in 1966.

Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F. was appointed National Chaplain of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity by President Muffoletto at the Mid-Year Meeting. Brother Camillus succeeds the late Father Salvatore Feredici, C.S. Sp. who held this position for 18 years.
Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F. is a charter member of Beta Sigma Chapter, St. Francis College, Brooklyn, and the faculty moderator of the chapter. Originally from Boston, he studied at the New England Conservatory of Music, one of the foremost institutes in the country. He received his B.A. in French from St. John's University, his M.A. from Fordham University, and his Ph.D.

NEW CHAPLAIN, NEW ENTITY HIGHLIGHT MID-YEAR MEETING AT CAMBRIDGE; SIGMA AND BOSTON'S ALUMNI FETE VISITING NAT'L REPRESENTATIVES

Alpha Phi Delta's 37th Annual Mid-Year Meeting was held at the Hotel Continental in Cambridge, Massachusetts on Saturday, February 22, 1969. It was a very crowded and enjoyable weekend, similar in activity to a National Convention. Meetings of the National Executive Committee and the National Housing Corporation Trustees constituted the business activities. The social functions included a fine buffet hosted by Joe and Angie DeGuglielmo for the out-of-towners who arrived Friday night, and a full course Italian dinner at Polcari's Restaurant on Saturday night, followed by the great Ice Capades at the Boston Garden. The evening was hosted by the Boston Alumni.

Breakfast was served on Saturday morning at 9:30 compliments of Central Office. The Executive Committee meeting followed immediately during which the state of the Fraternity was reviewed. The highlights of the meeting included the Presidential appointment of Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F., Beta Sigma, as Alpha Phi Delta's National Chaplain and the

acceptance of a petition from the Erie Alumni for the chartering of the Erie Alumni Club.

The meeting was chaired most efficiently by National President Vincent J. Muffoletto. It began with a moment of silence in memory of our late National Chaplain Father Salvatore Federici, C.S.Sp. Absent but excused from the meeting were National Treasurer

Joseph Scotti and 2nd District Governor Ernest Coletti.

Each District Governor reported on the status of the entities in his area. Many problems were brought up and given sufficient discussion time. Beta Iota, Utica College is threatened with the same problem which Epsilon, Buffalo University is now facing; namely, if the College becomes part of the State University system, all national fraternities will be forced to conduct their activities off campus. Beta Beta, Manhattan College and Beta Eta, Brooklyn College are experiencing internal difficulties. Efforts to reactivate Beta Kappa, Long Island University and Eta, City College of New York have not met with much success but will nevertheless continue.

An attempt is also being made to get Mu Chapter, Cornell University back on an active status. However, President Muffoletto ruled that since this chapter has been suspended by the Fraternity, the name of Alpha Phi Delta may not be used in the effort until the suspension has been lifted.

The other chapters seem to be in very good condition, both academically and financially. Some are responsible for very fine programs such as Beta Rho, Gannon College hosting an excellent Fraternity weekend culminating with the dedication of their house to the late Dr. D. A. Macedonia, P.N.P.

7th District Governor John Fiore announced the very strong possibility of a formal request for the chartering of the Chicago Alumni Club within one year.

Following a lunch break, the National Housing Corporation meeting was called to order by Chairman Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, P.N.P. Each house was reviewed in detail. Most of the chapter houses are current. Beta XI Newark College of Engineering, is still faced with the same problem of selling their present quarters before purchasing another house. Beta Rho, Gannon College requested funds to finish the third floor of the house; however, this matter was tabled until September, 1969.

In addition to the many Fraternity officers and committee members, undergraduates from Pi, West Virginia University, Sigma, Boston University, and Beta Sigma, St. Francis College, Brooklyn, N.Y. were present to observe the Fraternity in action.

FROM THE EDITOR

Many worried questions have been voiced about fraternity communication. Since the Kleos is the main vehicle of communication the big question of the year is "What has happened to the Kleos." The answer is twofold: a) transition and b) poor mail response.

The first part involves, of course, the change in editorship. This includes becoming familiar with the publication procedure. This is not very time consuming since the procedure is fairly simple.

What has kept the normal, steady flow of Kleos issues from the mailbox is a breakdown in communication on the part of many chapters and alumni clubs. It is not too difficult to put a Kleos issue together provided one has the material to put together.

The fraternity budgets itself for four Kleos issues annually. Transition of editorship is the factor which delayed the first Kleos but a poor mail response from the entities has crippled the other expected three.

The position of Editor provides for both interesting and vital fraternity work. It is usually solely through the Kleos that the brothers in Boston learn about what the brothers in Chicago are doing and vice versa. This is the very purpose of the Kleos. It is therefore against the sense of the Kleos were the Editor to make his own news that's fit to print merely for the sake of having a Kleos issue printed.

A brother who takes time out to send in news of fraternity interest to the Kleos, whether it concerns his entity, himself, or another brother, exhibits a sense of pride in Alpha Phi Delta. No attempt is being made to charge any brother with a lack of pride in the Fraternity.

The message is simple: send news — NOW! P.S. Special thanks to Stan Raffa, Ron Sme and Tony Rotolo for their great help.

Mondo Appointed Assistant Genesee County Attorney; Was Second District Governor

Joseph Mondo, who recently became an assistant Genesee County attorney, is a successful lawyer. He is also active in civic affairs in Buffalo, is an avid Buffalo Bills football fan, plays a topnotch game of pinochle and likes carpentry. The thing that makes these activities unusual is that Joe Mondo has been blind since the age of 6.

His recent appointment to the post of assistant county attorney is the latest in a long string of honors. "Joe's blindness had nothing to do with his getting the appointment," a county official said. "He was the best person for the job."

In his new role, Joe concentrates on cases being considered in Family Court. While the post poses new problems, Joe feels they will be no different from nor more insurmountable than those he has faced.

"I decided long ago," he says, "that if I was going to live in a sighted world, that is the kind of world I would have to train myself to operate in."

"I was 6 and in the first grade," he recalls, when my sight began to fail." For the next eight years, Joe was in and out of hospitals as doctors fought to save his sight. They believed a combination of childhood diseases, including perhaps a touch of polio, caused his blindness.

Finally at 14, and with all hope of vision gone, Joe left his Syracuse home and entered the State School for the Blind at Batavia — a teenager with a first-grade education. "It took me a few months to learn the Braille alphabet," Joe recalled, "and then they put me in the third grade."

Once he had started his education he quickly made up for his eight years lost. He whipped from the third through the eighth grades in little more than four years. "I decided that since I would have to live in a sighted world, the sooner I should start learning how to compete in that world," he said, "so I enrolled in high school in Syracuse."

Competition apparently served him in good stead. He completed high school in two years. "I believe a handicapped person who expects to live in a non-handicapped world should begin preparing to live in that world as soon as possible," Joe says.

He continued an impressive scholastic record against his sighted colleagues when he entered Cornell

University, acquiring his bachelor of arts degree in three years. While attending Cornell, he served as Vice President of Alpha Phi Delta's Mu Chapter.

He entered the Syracuse University Law School, and remained there a year before transferring to St. John's Law School in Brooklyn, where he received his law degree in 1940.

Joe more than held his own against his sighted peers in college. He was a member of Cornell's debate association team. At St. John's he was a member of the Student Council, president of the Senior Class, chairman of the Law School prom and won the Indian Head Award for extracurricular activities.

He opened a law office in Syracuse in 1941 and in 1946 married Theresa Falardeau. In 1956, the Mondos moved to Batavia. They have an 18-year-old daughter, Sheila, and an 8-year-old daughter, Celeste.

Joe, until his increasing responsibilities robbed him of the time, was a district Boy Scout commissioner and took part in numerous Scout affairs. He also has been a supreme director of the Anchor Club of Buffalo.

A football fan, he particularly follows the trials and tribulations of the Buffalo Bills. "In 1967, he says, "I did not miss a single Bills game. I even traveled to Boston for the championship game." He now follows most games by radio or TV, preferably radio. "The sportscasters

put more description into their reports on radio," he says.

Another hobby is pinochle, a game he plays with a deck which has the faces specially marked with Braille characters. When it was gently hinted that such markings might give him an advantage over sighted opponents, Joe says he is perfectly willing to pass the deal. "In fact," he says, "my partner and I played several games with another team one time; the other team never won a game and I never dealt a hand."

Macedonia Award To Dr. Carrigg

Dr. John J. Carrigg, head of the Department of History at The College of Steubenville, received the "Dr. D. A. Three members of Beta Theta Chapter of Alpha Phi Delta selected Dr. Carrigg because of the intensive professional interest he has shown to students in pursuing their studies, the guidance given them in their quest for knowledge, and for his continuing civic leadership.
