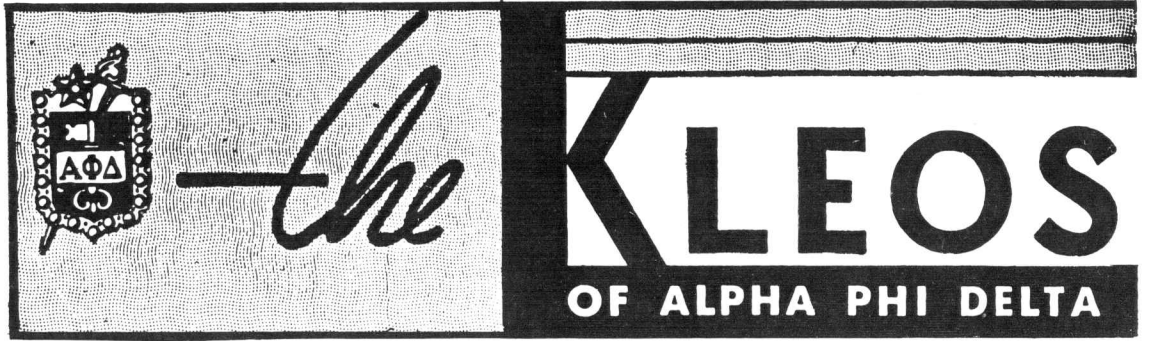
selected and she was crowned by the 1970 Queen, Mrs. Roger (Barbara) Lorenzini.

RICHARD RAU MEDAL

Beta Sigma Chapter, St. Francis College has decided to honor the memory of brother Richard Rau by presenting the "Richard Rau Medal" at the Commencement Exercises to the student who achieves the highest average in Italian after completing two years of that language.

Richard Rau, former vice president of Beta Sigma, met with a fatal accident while attending the 1970 National Convention as a chapter delegate. Born January 13, 1950, Richard was a graduate of St. Agnes High School. He majored in Accounting at St. Francis College. His name was on the Dean's List. A hard worker in his Chapter and District, Richard had a great interest in national affairs. He was one of nine brothers of Beta Sigma who attended the Mid-Year Meeting last February in Steubenville, Ohio.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur C. Rau, Richard was one of five children (three brothers and one sister).

The brothers of Beta Sigma agreed that the Medal not only honored Richard's name but also reflected the national heritage of the Fraternity.

"Pasta" Served at L.I.C.A. Dinner

On October 2nd, the Long Island Alumni Club made its first John Pasta Scholarship Award to Robert Shackatano, a freshman at Bucknell University and Edward Peteroy, a senior at St. John's University. Brother Stan Raffa, National President of Alpha Phi Delta was the guest speaker for the evening. Brother Raffa delivered an interesting menu of names affiliated with LIAC. Ed Peteroy is an outstanding scholar at St. John's and has been very active on campus. He is a psychology major and plans to use the scholarship money for graduate work in his major upon graduation in June 1971 from St. John's.

Robert Shackatano is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marc Shackatano and is a freshman in the Liberal Arts College of Bucknell. Mr. Marc Shackatano is a Brother of Alpha Phi Delta, Bucknell '36, Beta Epsilon chapter at Bucknell. He is also a member of the LIAC and the family resides in New Hyde Park on Long Island. Since Robert was not able to attend the affair, his parents accepted the award.

Brother Rocco Sutera, last year's president of the LIAC has assumed the chairmanship of the John Pasta LIAC Scholarship Committee since Brother John Coletti now resides in Miami, Florida and the former chairman, Brother Sarno is now the president of LIAC. The selection committee that selected the winners consisted of Brother Michael Luciano and Brother Frank Cantrell. The third winner will be announced shortly. The scholarship fund is now at \$6,000 and hopefully under the guidance

of Brother Sutera will try for \$10,000 by June of 1971. In this way many more scholarships will be made available for the benefit of young deserving scholars who need help.

A recap of the 1969-70 school year will indicate why Beta Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Delta was not only number one on Saint Francis Campus but also the number one chapter of Alpha Phi Delta National Fraternity.

The school year started off with a rush that could not be beat. Every brother in the house went out of his way to show the campus prospects what we were really like and what we had to offer. There were three or four consecutive weekend socials, an open house and a couple of barbecues. The thirty-eight-man pledge class and twenty-eight brothers activated indicated the rush's success.

In October, Alpha was placed in charge of Greek Week. The whole week was filled with activities and the campus was awakened to the value of the fraternities to SFC life. Dan Henesey, former president and Marty Herrick, former Social Chairman put together a week which included, the Guess Who in Concert, Open Houses, a Faculty-fraternity coffee house, a campus clean up day, a Halloween party for community children, a masquerade party for the campus, greek games, a chariot race and ultimately an Interfraternity Council Ball.

With the innovation of the new IFC all sports award annually, Alpha started its conquest. We won Major Softball, Wrestling and Volleyball titles, but seconds in Football, Basketball, plus a poorer showing in Bowling required us to settle for second place for the IFC trophy.

Our social life during that school year was second to none. Marty Herrick and his able committee provided social activities thirteen out of fifteen possible weekends first semester and his replacement, Gene Bell, followed in proper manner. There was the Wedding Bell Blues Social for Brother Robert Powell and his new wife, Alice, the Roaring 20's social and of course the always superb Orchid Ball, our annual fraternity semi-formal.

Second semester our pledgeclass of ten good prospects enabled us to activate nine more brothers bringing our number to sixty-nine, the largest house our brotherhood has ever had.

Then came the Fifth-District Convention. The brothers, especially Robert Falk, spent a whole week making plans and preparing things. But it was well worth it. A lot was accomplished fraternally and I believe the brothers from other chapters in the fifth district plus our own brothers can admit a good time was had by all.

That brought us to the end of the 69-70 school year. Now there were a new group of officers ushered in during the second semester all roaring to go. Beta Lambda was near its peak and enthusiastic to go bigger and better.

During that summer the new president, Gary VanSchaften, accompanied by John Gagliano, financial chairman, attended the National Convention. They had quite an enjoyable time and were really impressed by the true fraternity spirit shown by one

and all. Our chapter was awarded Most Outstanding Chapter for which we thank the National for bestowing the award upon us. The two brothers were however disheartened at the accidental death of Brother Richard Rau of St. Francis Brooklyn.

Now we are in the midst of the 1970-71 school year. Again we feel we have the best fraternity chapter on campus and in National and we are out to prove it. The brothers went out in a personal rush effort under Co-Rush chairmen Mike Onufrychuk and Paul Rooney. This coupled with some rush socials has given us a pledge class of 19.

Our first large activity of the year was preparing the house for Saint Francis Parents' Weekend. Our house had open house all weekend and participated in the resident decorating contest. In addition, on Saturday came a cocktail party and a buffet dinner which was enjoyed tremendously by all parents. It involved a lot of work for the brothers but the appreciation of the parents and the total success outdid the work involved.

Our social calendar has been set up by Gene Bell, social chairman and Russ Bee, assistant social chairman. We have already had a trip to a Pirates-Mets Game, a Haunted House social in our old house and numerous socials on and off campus. Future plans include camping trips, canoe trips along with our Orchid Ball.

Sports under the direction of Jim Kilcoyne and Walt Dalpiaz is actively engaged in the race for the IFC trophy. Presently we are in heavy contention for softball and bowling with intramural football starting.

The financial aspect of the fraternity guided by John Gagliano is already actively engaged. In September, the house raffled off a dinner for two at Erculiani's and were very successful. Plans include Hoagie sales, dances for the campus and other money-making projects largely to defer the cost of this year's Orchid Ball.

Pledging under the direction of Pledgemaster Bob Falk and assistant pledgemaster Jim Tulloch is progressing very beneficially. The pledgeclass's pledge period has been all laid out.

There are many other aspects of fraternity life which our chapter enjoys. At the IFC ball in October we were awarded the 1970-71 academic trophy. The officers who will end their terms in February are Gary VanSchaften, president; Dave Dunn, vice-president; Vincent Fatato, treasurer; and Stephen Walz, secretary. Other officers include John Creegan, sergeant at arms; Joseph Biviano, chaplain; Joel Sluga, house manager; James Langton, historian; and Tom Matarazzo, kitchen manager. With these officers and the potentiality that each of our brothers has, the future of Alpha Phi Delta, Beta Lambda Chapter looks very bright.

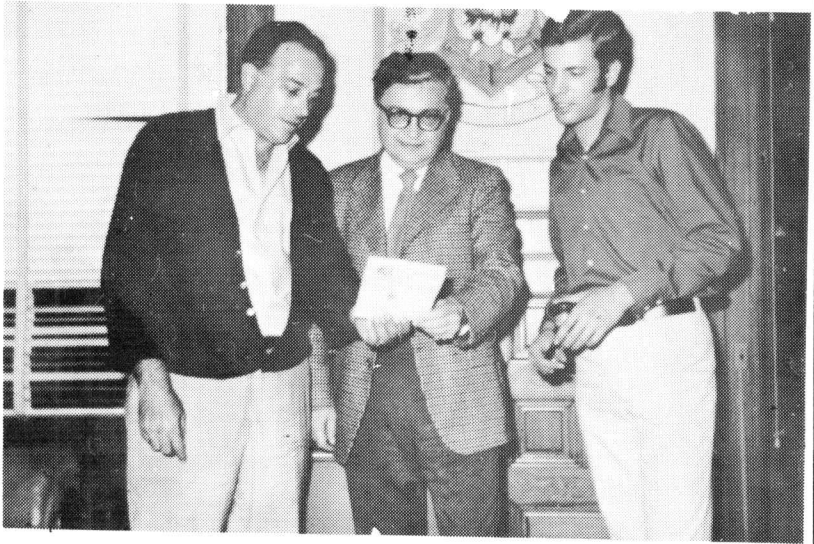

National President Stan Raffa is determined to keep his promise to visit every entity of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity this year. Actually, Stan has gone beyond his promise, since he has also made it a point to attend the important social events which are sponsored by the various entities.

So far, he has visited the following chapters; Chi, Penn. State; Pi, West Virginia U.; Psi, Duquesne U.; Delta, Brooklyn Poly.; Beta Delta, Temple U.; Beta Iota, Utica College; Beta Lambda, St. Francis College (Loretto, Pa.); Beta Omicron, Youngstown State U.; Beta Theta, College of Steubenville, Beta Rho, Gannon College.

Stan has attended the social affairs of the Pittsburgh Alumni Club, the Long Island Alumni Club and the Philadelphia Alumni Club. He meets with the New York A. C. on a regular basis.

On November 20, 1970, he returned to Chi Chapter to have dinner with the undergraduates. About the brothers of Chi, Stan said, "I have never felt more at home with any other group that I have met... these guys are like family; and every time I leave the house I feel that I left too soon." The following day, he made a second trip to Beta Theta to attend the Initiation ceremonies.

Following every tour, Stan floods the Fraternity mailboxes with a report of the trip, including a briefing on the discussions which take place at each entity. He asks all chapters and alumni clubs to read his report at their meetings.

On his tour during the Columbus Day weekend Stan visited a special individual. Following is how Stan described this special visit:

"I found myself in Amherst (near Buffalo) Monday morning, Columbus Day, wondering whether to go directly to Utica or call on past National President Vincent Muffoletto. Suddenly came an inspiration. Heading for the telephone book, I found the address and telephone number of the individual that passed through my mind. I called, introduced myself to the voice at the other end and was immediately invited to his house. I made what was to be a half hour ride in something like 21 minutes. Ringing the doorbell at 284 Hoyt Street, I immediately stood face to face with ALPHA FOUNDER, PROF. FERDINAND DI BARTOLO, and his lovely wife EDITH.

"Certainly, the name itself conjures up the most fascinating memories among all members of APD, young and old. For myself, it was like a visit to Mecca, except that I found a fascinating and interesting human being, instead of an inanimate monument.

"Brother DiBartolo is a young 81 and his appearance certainly belies his age (proof of this will be evident in the next issue of the KLEOS via fotos we took that day). He remembers every moment of his days at Syracuse University and the foundings of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. We examined treasured clippings from newspapers and other paraphernalia of those days together. I even examined the original hand-written constitution of APD.

"He is also completely aware of the changes that have taken place in APD over the years and we discussed a number of contemporary questions.

Certainly, we had a most delightful meeting, one which I hope to repeat again in the Spring, perhaps with a few of the undergrads. At the same time, I intend to visit with yet two other founders".

OFFICERS LEARN "HOW" AT 3-D SEMINAR

On Thursday, September 17, 1970 chapters of the Third District convened at the Beta Sigma chapter house for the annual Officers' Seminar. Chapters in attendance included Delta, Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute; Beta Eta, Brooklyn College; Beta Xi, Newark College of Engineering; Beta Pi, St. John's University; Beta Sigma, St. Francis College.

Third District Governor Albert Palazzo, who chaired the meeting, outlined the purpose of the event: "In order to have a strong national organization we must have strong chapters. In order to have strong chapters we must have good officers. Good leadership is an absolute must! A meeting of this nature is intended to present in detail the important duties of the chapter officers."

National President Stan Raffa presented the duties of the chapter president and vice president. Expansion Chairman Frank Cavallaro, P.N.P. gave a detailed account of the responsibilities of the chapter secretary and treasurer, calling these officers "the vital blood stream of the chapter." Dear Al:

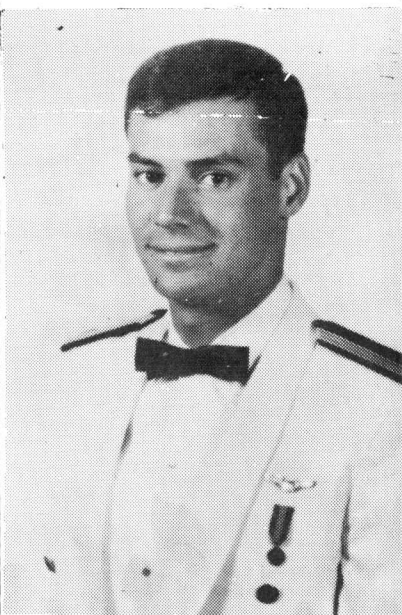
Well, You guys did it again. Whadda party. Putting it in terms you'll really understand. Like W O W! and the camera I'll certainly put that to good use. We all will.
