



MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE IN CHICAGO PLANS FOR FRATERNITY'S FUTURE; SPECIAL REPORTS MAKE WAY FOR ACTION AT 1971 NATIONAL CONVENTION AT GRANIT

The 1971 Mid-Year Meeting of the National Officers of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity was held on Saturday, February 13, at the O'Hare Holiday Inn, Chicago, Illinois. District Reports, Committee reports on Ritual Revisions, a National Pledge Program, a National Rush Booklet, and a National Scholarship Plan made this meeting an excellent follow-up on the very productive 1970 National Convention.

Most of the out-of-towners arrived Friday, February 12. On Friday evening, National President Stan Raffa held an open discussion meeting with the brothers of Beta Mu Chapter, DePaul University. Also at this meeting were: Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F., National Chaplain; Jules Zangrille, National Vice-President; Adam Di Vincenzo, National Secretary; Al Palazzo, 3rd District Governor; Dr. Anthony Nardone, 4th District Governor; Joe Creston, 5th District Governor; Peter Chila, 6th District Governor; John Fiore, 7th District Governor; Santo Barbarino, National Editor; and James Paccione, former 3rd District Governor.

This little get-together with Beta Mu turned out to be quite a discussion. Questions were asked concerning the duties of an undergraduate in the national framework, along with the privileges of being part of that framework. The answers were detailed, Stan Raffa handling most of the replies in his own unique style which manifests his tremendous experience in and knowledge of this Fraternity. Just a sideline to this meeting — During the discussion, Adam Di Vincenzo kept whispering to some of the brothers present about how much he wanted to eat pizza. After Adam had gone to his room to get some sleep on the night before what usually proves to be a very hectic day for him, John Fiore bought about ten pizza pies. Someone knocked on Adam's door to give him the good news. In a split second, Adam came rushing in to break bread with his brothers. The late snack was over at 3:30 A.M. Truly, this was a most typical APD session, from beginning to end!

Meanwhile, back in Toledo, Ohio, First District Governor Steve Rubino and his two daughters were on their way to Chicago until the weather no longer permitted their traveling. They stopped off for the night at a motel in Toledo, planning to leave early next morning for the Executive Meeting. They thought they were in for a quiet and perhaps lonely evening until they suddenly heard a very familiar APD voice also snowbound, just behind them, ready to check in. It was Expansion Chairman Frank Cavallaro, P.N.P., with his wife Anne. Both Steve and Frank attended the second half of the Executive meeting, in time to deliver their reports.

On Saturday, Central Office provided breakfast for the brothers and their ladies. After everyone had their fill, the room was prepared for the meeting.

Raffa explains new Expansion Policy

Stan Raffa called the meeting to order, issuing an agenda that was to keep the National Officers in session for six hours. Stan explained his new Expansion

system in which two individuals, presently Al Palazzo, 3rd District Governor and Joe Creston, 5th District Governor, will apply their expansion efforts against two, and only two, potential chapter opportunities in their areas. They are to take full advantage of the good offices of Expansion Chairman Frank Cavallaro for any material and/or assistance that he can provide.

Following the reports on the chapters and alumni clubs of the Fraternity by the District Governors, the Officers took a short time out for lunch and returned for the Committee reports.

Sarno Outlines Scholarship Plan

Prof. Anthony Sarno, Long Island A.C., Chairman of the National Alpha Phi Delta Scholarship Assistance Fund submitted his Committee's report with the following recommendations: (a) That scholarship grants should be based on academic performance. This recommendation does not preclude the possibility of additional forms of financial assistance in the future nor the use of other criteria (e.g. need, etc.). (b) Grants be made to undergraduates pursuing a degree and to matriculated full-time graduate students. (c) The following sub-committee; 2. Treasurer (with legal and CPA experience); 3. Selection Committee (to determine awards); 4. Recorder-Secretary (communications); 5. Awards-Banquet Committee (public relations helpful to fund raising activities).

Bro. Camillus working on Oath and Ritual

Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F., Chairman of the Ritual Committee, submitted the report of his committee stressing the need for uniformity in the Ritual on Initiation. With this in mind, the Ritual Committee is in the process of revising the Ritual, this includes work on the Oath. The Committee awaits opinions from the entities throughout the Fraternity. It will

have all revisions ready to be voted upon at the 1971 National Convention.

Rush Booklet and Pledge Program

Santo Barbarino asked for more cooperation from the entities in order to prepare the Rush Booklet on time. He will be using Kleos material for the most part as copy for the Booklet. He hopes to have it prepared by the 1971 National Convention.

It was announced at the meeting that John Palermo, National Pledging Chairman will be sending letters to each chapter and National Officer, requesting ideas on pledging and what they think should be incorporated into a National Pledge Program.

1971 Convention at Granit

It was also announced that the 1971 National Convention will be held at the Granit Hotel and Country Club, the site of the 1968 National Convention, from Monday, August 30 to Friday, September 3.

During Good and Welfare, the brothers praised Stan Raffa for the tremendous amount of time and effort he has put into his job as National President.

Following the meeting, the out-of-towners joined with the brothers of Beta Mu, the Chicago alumni and friends for dinner and entertainment. Adam DiVincenzo, Stan Raffa, and Brother Camillus addressed the group, requesting that everyone attend the next National Convention. 5th District Governor Joseph Creston, in his usual moving manner, urged the brothers to become more national minded.

The highlight of the entertainment was provided by the brothers of Beta Mu, who performed their traditional tarantella. Everyone at the dinner was given a Directory of the brothers in the Chicago area.

John Fiore, 7th District Governor, was given the Fraternity Hand Clap for his work in arranging such a fine social affair.

BETA LAMBDA + PSI = PI

Editor's Note: National President Stan Raffa has been writing reports to the Fraternity about different situations and events. What follows is an extract from one of his reports concerning Pi Chapter, West Virginia University.

PI CHAPTER RUSH (1/22/71) — I noted in previous reports of the situation at Pi and of the efforts of both Psi and Beta Lambda Chapters to help their sister chapter at WVU. On the evening of 1/15, while visiting friends in Endicott, NY, I received a call at home which I later traced to Walter Angelini, recent Pi alumnus and one of the few left taking care of the house at Morgantown. Pi, mostly in the person of Walter, and ably assisted by Beta Lambda and Psi, was holding a rush on 1/22. Accordingly, I arranged my schedule to be in Winchester, Va. the night before, with relatively "easy" access to Morgantown the next day.

It's only 150 miles from the Shenandoah Valley to the Mail Pouch country of the Alleghenys. The country is beautiful, but the drive is not. I have never had to maneuver so many curves since leaving the state of Washington. It took nearly five hours to get to Morgantown.

I parked at the bottom of the hill that is Spuce Street and walked up to the house. Driving or walking, maneuvering on this street must be accomplished in complete defiance of the laws of gravity. Somehow, at least 60 people manage to do this.

The house was mobbed. There was a contingency of 16 Brothers from Beta Lambda and 10 from Psi. Also present was the most recent group of Pi men. More important, there were some two-dozen non-affiliates from WVU who were wondering what it was all about. It was really impressive. There haven't been so many people at the house in moons.

The Pi men, assisted by Ann Dinardi, the chapter's faithful House-mother for many years, followed up the next day with a buffet dinner. I had to leave for Cleveland but was brought up-to-date by Joe Creston, 5D Gov. who passed on the results: twelve men signed for APD. The pledge period started Sunday, 1/24.

It would not be difficult to get over-ecstatic about what has happened at Pi but I'll try to keep my comments as low-bore as possible. The fact is, that I cannot recall any "call to arms" in recent times that has produced such immediate response with such satisfactory results. The Pi situation revealed itself at Convention time and looked desperate during a visitation a month later. At the same time Beta Lambda and Psi volunteered to assist in rejuvenating the chapter. Meanwhile, in January, with the house up for sale, the Weirton Alumni Club informed the Housing Corporation that they would buy the house in the interests of Pi Chapter, further underlining the faith in the potential of a chapter at WVU. Beta Lambda and Psi pressed their aid for Pi. Anne Dinardi added the needed touch. Walt Angelini scoured the dorms. The result is an extremely hopeful situation for Pi Chapter and a tremendous example for the rest of us in APD.

While everyone involved deserves much credit for what has happened at Pi, I wish to make special note of both Beta Lambda and Psi who took the initiative in this effort. They exhibited further proof of the wisdom of the "Five Old Men" (past National Presidents) at last year's National Convention in electing them the Outstanding and Most Improved Chapters respectively. For the total district effort, our congratulations to 5D Gov. Joe Creston.

The Citation reads:

Sarno has served as Teacher, Chairman, Departmental Representative, Member of the Personnel and Budget Committee, and University Senator, for the Department of Mathematics; Acting Director of Evening Sessions, Dean of Men, and Assistant to the President for Internal Communications. He has shown interest in his colleagues by serving as an officer of the Men's Faculty Club and past President of the local Chapter of the American Association of University Professors, and his interest in students by serving as Director of Intramural Sports, Coordinator of Student Advisement for the Department of Mathematics, Chairman or Member of various student affairs and activities, committees, and Moderator of the Mathematics Society, which he organized, and Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. St. John's University proudly recognizes the tireless service of a dedicated faculty member by conferring upon Professor Anthony H. Sarno The President's Medal.

RED CROSS RECEIVES HELP

The determination of college fraternity pledges sometimes take a strange turn of events. From The College of Steubenville Bill Stayduhar, of Bethel Park, Pa., Jogh Plesnarski of Wayne, N.J., and Kevin Chester of Pittsburgh, pledges of Alpha Phi Delta, Beta Theta Chapter, made several attempts at community participation but to no avail. After being told their timing did not coincide with the needs of the agencies, they walked into the local Red Cross Chapter House only because they were in the vicinity.

To fulfill their obligations, one of the requirements of the pledges is to sponsor a community project and their accidental 'walk-in' will do just that. In speaking with Mrs. Tish Louer, executive director of the local chapter, these pledges will be on call for The Motor Corps, a service that needs much assistance.

Working around their school classes, they will drive to and from the Veterans Administration Hospital in Pittsburgh, Pa., drive patients to and from local hospitals — where transportation is not

Among them were Joe Burgio, Joe "Robe" St. Pierre, Joe Bodnar and John Mispom.

Beta Xi was also very proud of its I.F.C. football team this past semester. Just missing the playoffs with a 3-2-1 record, the team battled down to the final game before being eliminated. Lead by its outstanding defense with brothers Stan "Stosh" Klotz, Lou Fernandez at ends, and "Big Al" Farara at middle guard, the defensive line proved almost impenetrable. Backed up by stalwarts "Steady Eddy" Grobelny, Mike Curcio, Niall Trimby, and Ric Riccardo,

The Chapter was privileged to have National President Stan Raffa and 3-D Gov. Al Palazzo attend the Beta Xi Christmas Dance. Several "rush" parties were held during the semester and they were successful for the most part. When all else failed, the brothers and guests got together for huge drinking games which lasted until only a few were left standing. Man for man, Beta Xi boasts the biggest percentage of beer drinkers on campus and can safely say that this is probably true in the national as well.

In the coming semester it is the hope of the brotherhood to improve its standing both at N.C.E. and in Alpha Phi Delta. New officers were elected recently and house improvements are in the works.

Nominated to the post of 2nd Vice President of the AAU by the Ohio Association of the AAU, Joe's background and credentials are at least as outstanding as his new position.

250 Eat and Dance In 3-D Christmasland

The Annual Third District Christmas Dinner-Dance was held on December 12, 1970 at the Astorian Manor in Astoria, Queens with approximately 250 brothers, wives and friends dancing and singing with the music of Bob Chevy, Beta Eta, and his Orchestra. Third District Governor Al Palazzo was Chairman of this affair, which has almost become synonymous with Al's name. Other National Officers present included National President Stan Raffa, First District Governor Steve Rubino and his wife, Fourth District Governor Dr. Anthony Nardone and his wife, National Chaplain Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F., and Expansion Chairman Frank Cavallaro, P.N.P. and his wife.

Engineer, Lawyer, Businessman, Wrestler

Graduating with a degree in Chemical Engineering from Penn State University, Joe went on to receive a law degree from Toledo University. He then graduated from Columbia University's Graduate School in Executive Business Administration. He possesses a Doctor of Jurisprudence (J.D., Cum Laude) from the University of Toledo, with additional specialization in Labor, Patent and Corporate Law. He is a member of the American Bar Association.

While at Penn State, Joe was a member of the Band and Glee Club; the famed Nittany Lions football squad and Collegiate Wrestling Champion in the Middleweight Division.

Joins Sun Oil

Joe joined Sun Oil at Toledo in 1941 and thereupon began a career devoted to industry and to the sports he knew so well. He began by organizing wrestling in Toledo and at the Toledo University. He gave clinics at the High Schools; developed training films at his own expense. The sport spread. Soon the demand for his films and clinics was extending to the Midwest. No amount of service was left undone. No call for help was left unheard. These untiring efforts on Scalzo's part caused the late Art Morse of Toledo to remark, "It is unbelievable what this man gives of himself and the places he goes to advance the sport of wrestling."

Joe sensed the lack of a program for Greco Roman and immediately set about establishing one in the United States. He had his programs moving in Toledo and he was moving up the ladder at Sun Oil. Young Dick Wilson came under his instruction. Dick, too, moved up the ladder to National Champion and became an Olympic contender. He is now head wrestling coach at Toledo University.

In 1956, Joe Scalzo was selected as coach of the U.S. Greco-Roman Wrestling Team and they made a remarkable showing. In the last two games, the U.S. moved into the finalist class in both the Greco-Roman and Freestyle wrestling, much of which is attributed to Joe by his fellowmen in their sport.

Joe's activity in the AAU has been outstanding. He has served as the Ohio Representative on the National Executive Committee and Chairman of the National Industrial Committee, seeking to bring Industry and the AAU closer together.

Represents U.S.

He has attended the past five Olympic Games in which he has served as a coach, as an official, as a Representative of the United States, and as U.S. Representative on the International Amateur Wrestling Federation. He has represented the U.S. Department of State in Germany in 1968 and has represented the AAU and the Olympic Committee at the Official International meetings in twelve countries since 1952, arranging, in the most part, his vacations to coincide with these events.

Meanwhile, back at the Sun Oil Company, Joe has been promoted to Administrative Assistant to the Manager of Employee Relations. He became Manager of Employee Relations in 1966 and, in 1970, became Manager of Employee Relations and Plant Services, his present position with the Sun Oil Company.

In addition to his myriad contributions to sports, to the administration of the AAU, his educational background and industrial experience, he served as City Councilman for the City of Toledo in 1958-60. In 1969, as a tribute to his achievements, he had offers of support for Council again from both political parties. He declined.

In 1955, Joe was selected as Toledo's Outstanding Young Man and one of five Outstanding Young Men in Ohio in 1956. In 1957, he was honored as the University of Toledo's Outstanding Alumnus.

The Ohio Association has given him a life membership in the National AAU. The Helms Foundation, in honoring Joe by placing him in the Hall of Fame, stated he had done more than any single individual in advancing wrestling for the United States since the 1948 game.

Joe has served on the National YMCA Board of Governors and is currently in his fourth term as President of the Board of Trustees of Parkview Hospital in Toledo.

As an Attorney, Joe is presently Secretary to the Board of Directors of Lake Erie Machine Company, an international manufacturer of foam machine equipment. You have the talents, desire, affection, experience and opportunity to do justice to the highest office in our Fraternity. You have my best wishes for success in your endeavors.

Brother Stan notes that the letter was signed with the greatest flourish noted in Frank Cavallaro's signature in a long time. (When you have been that close to the Fraternity that long, you notice these things.)

The National President first reaction was to drop the past National President a little thankyou note and then go on to discuss this year's activities of the Expansion Committee. Happily, he thought better of it and decided, instead, to write Bro. Cavallaro an open letter which he felt the entire fraternity might want to share through the KLEOS. The reasons for his doing this will become evident as you read the letter.

Dear Frank:
My sincerest thanks for your letter of September 17 and the kind words contained therein.

You mentioned several items that I would have liked to recall at the Awards Dinner at Tamiment, but unfortunately could not. Your letter, however, gives me the opportunity to make some of these statements via the KLEOS. I'm sure you won't mind sharing my thoughts with the entire Fraternity.

It was 22 years ago this past September that I was invited to pledge for Alpha Delta at Brooklyn Poly. It was the third of four stops intended that night. Happily I stopped right there, at 26 Schermerhorn Street, the smallest quarters I had been to. If you were to ask me why I stopped there it would take a lot more pages and even then its relevancy might be doubtful. After all, we have all had our reasons for "stopping right there". In any case, it was a quick and easy decision and I certainly have never regretted it.

I was initiated in January, 1949, the occasion still very vivid in my mind. I think it was the following semester that I was elected Treasurer. At the same time I started "Delta Doings", a four/six pager that made it no further than the bulletin board, prepared on the same typewriter that I'm using for this letter.

Strangely enough, everyone enjoyed it and the newsletter became a bi-weekly.

By that time it was 1950 and I remember you coming around the chapter house, looking at the bulletin board and making some comment about "Delta Doings". This is how I first met you; you were then National Vice-president. The next thing I know, we were meeting at your office, grinding out 1500 copies of the METROVOX, the 3D's official publication, every month. With the exception of Central Offices address of the time (1430 Massachusetts Avenue., etc.) there has never been a more familiar address than 55 Stanton Street.

My job took me to Seattle in late 1953 and I stayed there for two years while Gep LaSala carried on not only with the METROVOX but also as 3D Governor. Soon after I returned (Spring of '56), Vinnie Larcy decided to retire as Editor of the KLEOS, and as National President, you chose me as his successor. I lasted 12 years following which, circumstances made me run for national VP. Now I am honored to be National President.

That covers a few milestones, sufficient for the historical footnotes. The circumstances that took me here in the first place are something else again.

None of us in this life on earth ever really knows where we're going or how we're really going to get there. We all have goals, some vague, some specific and we normally set some general course to achieve them. Most of us don't really achieve them and in fact often find ourselves happier for it. We instead find ourselves in some other position, generally a not unenviable one, but often one quite different from what we thought we might have been striving for. On such occasions that we might look back, it is interesting to reflect on how we got there.

In my case, I feel that somehow I was destined to be associated with APD long before I was invited to pledge. It is interesting, for example, that once I decided to take advantage of the GI Bill of Rights following World War II, I considered going to Syracuse University, Cornell University and Manhattan College before settling on Brooklyn Poly, all colleges identified with APD, and that I in fact considered no other colleges. Later, while addressing METROVOX's at your office one night I came across the name of Emanuel Carone. Now there could be only one Emanuel Carone and he was the greatest math teacher we had at JHS PS 30, Manhattan (this judgement was not only mine, but unanimous among the kids). I called him that very night. Because I was very active in those JHS days in various school clubs, he remembered me even though it was 15 years later. At that point, my feelings were confirmed; somehow, I had been tied up with APD 12 years before I had ever heard about it!

This early association established in fact, it is possible that whatever influence I personally may have on the fortunes of APD may never be recorded; but I think I can tell you what influence APD had on me.

First, a very concrete example. It was Alpha Phi Delta that provided me with my first job. As you personally know, it was John Camaratta, another Delta man, who opened the door for me back in 1951. Naturally, I was on my own thereafter and I had to demonstrate my own abilities; but whatever success I may feel to have achieved in my profession to date I can trace back directly to that first opportunity.

My other examples cannot be demonstrated so concisely; they are pertinent nevertheless.

The METROVOX was one experience that had a lasting influence on all of us that worked on it. No greater friendships have been formed in this Fraternity since we all gathered regularly in your office, four or five times a month, writing, composing, typing, retyping, mimeographing, addressing and hand sorting 1500 copies of 8 pages, sometimes more, of fraternity news and ideas. No underground student group of today ever worked so fervently for a cause than we did: the dissemination of local and national news among local APD's. I know we were successful; the Third District hasn't been the same since publication effectively stopped in 1955.

The KLEOS was another experience. This position continuously monitors the pulse of APD. It's the best spot to be to find out what the young people are thinking and how APD is doing.

APD is, after all, just another of an infinite number of experiences that each of us senses as we wander through this microcosm of existence. Each experience produces its own pressure points. The combination of these pressure points — in physics, their mathematical force and direction — produces a resultant motivation that in fact directs and defines the very essence of our lives, where we go and how we get there.

This finally takes me to the crux of the point I am trying to make with these few thousand words.

We are often asked, "What has the Fraternity done for me?" I used to try to answer it when suddenly it became obvious that I couldn't answer such a question in terms of the person who asked it. I know what it's done for me; you, Frank, know what it's done for you. Those who ask can only answer the question themselves.

But we can help others to answer their own question in terms of our own experiences, and as a complement to my earlier notes I offer the following:

With respect to my first job, I was privileged to make some token repayment, not to John Camaratta, but to the Fraternity by actively assisting John in getting 24 other fraternity men positions over the following two year period. Maybe John did all the placing, but I did what I could to help.

With respect to the KLEOS, it was my pleasure to recommend my successor to our past National President two years ago. I am sure that he will get as much pleasure in this position as I did.

All I provided that first time was the transportation. They have been providing the enthusiasm ever since. Evidence is the dozen undergrads that flew to Steubenville last year at their own expense.

So where does all this take us but full circle. You were my mentor; I'm sure you had one too. Hopefully, I have served as someone else's mentor. All of us who have served APD devotedly have picked up the torch and passed the torch in our own time, in our own way. I intend to see that this tradition continues.

As far as I'm concerned, that's what APD is all about!

Obituary

Donato Mazzola, one of the original founders of Beta Delta Chapter, Temple University passed away on Tuesday, January 12, 1971. Brother Mazzola was the Delaware Valley general counsel and manager of the Seven-Up Bottling companies. He had been active with the company for the last 30 years. A 1936 graduate of Temple University School of Law, he served on the board of directors of the Keystone Bottlers Association and the Pathway School. He was a member of the Justinian Society and the Graduate Club of Philadelphia.

Surviving are his wife, the former Catherine Imbesi; two sons, Dr. Robert D. and William J.; and a daughter, Santa C.

Dr. Joseph A. Perrone, Nu Chapter passed away on November 8, 1970. A pioneer in the field of bronchology, he performed the first laryngectomy in Pittsburgh. He was a member of the senior staff at Mercy Hospital, where he died.

He studied under the late Dr. Chevalier Jackson, inventor of the bronchoscope and performed hundreds of operations removing everything from pins and coins to bullets and rings from lungs, bronchial tubes and esophagus. He was the first chief of the Dapper Dan Bronchoscope Clinic established in the 1930's.

He received his B.S. degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 1924. During his undergraduate years, he served as president of his Chapter when Nu was one of the strong links in the APD chain. He

received his medical degree in 1928.

Brother Perrone was also active at West Virginia with Pi Chapter and with Lambda Chapter at the University of Pennsylvania.

He was the husband of Anne Cusick Perrone and father of Mrs. David (Joanne) Connolly, Mrs. James (Mary Glynn) McAraraw, and Denise.

William Bartholomew, Chi Chapter, lost his life in the course of action in South Viet Nam. From his home in North Catasauqua, Pa., he enrolled in Penn State in 1966, and later joined Chi Chapter.
