### RECORD-BREAKING CROWD AT 1972 NATIONAL CONVENTION!

### FRATERNITY WELCOMES BETA TAU, FAIRMONT STATE COLLEGE!

### ELECTED: ZANGRILLE, PRESIDENT: PALAZZO, VICE-PRESIDENT!

The Fifty-Second National Convention of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity drew a record-breaking 437 conventioners to Granit 2, Kerhonkson, New York, from August 21 to August 25, 1972. The National Convention Committee must now consider the large attendance in choosing the site of next year's Convention.

The National Council elected Julius J. Zangrille, Jr., Beta Lambda, National President and Albert E. Palazzo, Theta Beta, National Vice-President during the third and final session. Outgoing National President Stanley W. Raffa, Delta, received both praise and awards as one of the greatest leaders in the Fraternity's history.

The Fraternity's Executive Committee met on Monday, August 21. All of the National Officers were in attendance to consider the status of the Fraternity. During the meeting, National Treasurer Joseph Scotti predicted financial troubles if the trend of low initiations and uncollected per capita tax continues. Following a review of the districts, National President Stan Raffa appointed Joseph Scotti Chairman of the Credentials Committee and Second District Governor Ernest Coletti Chairman of the Rules of Order Committee.

The first session of the National Council was held on Tuesday, August 22. The highlight of this meeting was the seating of the delegates of Beta Tau, Fairmont State College, the first addition to the Alpha Phi Delta roster in ten years. After delivering his report, President Raffa appointed the following chairmen: National Chaplain Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F., Ritual Committee; Past National President Frank Cavallaro, Expansion Committee; Fifth District Governor Joseph Creston, Legislative Committee; Third District Governor Albert Palazzo, Resolutions Committee; and Matthew Lo Monaco, Phil. A.C., Budget and Audit Committee.

Raffa urged the undergraduates to participate in the business of the Fraternity. He asked that each committee appoint or elect an undergraduate associate chairman, who would report to the National Council on the business of his committee.

Memorial Services were held on the following day before the start of the second session. Brother Camillus Casey O.S.F. conducted the services. Following prayers for the deceased brothers, a white carnation was placed in the memorial wreath as each name was read. A large group of brothers, wives and friends attended the services. Before concluding, Joseph Creston spoke to the group about the Father Federici — Father Niehaus Memorial under construction at Duquesne University.

During the second session, Gary Marsh, Beta Xi, reported on the progress of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee, the main purpose of which is to set up a communication network among the

chapters. William Weber, Beta Sigma, delivered the Ritual Committee report asking for suggestions and ideas from the chapters during the coming year so that the revised Ritual to be voted upon at the 1973 National Convention will be accepted by all entities.

Those who reported for the Expansion Committee included Tom Livelli, Theta Beta, Dick Canestraro, Steubenville A.C., Tim Mulvey, Beta Sigma, and Bruce Brodsky, Beta Iota. Frank Cavallaro announced plans to make a film in order to help rushing and expansion work. He asked for cooperation from the chapters in filming events to appear in the film.

Santo Barbarino, National Editor asked for more communication from the chapters and alumni clubs during the year so as to insure the publication of four issues of the Kleos. He presented the Rush Booklet to the brothers and asked for reports from the chapters on the Booklet's effectiveness in the rush programs.

The third session of the National Council began with a report of the Budget and Audit Committee, given by John Coll, Beta Xi. Jim McKenna, Beta Sigma reported for the Legislative Committee. The only legislative action passed at this Convention was that the following sentence be added to Article VII, Section 8, paragraph 7 of the National Constitution: "If he is unable to attend, he shall request another national officer or competent alumnus to represent him." The word "he" refers to the district governor. This change was made to insure proper supervision during initiations. The Resolutions Committee report was delivered by Gary Marsh, Beta Xi.

Second District Governor Ernest Coletti was elected to a three-year term on the National Housing Committee. The final official business of the Convention was the election of Albert E. Palazzo, Theta Beta to the post of National Vice-President and of Julius J. Zangrille, Jr., Beta Lambda to the post of National President.

During Good and Welfare, Stan Raffa thanked Central Office for the great cooperation he received during his term of office. He also praised Third District Governor Al Palazzo and Fifth District Governor

Joe Creston for their truly outstanding work.

Alfred E. Santangelo, Eta eloquently addressed the National Convention urging the undergraduates to become politically involved.

### Joe Catapano, I.I.A.C. Founder, Gets Alumnus Award

Joseph I. Catapano, Pi, '28, received the 1972 Outstanding Alumnus Award at the Grand Dinner and Ball on Thursday, August 24. Joe is a charter member of the Long Island Alumni Club, which was installed on July 13, 1957. Since its inception, he has served as Activities Chairman, a position he presently maintains.

This position is the very core and life line that permits the I.I.A.C., one of the most active alumni clubs in the Fraternity, to function as it does. The Activities Chairman, with the President, sets up the calendar of events for the fiscal year. These events include seven business meetings at a restaurant, two dinner meetings with guest speakers, a Scholarship Award Dinner, a Cocktail Party and Membership Drive, an Installation Dinner, and an Annual Dinner-Dance. The actual running of these functions is the job of the Activities Chairman.

This means the selection of site, printing tickets, taking reservations, menu selections, band, etc. Except for meetings, these affairs are held at continually different places, to stimulate interest so that no one becomes bored with certain establishments. Some men would consider the running of one affair a full time function.

As if this were not enough, Joe has been extremely active in District and National affairs. On the District level, he has represented the I.I.A.C. at the Third District Conventions and has attended the many functions which take place in the District. On the National level, Joe regularly attends the National Conventions and has represented the I.I.A.C. as a delegate.

## SMALL BUT STRONG! THE N.Y.A.C. WINS 1972 ALUMNI CLUB AWARD

The New York Alumni Club was the recipient of the 1972 Outstanding Alumni Club Award. Dominic Zema, President of the N.Y.A.C., accepted the award at the Grand Dinner and Ball.

The N.Y.A.C. has been in existence for many years. It is a small active group that meets regularly every month. The business meetings, while informal, accomplish what they should: regular conduct of affairs, dissemination of information concerning the Fraternity, and what assistance can be given to undergraduate chapters.

Every affair conducted by an entity in the Third District can depend upon active support from the N.Y.A.C. The Club is represented at every Third District meeting. Most important is the fact that this group is always ready to assist all the undergraduate chapters of the District both personally and financially. Here are a few examples:

1. Reactivation of Theta Beta: payment of two weeks of ads in the school newspaper and a Beer and Pizza Rush Party. Over \$300,000 was spent. It would have been difficult to reactivate this Chapter of New York University were it not for this assistance from the N.Y.A.C.
2. Beta Beta: Pledge recruitment and getting Alpha Phi Delta known on the Manhattan

College Campus. Result — Seven new brothers for Beta Beta. Cost — \$600.00. The N.Y.A.C. annually votes money for Beta Beta.

3. Delta: The Third District Governor has \$15.00 voted for a selective mailing for the fall rush. More will be voted, if needed.
4. Beta Xi: This Chapter wanted to run a raffle for the purchase of a house. However, New Jersey law forbids the running of a raffle for profit. The Beta Xi brothers consulted with Third District Gov. Al Palazzo, who, in turn, went to the N.Y.A.C. Result — Tickets were printed — "New York Alumni Club for the Beta Xi Housing Fund", and prizes totaling \$400.00 were bought. If Beta Xi fell down on the selling, the N.Y.A.C. treasury would have been wiped out. Beta Xi sold in New Jersey and the N.Y.A.C. sold in the rest of the District. Today, over \$1600.00 is being held by the N.Y.A.C. to be given to the National Housing Corporation toward a Beta Xi house.

All of the above items were accomplished during the past school year. The members of the New York Alumni Club have worked consistently for the welfare of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity and have well-earned the 1972 Outstanding Alumni Club Award.

## BETA XI REACHES THE SKY OUTSTANDING CHAPTER OF '72

The 1972 Outstanding Chapter Award went to Beta Xi, Newark College of Engineering. The winner of last year's Most Improved Chapter Award, Beta Xi is

now one of the Fraternity's healthiest and most active chapters.

*Below is a letter written by former Third District Governor Al Palazzo. This letter tells the Beta Xi story:*

"At the Balsams Convention, I was placed in charge of the Beta Xi house by the Housing Committee. This chapter was in deep trouble with National: refusing to pay rent or make repairs or pay per capita. In effect, they tried to blackmail National — refusing to listen to me as 3rd District Governor. I worked with them a year and then came back as 3rd Dist. Governor for another two years. My term has just been completed.

"This chapter did a complete turnabout. Back rents were paid, repairs were made and the chapter caught up with National obligations and is up to date today. Last year they took the Most Improved Chapter Award. This year, they, if anyone, richly deserve the Outstanding Chapter Award. They are Alpha Phi Delta and they are National-minded all the way.

"I have been invited to every meeting, social affair, sports event etc. I have been to Newark so often that my car could find its way there alone. There were times when I was too tired to go, but went anyway. Nothing I felt was going to destroy the rapport that had developed between the National Office (3D

Gov.) and the chapter. If they asked me, I went. And they always asked me. As a result, Beta Xi became the shining light of the district. Beta Xi never sent a delegate to the monthly 3D meeting. They came 10 to 15 strong. It was another fraternity affair that had to be attended.

"Remember, Beta Xi started this year with troubles. The National house at 15 Burnett was uninhabitable. Therefore, they started the Fall semester as the only Fraternity on Campus without a house. This was tantamount to extinction. If ever a chapter could have yelled, "What is National doing for us?", here was a great opportunity. They didn't. They took the problem head on and solved it.

"I got a phone call, "Al, we lined up three locals that want to join us. Come look them over and tell us what you think." I went and talked with the locals and made my choice on one. Fortunately, we agreed. They had also decided on Sigma Delta Sigma. As a result of the merger, 16 new brothers came into the chapter and Beta Xi had the necessary house — located right off the campus. These new brothers fit in so well that today I have to look at the records to determine who was original Beta Xi. This wasn't accidental. They thoughtfully picked the right group, confirmed it by seeking my advice and then all worked to blend the two into one. Today it is all National, Alpha Phi Delta. In fact one of the new members was named by President Stan Raffa to head the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee.

"Beta Xi did not stop there; they brought in 20 more new brothers in

three pledge periods for a total induction of 36 this year, increasing their membership from 21 to 57. This made them the second largest fraternity on campus.

"Rather than go on in narrative form, which could go on for pages, let me just list Beta Xi's accomplishments this year:

1. Ranked 2nd among Newark College of Engineering fraternities in the 1971 Fall Semester grade point averages and had 10 brothers top 3.0.

2. Obtained \$1600 toward the purchase of a house by means of a raffle held in the Third District and sponsored by the N.Y.A.C.

3. Lead the way to the establishment of the undergraduate coordinating committee by one of their brothers, Eric Hartmann.

4. Had representatives in attendance at the 3D Workshop, all 3D meetings, the 3D convention, the National Mid-Year Convention, and Stan Raffa's testimonial party.

5. Was active in community service with 35% of the brotherhood donating blood in the I.F.C. blood drive and having a brother tutor in a Newark grammar school.

6. Was active in the Newark College of Engineering community with several of their brothers on the varsity fencing, swimming, tennis, and volley ball teams, as well as some in student government.

7. Placed first in N.C.E. intramural volley ball, waterpolo, and softball. Also placed first in I.F.C. bowling.

8. Christmas caroling for toys for underprivileged children in Newark.

9. Baseball clinic for Central Ward children in Newark.

10. Overcame difficulties with their lease expiring in Jan. 1972 which took four weeks of negotiations with the landlord and his lawyer and ourselves and our lawyer (James Tamburo, Beta Xi class of 1964). This last time prevented them from bringing in a new chapter at Paterson State.

11. Obtained a summer resort house in order to promote close ties within the brotherhood and alumni during the summer months.

12. Vice Pres. Stephen Warren granted a fellowship for graduate studies in N.C.E.'s Civil Engineering department.

## Raffa's Story Is Part Of The Record; Pi's Improvement U.S. Congress Knows All About Him! Wins '72 Award

The Long Island Alumni Club held its Annual Dinner-Dance at the Bayberry Hotel in Great Neck, Long Island on April 29, 1972. In recognition of devoted service and dedication to Alpha Phi Delta, this festive occasion was chosen to honor our National President.

Through the diligent and untiring efforts of Joe Catapano, LIAC's perennial Activities Chairman, who even one-fingered individually typed letters to innumerable brothers, the affair was a resounding success and well attended including many brothers outside of the LIAC entity.

Among those were National Chaplain Brother Camillus, former Third District Governors Al Palazzo and Alfred Santangelo, brand new Third District Governor Joseph Derrico, Jr., and his father, Joseph, Sr. Laura Derrico participated in the fund-raising when she lent her blonde statuesqueness to the selling of raffles.

Also honored were all of LIAC's past presidents who received citations acknowledging a job well done.

The highlight of the evening was when Stan Raffa was personally presented with a page of the Congressional Record by Congressman Lester Wolff of Great Neck, Long Island.

All this was the brainchild of Joe Catapano, who a few weeks before, sought the aid of his good friend, Lester Wolff, to help honor our National President. The rest is a permanent history.

Pi Chapter, West Virginia University received the 1972 Most Improved Chapter Award for its remarkable come-back from a stage of near disaster. The circumstances unde; which Pi Chapter struggled were fully detailed in the last issue of the Kleos.

The great progress and many activities of Pi Chapter has placed this entity back on the map of A.P.D. Perhaps the Chapter's greatest accomplishment was the successful establishment of Beta Tau Chapter at Fairmont State College. This project took many hours of planning and hard work. Out of six men who showed up for the first rush date, four were interested. These men talked to their friends and the number of interested people grew with each weekly meeting until fourteen were pledged and, after a period of six weeks, initiated.

The Pi brothers monitored the meetings of the Fairmont pledges and instructed them with the Dokime and supplementary lectures. Transportation was a major problem. Also, the fact that this program took place along with the final part of Pi's own rush activities made the sacrifices of the brothers of Pi tremendous in the work done for the new Chapter.

Pi Chapter has not given up on expansion. The brothers are now considering the possibility of reactivating Xi Chapter at Ohio State. They also hope to start a colony at Waynesburg College in Pa.

The brothers are looking forward to a bright future. They have plans for the house, an open rush system and finally another nearby chapter in West Virginia to make a potentially great year a reality.

Pi Chapter is indebted to Psi and Beta Lambda Chapters, the Weirton Alumni, Alumnus Walt Angelini, Housemother Ann DiNardi, National President Stan Raffa, John May, who lead the Beta Tau project, and last, but certainly by no means least, Fifth District Governor Joseph Creston, without whose concern and encouragement, Pi might not exist today.

## Big Night For The Boston Alumni
