The North Jersey Alumni Club, recently reactivated this past fall, has made considerable progress in its attempt to become a contributing entity in the Third District, and in the National as well. Regular meetings, on the first Thursday of each month, have been established, and they have been well attended.

The Alumni-Undergraduate Basketball Game, which was not played last year because of lack of interest, was resumed this November, and the Alumni emerged victorious by a 52-47 score. They managed this despite the fact that only 5 men suited up, and had to play the entire game. The big guns for the Alumni Club were Larry Tasato, '56, and Rich Bruneg, '72. Tasato hit for 20 points in the first half, and Bruneg pumped in 16 in the second half. Beta Xi has never beaten the alumni in this game. Another game is planned for February, and a volleyball game for sometime in March.

Since its inception 15 years ago, Brother Catapano has been the Activities Chairman. With very little assistance, he contrives a calendar for the various functions of the year which include seven business meetings, three dinners, a cocktail party, a dinner-dance, a picnic, and any special event that may arise.

Then comes the real work: engaging a place for the functions, preparing menus, arranging for music, printing, publicity, and resolving the countless little details and problems which could add up to a gigantic headache. Joe takes all this in stride and makes everything look easy.

Brother Catapano instinctively gets involved. He is constantly helping those who need counsel, and since his work has to do with mortgages, his aid can go even further.

It is the consensus among his friends and acquaintances that Joe is a very special person, a pleasure to know, and a fine fellow to be with.

On the district level, the N.J.A.C. has been well represented at all 3-D functions. Two members attended the Johnny Pasta Scholarship Dinner, and five were represented at the Joe Catapano Outstanding Alumnus Dinner. There is always a man present at Joe Derrico Jr.'s Third District Meetings, usually President Al Fafara. Several members have attended New York and Long Island Alumni Club Meetings in an effort to stay abreast of other alumni activities.

The only set back the N.J.A.C. has suffered this fall was the loss of its treasurer, Eric Hartmann. Eric, who is employed by Ingersol Rand, was transferred from the company's Bronx, N.Y. office, to Winston-Salem, North Carolina. The Alumni Association not only lost an officer, but it also lost one of its hardest workers. Joe Burgio, '72, was appointed treasurer to serve out Hartmann's term.

The club's activities will include a good showing at Al Palazzo's Third District Christmas Dinner Dance, Beta Xi's own Christmas Dance, and the re-establishing of the Graduate Dinner, which honor's Beta Xi's graduating seniors, in the spring. This dinner has not been held since 1968, but will be resumed this year.

ADAM TALKS ABOUT 'FATHER SAL'

(At the Memorial Dedication on Oct. 4, 1972, Adam DiVincenzo delivered the following address:)

On August 28, 1910 a son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Federici of Norwalk, Connecticut and they called him Salvatore better known to all of us as "Sal".

He completed grammar school in Norwalk and then attended the Holy Ghost Junior Seminary at Cornwells Heights in Eastern Pennsylvania for a period of six years. Sal then went to Ridgefield, Connecticut for one year for his novitiate. He continued his education by attending the Senior Seminary in his home town of Norwalk, Connecticut from 1931 to 1932.

Then Sal came to our city — Pittsburgh — to teach at Duquesne Prep. He received his degree of Bachelor of Arts with my class of 1934. From Duquesne University he had two years of study in Theology at Ferndale, Connecticut and then journeyed to Fribourg, Switzerland where he was ordained to the Priesthood in 1937. After ordination he remained in Switzerland for two years as Sub-Director of the Seminary while he was doing graduate work.

After this service Sal returned to Pittsburgh and Duquesne University. He furthered his studies at Georgetown University where he earned his Doctor of Philosophy in History. To the best of my recollection Sal was one of the first Holy Ghost priests to get a Ph D. degree. At Duquesne University he served as Head of the History Department and served, also, as Director of Admissions. While Director of Admissions Sal earned the reputation that without being told the name of a high school he could look at a transcript and tell you the high school that issued it. Football returned to Duquesne in the late 40's and another job was given to Sal, when he was made Faculty Moderator of Athletics, a job he not only enjoyed but did very well. I enjoyed that job, too, because I traveled with the team as

one of the Duquesne representatives holding the 10 yard sticks. It was my habit in those days that when I was away from home I'd buy something for Mary (Adam's wife) in the city I was visiting. I can remember on one of our football trips at Athens, Georgia one week-end, the late Joe Donnelly, a good friend of the University, and I went shopping to get something for our wives and Sal came along. I guess Joe and I were taking too long on deciding what to buy. So Sal said "come on boys let's go." The second time he said it the sales girl spoke up, "let them alone — perhaps it would be wise if you would look around and buy something for your wife or sweetheart." The position of Faculty Moderator of Athletics fit in with Sal's personality because in his own right he was an accomplished athlete. He could play football, basketball, baseball, handball, golf, ski and play cards, if you please, with the best of them.

Our Sal was stationed at Duquesne University for a period of 19 years when he was transferred to Cornwells Heights. There he became very friendly with Alpha Phi Delta men in the Philadelphia area and especially with Dr. and Mary Goffredo.

Although his stay was of a short duration he did build a new complex at Cornwells. From this location he was transferred to Riverside, California where he was principal of a high school. While at Riverside he organized an all high school prom-night for all high schools of the area and this activity was an all night affair at Disneyland. This practice still goes on at Riverside, California. Sal's last assignment was to the missions at Shreveport, Louisiana. From there he returned to the family home at Norwalk for medical attention and a possible operation on his eyes. While at Norwalk, on October 26, 1968, he was called to his eternal home in heaven.

I could go on and on about Sal, about our many evenings at my home in Bellvue, as well as where I now live — about our many trips with Dr. Macedonia and others — about serving as his altar boy at fraternity conventions. In fact I must tell you about one of the times a Psi boy served with me. The

evening before everyone made sure Sal had scotch when he wanted it. The next morning after Mass the young man said to Sal "I should be mad at you because last night I served you scotch all evening and this morning at Holy Mass you took a drink of wine and didn't offer me any." Oh, I must tell you of another incident. We were in New York for a Corporate communion and breakfast and while playing cards Sal said "if any of you are from Pittsburgh I have facilities to hear your confession." I wanted to go to confession, so we went into the next room. Sal sat in one chair and I sat in another. Nothing was happening. I said to Sal "I'm ready" he said I'm not. I waited a little while and repeated the same phrase. "I'm ready." Finally Sal said, "Damn, you, get down on your knees!"

Although Sal was a true friend to many people, I believe that I was probably one of his closest friends. We were not blood brothers, but we couldn't have been any closer.

He knew my problems and I knew his. Our bond was such that just talking things over together in the choice language that only two good friends can use and understand was good therapy for both of us. I know that Sal's untimely departure from among us caused pain to his family and many friends. I know how much I miss seeing him or hearing his voice. But not a day has gone by that I don't, in my own way, talk to Sal.

And that is why I'm so thankful to the Alpha Phi Delta boys at Duquesne for instigating and promoting this lasting memorial to our National Chaplain and my personal friend and counsellor, Salvatore J. Federici. And also my humble thanks to the President of Duquesne University, Henry J. McNulty for granting the ground on which the memorial has been erected.

'BOOTSIE' ALL SET FOR ONE BIG TASK-NAT'L LADIES AUX.

Mrs. Charlotte Zangrille of Pittsburgh has been appointed as General Chairman to try to organize a National Ladies Auxiliary. Mrs. Zangrille, known to many of her friends as "Bootsie" and known in the Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity as the wife of our National President, Julius J. Zangrille, Jr.

Appointment was made by National Secretary, Adam Di Vincenzo who believes that a Ladies Auxiliary is very necessary to our Fraternity.

Mrs. Zangrille, is well versed in fraternity affairs as she has been extremely active for many years. She has served as President of the LAAPDA Club, which is the Ladies Auxiliary in Pittsburgh. She is now Treasurer of the group.

Mrs. Zangrille has been requested to select her own Committee and there is hope that for the 1973 National Convention there may be some report on this phase of the program.

Samuel Varco, M.D., who served as National President of Alpha Phi Delta in the late 40's had a meeting in Pittsburgh in 1950 and started the ball rolling. However, the matter was dropped for unknown reasons.

Certainly a Ladies Auxiliary will be of great help to the Fraternity and everyone is pleased that Mrs. Zangrille has accepted the appointment.

The National Convention- It's Part Of Pledging

When a man pledges for six or eight weeks, he hears much about Brotherhood, Love, Sacrifice and other synonymous expressions for Fraternalism. He struggles through those hard long weeks hoping that he may learn about APD, hoping that he may pick up the key to becoming a good brother. If he is lucky, he is initiated into his chapter ready to use his newly acquired knowledge in helping to make his chapter grow in any way possible for the good of the Fraternity. He will experience the various duties and obligations, and most important, privileges of being a brother of APD, for example, pledging others to perpetuate the chapter, be involved in fund raising projects to strengthen the treasury, enjoying parties for his social life, etc.

Now stop and look at this man and see if his chapter has molded him into a well rounded APD man. One of the most important elements I see, however, has been excluded from his indoctrination. And that is national. The pledge must realize that Alpha Phi Delta is a National Fraternity, sharing knowledge and love not only with her individual members, but among all her entities. A chapter can't possibly describe this to a pledge, he has to be shown. "The National Convention", in the words of Adam Di Vincenzo, "is the Supreme Body of the Fraternity", so how could a chapter not enforce its newly initiated brothers to attend?

This was the third consecutive convention I attended and each year I find it harder to explain the insurmountable joy I received from them. But in each year, however, the nonparticipation and uninvolved representation of the various chapters steadily increases, and more and more it's the alumni who take the floor and have the most to say, and not the undergrads. Please don't misunderstand — the alumni play an intricate part in developing the right attitudes in the minds of the younger members, but let's face it, it is an undergraduate fraternity. The blame for this does not lie upon Stan Raffa nor any other national officer, but rather lies upon the chapters themselves.

Ever since I was a pledge, Beta Sigma stressed in my mind how important it is to belong to a national Fraternity — to meet other chapters, to see our national officers at work, and to exchange ideas on running a chapter with other entities. Now that it is our duty and privilege to run a chapter, we are proud to say that Beta Sigma has not lost its national pride by having a representation of more than half of our chapter, including four newly initiated brothers, plus eight of our loyal alumni. We continue to stress the fact that only through attending the National Convention can one witness the "big picture" and find the answer to the often asked question, "What does National do for me?"

This year at the Granit, it was announced that over 400 friends, guests and brothers of APD attended. The turnout was so big, it was necessary to open the back dining room. Everyone seemed so elated by Bob Chevy's announcement, but from those 400 or more, how many of those were undergrads? — the most important element of the Fraternity. I can think of a few reasons or excuses why the representation was so puny:

1. School may have been in process.
2. The undergrads just weren't interested.
3. They just could not afford leaving their summer jobs, and then paying over \$100.00 for expenses.

The first barrier, I feel, has been tackled by the convention committee by moving the convention date up one week in advance. John Palermo and the other members of his committee must be commended for such an undertaking. But as far as the last two obstructions are concerned, it is very discouraging to note that nothing has been done.

The reason for the new brothers and other brothers alike for their apathetic attitude toward National is caused by the manner in which they were indoctrinated. By no means do I wish to convey that Beta Sigma should be looked upon as if it were on a pedestal, not the epitome of the Fraternity. All I wish to do, and apologies for being redundant, is to suggest a way — the manner in which Beta Sigma employs, in teaching the man as a pledge and showing him as a brother, how much a National Fraternity means and how much stronger the Fraternity would be if the representation were greater. If there were just one man who stood out to stress the importance of National, it would have to be Bro. Camillus. Being our National Chaplain and Beta Sigma's moderator, it was easy for me and my fellow brothers to realize the importance of National. But not every chapter is fortunate as we to have a Bro. Camillus around or for that matter, National Vice-President like Al Palazzo, who attends all of our affairs from pledge meetings to parties. So thus, the responsibility lies first in the officers, and then second, in each individual brother to indoctrinate the pledge into the meaning of National. I suggest that the President, Vice-President, and Pledgemaster organize bi-weekly meetings for the pledges with their District Governor, explaining the importance of a strongly united district. Informing them that Jules Zangrillie is the National President or that Al Palazzo is the National Vice-President is not good enough. Inviting a National Officer to a pledge meeting and/or a party will have a greater impact upon the pledge. If a personal introduction is not possible, allow then the pledges to communicate through either phone of letters with them. Something very important also, is to teach the pledges to have pride in the chapter — such a pride that once they become brothers, they would want to have a large constituency attending the convention, having at least one brother participate in each of the National Committees. To demonstrate this pride, construct a year book and bring it up to the convention, showing the other chapters and entities your campus, Fraternity House, various functions during the year, etc. and most of all when coming up to the convention, bring your Banner — show your pride — raise it high, for you have something to be proud of.

The third hurdle to be cleared, is by no means a simple one. From the age of eighteen through twenty one, a college man has many expenses. To meet expenses such as tuition, boarding, up keeping a car, saving for an engagement ring, etc., it is quite necessary that he work during the summer months. Taking

a full week off from work may cause reproachments such as losing a whole week's pay and possibility losing the job. (Including, also the fact of additional convention expenses.) One solution to alleviate these financial deterrents may lie in the development of a "Convention Kitty" set up by each individual chapter. Raising the money may come in the form of either collecting whatever amount the brothers have to offer at monthly meetings, and/or by taking a small percentage of a Chapter's Fund raising profits and placing it in this "Kitty". If a kitty such as this is initiated, the chapter may suprisingly discover that it has pooled enough money to send a few of the less fortunate brothers (i.e. those who definitely can not meet the expenses) to the convention. Beta Sigma sent two delegates, plus one other brother with all the expenses paid (total near \$300.00) to the last convention. One other means of meeting these financial obligations may come through the chapters running a joint fund raising drive with their district, receiving a percentage of what each individual chapter collects in profit. (This may operate on the same basis as the Third District Journal Ad Drive.)

In conclusion, I sincerely hope that this article is not taken as a chauvanistic nor presumptuous one, but rather one which may be helpful in procuring a stronger undergraduate representation and involvement within the Halls of APD.
