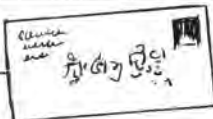

**Legislative Items For 1975 National Convention**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

**ARTICLE XII**

Section 5, paragraph c: Re: Life Membership

DELETE: \$100

ADD: \$200

(This proposal was tabled at the last National Convention to be brought up at the 1975 session.)

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

**ARTICLE XI**

Section 1 - Chapters of this fraternity shall be established only at colleges and Universities recognized by the National Interfraternity Conference. The group shall be composed of a number of men large enough to be satisfactory to the District Governor.

PURPOSE: The purpose is simply to help the establishment of new chapters.

REASON: Firstly, it must be understood that this is two separate amendments, one - the elimination of the one year stipulation and two - the elimination of the 10 men stipulation.

The one year stipulation - Although there is some justification for this caluse the bottom line is simply that it has the effect of producing no new chapters. Its unreasonable to think that the district governor can not handle the new chapter situation better if he has some discretionary power.

The 10 men stipulation - The basic logic behind this is that chapters can't work with less than 10 men. There is no reason to think that under certain circumstances new chapters couldn't be started with a very small group and built up from there. The question becomes what do we have to lose by allowing smaller groups to start chapters? Even if the chapters are not successful, at least some men will be able to enjoy being brothers of Alpha Phi Delta that presently are not because of this stipulation.

NOTE - There is also a mention of the 10 men stipulation in Sec. 2 of Article XI; that phrase ("and shall be signed by ten or more regular matriculates") is deleted as part of this amendment.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

**ARTICLE VI**

Sec. 8

\*add\* ---

9, Approve and attend the initiations of any undergraduate, (within the area of his district) who would normally be acceptable for membership had a chapter existed at the school he now attends, but where a chapter does not exist at that school.

PURPOSE: To allow deserving people to become brothers of Alpha Phi Delta even if it is impossible to start a chapter at their school at that time. (This is in no way an effort to break anti-fraternity rules that a school might have).

REASON: Other than the purpose outlined above it is important to realize the advantage of having brothers at other schools especially when future expansion is considered at that school.

## AlphaPhi Delta's 1975 Mid-Year Meeting

The 1975 Mid-Year Meeting of Alpha Phi Delta was held on Saturday, March 1, at the Holiday Inn, Philadelphia, Pa. The national officers, many arriving the night before, convened to review the status of each district and the Fraternity as a whole.

Following a report by each district governor (only one did not show), National Secretary Adam DiVincenzo announced that although reported initiations were down, only four chapters were in arrears for the fall per-capita tax. Don Berger, Chairman of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee, expressed difficulty in maintaining communications with the various chapters. He hoped for more cooperation in this regard from the undergraduates.

National President Albert Palazzo delivered his report, a detailed account of his visitations, totaling fifty-three since his election at the last National Convention. (There have been many more since the date of this meeting.) National Vice President Anthony Nardone, M.D., announced his plans to visit various areas of the Fraternity during the remainder of this year.

National Editor Santo Barbarino asked for more cooperation from the chapters, thanking those who have already communicated. Following a report of the National Convention Committee given by Joseph A. DeGuglielmo, the Committee was given a vote of confidence in the way the Conventions have been run.

The National Housing Committee meeting followed the Executive meeting that afternoon. Present were contingents from Chi, Beta Lambda, and Beta Xi Chapters. Chi's request for repairs (electrical wiring), was approved; Beta Lambda's request for remodeling of their dormitory quarters to private, 2-student rooms was approved. Both approvals were contingent on obtaining financing. Beta Xi's search for a house continues.

That evening, the Philadelphia Alumni Club held a dinner-dance in honor of Dr. Horace Goffredo, National Housing Trustee and Dr. Anthony Nardone, National Vice President, both celebrating their fiftieth year in Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. The next day, Fourth District Governor Matt LoMonaco and his wife, Rita, concluded the weekend by hosting the out-of-towners to a superb brunch. The social climax of the national executive committee's meetings in Philadelphia was brunch in Collingswood, New Jersey. Fourth District Governor Matthew L. LoMonaco and his lovely wife, Rita, who is President of the Philadelphia Women's Auxiliary, hosted at a buffet in honor of the national officers and their wives. The beautifully appointed LoMonaco home,

which stands facing the Cooper River, was the site of the repast.

Present were the national officers, several former fourth district governors and their wives. The brunch lasted well into the afternoon. The cuisine was superb, the liquor of the finest, and the hosts most gracious. The necessary parting of the company was most difficult. However, it was the end to a beautiful weekend in Philadelphia.

## North Jersey boys enjoy most active year

The North Jersey A.C. continued to have its most active year in a long time this past winter and spring. Not a month went by without some social or athletic event, and the enthusiasm by the membership was evident. Both the older and younger members participated in the various functions.

On February 21, a theater party was held, at which 51 persons attended. A bus was chartered to take the group from Newark to New York, and the play seen was the Broadway hit musical, "Grease", a spoof of the 1950's. Great support was given by the brothers of Beta Xi, and the total attendance broke down as 15 alumni and dates, 24 undergraduates and dates, and 12 outside friends. The play was thoroughly enjoyable, and upon return, about ten couples traveled to Pal's Cabin in West Orange, N.J. for drinks and snacks.

On March 22, a trip to Madison Square Garden to see the N.Y. Knicks-Boston Celtics game was sponsored. A total of 34 people went to the game, and there would have been more, but for the fact that the game was a sellout, and the Alumni Club got the last 34 tickets available. Out of the 34, 16 alumni attended, 8 brothers from Beta Xi, and 10 outsiders. The game was an exciting contest, with the Celtics winning it in the last few minutes, 90-81, after trailing by as many as 8 points.

On April 11, the annual Alumni Volley Ball Game was held, pitting the N.J.A.C. against Beta Xi. The alumni had never lost a sports event to the chapter, but Beta Xi came within a whisker of pulling an upset. A best of 5 series was played, and the alumni appeared to be on their way to a sweep when they won the first two games, 15-11, and 15-9. Fine volleys by Gabe Hauer ('73) and Gary Marsh ('73) aided the alumni cause. At the start of game 3, the undergrads inserted senior Lee McQuillan, who was also captain of the varsity volleyball team at N.J.I.T. McQuillan's spikes and some sloppy play by the alumni enabled Beta Xi to tie the series at 2-2 by winning the next two games 15-11 and 15-13. The alumni rode to an early 10-5 lead in the final match with Jim Fitzgerald ('74) and Garry Kosteck leading the way. However, the undergrads stormed back to take a 13-11 lead, and appeared to be on their way to a victory. Inspired play by Hauer gave the serve back to the alumni, and Greg "Swordfish" Soriano smashed four straight serves under pressure pulling out the win. A party at the Beta Xi house followed.

Graduate Dinner was held at the San Carlo Restaurant in Lyndhurst, N.J., honoring the graduating

seniors of Beta Xi. This affair, normally the largest the N.J.A.C. holds each year, was well attended again, with 74 persons accounted for. Among those in attendance were National President Al Palazzo, and Third District Governor Stan Raffa.

The seniors honored this year were Don Berger, a civil engineering major, John Cavanaugh, an electrical major, Mike Cramer, a geo-chemistry major, Jay Naase, a mechanical major, John Hodge, another M.E., and Lee McQuillan, an E.E. John Cavanaugh was named the Outstanding Graduate, the one chosen by the brothers for his efforts in the chapter during his undergraduate days. Al Palazzo made the presentation of the award.

A fine dinner and evening of entertainment was again provided by one of the No. Jersey A.C.'s own members, Sonny Ferrara, the manager of the San Carlo. In addition to the brothers of Beta Xi and the North Jersey Alumni Club, a fine group from the New York Alumni Club attended. The affair was once again highly enjoyable, and financially stable.

During April and May, the N.J.A.C. participated in a softball league established by the Third District. The season opened impressively, with a 27-9 win over Beta Pi, with first baseman Bill Rindosh and pitcher Steve Becher driving in 11 runs between them. The next game was against a very tough Beta Sigma team, and before the alumni could get the feel of the game, Beta Sig scored 2 runs in the first inning. Although it did not appear to be much, Beta Sigma made them stand up for 6 innings. A triple by Al Fafara, and a sacrifice fly by Greg Soriano cut the margin in half, and a clutch 2 out single in the 7th by Pedro Perez tied the score. Fafara had a chance to win it, but grounded out. Beta Sigma then scored 3 runs in the 8th, and held on, despite another alumni rally in the bottom of the inning to win a hard fought game 5-2. After winning the next 2 games, the North Jersey Alumni Club faced Beta Xi, in what amounted to a playoff game for the right to meet Beta Sigma for the championship. A mixup in scheduling left the alumni with only 7 men for this big game, but they played inspired ball, and thanks to hustling play by shortstop Garry Kosteck, and RBI's by outfielders Mike Curcio, and Lou Fernandez, and also Rindosh and reserve first baseman John Beattie, they forged an early 5-2 lead. But the absence of two players was too much to overcome, as Beta Xi whittled away at the lead, tying it in the fifth, and pushing across two tainted runs in the sixth for their first win over the alumni ever in any sport. The 7-5 loss, though heartbreaking for the alumni, was tempered by the fact that they played well without a full team.

This summer, the members of the North Jersey A.C. and brothers of Beta Xi combined to rent a summer house at 50 1/2 Ocean Ave., Manasquan, N.J. This is the fourth consecutive year of a summer house and the alumni support this year was greater than in the past. Only an hour's ride from the Greater-Newark area, the house provides weekend summer entertainment, and keeps the members in touch with each other over the summer months.

## Beta Tau has winning year

Beta Tau Chapter, Fairmont State College enjoyed a very successful year, winning the title of Champions of West Virginia. Sports, school activities, and fraternity progress have all been very strong, positive areas for the youngest chapter of Alpha Phi Delta.

In competition with another fraternity on campus, Beta Tau won individual or team championships in events such as football, pool, bowling, ping-pong, and arm-wrestling.
