

## GUIDELINES FOR A.P.D. AWARD; TRUSTEES PUT FUND IN MOTION

The following Guidelines have been prepared by the Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity National Scholarship Foundation, Board of Trustees, for the selection, appointment, and distribution of scholarship awards.

The trustees may from time to time adopt such rules and regulations in these Guidelines and may alter or amend the same, as they deem advisable.

All scholarship awards will be made annually with all applicants submitting petitions no later than May 30th to be considered for review during that year. The review year will be September 1st of one year to May 30th the following year or the year the awards are made.

Trustees will review applicants' petitions prior to meeting called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees for the purpose of selecting the award recipients. Petitions will be circulated to all Trustees by mail or other means in ample time to meet the requirement for review.

Petitions for Scholarship Awards can be received by any of the Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity National Scholarship Foundation Trustees for circulation to all the Trustees for consideration. Scholarship recipients will be announced annually at the Annual National Convention of Alpha Phi Delta. Recipients are to be notified as soon as possible after the announcement and the arrangement for money involved will be made with the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the recipients.

It is the desire of the Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity National Scholarship Foundation Trustees that these Guidelines for Scholarship Awards be circulated to all the entities of our National Fraternity.

These Guidelines are to be a part of the Trust Agreement of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity Scholarship Foundation as referred to Article II Section 3.

The Guidelines for selection of recipients are set forth:

### Who are qualified as Applicants

1. Alpha Phi Delta brother who is an Undergraduate in good standing with chapter.
2. Alpha Phi Delta pledge who will be initiated within one year.
3. Alpha Phi Delta brother who is an undergraduate or graduate student and attending a college or university that does not have a chapter.
4. Alpha Phi Delta brother son or daughter who is attending a college or university.
5. Anyone whose relation with Alpha Phi Delta brother justifies consideration.
6. Any fraternity undergraduate, graduate, or entity that feels they have someone who meets the Guidelines presented.

The Foundation is exclusively for the charitable and educational purpose of assisting deserving young men or women who may or may not be members of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity to obtain a College, University, Technological, Academic, or Artistic education.

### Application

Applicant will prepare his own dossier and it should include:

- a. Personal information  
Address, age, sex, college or university, years attended, etc.
- b. Copy of grades from school attending

We are not looking for top grades; consideration will be given to school records.

- c. College Activities

They may include response to community, fraternity service and participation.

- d. Letter from Dean of School attending.

e. Letter from alumnus supervisor of chapter or any alumnus of Alpha Phi Delta in good standing.

- f. Personal qualifications and financial need.

- g. Any other information that should be considered by the Trustees.

The applicant dossier considered for Scholarship Funds will be treated as confidential information by the Board of Trustees. Those petitions that have been reviewed by the Trustees requiring additional information may be passed over or the additional information may be requested at the discretion of any one of the Trustees.

Applications of those individuals that are not accepted during the year of review by the Board of Trustees will be returned. Board of Trustees do not have to explain why individuals are turned down.

Applicants that are to receive Scholarship Foundation Awards will be asked if their dossier or parts of it can be made public or not, and if the Board of Trustees can keep the applications for record.

The minimum amount of money the Trustees can award any one applicant is \$200.00 with the maximum amount being \$500.00.

The Board of Trustees can give the same individual an award succeeding year; however, no more than 3 years in succession. Applicants should consider succeeding yearly awards when preparing their dossier. The Trustees should recommend those recipients that have need for Scholarship Funds to consider succeeding yearly awards.

## Stevensville Hosts Fifty-Fifth National Convention Legislation Passed To Aid Expansion Program; Pres. Palazzo & Vice-Pres. Nardone Re-elected

The Fifty-Fifth National Convention of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity consisted of five enjoyable days for approximately three hundred people. From August 25 to August 29, 1975, the many Convention guests were thoroughly pleased by the delightful accommodations and warm hospitality of the Stevensville Hotel and Country Club in Swan Lake, New York.

Culminating the work accomplished during the National Council sessions was the re-election of National President Albert E. Palazzo, Theta Beta and National Vice President Anthony A. Nardone, M.D., Lambda.

At the conclusion of the Grand Dinner, National President Albert Palazzo presented National Awards to the following: Beta Sigma Chapter, St. Francis College, N.Y., Outstanding Chapter; Mohawk Valley Alumni Association, Outstanding Alumni Club; Charles Fiore, Theta Beta, Outstanding Undergraduate; and Leon Panella, Psi, Outstanding Alumnus. Ralph Strippel, Beta Tau and John May, Pi each received an Expansion Award for their work in establishing the Central West Virginia Alumni Club. Receiving certificates of merit for their fine work during the year were Psi Chapter, Duquesne University, Professor Anthony H. Sarno, Beta Pi; and the North Jersey Alumni Club.

Business began on Monday, August 25 with the Fraternity's Executive Committee meeting. The major portion of this meeting was devoted to the reports of the district governors. While most chapters and alumni clubs were reported in good shape it became apparent that the governors will have their work cut out for them in revitalizing some of the Fraternity's failing during the new fiscal year.

National Scholarship Chairman Carlo M. Vannicola asked the National Officers to act as agents in assisting the growth of the fund and in publicizing the availability of money to deserving applicants. The meeting concluded with a discussion of time limits on various executive positions. This discussion emerged from the report of a special committee appointed by the National President, the details of which appear elsewhere in this issue.

The first session of the National Council was held on Tuesday, August 26. Following the roll call by Credentials Committee Chairman Santo Barbarino, National President Al Palazzo

appointed Frank Costanzo parliamentarian and the following chairmen: Second District Governor Ernest Coletti, Rules of Order Committee; Frank Cavallaro, Expansion Committee; National Chaplain Bro. Camillus Casey, O.S.F., Ritual Committee; Fourth District Governor Matthew LoMonaco, Budget and Audit Committee; Sixth District Governor Richard Canestraro, Resolutions Committee; and Joseph DeGuglielmo, National Awards Committee.

National Editor Santo Barbarino discussed the relationship between the amount of correspondence he receives during a given year and the health of the Fraternity. Thanking those brothers who corresponded during the past year, he asked each entity to appoint or elect a responsible brother to the position of Kleos Reporter, whose job it would be to correspond at least four times during the year.

Following a report by National Secretary Adam Di Vincenzo on the proceedings of the Executive Committee meeting held the previous day, President Palazzo announced the next Executive mid-year meeting will be held on Saturday, January 31, 1976 in Utica, New York. Before the first session concluded, a large number of undergraduates volunteered to work on the various committees.

National Chaplain Bro. Camillus conducted Alpha Phi Delta's traditional Memorial Services on Wednesday at 9:30 A.M. As always, the National President and National Vice President participated by placing a white carnation in the memorial wreath as the name of each departed brother was called. What was not traditional about this year's Memorial Services was the remembrance of a special woman on the memorial wreath. Following a prayer for Angie De Guglielmo, known and loved by the Fraternity for more than 40 years, a carnation was placed on the wreath in her name.

The second session of the National Council began with the Rules of Order Committee report, instructing the brothers on the manner in which business was to be transacted. Rick Sparno, Beta Sigma delivered the report of the Ritual Committee asking for comments or suggestions from the brothers on the Ritual.

Carlo Vannicola, Chairman of the Alpha Phi Delta National Scholarship Foundation distributed a financial report of the fund, along with a brochure concerning the fund. He reminded the brothers that money is available and urged them to apply for scholarships during the year. Brother Vannicola promised that he and the committee will continue to work hard for the fund's growth (it is now over the \$14,000.00 mark).

The report of the Expansion Committee was given by Sal Balogna, Beta Sigma. A number of leads were mentioned in the report as possible sites for colonization. The Expansion Program highlight was the announcement by Chairman Frank Cavallaro that the new Central West Virginia Alumni Club would receive its charter at this National Convention.

*From the Editor.....*

**ALUMNI MATH --  
 A FAILURE?**

Alpha Phi Delta takes pride in being a small but cohesive Fraternity. This has always been the case, even when you were initiated — whether it was in the fall of 1930 or the spring of 1970. We do not have 80,000 alumni as many other national fraternities have. Our figure is closer to 8,000. And yet, all you need to do is examine the Budget and Audit Committee report and you will find that we project 225 alumni will pay their per capita dues during the year. We also project 15 new Life Members will be added to the roster.

Let's assume, unusually, that the 15 Life Members are not coming from the previously mentioned 225 alumni. Finally, add the approximately 200 alumni who are now Life Members and you will find that Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity depends upon 440 alumni. This is only 5.5% of the total count! It should also be noted that out of this 5.5% come your non-salaried national officers and other personnel who devote a great part of their lives to the Fraternity.

More than 7,000 alumni do not support our Fraternity. Some of you are my close friends and, in response to this editorial, may choose to ignore me or help the Fraternity. If you take the few minutes to read this issue of the Kleos you will find many brothers, some of whom you know since your college days, working for, and most of all, enjoying our Fraternity. In fact, the Fraternity, now more than ever, is trying the best it can to be a great organization. Where do you stand in this attempt? You can be a tremendous help by coming back to the fold this year.

Remember how much you wanted Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity when you were a pledge? Well, that is how much the Fraternity wants you now. At most the Fraternity wants your activity. At least, the Fraternity wants your support.

**QUESTION:** What can you do? **ANSWER:** Four simple things:

1. Send your dues (\$15.00) to Central Office immediately, or become a Life Member (\$100.00—best deal you'll ever see!).
2. Write to me (check Kleos Staff above) and tell me what you are doing these days so that I may put this information in the Kleos. I am sure you have some long-lost friends in the Fraternity. They also get the Kleos and would like to hear about you.
3. Contact one Fraternity brother and try to convince him to follow your example.
4. Read the letter received from Pat Lombardi, Eta '51, to see that you are not alone.

A special report was given by Jules Zangrille, P.N.P. who chaired a committee during the year consisting of former Fifth District Governor Joe Creston and Third District Governor Stan Raffa, P.N.P. This committee appointed by the President, was aimed at studying the official structure of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. The committee's recommendations, some of which are legislative changes, appear elsewhere in this issue. Those changes which are legislative become part of next year's National Convention agenda. The final feature of this session was a partial report of the Resolutions Committee delivered by Sixth District Governor Richard Canestraro.

Steve Bruce, Beta Sigma began the business of the third and final session of the National Council by giving the report of the Undergraduate Co-ordinating Committee. He said that although there was some level of cooperation during the past year, it was the hope of the committee that correspondence among the chapters would reach its highest degree during the new school year. He also announced the names of the brothers who were elected to lead the Undergraduate Co-ordinating Committee during the year: Jonathan E. Johnstone, Psi, Chairman; and Kevin Nolan, Beta Sigma, Co-chairman.

Fourth District Governor Matt Lo Monaco gave the Budget and Audit Committee report. In addition to listing projected income and expenses, the report called for clarifications of the various funds in the Fraternity. It also included a breakdown of the distribution of monies received from dues during the year. Richard Canestraro completed the report of the Resolutions Committee by offering three more items for the Council's consideration. One of these items, involving a total re-write of the National Constitution, produced much discussion before it was passed by the delegates.

Contained in the report of the special committee headed by Jules Zangrille was a request for clarifications concerning the National Convention Corporation. In order to respond to this request, National Convention Chairman Joseph A. De Guglielmo was given sufficient time on the floor to thoroughly explain the history of the Convention Corporation. Brother De Gug then accepted questions from the floor to further clarify the Corporation. All brothers present were completely satisfied with Joe De Gug's presentation and President Al Palazzo thanked him for his time and concern.

Stan Raffa delivered the report of the Legislative Committee. The delegates of the National Council decided favorably on amendments which, hopefully, will facilitate the establishment of new chapters. The actual text of these changes is contained in this issue. Brother Raffa reported that the amendment concerning the increase in payment for Life Membership to two hundred dollars, table at last year's Convention, was not acted upon by this year's Legislative Committee. Therefore, he said, the unfavorable vote of last year's Legislative Committee is still in effect. The National Council then decided to table this proposal once again. As a result, it is now part of next year's agenda.

National Secretary Adam Di Vincenzo announced the resignation of Anthony H. Sara from the National Housing Committee. Brother Sarno's term would have expired in one year. Following the nominations of Richard Canestraro, Beta Theta and Joseph Fabrizi, Beta Pi, the delegates elected brother Canestraro to fill out the term. Ernest Coletti, Mu was re-elected to a three year term on the Housing Committee.

The final action taken by the delegates was the re-election of National President Al Palazzo and National Vice President Anthony Nardone to the Fraternity's highest positions. Both brothers addressed the Council, promising much travel during the year and asking for the cooperation from the chapters and alumni clubs that is necessary for a successful year for Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. Each brother was given the Fraternity Hand Clap.

During Good and Welfare, Secretary Di Vincenzo presented the past national presidents attending the Convention, including: Carlo Vannicola, Joseph De Guglielmo, Frank Paladino, Frank Costanzo, Frank Cavallaro, Jules Zangrille, Stan Raffa, and Adam Di Vincenzo.

## Nat'l. Scholarship Passes 14 Grand! Growth Goes On

A meeting of the Trustees of the Alpha Phi Delta National Scholarship Foundation was held on Monday, August 25, 1975. The Trustees include: Carlo M. Vannicola, Chairman; Santo J. Barbarino; Trent J. Ciarrocchi; Frank E. Costanzo; and Dr. Frank L. Tosi.

At this meeting, the Trustees signed the Trust Agreement of the Scholarship Foundation. Chairman Vannicola stressed the need for publicity of the fund through all means that are available. He also said that he will mail a copy of the Trust Agreement to any brother who is interested in having one.

The Trustees were satisfied with the growth rate of the fund, having obtained more than \$14,000.00. However, they also expressed their determination to continue to build up the fund so as to increase the number of possible scholarships that may be granted. The Trustees are looking forward to receiving applications during the 1975 - 76 school year. The guidelines to be used by applicants will be distributed among the entities.

## Beta Sigma, Outstanding Chapter Is Served Outstanding Award

Beta Sigma Chapter, St. Francis College, Brooklyn, N.Y. was chosen as the Outstanding Chapter of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. Moderated by National Chaplain Brother Camillus Casey, O.S.F., the brothers of Beta Sigma have continued in their tradition to play an active role in every facet of Alpha Phi Delta that is available to an undergraduate entity.

### THE CHAPTER

Instrumental in Beta Sigma's growth has been the nurturing of two highly productive pledge periods in both the fall and spring semesters of 1974 and 1975. The chapter realizes the importance of generating a solidarity of fraternal spirit between brothers and their pledges. Such an interpersonal spirit flowered throughout the conduction of such activities as the pledge raid, card nights, and sports days. Alumni participation was especially important in kindling a gleam of fraternalism in the eyes of each pledge.

Following the induction of the new brothers, a party was held for their parents which consequently won their hearts and proud recognition. This year, the festivity of the parents' party was augmented with our annual celebration of this fraternity's Italian heritage, provided for by flavoring the atmosphere of the party with Italian cuisine.

Cognizant of the benefits for growth that a stable financial status brings, Beta Sigma once again demonstrated her ability to reinforce the financial foundation upon which she rests by the amount of money accumulated through the selling of Journal Ads, a sum of over \$1,000.

### SCHOOL

#### ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Probably the single most valuable vehicle through which Beta Sigma has been able to cultivate the seeds of a productive pledge periods is Freshman Orientation. This past year, as in preceding years, they participated in this event. For the first time in the history of our college, the chapter, in conjunction with the Historical Studies Institute at school, will be constructing an Information Package, including a short history of Alpha Phi Delta, for incoming Freshman in order to acquaint them with both the college and neighboring community.

Beta Sigma has also taken great pride in the recognition she attained through her endeavors in both intercollegiate and intramural sports activities. During the 1974-75 season, three brothers played an integral part in taking the St. Francis College Hockey Team to the playoffs and a second place finish. This year, in regard to intramurals, the chapter made it all the way to the playoffs in volleyball and basketball and won the championship in softball. Their involvement as a team competing in these events and also the support lent to the varsity sports teams of the college, served to enhance their closeness as a chapter.

This year, two more brothers, Steve Bruce and Michael Marcotrigiano, were inducted into the Duns Scotus National Honor Society of our college. Subsequently, 15 brothers made the Dean's List (3.0 index or better) for the fall semester.

In October of 1974, the Richard Rau Scholarship Fund presented its first award to Joe Caldarella, a brother of Beta Sigma. The dinner which accompanied the award presentation was attended by seven brothers of our chapter. The chapter has maintained a close relationship of mutual cooperation with the Rau Fund since its inception.

At our institution's Annual Charter Day Ceremonies, the Richard Rau Medal was given by Beta Sigma to the undergraduate attaining the highest average in Italian. In collaboration with the Rau Fund, the chapter also sponsored an essay contest in the name of Richard Rau, the winner of which received an award of \$100. As an indication of Beta Sigma's appreciation of the fraternity's Italian heritage, the brothers have consistently maintained a changing exhibit of Italian culture in the college library.

### COMMUNITY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In the community, Beta Sigma has proven to be a charitable entity. Each year they assist the Cancer Research Institute fulfilling their everyday tasks. This year they have also given time and services caring for children with Spinabifide (a disease of the spinal column) and assisted their parents with the various programs instituted for them. The brothers have aided the Blood Drive sponsored by the Knights of Columbus in becoming a great success due to the blood donated by Beta Sigma. In addition, they have taken great pride in helping to collect cancelled postage stamps and also old glasses for the Fowler Mission, which pays for food and other needed goods for various missions overseas.

### NATIONALLY ORIENTED

Beta Sigma is "nationally oriented" in the true sense of the phrase. Each new pledge group is taught the meaning of pledging for a NATIONAL FRATERNITY. This allows Beta Sigma's tradition of being a leader on the national level to continue uninterrupted. This past year was an outstanding one for Beta Sigma on the national scene. They started at last year's Convention by sending eleven brothers to the Picasso. The brothers of Beta Sigma do not forget their fraternal responsibilities while having a great time at the Convention. This is proven by the

fact that Beta Sigma was represented on each committee at the National Convention. This year was no different as they were represented by seventeen of the twenty-one brothers.

The 1975 mid-year Convention in Philadelphia saw six brothers of Beta Sigma in attendance. The six Beta Sigma brothers left from Brooklyn the night before the meeting along with several brothers from Theta Beta and Beta Eta.

Beta Sigma believes in keeping in contact with all entities in our fraternity. They have sent out four newsletters over the past year to every chapter, alumni club and national officer.

It is obvious that Beta Sigma takes great pride in being part of Alpha Phi Delta, however, they are also very proud to be part of the Third District. The chapter interactions go further than meeting once a month at the district meeting. Beta Sigma always actively supports all district functions. The chapter house is always open to any brother of the fraternity. This year Beta Sigma sponsored the Third District Smoker which was intended to reactivate or possibly start new chapters in the district. Through the efforts of several brothers of Beta Sigma, a group of five Queens College students became actively interested in starting a chapter. However, they could not get their following up to the required ten men for the starting of a new chapter. This has not stopped Beta Sigma in its quest to bring our brotherhood to Queens College. In cooperation with Theta Beta, an amendment was submitted for this year's Convention to eliminate the ten-man requirement and leave the number up to the discretion of the District Governor.

The unique closeness among Beta Sigma, Theta Beta, Beta Eta, and Delta can be traced back to December of 1973. At this time, Theta Beta consisted of three men while Beta Eta, and Delta were inactive. Beta Sigma worked hard to find people to pledge for these troubled chapters. Then they volunteered to hold a joint pledge period with these chapters since they were not capable of running a pledge period alone. Their efforts were rewarded with the induction of six new brothers on December 2, 1973. After the induction, Beta Sigma continued to help these chapters through the brothers' guidance and support. Now, Theta Beta contains thirteen brothers, Delta eight, Beta Eta, six, and each chapter is an active part of our fraternity.

# A Steady Climb for Theta Beta To Most Improved Chapter Award

**PETITION FOR MOST IMPROVED CHAPTER** The growth of Theta Beta Chapter in a few short years presents a fine example to the rest of Alpha Phi Delta. When the chapter was reactivated its membership included three undergraduate brothers. By the Fall of 1974 that number had doubled and with seven new initiations during the present school year it has doubled again. Twelve months ago there was slightly more than \$150 in the chapter savings account. This figure will be well over the one-thousand dollar mark. As a result, the establishment of a live-in fraternity house is now definitely within reach.

Theta Beta Chapter is also very proud of the fact that three of its brothers are currently on the Student Council of the University, and as many as six of its thirteen brothers will be running in the upcoming elections in May for key positions on the Council. Alpha Phi Delta made another contribution to the history of N.Y.U. student-government in the fall semester when it became the first fraternity to receive funding from the Council. (The Council distributes \$40,000 annually to deserving student groups.)

In April the chapter again sounded the name of Alpha Phi Delta throughout the University with its support of N.Y.U. SHARE, an organization created this year to bring the world food crisis to the attention of all. APD men were very active behind the scenes when a day-long seminar on the hunger problem was held at the student center.

The chapter's activities have been characterized by an exceptional level of involvement in and support of the concept of Alpha Phi Delta as a national fraternity. Contact with Central Office and with all National Officers, Chapters and Alumni Clubs is better than it has ever been. Newsletters are sent out periodically to keep everyone abreast as to the activities of the chapter. In addition, Kleos Editor, Santo Barbarino has been kept well informed of all functions. Particularly close ties exist with the other chapters in the district through frequent district-wide events — both athletic and social. The brothers of Theta Beta pride themselves on trying to support all the functions of all the chapters in the district. This year the Chapter

sponsored the 3-D Christmas Dance by selling close to \$600 in ads for the Journal that accompanies the dance.

This year Theta Beta was host of the District Picnic where over 35 alumni and undergraduates as well as their sweethearts enjoyed the countryside in a fun filled outing. In the spring semester Theta Beta hosted the annual 3-D Seminar and Workshop. Distinguished alumni, including Past National Presidents Frank Paladino and Frank Cavallaro spoke to over 50 undergraduates of the district about the duties and responsibilities of the chapter officers. A workshop followed in which the incoming and outgoing officers of each chapter discussed problems and offered suggestions to each other.

Theta Beta has had particularly close ties with Beta Sigma and Beta Eta Chapters. Brothers of the three chapters get together informally dozens of times during the year in addition to supporting each other's formal social functions and attending each other's inductions in large numbers.

In the fall semester Theta Beta and Beta Sigma co-sponsored a party-dance which featured a five piece live band. The dance was held at "Top of the Park" in the student center of N.Y.U. Over one-hundred people were in attendance, including brothers from several chapters and alumni clubs and many students from New York University and Saint Francis College.

This past year the closeness of Theta Beta Chapter to the other fraternities on the N.Y.U. campus has been much improved. The chapter has lent its enthusiastic support to the effort to organize an Inter-Fraternity Conference at the University. Although the conference is not yet fully functional, the groundwork has been laid this year and the brothers look forward to several joint functions in the following semesters.

Theta Beta Chapter is made up of serious students (the chapter's academic index is 3.2) who are involved in fraternity activities on the National as well as the local level. They have made a name for Alpha Phi Delta on the N.Y.U. campus by their contributions both as individuals and as a chapter. They have done all this in spite of the fact that one year ago its limited finances and membership left its survival in doubt. At this point it seems clear that Theta Beta shall continue to improve for many years to come, although, perhaps, never again will its improvement be so striking.

# Legislation Acted Upon By Delegates Of Nat'l. Convention

*The following proposals were approved by the National Council. Therefore, change your copy of the National Constitution accordingly.*

## ARTICLE IV

### Sec. 1 — The Proposal of a Candidate for Membership

Any student who is matriculated at a college or university wherein a chapter is located (or in the event that a chapter does not exist -- reference Article VI, Sec. 8, paragraph 9) and is of good moral character and who is not obliged by any pledge or acceptance of an invitation to join any other fraternity, except purely honorary, scholarship, or professional organizations, and who has not been expelled from any fraternity is eligible for the proposal of his name to the chapter for membership, provided, however, that there is full compliance with all other qualifications in this document.

## ARTICLE VII

### Sec. 8 — Powers and Duties of the District Governor

**ADD: 9.** Approve and attend the initiation of any undergraduate (within the area of his district.), who would normally be acceptable for membership had a chapter existed at the school he now attends, but where a chapter does not exist at that school.

## ARTICLE XI

### Sec. 1 — Where Properly Established

Chapters of this fraternity shall be established only at colleges and universities recognized by the National Interfraternity Conference. The group shall be composed of a number of men large enough to be satisfactory to the District Governor.

*The following section of the Constitution is in direct accordance with the intent of the above sections which were approved. However, due to an oversight this section was not considered. It will be presented at the next Convention:*

### Sec. 2 — Application to Whom Made

Application for a charter to become a chapter shall be made in writing to the Central Office. Such application shall be accompanied with a document of approval of the faculty of the said institution in accordance with instructions prepared by the fraternity and with the payment of the initiation fee.

*The following proposal was tabled by the National Council. It will be a legislative item for the 1976 Convention delegates.*

## ARTICLE XII

### Sec. 5 — Annual Dues, paragraph c

## Committee Studies A.P.D. Structure

The following is a report submitted by a special committee appointed by National President Al Palazzo. The committee, whose job it was to study the official structure of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity, consisted of Julius L. Zangrille, Jr., Chairman, A. Joseph Creston, and Stan Raffa. Those recommendations which are legislative will be items for consideration by the delegates of the 1976 National Convention.

1. One year term or longer for President and Vice President - no change.

2. a. District Governor — Legislative

Maximum term 4 years, re-election yearly by the entities of a district. Art. No. 7 - sec. 8 add preface to read: "The tenure of office of District Governor shall be no more than 4 consecutive years upon re-election in the district each year, districts may further limit the maximum to be of a lesser period if they so choose.

b. Re-alignment of territory.

Recommendation:

New district be formed comprised of Pi — West Virginia University, Beta Tau — Fairmont State College, Central West Virginia Alumni Club.

3. Central Office: re-affirm National Sec/Treas. every 2 years by the executive committee, with subsequent approval of the Grand Council with a maximum term of 6 years.

Legislative: Art. No. 7 — sec. 5 & 6 add the preface "The tenure of office of the National Sec/Treas shall not exceed more than 6 consecutive years with re-affirmation every two years by the executive committee with further re-affirmation by the National Council."

4. Possibility of Alumni Clubs having more votes than undergraduates? After careful consideration we find this is not an issue at this time.

5. Traveling Sec. — Recommendations: — That the National President and Central office agree on an appointment of a traveling secretary no later than Dec. 31, 1975. Maximum salary and travel expenses be established and the job description presently submitted should be considered as guideline for his duties. The money accumulated for this purpose (contingence fund) be utilized.

6. Expansion chairman — Legislative: — Expansion chairman shall be appointed yearly with a maximum tenure of four years. Art. No. 9 - Sec. 9: Add to the preface "Expansion chairman shall be appointed yearly by the National President and in no case shall his tenure in office exceed 4 consecutive years."

7. Recommendations: — That a total re-write of the constitution be undertaken to simplify the structure and clarify the constitution.

Point of Clarification: — All recommendations affecting tenures in office will commence after legislative approval has been obtained.

It should be noted that the report also contained questions concerning the National Convention Corporation. However, these questions were answered to everyone's satisfaction by the General Chairman of the Corporation Joseph De Guglielmo during the final National Council session. Also, item 5 (concerning the Traveling Secretary) and item 7 (concerning the National Constitution) were passed by the delegates, while item 2 b (concerning the formation of a new district was tabled.

This year's Outstanding Undergraduate Award winner, Charles Fiore, was happier than most undergraduates who win this coveted award. On the night of the Grand Dinner, Charlie's chapter, Theta Beta, N.Y.U. received the Most Improved Chapter Award.

When Charles was inducted into Theta Beta in the winter of 1973, the chapter consisted of three brothers working hard to reactivate what once was one of the strongest chapters in Alpha Phi Delta. Only two months after being inducted, Charlie was elected President of the Chapter. His keen insight into the problems facing the chapter, added to his constantly growing knowledge of Alpha Phi Delta, had Theta Beta back on its feet again, long before anyone thought it would be.

As President, he organized the chapter by writing the Chapter By-Laws, which will serve as a workable guide to all future brothers of Theta Beta. During his year as President, he oversaw the running of numerous pledge periods. Charlie felt that since the chapter was small, an interested pledge should be given the opportunity of brotherhood at anytime and at any cost. Charlie also made sure the name of Alpha Phi Delta was heard on campus. Besides organizing a social program, he was instrumental in obtaining funds from the Student Government, the first time a fraternity was funded at New York University.

While Charlie was President, and currently as Pledgemaster, he has always recognized the need to be active in district and national activities. Attending Mid-Year Meetings and National Conventions are a large part of fraternal life. Charlie has never missed a Mid-Year nor Convention since being inducted. He fostered a policy of constant inter-chapter involvement in the district as well as with other districts. Last year he wrote the first chapter newsletter and was vital in bringing the chapters of the Third District toward a 'district unity'. A unity which culminated in him sponsoring an amendment with Joe Caldarella of Beta Sigma to reduce the problem of colonization and reactivation of chapters. Once

again, working within the guidelines of our Constitution in order to bring about beneficial and meaningful change to our fraternity.

Relations with Beta Eta and Beta Sigma have never been stronger and continue to grow and strengthen. Joint inductions and cosponsored parties are just a few of the many ways Charlie has tried to instill cooperation and support of other chapters as tradition within Theta Beta Chapter.

Not only have chapter relations been a strong part of Chuck's beliefs, but the idea that 'alumni should never be forgotten' has also flourished in the chapter under his influence. Charlie believes that chapters who think alumni are only good for buying raffle books are seriously mistaken. He has moved Theta Beta closer to its parent Alumni Club, the New York Alumni Club, than it has ever been in the past. So close in fact that the NYAC will soon be given its own key and unlimited access to the newly acquired fraternity house (provided they can climb all the steps to get there).

Charlie presently holds the office of Student Councilman and has had a major voice on the Council since his career began there in 1974. It was through his efforts that the chapter became involved in the Freshman Orientation Program and thus gained a major source of pledges. Although thoroughly involved in Alpha Phi Delta and NYU, his scholastic index is well over 3.0 and he is currently applying to law schools. Chuck is a fine example of activity not interfering with academic performance.

# Resolutions of 1975 Convention

Chairman Dick Canestraro (6th D.G.) reported that all of the following resolutions were passed favorably by committee members: Edward F. Trgovac Jr. and Jeffrey O'Nesti (Beta Omicron), Anthony Fiore and Gregory Hayes (Beta Sigma) and Martin Spigner (Theta Beta);

1) BE IT RESOLVED, That Alumni Clubs continue to be more involved with chapters in their areas, giving moral and financial support to the undergraduate chapters.

2) BE IT RESOLVED, That wherever possible, undergraduate chapters give whatever help they can to help revitalize alumni Clubs. Strong and interested alumni clubs are and can be a great help to the chapters.

3) BE IT RESOLVED, That every chapter continue in their efforts to put out a newsletter on a regular basis. This letter to be sent to all entities to help eliminate the communication gap and increase the interest and knowledge that chapters have of one-anther.

4) BE IT RESOLVED, That chapters, whether candidates for National Awards or not, put together a book of their past year's activities. This book to be brought to and displayed at the National

Convention to help spread knowledge of one entity for another and create an interchange of ideas.

5) BE IT RESOLVED, That realizing that fraternity life has changed since the founding of Alpha Phi Delta, the president appoint a committee to study the principles and goals of Alpha Phi Delta with an eye toward the revitalization of the fraternity.

6) BE IT RESOLVED, That to better relations between chapters, invitations be sent to other chapters and District Governors to attend social affairs and initiations.

7) BE IT RESOLVED, That the National Secretary re-affirm and exercise the duty specified in Article VII, Section 5, paragraph 8 of the National Constitution (i.e., issuance of a monthly Chapter Letter).

8) BE IT RESOLVED, That the National Treasurer, twice a year, publish a list of chapters, initiates and per capita payments, as well as chapter delinquencies for distribution among chapters, alumni clubs, and national officers. Such a report may either substitute or supplement a Chapter Letter.

9) BE IT RESOLVED, That any chapter or alumni club who has not provided at least one article during that school year be excluded from consideration by the National Awards Committee for National Awards.

10) BE IT RESOLVED, That this National Convention wishes to thank Joseph A. De Guglielmo, John Palermo and the committee for a job well done in his selection

of the convention site and for the work in making our stay here a very pleasant one.

11) BE IT RESOLVED, That this National Convention wishes to thank Albert E. Palazzo, National President, and Anthony A. nardone, M.D., National Vice-President, to Adam Di Vincenzo, National Secretary, and Joe Scotte, National Treasurer, and to Santo Barbarino, National Editor, for a great job this past year.

12) BE IT RESOLVED, That the National President and Central office agree on an appointment of a traveling secretary no later than Dec. 31, 1975. Maximum salary and travel expenses be established and the job description presently submitted should be considered as guideline for his duties. The moneys accumulated for this purpose be utilized.

13) BE IT RESOLVED, That a total re-write of the constitution be undertaken to simplify the structure and clarify the constitution.

14) BE IT RESOLVED, That the feasibility of changing the current format of reporting of the financials be changed to a format which can be understood by the members of the fraternity.

The following resolution was tabled by the delegates:

BE IT RESOLVED, That a new district be established consisting of Pi Chapter, Beta Tau Chapter, and the Central West Virginia Alumni Club.

The 1974-1975 year of the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association was the biggest and best ever, winning for the MVAA the Outstanding Alumni Club Award. The twenty-one page directory, the number of activities, the increase in paid members, and the strengthening of Beta Iota Chapter, Utica College were their outstanding features of the year.

The directory includes the names and addresses of all Beta Iota graduates, other Alpha Phi Delta men in the Mohawk Valley, the national officers, and the undergraduate Beta Iota membership.

The social events included the Ernie Coletti Roast. Fifty brothers attended the event to hear roasters Malio Cardarelli, Vincent De Iorio, and James Riccard "baste" Second District Gov. Ernie Coletti with loving care. The MVAA also had two Golf Bakes which were very successful, a communion breakfast, various get-togethers, and the First Annual Reunion, the biggest Fraternity event in the history of the MVAA.

The paid membership of the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association jumped from below twenty to above forty. The alumni anticipate a steady growth rate.

A basic function of an alumni club is to help a chapter in need. The Mohawk Valley Alumni Association has done this very thing. Beta Iota Chapter had severe difficulties. Many of the younger alumni spent much of their time at the college, attending undergraduate socials, rush and pledge events. The chapter grew from four to twelve and has leveled to nine for the fall, 1975 semester.

In 1974 the MVAA established a fund of \$250.00 to cover any losses Beta Iota incurs when they sponsor beer blasts. They are thyonly Fraternity on campus to have this protection. Also in 1974, a \$200.00 damage deposit on their house was paid for by the alumni. The success of Beta Iota Chapter is taken very seriously by the MVAA.

Their concern for the undergraduates and their active interest in Fraternity affairs has made the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association one of Alpha Phi Delta's outstanding organizations.
