

## DR. ANTHONY NARDONE DIES, VICTIM OF HEART ATTACK

Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity suffered a great loss on Sunday, March 7, 1976 with the passing of National Vice President Anthony A. Nardone, M.D., Lambda. The victim of a heart attack, Dr. Nardone died just two hours before he was to host Fraternity guests from New York.

Born August 5, 1905 in Philadelphia, Pa., Brother Nardone received his A.B. degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 1926 and his M.D. from the same university in 1929. Initiated into Lambda Chapter in 1926, he remained continually active. In 1936 he was a founder of the Philadelphia A.C. and served as its president in 1937-38, and again in 1946-47. He served as Fourth District Governor for many years. Dr. Nardone was elected National Vice President in 1974 and re-elected to that position in 1976.

A veteran of World War II, Dr. Nardone went overseas as a captain in the Medical Corps and saw front-line action as regimental surgeon. Decorated often, he held the commission of Full Colonel in the U.S. Army Medical Corps Reserve in command of the 348th General Army Hospital.

Since 1930, Dr. Nardone practiced in the field of obstetrics and gynecology. He was a Fellow of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and a Diplomat of the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

On the night before his death, Dr. and Mrs. Nardone attended the Fourth District Governor's Ball at the Holiday Inn in Philadelphia. In addition to the notable Fraternity brothers from the area, National President Al Palazzo and his wife, Dotty, were present along with Third District Governor Stan Raffa and National Chaplain Brother Camillus. All four were invited by the Nardone's to have breakfast at their home before taking the trip back to New York. The news of Dr. Nardone's death came as a double shock, considering how well he looked only the night before.

Dr. Nardone is survived by his wife Ann, and his two daughters, Marie and Rose, who is married to past Fourth District Governor Benjamin V.P. Verdile.

## Beta Eta On The Rise

Beta Eta (Brooklyn College) reactivated two years ago, continues to prosper under new officers. In January Steve Jones was elected President, Carlo Ficiolini and John Clarke Vice-Presidents, Charlie Ragusa (past President) and Ron Siggia Pledgemasters, Lou Carbone Secretary, Frank Morano Treasurer and Dante Naccarato Historian-Chaplain.

The major problems confronting the new officers was an empty treasury and devising an effective pledge program. The financial resources of the chapter was strengthened by an increase in monthly dues and conducting a raffle (which has increased the treasury by \$400). Under the energetic leadership of both Pledgemasters, the chapter assembled the second largest pledge group (10) in the district. The officers realized that previous pledging techniques needed reform and the first improvement was evident on March 2nd when Beta Eta conducted "Pledge Edification" (similar to Baptism) at Brooklyn College's Student Center. This was the first time that such a major event was held by the chapter at Brooklyn College. The pledges were required to eat lunch with the brothers and to meet regularly for instruction. On April 5th and 6th Beta Eta held its induction at Beta Sigma's house with the brothers of Beta Eta staging, directing and acting in the key roles. Never before had the chapter conducted such an active pledge period on its own.

The chapter is also developing a tradition of support for district activities. Many Beta Eta brothers attend the district's monthly meetings and several attended the mid-year convention. The chapter

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has developed close ties with Beta Sigma and Theta Beta and several of its brothers can usually be found at these entities affairs.

The Brooklyn College campus, which only a decade ago had over forty fraternities, presently has less than ten (all greatly reduced in size). While the chapter has concentrated on its internal development, it has not neglected campus activities, and several of its brothers are leaders of campus activities (Charlie Ragusa is Student Body Vice-President and Dante Naccarato President of the Italian Society). The chapters future ability to attract pledges will depend on the continued involvement of Beta Eta brothers in campus activities.

The most difficult challenge facing the chapter is the rapid training of recently inducted (Fall '75) brothers for leadership positions in the chapter which will be vacated by the present officers in June. Since January the brothers have demonstrated great ability and confidence. Whether they are able to continue and build on that record will determine whether Beta Eta becomes one of the strongest chapters in the district and the fraternity.

## Psi's Big Night

Psi Chapter, Duquesne University held its Annual Valentine Ball on Saturday, February 14th. The Ball Chairman was Brother Tony Angiulli, and the Assistant Chairman was Brother Tony Svolos. Their hard work made this one of the best events ever for Psi Chapter. It was held in the Duquesne Ballroom, which was appropriately decorated for the occasion. All of the brothers stayed awake the entire night before the Ball arranging flowers, tables, and other necessities.

The Ball was open to everyone and some of the guests included: National President Al Palazzo, National Secretary Adam DiVincenzo, National Treasurer Joe Scotti, Fifth District Governor Arnie Midili, and Psi Alumnus Advisor Joe Creston.

The highlight of the evening was the crowning of the Queen. Ten girls from various campus groups were nominated as candidates. The winner was picked by a penny vote system. The winner was announced and presented with the traditional crown and flowers, as well as a money gift for her sponsoring organization. The money received from the voting was given by the Psi Brothers to an orphan whom they sponsor overseas.

The Ball ended at 12 o'clock, but was followed by an "After Ball" at the Park Schenley Hotel. There, the brothers and guests enjoyed drinks and a great buffet dinner. The newly-elected officers of Psi officially began their term at this event. The new officers are:

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The following letter was received from Charles Fiore, Theta Beta, Alpha Phi Delta's Outstanding Undergraduate of 1975. It concerns his observations of the Mid-Year Meeting.

Dear Editor,

On Saturday January 31, Alpha Phi Delta held its yearly Executive Committee meeting. Although the meeting itself was rather noteworthy it was only a small part of a great fraternity weekend.

The weekend started with a Friday night "beer blast" run by Beta Iota Chapter. Many national officers attended but the big story was the large crowd of third district undergraduates, which included 10 from Theta Beta and 13 from Delta, Beta Eta, Beta Xi and Beta Sigma.

After the "beer blast" the undergraduates were taken to a local bar which stayed open an hour past the usual 2:00 A.M. closing time to accommodate the overflow crowd.

The explanation of the large third district attendance goes back to the early Fall. In September of 1975 Dick Pellegrino (Beta Iota 71) moved to New York City to start work on his masters of law degree at New York University.

Under Article XXVI Section 10 of the National Constitution Dick was made an undergraduate brother of Theta Beta. He is one of the four live-in brothers at the Theta Beta house (located at 121-3 MacDougal St. N.Y.C.) and was recently elected house chairman by the chapter.

Later in September Dave Ambrose, another Beta Iota alumnus (Beta Iota 75) also moved to New York City. David was accompanied on his trip by several undergraduate brothers of Beta Iota. On the night that they arrived in New York several brothers of Theta Beta assembled with their brothers from Utica for a now legendary tour of Greenwich Village bars.

David and Dick have since both joined the New York Alumni Club and David has become a good friend of the district. The migration from Utica to New York has

resulted in great communications between Theta Beta and Beta Iota, and has been seen visitations by four Beta Iota undergraduates and four Beta Iota Alumni.

Rather than go into a detailed account of Saturday's Executive Committee meeting I will make some personal observations concerning it.

It seems that National President Palazzo's call for the fraternity to be run in a more business-like fashion is undeniably correct. We can only hope that the national officers will use the wealth of professional help available throughout the Fraternity to help us move towards this goal.

The question of the fraternity pins made several points evident to the brothers present. When the Executive Committee heard that the undergraduates were in favor of dropping the fraternity pin from the initiation fee they responded with a unanimous vote supporting this view. Although some of the National Officers personally felt that the pin should be included, they responded to the wish of the undergraduates. This shows that Alpha Phi Delta is truly an undergraduate fraternity run not by the undergraduates but for the undergraduates.

The Fraternity pin question also presented a much broader question to the Fraternity. No matter what was said at the meeting it is obvious that the motion passed, (although it was necessary), violates the National Constitution. This points out that the constitution must be not only rewritten but restructured so as to be basic and flexible. Along with a more flexible constitution we need the strengthening of National Council resolutions which are presently forgotten as quickly as they are passed.

On Saturday night the M.V.A.A. made arrangements for undergraduates to attend a four hour open bar, (which followed the alumni dinner) for only five dollars.

This was an excellent adaption to the undergraduates' needs and resources and showed excellent thinking in unifying the undergraduates and alumni.

## The Legacy Of Dr. Nardone

On March 18th, 1976 at the Villa de Roma Restaurant in Philadelphia thirty five men observed one minute of silence to honor one of the great men of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity. One minute of pay homage to fifty years of activity and service. Thyman so remembered was Dr. Anthony Nardone who died suddenly on Sunday morning, March 7th, 1976.

As I looked at the brothers attending this particular meeting of the Philadelphia Alumni club, I was struck by the spectrum of ages of the brothers who knew Doc. They ran the gamut from early twenties to early seventies. This represented Doc's greatest accomplishment — he never lost touch with the fraternity. His style of

fraternalism eliminated any generation gap. For him there was no age barrier among fraternity brothers.

Doc was initiated into Lambda Chapter in 1926. For fifty years he remained an active and dedicated brother of Alpha Phi Delta. A founder of the Philadelphia Alumni Club, Fourth District Governor and National Vice-President were some of his accomplishments. Recently, he was debating whether to assume the presidency in August. Doc had suffered several heart attacks, the most recent one in September, 1975. Various brothers voiced concern over his health and the demands of the presidency. The night before his death both of us attended the Philadelphia Alumni Club's Governors Ball honoring Joseph Mangano. Doc resolved that "if a man comes forward who I feel will do the job, I'll step aside". These words so typified Doc — the fraternity first.

It will be difficult to find a man to replace Doc. All of us will miss him. He did the job and we basked in the glory of his doing.

Following the dinner many of the undergraduates went back to the Beta Iota house for the traditional scrambled eggs breakfast.

In retrospect I would say that this year's Executive Committee meeting was my most enjoyable national fraternity event. It was a chance to see exactly how Beta Iota and the M.V.A.A. work in the only way possible, by visiting them. We meet at the National Convention but the atmosphere is by necessity artificial in that it does not allow us to learn about other entities in the same way as a visit.

The Executive Committee meeting itself was one of the most stimulating and interest-filled national fraternity meetings I've seen since I've been in the Fraternity. This interest can only be a good sign for the future of the fraternity.

Charles Fiore, Theta Beta, and Professor Anthony Sarno, Beta Pi, LIAC, were honored as the Third District's Outstanding Undergraduate and Alumnus respectively, at a gala affair attended by over 125 people on March 19th.

The event, chaired by Bro. Joe Randazzo, was a tribute to the recipients of the district's highest honors. Presidents of all the entities in the district, and four National Officers (President Al Palazzo, Chaplain Bro. Camillus, Kleos Editor Santo Barbarino and 3-D Governor Stan Raffa) as well as large contingents from Theta Beta and the Long Island Alumni Club, helped make this affair one of the most successful in recent memory (not including the 3-D Christmas Dance).

Bro. Fiore, cited for his exceptional work within Theta Beta Chapter in leading it to its current status as National's Most Improved Chapter, called this award "the result of hard work on the part of many throughout the district." Aside from his National and District honors, Bro. Fiore was the first recipient of the "Golden Pump Award", a newly founded Theta Beta tradition. He was so honored because, as Bro. Vinny Del Giudice so eloquently put it, "Charlie has a knack for pumping his thoughts into the minds of theless intelligent brothers of the chapter".

Professor Sarno, who announced his retirement last year, added this award to a long list of fraternal and scholastic accomplishments. His work with Beta Pi Chapter as their moderator and as a Trustee of the National Housing Corporation of APD will always be admired by our brothers.

After the affair, a large group of undergrads and alumni continued the celebration until the wee hours of the morning at the local Theta Beta nightspots in Greenwich Village.

Bennett, dealt with 17 persons trying out for a chorus line in a Broadway play in which there are only 8 openings. The music and choreography were nothing less than superb.

This outing, for the second consecutive year, proved to be the second most popular event on the N.J.A.C. calendar, topped only by the Graduate Dinner. Special thanks must be given to Social Director John Cavanaugh for his efforts in arranging this fine affair. All of the North Jersey A.C. officers were present, and half of the Beta Xi executive committee was in attendance.

After returning from New York, a number of the party again visited Pal's Cabin, a restaurant and cocktail lounge in West Orange, N.J. for late evening refreshments. After two consecutive successful theater excursions, the officers of the No. Jersey Alumni Club are considering making this event a permanent part of the annual social calendar.

Interestingly when Alpha Phi Delta was reactivated in the Fall of 1971 it was the only fraternity on the campus. There are now five social fraternities at N.Y.U.

Some of the older brothers have shown particular interest in the sorority and the way its growth has paralleled the fraternities' growth at N.Y.U.

The sisters of Theta Beta intend to spend the rest of the semester and the Summer months organizing themselves and exploring the idea of seeking national affiliation.

## Rollin' Around North Jersey

On Saturday February 21, 1976, the North Jersey Alumni Club sponsored an outing at the Livingston Roller Rink, Livingston, N.J., "Roller Skating Night", naturally. Approximately 20 people attended, including some of the brothers from Beta Xi.

For the low cost of \$1.50 per person, the group was able to enjoy the facility for about three hours. For some, it took a period of time to get re-adjusted to skating, and early spills were common. For others it was as if they were never off skates. For still others, they were never quite able to get the hang of it, and spent a frustrating though amusing time of picking themselves off the wood all night.

The surprise of the evening was Beta Xi's Mike Van Stolk, a brother who certainly is not noted for his gracefulness. Mike managed to fool everybody, as he proved to be a master on skates, exhibiting spins, backward, and sideways skating, while most others were content to stay upright, and prod around the rink.

The "Spaz" award of the evening went to the date of Bill Linteris, Debbie Fitzgerald (sister of N.J.A.C. Vice-Pres. Jim Fitzgerald). Although Debbie claimed she had not roller skated in four or five years, it seemed more like 14 or 15. Among those attending were North Jersey President Garry Kostek, and Historian Al Fafara. For Beta Xi, besides Treasurer Linteris, Historian Steve McCurry, and Pledgemaster Phil Starapoli participated.

At the end of the evening the contingent travelled a few miles to Oscar's Tavern in Union N.J., for refreshments, and "painkillers" after spending a unique outing sponsored by an alumni club.

## Some Proposals For '76 Convention

From The Restructuring Committee

(1) National President/Vice President — Legislative

Add to Article 7 Section 2 Item 1:

No National President or National Vice President shall serve more than 2 consecutive years in office.

(2) District Governor — Legislative

Maximum term 4 years, re-election yearly by the entities or a district. Art. No. 7 — sec. 8 add preface to read: "The tenure of office of District Governor shall be no more than 4 consecutive years upon re-election in the district each year, districts may further limit the maximum to be of a lesser period if they so choose."

(3) Central Office: Re-affirm National Sec/Treas. every 2 years by the executive committee, with subsequent approval of the Grand Council with a maximum term of 6 years.

Legislative: Art. No. 7 — sec. 5 & 6 add the preface: "The tenure of office of the National Sec/Treas. shall not exceed more than 6 consecutive years with re-affirmation every two years by the executive committee with further re-affirmation by the Grand council."

(4) Expansion Chairman — Legislative

Expansion chairman shall be appointed yearly with a maximum tenure of four years. Art. No. 9 — Sec. 9: Add to the preface: "Expansion chairman shall be appointed yearly by the National President and in no case shall his tenure in office exceed 4 consecutive years".

All items were presented and discussed on the floor of the convention last August with the exception of Item (1). This item was added at the last Recommendation Committee meeting held at Utica, New York on February 1, 1976.

From Charles Fiore, Theta Beta

1) Article XII Section 5 — Strike paragraphs "a" and "b" and add the following.

"a) The annual dues of each alumni club shall be (\$75) seventy-five dollars a year plus (\$0.50) fifty cents for each man in excess of twenty-five (25). In addition each alumni club shall pay the sum of (\$15) fifteen dollars per year for each member of said club who is not a life member. This payment will excuse each member of the alumni club from national alumni dues as provided for in paragraph "b" of this section.

b) Each alumnus who is not a member of an alumni club is hereby the sum of (\$15.00) fifteen dollars annually. The Central Office shall supply annually each alumnus who pays his annual assessment with a good standing card which shall entitle said paid alumnus with all rights and privileges of membership during the period covered by the assessment."

EFFECT: The effect of this amendment is simply to have local alumni clubs be responsible for collecting national dues.

2) Article IX Section 9 — after the first paragraph add —

"Two of the members of the Expansion Committee shall be designated by the National President as co-chairman. These two co-chairman shall not be from the same area."

EFFECT: To have a competent person in charge of expansion in two different areas of the fraternity.

3) Article IX-add the following

"Sec. 11 — Composition of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee

The Undergraduate Coordinating Committee shall consist of one member from each chapter. These members shall be appointed by the outgoing Undergraduate Coordinating Committee Chairman, (or in his absence the Co-chairman), at the National Convention. Appointment to membership of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee for chapters not present at the convention shall be made by the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee Chairman in the month following the convention."

EFFECT: To set up an equitable composition for the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee.

4) Article VII — strike entire section 10 (including 1973 and 1974 amendments) and add —

"Sec. 10 — Power and Qualifications of the Chairman of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee.

The Chairman of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee shall be a member of the Executive Committee. He shall be elected at the National Convention meeting of the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee. At the same meeting a co-chairman shall be elected, the co-chairman shall not be from the same area as the chairman.

In order to be elected chairman or co-chairman the candidates for said offices must be present at the meeting or have submitted a written request asking to be nominated to the Undergraduate Coordinating Committee prior to the election.

Should the Committee be unable to elect a Chairman or Co-Chairman (or both) the vacancy (vacancies) shall be filled by appointment of the National President.

The Chairman and Co-chairman shall have the power to:

1) Stimulate correspondence between chapters to bring about a better understanding of the internal workings of each of the chapters.

2) Gather and coordinate undergraduate ideas on national legislation or policies, as well as to encourage interest in and attendance at fraternity functions on a national and district level."

EFFECT: To eliminate the cumbersome constitutional procedures for electing the U.C.C. Chairman and Co-chairman.

## P.A.C. Knows How To Do It

The Pittsburgh Alumni Club has enjoyed much success throughout the years because of its well-organized planning system. The members of the Alumni Club's executive committee meet every third Monday of the month to plan a detailed program for the following month's social activities.

Notice of the program is sent to all active brothers in the western portion of Pennsylvania. Monthly meetings of the Pittsburgh Alumni Club are held at the Marriott, located in Greentree, Pittsburgh, Pa.

At the first meeting of the executive committee, the P.A.C. leaders had three guests in attendance: Frank Rubolino, visiting from South America; Sid Aurilio, proprietor of the Penn Shady Restaurant; and Joseph Scotti, National Treasurer.

Recently, Pittsburgh's Ladies' Auxiliary invited their husbands to a Gourmet Dinner at the home of Anthony and Theresa Scotti. Food, games, and more food was the order of the night, with each brother leaving the Scotti abode much happier, but a little heavier.

## Mohawk Hosts Mid-Year Weekend For A.P.D. Executives

The Mid-Year Meeting of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity was held at the Treadway Resort in New Hartford, New York on January 31, 1976. The business and social features made it a weekend to be remembered by the many undergraduates and alumni who attended. Activities were expertly arranged by Beta Iota Chapter, Utica College, the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association and the Ladies Auxiliary.

On Friday night, Beta Iota sponsored a beer blast at the college, drawing a huge crowd, including all the out-of-towners. On Saturday, the Executive Committee Meeting was held, during which an enormous amount of business was covered. In addition to the reports given by the various National Officers, the following items were considered:

a) Initiations are moving slowly; with seven chapters reporting (four from the 3D) only 34 initiates have been added to the scrolls (the 3D has 14). This does not include recent initiations at Psi and Pi.

b) The initiation pin may become optional again; i.e., it will not be a part of the basic initiation fee and the latter will be reduced accordingly. The most recently available pin was simply unacceptable and the previous 10 carat gold pin has become too expensive to add to the basic initiation fee (it now costs over \$25 for what was about \$11 just three years ago). The actual action taken by the Executive Committee was to express the sentiment of the body that the cost of the pin be removed from the initiation fee and reduce it by the amount it was increased three years ago. This was virtually unanimous, but the item must be approved by the Grand Council in Convention before it can be implemented. Therefore, Central Office advises that for Spring initiations, the chapters forward only \$40 and hold any other funds in abeyance in the unlikelihood that this is not confirmed. Central Office has already held up the pins for this Fall's initiates and if the item is confirmed at the convention, the \$15 per initiate for this past fall shall be returned. It is possible that some other arrangements may be made for those who received the poorer

looking pin over the past two years but that will have to be determined later. Pins will still be available through Central Office (10 carat gold type or better) but separately. To summarize: initiations are now \$40, it does not include the pin and it is all subject to National Convention confirmation.

c) In a separate matter involving Fraternity jewelry and the Balfour Co., it was agreed that the National Treasurer would come to an equitable agreement with them within 30 days. In a separate matter relative to the NFC, the Executive Committee reaffirmed its desire to retain membership and this shall be resolved equitably by Central Office quickly.

d) In the matter of Beta Pi, the Executive Committee MOVED unanimously that the chapter be placed on suspension with the recommendation that it be expelled at the forthcoming National Convention. Central Office was instructed to so inform the chapter and the school.

The Executive Committee Meeting was followed by the National Housing Corporation Meeting. The highlight of this session was the completion of arrangements for the purchase of the new Beta Xi House, New Jersey Institute of Technology.

Saturday night the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association held a dinner in honor of the Executive Committee at which the latter were guests. It was a great affair with about 130 in attendance plus all of the undergraduates who joined in the open bar after the dinner for a nominal fee and a long session. All Fraternity visitors are very grateful to Beta Iota, the Mohawk Valley Alumni, the Ladies Auxiliary and Second District Governor Ernie Coletti for an excellent weekend.
