The initial contacts for this project were made by National Expansion Chairman Mike Zerega, who was personally responsible for the successful foundation of the chapter. He was also aided by Dr. Robert Trapani and many of the members of the Capital Alumni Club who held the pledge meetings with the undergrads at The Black Angus.

The chapter at G.W.U. represents the first that the Fraternity has ever had located in this part of the country. One of the most amazing features of this accomplishment is that a strong group was able to be assembled within a relatively short period of time.

At present, Beta Upsilon has three very capable officers: President Dom Lionetti, Pledgemaster Chris Vignare and Secretary Mike Cortese. They figure to be getting plenty of help, as they have in the past, from the nearby Capital Alumni Club. Together, based on the tremendous effort that these two entities have shown in the last few months, there is every reason to believe that Beta Upsilon can become one of the stronger chapters in the Fraternity within the near future.
