

## Santo Barbarino Elected President



Alpha Phi Delta's 34th National President was inducted into Beta Sigma chapter in April, 1965. During his undergraduate days, he served his chapter as Vice President, his district as Assistant Governor and was the only District Governor ever to serve as an undergraduate. He graduated St. Francis College with a B.S. in chemistry in 1967. Among his awards and distinctions are: Outstanding Undergraduate Award 1967, Central Office Service Award 1967, Third District Newsletter Editor.

Santo Barbarino was appointed Kleos Editor in 1968, succeeding the incomparable Satn Raffa, PNP. He served in this position for ten long years. During this time he was a member of the National Scholarship Foundation and worked on various national and local committees.

Currently, Santo serves as chairman of the Science Department at Holy Cross High School in Flushing, New York. He holds a Masters Degree from St. John's University in Secondary School Administration & Supervision.

Santo believes chapter pledging is the lifeblood of Alpha Phi Delta and promises this will be one of his administration's priorities. He looks forward to working with the new National Officers within the new organizational framework of Alpha Phi Delta. He states that the policy of his term in office will be, "first the organization, then the individual".

# New Constitution Ratified; Organizational Structure Changes; Three New Chapters Join APD

A new administration, Central Office and National Constitution are some of the ingredients which made the 58th National Convention an unforgettable event. Add to this two new chapters, another chapter re-instated, and the conclave at the Stevensville Country Club in Swan Lake, N.Y. becomes the most historic meeting of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity.

Former National Editor Santo Barbarino was elected *President*, and Anthony Carfang was elected *Executive Vice President*. Following his election President Barbarino appointed Stan Raffa *Executive Secretary*, and Al Palazzo *Vice President-Financial Affairs*, Neil Anastasio was appointed *Vice President-Good & Welfare*, and John Colgan was selected *Vice President-Undergraduate Affairs*. Re-appointed to their respective positions were Bro. Camillus Casey, *National Chaplain* and Michael Zerega, *Vice President-Expansion*.

Business began Monday, August 21st, when the members of the Executive Committee met to review the status of the various entities and to prepare for the National Council meetings. The National Officers voted to grant chapter status to Beta Phi Colony, Glassboro State College and to Beta Chi Colony, State University of New York, Utica/Rome. They also agreed to reinstate Beta Pi Chapter, St. John's University.

The first meeting of the National Council was called to order by President A. Joseph Creston on Tuesday morning. The delegates first action was to grant chapter status to the above mentioned chapters. President Creston then called on Anthony Cavuto, Chairman of the Legislative Committee, to handle the adoption of the revised National Constitution.

The new document consumed the remaining time of the Tuesday meeting and forced the delegates into a rare double session on Wednesday. Thursday morning brought the mentioned elections and appointments. In his acceptance speech, President Barbarino advised the delegates that complacency on the part of an undergraduate, alumnus, national officer or committee member will not be tolerated. He also warned chapters which engage in harmful physical hazing to change their "traditions" or face expulsion.

The final action of the delegates was the election of Jules Zangrille, Past National President, to a three year term as a National Housing Trustee. During Good & Welfare, the brothers honored the out-going National Officers, Joe Creston, Ben Verdile, Adam DiVincenzo, Joe Scotti and Paul Bonzani, with the Fraternal Hand Clap, for their collective years of fine work and dedicated service to the fraternity.

## 5 Awarded Scholarships: A Banner Year!

The awarding of five scholarships amounting to two thousand dollars, a merger with a Boston scholarship fund, and the inclusion of Alpha Phi Delta in the will of the late Rev. Armand F. DeRosa, Beta Eta, launched the National Scholarship Foundation to a new height of recognition.

Scholarship Chairman Trent Ciarrocchi announced the five recipients at the Awards Dinner of the 58th National Convention. They are: George Bowers, Psi (Duquesne U.); John Colgan, Beta Sigma (St Francis College, N.Y.); Ralph Chappano, son of Ralph Cappano, Beta Theta (College of Steubenville); Steve Coupe, Beta Iota (Utica College); and Mark Hughes, Beta Lambda (St. Francis College, Pa.). Steve Coupe received his scholarship in the name of the late Carlo Vannicola, Past National President.

The scholarship recipients were chosen from a total of seventeen applicants. Bro. Ciarrocchi also announced the receipt of a \$500 donation from the Steubenville Alumni Ladies, a \$50. donation from the Ladies Auxiliary of Pittsburgh and a \$100 donation from the Piave Club of Columbus, Ohio.

Also, for the first time in history, a brother left a sum of money to Alpha Phi Delta in his will. This sum, twenty-five hundred dollars, was placed in the National Scholarship Foundation and will be used as the base from which a scholarship will be granted every three years in the name of the donor, the late Rev. Armand DeRosa.

Scholarship Chairman Ciarrocchi appealed to all APD brothers and friends for their help to assure the Scholarship Fund can continue to award many scholarships each year.

A small group of reactivation brothers overcame obstacles of an apathetic campus, lost chapter traditions, little if any funding and tremendous odds against success, to establish Beta Delta (Temple University), as Alpha Phi Delta's Most Improved Chapter, 1978.

Breaking down the walls of apathy and exposing APD to the campus population was a frustrating experience. They had little assistance from the activities office, no viable interfraternity conference and no assistance from any school organization or newspaper. In effect, Beta Delta paid for everything with their own resources, talent and time.

They started from scratch and learned how to sell themselves and Alpha Phi Delta along the way. With the small number of brothers, they built up their treasury, had several large and most successful social functions, and most importantly, came up with a fine pledge class each semester. Their big pledge class this spring certainly was the highlight of the year. Seventeen Beta Delta brothers were inducted.

The list of Beta Delta's accomplishments goes on and on. From sporting events and successful social affairs to community service events, visits to other chapters, national participation and district service, the chapter's year was indeed vastly improved. No wonder they are one of the fraternity's finest chapters.

Anthony J. Cavuto, Esq., Beta Delta, has been in the forefront of fraternal events during the last year, both locally and on the national level. His hard work and dedication have earned him the title of Alpha Phi Delta's Outstanding Alumnus of 1978.

Tony was appointed a member of the Constitution Committee at the 1976 National Convention by National President Creston. After several meetings, he emerged as the leader of the group. Soon thereafter, he was appointed chairman of the committee.

His leadership is reflected in his tenacity, legal expertise, committee management, and competence in governance procedures. He not only managed a committee of people with divergent personalities, but led them to a most successful completion of the task.

Tony has served, and continues to serve, as Assistant Fourth District Governor. His leadership as Alumnus Advisor to Beta Delta led them to a successful year as Most Improved Chapter. As an active participant in the Philadelphia Alumni Club, Tony found time to support the fraternal events of Beta Delta as well as the Philadelphia Women's Auxiliary, of which his lovely wife Marie is President.

The glowing leadership that Tony displayed at the 1978 Constitutional Convention ranks among the most important contributions to Alpha Phi Delta in recent years. He certainly has earned the title of Outstanding Alumnus 1978.

There is an Alumni Club which has been most instrumental in generating an explosive undergraduate expansion and revitalization program in the Fourth District. This club has been holding events which have re-spirited an already spirited alumni organization, and always with the theme of propagating fraternalism. These claims can best be described as the 1977-78 activities of the Philadelphia Alumni Club, Alpha Phi Delta's Outstanding Alumni Club of 1978.

Perhaps the most significant accomplishment of this group during the past year was the installation of a new colony, Beta Phi (Glassboro College), where on December 10, 1977 the PAC initiated nineteen brothers. An initiation of thirteen followed in April, 1978. Imagine, in less than one year the Beta Phi Colony was thirty-two strong! Indeed an admirable feat for the Philadelphia Alumni Club. Subsequently the club sponsored a cocktail party honoring these colony members.

Perhaps just as significant as the new colony is the continuing revitalization of Beta Delta Chapter (Temple University). With the help of the PAC, it went from five brothers in early 1977 to a current twenty-three.

The PAC boasts fifty-one life members active in many of the club's social events including: monthly dinner meetings, an annual dinner-dance, annual picnic and strong support of the Womens Auxilliary. They have served in an advisory capacity to the National Capitol Alumni Club regarding the creation of Beta Epsilon (George Washington University).

Throughout the expansion and revitalization programs, the PAC has played an important role. Its members have had meetings with pledges, been big brothers during initiation periods and demonstrated the meaning of fraternalism.

Apparently, the Philadelphia Alumni Club has been somewhat successful. Their contributions to Alpha Phi Delta speak for themselves. They are indeed outstanding fraternity brothers.

Theta Beta continues to be a vital force in district and school events. They co-sponsor numerous functions with Third District chapters and Alumni Clubs as well as with other organizations on campus. Currently, the chapter continues to maintain their seven room apartment in Greenwich Village while being in good financial shape, thanks to the fund raising work of their seventeen brothers. While the chapter is not large, the brothers work as a cohesive unit to assure the chapter a position of strength in school and fraternal affairs, for a long time to come.

Saving Beta Mu Chapter (De Paul University) from collapse and bringing it to a position of strength within Alpha Phi Delta and the University, is just one reason why Dan Smith was chosen Outstanding Undergraduate of 1978.

Internal strife, low morale and no initiations over eighteen months, characterized Beta Mu in 1976. When Dan Smith arrived on the scene as chapter secretary, things began to move.

Dan was successful in establishing monthly chapter meetings in the homes of the brothers in an effort to revive the enthusiasm of both brother and parents alike in Alpha Phi Delta. Correspondence with National entities increased, sparking two visitations by then National President Creston. Dan seemed to have halted the downward slide of the chapter by the summer of 1977, but, all the returning brothers were seniors!

Subsequently, as chapter president, Dan Smith met the challenge. A comprehensive rush/pledge program was formulated, bi-weekly meetings were held, chapter by-laws were passed, a formal budget was instituted which carefully allocated the chapter's low resources. The year ended with fifteen young brothers ready to carry on the traditions of Beta Mu.

## Reorganization: The Future Is Now!

The 1978 Constitutional Convention saw the National Council pass sweeping changes in an effort to modernize and reorganize the fraternal heirarchy.

At this Convention, the average age of the National Officers plunged to an all time low. Most notable were changes in district leadership of the second, fifth and seventh districts, where Phil Vanno Beta Iota '71, Rod Belsky Psi '74 and John Rago Beta Mu '76 are making vital contributions.

National President Santo Barbarino Beta Sigma '67, has past on his National Editor's position to the new *Vice President - Good & Welfare*, Neil Anastasio Theta Beta '76.

Also, after eighteen years of dedicated service, Adam DiVincenzo Psi '34 and Joe Scotti Psi '48 have turned Central Office over to Past National Presidents Stan Raffa Delta '51 and Al Palazzo Theta Beta '49, who will assume the titles of *Executive Secretary* and *Vice President-Financial Affairs*, respectively.

Tony Carfang Psi '74 now becomes the youngest *Executive Vice President* in Alpha Phi Delta history, at age 28. Mike Zerega Psi '74 continues to spearhead the expansion effort as *Vice President-Expansion* and John Colgan Beta Sigma, becomes the new *Vice President-Undergraduate Affairs*.

Where do these changes leave the fraternity? Alpha Phi Delta now has the organizational capability to involve young alumni in order to assure continuity in its governing body for many years to come.

Traditions such as the Parents Banquet and Candlelight Bowl, under Dan's direction attracted previously unheard of crowds of over eighty and two hundred people respectively.

These notable accomplishments, among others, certainly make Dan Smith a brother our National Fraternity can look with pride upon.

# Expansion: Three Chapters Are Born

## Beta Chi Is Born

The official recognition of Beta Chi Colony as *Beta Chi Chapter* came at the Grand Ball during the recent National Convention. The chapter, located at the State University of New York, Upper Division, Utica/Rome, begins the academic year with seven brothers. They are: Jim Brannan, Gary Cuda, Robert Flynn, Larry Ianzucci, Bill Przulucki, John LaVallee and Frank Sicilia.

Through the hard work of Gary Cuda, a transfer student from Beta Iota Chapter (Utica College), Phillepe Vanno, Ass't. 2-D Governor, and Bruce Brodsky, Mohawk Valley Alumni Association, the Beta Chi Colony is now APD's newest chapter.

A group of the new brothers were at the National Convention to recite the sacred Oath of Brotherhood, this officially recognizing them as a bona fide chapter of Alpha Phi Delta.

## Beta Pi Reactivated

Alpha Phi Delta is again on the campus of St. John's University in Flushing, New York, with the reactivation of Beta Pi Chapter on May 20th, 1978. The three new brothers of Beta Pi Chapter are: Quentin Dixon, Mike Wellbrock and Jim Rivera.

Because of summer scheduling problems, the new brothers were not able to hold an induction as they had planned. The chapter will, however, hold another initiation before their formal installation at the October 10th Third District Meeting.

Beta Pi Chapter was expelled at the 1976 National Convention and this reactivation represents another successful effort of the Expansion Committee under the direction of Mike Zerega. This particular effort was nurtured along by the hard work of Bob LePore, Psi '73, Charles Fiore, Theta Beta '76, and numerous Third District undergraduates and alumni.

## The Founding of Beta Phi

Beta Phi's first attempt was in the fall of 1976. With the efforts of Dr. Benjamin Verdile, the initial effort was made to bring about a colony at Glassboro State College, Glassboro, New Jersey.

In the summer of 1977, Dr. Benjamin Verdile and myself had lunch. We discussed Alpha Phi Delta in general. I expressed a desire to become active in the fraternity and offered my services. The expansion at Glassboro State College was mentioned, as was the importance of manpower to get the project off, in the right direction. It was then that I committed myself.

Mike Zerega, Vice President-Expansion, contacted me and explained his adventures of starting a colony at George Washington University. He described the difficulties involved by said the rewards outweigh the problems. Mike truly was an inspiration to me.

It was unknown to me that there were many students interested in joining some sort of fraternity at Glassboro. This was due to the fact there was only one fraternity (TEK) on campus. This fraternity basically monopolized the Greek world at Glassboro. The appeal of such a large frat like TEK did not interest many students. They were looking for something like Alpha Phi Delta. It was a matter of being at the right place at the right time.

The brothers have scheduled an organized pledging program and have already adopted bylaws to conform to the new National Constitution. Beta Pi certainly is working hard to establish themselves as a strong, nationally oriented chapter within the Third District.

During the fall semester of 1977, I followed Mike Zerega's basic attack. I put an ad in the school's newspaper (WHIT), explaining the formation of an Italo-American fraternity on campus. It also had a time and place to meet with interested students. I also discussed this with the head of Greek organizations on campus, and followed the rules laid down by the university. A room was reserved, at the school, to meet with prospective pledges. The undergraduates of Beta Delta, Temple University, along with their faculty advisor, Dr. John Florino, all came to help. Many members of the Philadelphia Alumni Club also supported this Our National Vice-President and Fourth District Governor also attended. I must admit, it was a very impressive turnout for Alpha Phi Delta. This first meeting attracted only 2 prospective pledges. This was a little discouraging, but, unknown to us, the project was about to mushroom.

During the next month, I again put an ad in the school newspaper. The second meeting was held at my home. Again, the same group of Alpha Phi Delta men came to discuss APD's ideals and history. To our amazement, 19 prospective pledges attended. I truly believe they felt our desire to have them begin Alpha Phi Delta's existence at Glassboro. A week later, I officially stated a 6 week pledge program, which commenced at Dr. Verdile's home. In the beginning of December, 16 brothers were initiated at Matt LoMonoco's home.

In the beginning of April, 1978, 13 new brothers were initiated. Beta Phi Chapter now stands twenty-nine strong.
