

BETA OMEGA "PACES" APD

Twenty four men were inducted into the newly established Beta Omega Colony at Pace University on December 10th. The largest colony in recent memory was nourished by the flawless efforts of Project Manager Paul Bonzani, Theta Beta.

The project at Pace began in the middle of October when Brother Fred DeCicco, Theta Beta, approached Scott Giammarino, (currently the colony president), about beginning a chapter at Pace. The initial meeting took place at the home of 3-D Expansion Coordinator Charlie Fiore, with seven undergraduates from Pace attending. Several follow-up organizational meetings were held at the University which attracted the remainder of the group.

Throughout the indoctrination period, the colonists visited many chapters in the Third District and participated in all district events from the November 3-D meeting to the Annual Christmas Dance. These remarkable young men managed to sell \$600. in advertisements for the dance's journal during this short time.

The group has already created an overwhelming presence for itself on campus. They have affiliated with a local sister sorority of over 70 women, sponsored a school party and participated in the University's Student Olympics representing Alpha Phi Delta.

The New York City campus of Pace University is one block from City Hall in lower Manhattan. The school is predominately commuter oriented and is located within a mile of Theta Beta (N.Y.U.), Delta (Polytechnic Institute of N.Y.) and Beta Sigma (St. Francis College).

The officers of the colony, Scott Giammarino, President; Mike Kawas, Vice President; Gary Katen, Treasurer; Al Cavallaro, Secretary; Leo DiGuilio, Pledgemaster and Steve Kaye, Rush Chairman, have continued their feverish workpace through the end of the year and will be inducting six men in January.

CALLING ALL BROTHERS

Sweeping changes in the way APD conducts its business were put in place by the new constitution. These changes are designed to provide the flexibility and expertise necessary to carry on as a viable organization. The strategy is creation of a series of Vice Presidential positions; functional experts, reporting to the President and Executive Vice President. These experts are each supported by an operating committee which will function year round, focusing on Alpha Phi Delta's opportunities.

The intent of these changes is to attract large numbers of alumni, whose expertise is desperately needed, into service for the fraternity. The positions have been established with the busy alumnus in mind. A man who can spare a few hours each week for Alpha Phi Delta may qualify for a Vice Presidential position. For the brother who is able to find a few hours each month, there are over seventy committee positions available.

The fraternity is faced with serious problems as it approaches 1980. Help is needed in facing these issues. To this end, the new constitution has created positions which don't require the oppressive time and financial burdens that existed in the past.

The new structure is essentially a staff organization which will support the President, Executive Vice President, the District Governors and entities. This effects a matrix type organization with two experts looking after each problem; the District Governors are the territorial experts and the Vice Presidents are the functional experts.

Further changes involve changing the Legislative Committee (Tony Cavuto), Resolutions (Paul Fabrizio), Budget and Audit (Tony O'Toole), and Corporate and Tax Structure (Greg White) from convention committees to committees that will operate on a year round basis.

Alpha Phi Delta has taken a giant step forward. If the vast pool of alumni and undergraduate talent can be channeled, APD will be successful in bringing it's unique experience to many deserving young men. It's up to everyone. The jobs are there and they are not demanding. Come forward and give a few hours to a great cause. Young men, recent graduates, your energy is needed. OBITUARY

ARMAND 'SONNY' FERRARA Beta Zeta

Bro. Ferrara died suddenly on October 8, 1978, at the age of 59. Best known for his work with the North Jersey Alumni Club and Beta Xi while manager of the San Carlo Restaurant, host to many Third District functions. Born in 1919 he was inducted into APD in 1940 at the University of Ohio by Dr. Macedonia, PNP. Sonny graduated in 1942 with a business degree and joined the Army Air Corps. He was one of the prime movers behind the establishment of Beta Xi Chapter at Newark College of Engineering in 1952 and became the first president of the newly formed N.J.A.C. the same year. Sonny was active in various other community organizations, most notably the Colonial Country Club, Montclair YMCA, Unico and Elks of West Orange, and Montclair Academy Fathers Club. Brother-in-law of Hon. Joe DeGuglielmo, he is survived by his wife Nancy and son Robert.

DR. F.A. LOIERO Beta Iota

Charter member of Beta Iota, Utica College, and faculty advisor for many years Dr. Loiero died on Sept. 18, 1978 at age 67. Born and educated in Italy, he came to the United States in the early 1930's and pursued advanced degrees. In 1954 he was awarded his doctorate from Syracuse University. He was chairman of the language department at Utica College for many years, during which time he was initiated into Beta Iota Chapter (1949). As advisor, he inspired and directed the undergraduates to build strong and lasting fraternal traditions. In 1962 he resigned his post at Utica College to accept a position as full professor of foreign languages and department chairman at Massachusetts State College in Westfield, Mass.

FRANK A. CARCHEDI Beta Iota

On December 8, 1978, Bro. Carchedi, charter member of both Beta Iota and the Mohawk Valley Alumni Association, died at age 53. A local product of Utica, he served his country in WW II and was the recipient of numerous honors including the Purple Heart, Good Conduct Medal and American Service Medal. Upon graduation from Utica College in 1950, he pursued a career in the insurance industry. As a Certified Life Insurance Underwriter, he contributed to numerous professional, community and fraternal organizations. Bro. Carchedi was a past president of the MVAA. He is survived by his wife Nicholina, daughters Ann Marie and Maria, sons Peter and Jerome.

Beta Pi, after what many thought was the start of something big at St. John's, is once again inactive. At a meeting on Nov. 8th the members that were reinstated as Beta Pi Chapter in August felt that they could not successfully break the ties with those of their local fraternity and dedicate themselves totally to APD, the national fraternity. They voted to withdraw from Alpha Phi Delta and then changed their name to Beta Alpha Delta, a local fraternity. It is felt that a fresh group of unaffiliated undergrads can form a new Beta Pi sometime before the next convention.

News from 4-D Land concerning **Beta Delta** and **Beta Phi** has been sparse. Their brotherhoods are 20 and 37 strong respectively. **Beta Psi Colony's** story is told elsewhere.

Pi postponed their induction until January but managed to celebrate Christmas on time with a bash at the house.

Chi emphasized community and social activities, working for the Muscular Dystrophy Association and the Epileptic Foundation while running a social calendar that included the chapter's 50th Anniversary Party, a South Sea Luau, a Christmas Party and the annual Homecoming celebration. The chapter, which has ten active undergraduates, also did major house repairs and reinstated their chapter newsletter.

Psi managed to pull another miracle at the Annual Dance Marathon by collecting over \$5,000 in support of their marathon couple, and capture first prize as the marathon winners. Bro. Ed Franco and Mary Jo Flynn led the way for \$30,000 to be collected for MD. They had a small pledge class this spring and are at 27.

Beta Lambda's Chris Day has undertaken the task of editing the new Fifth District Newsletter. He is seeking contributions to cover the cost involved. It is hoped this will help the district be better informed of national and local happenings.
