When Beta Sigma took the first step towards reactivating Beta Beta Chapter at Manhattan College in the fall of 1975 by inviting Thomas Farina to participate in its pledge period, the seed of outstanding fraternalism was planted. Before he was initiated, he had already lined up five young men from Manhattan College, and by the end of the academic year, Beta Beta had been reactivated. It cannot be doubted that the excellence which characterizes that chapter today is the result of Tom Farina's hard work, common sense, and fraternal spirit.

As president this year, he was responsible for the successful celebration of Beta Beta's fiftieth anniversary.

WOW! LOOK WHAT WENT ON IN DOWNTOWN

Coming off a year of unprecedented initiation and revenue, the National Council has voted to support the work of its Executive Council and take bold new steps into the future. The 59th National Convention at the Downingtown Inn in Pennsylvania will long be remembered as the time Alpha Phi Delta "put its money where its mouth is" and began implementing vital national services for its undergraduates. Represented were sixteen chapters and thirteen alumni clubs, although total attendance barely reached the two hundred mark. Among the most important issues that confronted the National Council were plans to institute a paid Chapter Consultant at the start of the 1980-81 school year, funding proposals to establish the corporate tax structure of the National Fraternity and plans to re-district Alpha Phi Delta.



NATIONAL COUNCIL DELEGATES IN SESSION

Highlighting the Executive Council and three National Council meetings was the acceptance, as chartered chapters, of Beta Psi at The Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., Beta Omega at Pace University in New York City, and Gamma Beta at the University of Illinois Chicago Circle Campus. Also given official recognition as colonies were Gamma Gamma at Fairleigh Dickenson University, Madison, New Jersey, and Gamma Delta at Waynesburg College, Pa.

Among the most controversial and hotly debated issues was a proposal to establish a Chapter Consultant. This recent graduate and alumnus of APD would trouble shoot and assist chapters in their rushing, pledging and operating problems. He will have the opportunity to spend several days with a chapter, meeting with undergraduates and alumni alike, to work out the kinks of a chapter to assure its successful operation.

BETA BETA'S BEST

Beta Beta Chapter of Manhattan College was reactivated in 1975. Since that time, carefulness in the selection of worthy candidates has resulted in an extraordinary chapter which has become Alpha Phi Delta's role model for 1979.

By accenting the idea and ideal of fraternity during the pledge period, the chapter has developed strong bonds among its brothers. This is done without a chapter house of its own within which to conduct its activities. Before the pledge period begins, a smoker is held to which brothers of other chapters and alumni clubs of the district are invited. Thus, from the very beginning, the prospective pledges know that Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity is national.

The pledge program is well-organized. An essential part of it is the insistence that pledges attend the functions of the other chapters in the district where they can meet and talk to these brothers in a relaxed atmosphere. The initiations are conducted in accordance with the Ritual, with interesting and worthwhile additions. The pledges are given assignments that treat of various aspects of Italian culture. A test of their knowledge of Italian culture is part of the initiation. On the Sunday morning of the initiation all together attend Mass said in Italian in a parish

not far from the College.

Chapter meetings are conducted on a regular basis, run effectively they are productive and not excessively time consuming. The chapter has a close union with its faculty moderator, who is the Dean of Students of Manhattan College.

Beta Beta publishes from time to time *The Bulletin Board*, which gives news of the chapter and its brothers. This year, Beta Beta celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the granting of its charter. The dinner in celebration of this event was a huge success and was attended by National Officers, school officials, and many other friends and brothers of the Fraternity. An interesting feature of the evening was a film of the past events in Beta Beta which was put together in an ingenious manner. The Journal assembled for this affair is a model of its kind.

BETA BETA AND MANHATTAN COLLEGE

The members of the chapter represent nearly all departments of the institution. The cumulative index of the chapter is 3.1 out of 4.0 Fifteen members of the chapter are on the Dean's Academic Honor List. 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KAREER KORNER

ADVERTISING COPYWRITER

The first question is, *do you have it?* If you're interested in writing ads and commercials, take some courses at an arts and design school to make sure you have the talent. You can't learn how to be creative or original. In your classes, however, you'll be taught how to apply whatever talent you do have and see if you find it worthwhile.

You'll be disciplined on how to 'brainstorm' with other people, how to solve marketing problems, how to create and execute ads and commercials. In short, what to do, how to do it, and what to avoid. Most importantly, you will learn to create and manage a portfolio of your work.

The portfolio, or *book*, is your bill of goods. Ad agencies don't care about your height, weight, date of birth, excellent health, if your black, white, fat or skinny. They care only about your book because that book is *you*. It's their only indication of what you can do. Remember, you're hired for your creativity and nothing else.

Your book should consist of twelve or thirteen concepts artistically rendered to the point of resembling actual ads. Hire a freelance artist or art director to do the rendering. It's the best investment that you can make. Color photostats of the book should be made for distribution to agencies at their request.

The next step is finding an ad agency for which to work. Like everything else, it's a pretty tight market, so the choices might be few. You have nothing to lose, other than a day or two, by applying to agencies whose commercials and ads you really admire. When I saw the Volkswagen, Polaroid, and American Tourister advertising, I knew Doyle Dane Bernbach was the agency for which I wanted to work.

So, get your book together and knock on agency doors. If you can get by the Personal Dept., the person to see is called the Creative Director. Normally, you can leave your book with him or her. Aside from ad agencies, you can also apply to

Cited for bringing the National Scholarship Foundation into an era of unprecedented activity, Trent J. Ciarrochi, Past National President (1966-8), has been honored as APD's Outstanding Alumnus for 1979.

Active in the Fraternity since his undergraduate days at Psi Chapter (Duquesne University), he was a member of the Steubenville Alumni Club and later founded the Weirton Alumni Club. Having served on a National level since being elected Vice President in 1964, Trent was named Chairman of the Scholarship Foundation in 1976.

During the two years he has headed the Fund, contributions, investment returns and total scholarships awarded have reached record levels. This has allowed the Scholarship Trustees to award five scholarships in each of the last two years.

It is indeed a tribute to this man that he has chosen to give so much to the fraternity, whether it be serving locally with the alumni club, or as a National Officer, or as a Housing Trustee or as Chairman of the Scholarship Foundation. Through his outstanding work, he allows Alpha Phi Delta to give something back to its fine undergraduates.

The brothers of the Chapter are group leaders in the Freshman Orientation Program and participated in Open House Day. Included among the college-wide social activities, two were organized and conducted by Beta Beta: the Turkey Trot and the Columbus Day Coffee house. Worthy of attention is an activity initiated in the 1978-79 year. This was a monthly luncheon meeting; a different member of the College administration participated in this meeting every month with chapter brothers.

The District Governor can testify to the fact that, no matter how well the other chapters cooperate with him, none do it with as much enthusiasm as Beta Beta. They keep him completely informed about internal affairs, not only those that require his attention.

No initiation, no social function, no Third District sponsored function takes place without the presence of Beta Beta. No other chapter in the District can make this boast. As an example of continuing work, a 1979 graduate has taken over the duty of putting together the Journal for the Third District Annual Christmas Dance.

Nationally, the chapter worked hard to compile an up-to-date list of all Beta Beta alumni for Central Office. The chapter sends pertinent information to the editor of the Kleos while the National Expansion effort is also given attention by Beta Beta. Since reactivation, Beta Beta has been represented at every National Convention, and was the only eastern chapter that sent brothers to the 1979 mid-year meeting in Chicago. They are, without doubt, an outstanding chapter.

An uplifting feeling came about; this had been a very successful and rewarding week.

At the next chapter meeting, two goals were set. The first was to revive the then inactive Erie Alumni Club. Alumnus Lou Biacchi volunteered his support to assist the chapter. In early February the first alumni weekend was held. Persistence was rewarded when forty recent graduates attended the weekend.

The second goal was the need of a large spring pledge class. The motto "replace yourself" netted 16 of the most actively rushed freshmen on campus.

In order to achieve their rushing goals they needed to renovate the house. Realizing that car washes are not too successful in the winter and that a raffle would take forever, they looked elsewhere. Providing entertainment for the school seemed to be a way of acquiring quick cash and improving public relations. Since local social halls had all banned fraternities from their establishments due to poor past experiences, these inspired ten brothers acquired a hall and the two year absence of beer blasts on the Gannon Campus was now over. Beta Rho sponsored three blasts and repaired the house.

The brothers of Beta Rho have not stopped at being the social leaders on Campus. They have taken the initiative and leadership in assisting Alpha Phi Delta's expansion program at neighboring Behrend College of Penn State. In recent I.F.C. elections three of the top four positions were filled by A.P.D.s, including Jim Thompson being elected president.

As this year started the most charitable prediction concerning the fate of Alpha Phi Delta at Gannon College would have still been very dismal. One can be very proud in having the Beta Rho Chapter representing APD at Gannon College.

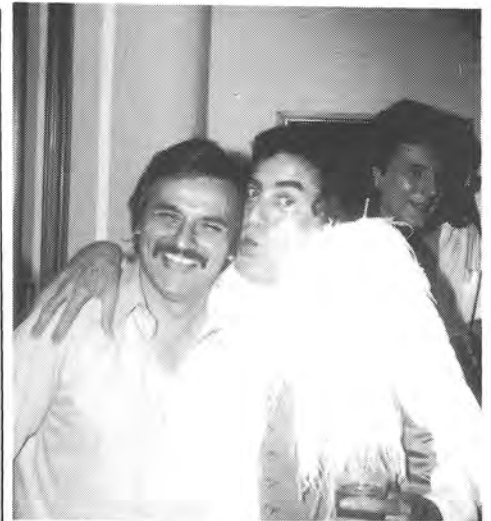
CONVENTION TIDBITS

This position will be budgeted at a \$12,000. level, to take effect in the fall of 1980. The idea, it was pointed out, is not new. During the Raffa Administration plans were initiated for a Traveling Secretary whose function would have been similar to that of the Chapter Consultant. The National Council saw fit to mobilize existing funds set aside for this purpose and create the Consultant position. President Barbarino has been charged with the creation of a selection and solicitation committee which will report to the Executive Council on its progress at their next meeting in January.

Meeting with unanimous approval was the proposal to allocate up to \$10,000. to establish the corporate tax structure of the National Fraternity, with the ultimate goal of establishing a non-profit foundation, similar to those of other national fraternities, through which APD can service its undergraduates and college communities.

Also voted upon unanimously was a constitutional amendment to expand the term of office of the Vice Presidents (excluding Executive V.P.) from two to four years. This move will allow these Executive Council members to plan, impliment, and complete long range projects and establish protocols for their offices to assure continuity during transition periods. A proposal to re-district Alpha Phi Delta into 10 districts, with notable changes in the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th districts, was tabled until the next National Council meeting. In the interim, President Barbarino will appoint a committee to study this area.

From the offices of Public Relations and Good & Welfare have come much activity. V.P. for Public Relations Pete Bertolino unveiled a chapter activity announcement poster (the first ever available nationally), and rush brochure which will spread the Alpha Phi Delta name around campus. Neil Anastasio, V.P. for Good & Welfare, announced the completion of the new *Dokime* and *Dokime Examination* while the rush manual, pledging manual, and chapter management manual are all nearing completion.

Other business included a report by Steve Feraca, V.P. for Cultural Affairs who represents APD on a committee to realize a Center for Italian Studies at Catholic University. Scott Willett, Beta Rho (Gannon College), was elected V.P. for Chapter Affairs by the undergraduate representatives. Rev. Stanley Otto, Chaplain of Psi Chapter, was voted honorary brotherhood.

Highlighting the business conducted was an address by Jack Anson, Executive Director of the National Interfraternity Conference, who expressed concern over the increasing number of hazing injuries and deaths that have occurred in recent years. He applauded APD's efforts in the Cultural Affairs area, citing this activity as a first among National Fraternities. He also encouraged year round rushing programs to combat the trend of decreasing college enrollment. Following his talk to the National Council, Mr. Anson chaired a workshop for the National Officers and alumni.

At the final session of the National Convention on Thursday, President Barbarino and Executive Vice President Carfang were re-elected to lead Alpha Phi Delta during 1979-80. Their jobs, as well as those of the Executive Council, are formidable. They can use every helping hand.
