## APD: A CLOSE LOOK

As we stand at the doorstep of a new decade, we face tremendous opportunities and challenges as an organization. We are carefully positioned to capitalize on our strength and to remedy our weaknesses thus maximizing the fraternal ideals which we all hold so close. But will we? The sad truth is: We have been here before.

### 1960 - 1978

This period was to shake the fraternity system to its roots. To be sure, 1960 began with all time highs in membership and number of chapters. We were strong and vibrant, however, we were deceived in the late 60's as college enrollments shot upwards while problems were developing.

Campus attitudes were changing rapidly. This was to affect us very suddenly when fraternity membership plummeted and several chapters died. Throughout the entire 1970's we were preoccupied with healing our wounds of previous years.

The statistics speak for themselves. In 1962 we had a record number of initiations, 255. By 1966 our membership had grown to an all time high of 699, we purchased several fraternity houses for our chapters, and Beta Sigma was initiated in 1962 bringing our chapter roster to 25.

Then in 1970, students in anger and protest, began questioning traditional values. Membership declined to such an extent that the period from 1966 through 1974 saw nine of our chapters close their doors. Initiation for the 1974-78 period averaged only 110 per year. In 1978 total undergraduate membership had plummeted to 320, a 50 year low. During this time period, through 1977, we added only one new chapter and it died a few years later. We had only 16 active chapters.

A careful analysis reveals, surprisingly, that APD was quite fortunate. Our leaders took unpopular positions but the strategies they formulated permitted us to survive. **We are the smallest national fraternity to survive this period.** Without question, the cost was high. We borrowed from the future. We depleted our capital resources and failed to invest properly in the maintenance and expansion of our houses. We provided only minimal services to our chapters and fought for day to day survival. Some of these costs are still being borne. The students of that time period are alumni today and they carry deep scars of resentment.

By the early 1970's we had depleted not only our financial resources

## CHAPTER CHATTER

As we approach the Midyear Meeting, the mid-point of the fraternal year, chapters have finished up the fall semester and are readying for an all out spring push. Generally, initiations for the fall were up and a good spring could put the count past the all time high. Chapters communicating with the *Kleos* reported the following:

**Beta Iota** completed a sound fall semester and looks forward to internal strengthening. Projects like housing stability, financial security and fund raising, social, cultural and campus activities have all been reviewed with representatives from the national organization. A sound program with specific goals is in the horizon.

About 65 brothers gathered on Thanksgiving Eve to honor one of APD's baby chapters, **Beta Omega** (Pace U.). Several visiting fraternal dignitaries, including President Barbarino, helped distribute membership scrolls and the chapter's charter. The chapter held a successful fall rush and pledge period initiating eight while holding several rush parties and a school-wide Disco Extravaganza.

**Gamma Gamma Colony** members were toasted by the North Jersey A.C. and area alumni at a cocktail party in their honor earlier in the fall. The colonists are lead by Al Scopelliti and are being trained by Glen Small (Beta Xi). The Colony held a fall pledge program and added five new colonists to the original seven.

**Beta Eta** (Brooklyn College) recently inducted five, ending a two year period during which time the chapter doubled in size. Guided by president Buddy Santamaria and pledgemaster Joe Visci, the chapter is reaching out on campus in various directions. They are organizing the formation of a sister sorority, and sponsored a Christmas party with two other student organizations.

**Gamma Zeta Colony** APD's newest entry, has run two successful inductions under the direction of Project Manager Jack Kellner (Theta Beta - N.Y.U. '77). The five colonists were chosen from contacts made at the freshman club fair in September. Newspaper ads and personal contacts followed, and the list of potential pledges grew to 25. From these, nine received bids to pledge. On November 13th, the college newspaper announced the presence of Alpha Phi Delta (the only fraternity on campus) at Queens College, Flushing, New York.

**Beta Beta** (Manhattan College), **Beta Sigma** (St. Francis College) and **Beta Xi** (N.J.I.T.) have inducted five, five and two, respectively during the fall. They, as well as other 3-D chapters, recently had their pledges participate in the 3-D Pledge Bowl. This event, a take-off on the old G.E. College Bowl, matched pledge group against each other in a pressure filled contest testing fraternal knowledge. The Beta Sigma pledges finished on top, handily, we might add.

**Beta Delta** (Temple) has sadly fallen into the inactive ranks. Reactivation projections look dim at this point. On the bright side, **Beta Phi** (Glassboro) welcomed seven new brothers into the fold of APD. The chapter boasts of many fine campus activities.

**Psi** (Duquesne) continued their string of successful semesters by inducting 15 in early October. Added to this the raising of some \$5,800. for Muscular Dystrophy and

## Cultural Affairs

The National Cultural Affairs Committee began its first year as a functioning entity dedicated to encouraging all undergraduates and alumni in the pursuit of cultural goals.

As of the 1978 National Convention, with the fraternity's formal rededication to the enhancement of the sense of Italian cultural heritage, this committee was given a mandate. The mandate seeks to instill into all entities of the fraternity a genuine appreciation of all aspects of Italian and Italo-American society **while simultaneously recognizing the ethnic background of each and every brother.**

What kinds of programs and projects might the local chapters and alumni clubs, undertake?

We are recommending that such activities strive to combine the social, scholarly and cultural. "Cultural" can range from a fraternal night at the opera, through the transcribing of notes from one's immigrant grandfather, to the savoring of truly traditional dishes.

Permit some examples,

1. Alpha Phi Delta has sponsored a proposal for the establishment of a Center for Italian Studies at Catholic University, in conjunction with the National Italian American Foundation.

2. Beta Upsilon (George Washington U.) operated two booths at the Alexandria, Virginia Italian Festival. The booths featured Italian delicacies, and accordionist playing traditional pieces.

3. On the last Sunday in April, The National Capital Alumni Club, will be co-sponsoring the third annual Festa di San Francesco di Paola which will include a mass, the traditional transporting of the saint's image on a local lake, band music, picnic and bocce tournament

4. One of our committee members reports that early this year he was active in organizing a group which viewed the Pompeii Exhibit at the Chicago Art Institute.

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## Expansion

Activity and growth are the words which best describe the expansion program for the first half of this APD school year. The largest districts (Western Pennsylvania & New York City) are each sponsoring two projects.

*Gamma Gamma Colony* (Fairleigh-Dickinson University, Madison, N.J.) has ten men; (*Gamma Delta Colony*) (Waynesburg College, Pa.) has seven men; *Gamma Epsilon Colony* (Behrend College of Penn State, Erie, Pa.) has 21 men; and *Gamma Zeta Colony* (Queens College, New York) has four men.

In addition to these four colonies, reactivation projects are underway at *Beta Chapter* (Columbia University), and *Epsilon* (S.U.N.Y. at Buffalo). Should the Buffalo project come through, it will represent the rebirth of a city which has been dead to APD since 1966. In addition, prospects at Cleveland State University could add a second city to the realm of APD, something the Fraternity has not seen since before World War II.

A significant facet of this activity is the cross section of brotherhood managing these projects. Glen Small, and undergraduate at Beta Xi is managing Gamma Gamma; Joe Creston (*Psi '49*) manages Gamma Delta; Scott Willett (*Beta Rho '81*) handles Gamma Epsilon while Jack Kellner (*Theta Beta '77*) works with Gamma Zeta. On the reactivation side, Tom Farina (*Beta Beta '80*) is working at Beta; Mike Piccuil (*Epsilon '66*) is pushing for restarting his old group; and Dr. John Muffo (*Beta Lambda '68*) is on the front lines in Cleveland.

The people involved are young and old, undergraduate and alumnus, married and otherwise, doctor, lawyer, public servant nuclear engineer. The expansion program would like to zero in on specific areas with the help of men like these.

The University of Pittsburgh (Nu) and the Ohio State University (Xi) are key areas. Also, an effort to establish an alumni association in the Albany-Schenectady-Troy, New York area will be pursued. Alumni interested in these projects should contact the author, care of the Kleos.

### Going into Accounting

Planning for a career in accounting will mean doing well up to and including the intermediate accounting course. Should you reach this level, begin planning for the future.

Now is the time to use your remaining school years productively. That is, involve yourself in activities that will make you stand out from the rest of the accounting majors in your class. Show participation and leadership in extra-curricular activities, sign up for accounting internships or summer job programs in the field. Also, a minor in computer science could prove helpful since the two fields are becoming more interrelated daily.

Next, prepare yourself for the interview process. Sign up for as many on-campus interviews as possible, or, obtain the names of firms and apply from the career guidance or placement office. You will be facing jobs in the public and private accounting areas. Investigate both areas via the interview.

Within the public, or auditing, field are a variety of different size of firms. Here, you will be able to get experience for the CPA exam. This exam should be taken as soon after graduation as possible. Passing the exam will allow you to operate like a baseball free agent; remain in public accounting or take your pick of a private company. Review courses are available for the exam. You can take and pass all parts of the test before you complete the experience requirement.

Upon choosing private accounting directly after graduation, working toward and MBA (Masters in Business Administration) is the wisest goal. This will allow you to compete with the CPA and even give you the proper experience to sit for the C.M.A. exam, a so-called "CPA exam for private accountants".

So begin now to prepare a good resume; stressing your strong points and playing up your accomplishments. Remember, this will get you that all important interview. Next, research the companies to which you are interested in applying. This will give the knowledge to conduct a meaningful interview.

Should the job market prove empty, continue looking, or begin on a Masters in accounting. The options are yours. Make intelligent choices by being well informed, and begin being well informed...NOW.

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but our good will with the chapters. Thus, the recovery of the 70's was very slow, but, we did not abandon the ideals and traditions that form the strong bonds of Alpha Phi Delta.

**1978 - 1979**

When Santo Barbarino and I took office in August, 1978, the struggle to build for a strong future began. In short, our national structure changed. Several staff Vice Presidents were appointed covering functional aspects of the fraternity. The authority of the district governors was reaffirmed as the first line management link to the entities. Our relationship with the National Interfraternity Conference was renewed, with high dividends. We began working closely with the chapters on membership and training. A new vitality lives within the membership. It is a spirit that shouts "We can, We will" and a deep feeling in each brother that says "we love Alpha Phi Delta".

The results speak for themselves. One new chapter was added in 1977, two in 78 and three in 79. Currently four colonies are in operation. This brings our total to 22 chapters and four colonies. By the end of this school year, we will have surpassed our previous record number of chapters.

Initiations jumped to 200 in the 1978-79 school year. We estimate 145 initiations for just the fall semester of 1979 and our total for the year could tie the all time high. The turn around had been dramatic.

**The 1980's**

This decade will be a challenge for APD. Fortunately, the momentum and cultivation of professional management is present to meet, head on, this challenge. The problem is strictly demographic - college enrollment is expected to decline 25% in the decade, most severely in the northeast and particularly at private schools. How will APD face these facts?

Chapter management will be a dominant theme. We must train our chapters to organize tightly. Our chapter consultant will be a full time advisor to the chapters with stronger alumni support as a necessary ingredient. Each chapter will then be better prepared to meet its own unique challenge.

Alumni support was all but abandoned in the 60's. Our survival during the period was due to the super human efforts of a dedicated few, We cannot depend on that in the future, Thus, we will establish programs to cultivate alumni support, updating mailing lists, publish directories, etc.

We must also enhance our relationship with school administrations. In the past, we had not properly developed these relationships and as a result, schools were quick to take firm action and even close some chapters. At the national level, we must establish contact with each University. However, this requires followup and maintainance at the local level. Alumni support is a key ingredient in this area.

Central Office must be completely revamped, even though it has been the backbone of APD for many years. The reason is simple. The strength of those individuals serving in these offices has obscured severe weaknesses in the rest of the national and local structure. In the future, our strength will come from the constitutional structure adopted in 1978. As for Central Office, it must become an efficient service bureau, a clerical extension of the National Officers and each entity.
