Midyear Mayhem: New York Style

On January 19th, the Third District hosted the Executive Council's Annual Midyear Meeting at the Holiday Inn at LaGuardia Airport in New York. The meeting itself lasted an incredible six hours in two sessions, followed by a National Housing Corporation meeting. Brothers throughout the country and district assembled for the meetings beginning near 10 A.M. President Barbarino called the session to order and business was well underway. Many reports and discussions followed, a summary of which follows.

Executive Secretary Raffa distributed the 1980 Undergraduate Directory. He reported that the first edition was well received in 1979. V.P.-Good & Welfare Neil Anastasio revealed plans to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Kleos with a new format in the early fall. Also, he reported on completion of the Recruitment Manual and progress on the Chapter Management and Pledging Manual.

V.P.-Chapter Affairs Willett asked chapters to pay particular attention to corresponding with his office and updating their alumni rosters during the upcoming semester. Tom Mauro, Esq., currently serving as National Counsel reported on progress being made with the tax and corporate structure of the fraternity.

The National Housing Corporation was disbanded and a new committee headed by Jules Zangrille and composed of Sam Catanzano, Joe Creston, Arnold Midili and Charles Fiore, Esq., will serve until the National Convention, when the National Council elects a new committee. Also, the issue of redistricting the fraternity was tabled until the Convention by which time all proposals will be studied and discussed.

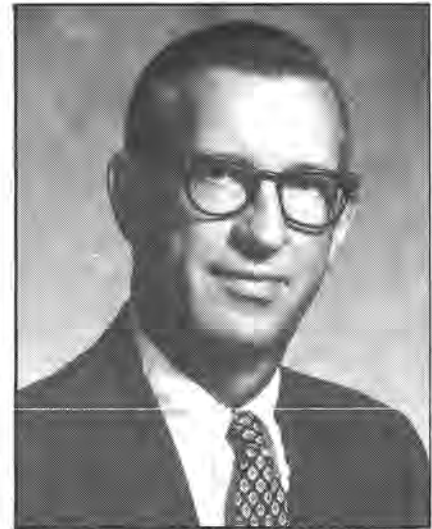

There's a degree of loyalty that seemingly is unsurpassed by any other fraternity. And that can only come from a solid base of ideals and experiences! Well into the spring semester, chapter activity turns its attention toward pledging and the traditional 'spring bashes'. Here's how APD celebrates the arrival of spring.

Beta Iota (Utica College) and **Beta Chi** (S.U.N.Y.-Utica/Rome) turned their collective attention toward the south with a journey to New York for the Midyear Meeting in January. A large representation from both chapters attended the meeting and cocktail party which followed.

Beta Xi (N.J.I.T.) played host to several out-of-town brothers during that weekend, the highlight of which was a wild and typical 'Beta Xi Blast' on the eve of the meeting. Led by Chuck Gruber, the chapter is pledging five, a campus high, and hosted a huge 'Casino Night' attended by over 150 people from the campus community. Graduating three this spring, they are the first to make a serious move to purchase their house from the Fraternity.

Theta Beta (N.Y.U.) is trying to overcome a serious housing problem caused by increased numbers and enthusiasm among the brothers. The chapter apartment is now inadequate to house the large chapter (over 30), and the many brothers who would like to live on campus. Unable to take advantage of a school-supported proposal which established a five floor building to house fraternities, the brothers have taken out their frustrations on the basketball court. Their unstoppable five, coached by Tom Modica, Theta Beta '79, is currently on an intramural tear. Led by Angelo Reppucci, the housing problem appears to be a major concern this spring.

Congratulations to Peter Cordovano, **Beta Beta** (Manhattan College), Gerard Visci, **Beta Eta** (Brooklyn College), Ralph Corrado, **Beta Sigma** (St. Francis, Brooklyn) and Vinny Guttilla, **Beta Omega** (Pace U.). These men were elected to lead their respective chapters during the current year.

Gamma Zeta Colony (Queens College) is fresh off the initiation of three colonists in early December, are pledging again with a group of three. Plans are ready for reactivation of **Beta Pi** (St. John's), a natural sister chapter given the proximity of the two.

The weekend of March 14th symbolized perhaps the most important occasion in the history of **Chi Chapter** (Penn State), the 51st Anniversary of Founders Day. The brothers conducted a well organized telephone and mail campaign to over 200 alumni from all over the country. The festivities ranged from an Italian dinner to the swearing in of Joe Paterno as an honorary brother of Chi Chapter. Further details will appear in the next issue of the Kleos.

Dial 'E' For Escort



The Glassboro (N.J.) State College Student Government Assn. recently began running a student escort service. No, it's not a dial-a-date service for lonely college students, but an all-volunteer program designed to help students who travel the campus alone at night to arrive home safely. The 35 members of APD's Beta Phi chapter comprise over 25% of the volunteers.

Under the program, the flashlight-toting volunteers are sent to all parts of the campus and surrounding areas of the town between 9 PM and 3AM to accompany students who desire the service. Any student wanting an escort simply dials a specific number and an escort is dispatched to walk with the student to his or her destination.

Previous attempts to initiate the program failed as recently as last year. The difference this year has been the enthusiastic support of Beta Phi. Not only is the chapter reigning supreme on campus as the number one fraternity, but they have been active within the district and locally.

Last spring the chapter initiated a program of joint induction with Beta Xi chapter (N.J.I.T.) with resounding success. The tradition has been established and brothers of both chapters anxiously await the spring gathering to share fraternalism and spirits at Glassboro.

The chapter hopes to obtain housing in the very near future with the assistance of the area alumni. Also, plans are underway for the Annual Spring Formal, and support of a reactivation project at Beta Delta (Temple U.) But, the bottom line of Beta Phi's success is their untiring support of campus and community affairs. They are leaders at Glassboro, and are quite respected as a result.

CAREER CORNER

School Psychology

School psychologists are currently in demand, due to the recent passage of Federal legislation mandating a free public education for all children, including those with handicapping conditions (Public Law 94-142).

They work with children who generally cannot make it in the "mainstream" i.e. the standard educational curriculum. The psychologist in the schools evaluates these children in order to determine whether or not they are eligible for special educational services. The range of services could be as minimal as having a special tutor take the student out of their regular classroom for two periods a week, or as extensive as a totally self-contained class for the entire school day. Sometimes even this is not enough, and a private residential facility must be located to meet this child's individual needs.

Qualifications for becoming a school psychologist vary from state to state. In general, minimum requirements include a master's degree in psychology, and in my home state of Illinois, the completion of a one year internship. The latter involves doing the daily work required of a school psychologist, but under the direct

supervision of someone fully certified with three years experience.

Competition for graduate programs is stiff. A solid undergraduate grade point average is necessary, but good letters of recommendation and volunteer experience could also work in your favor. Of course, classes in psychology are needed to get into a graduate psychology program, but one need not necessarily major in this subject. One of my classmates was a history major, and took psychology as a minor. In my opinion, a good foundation in education is very helpful. Many of the referrals to school psychologists involve remediation of one or more subject areas, e.g. reading, math, etc.

A career in school psych is one which many education majors might want to look into further. With declining enrollments, the outlook for teachers is bleak, unless one were going into special education, e.g. learning disabilities. The hours are great, the fringe benefits super, and the salary competitive. For further information, sources included: 1) the library; 2) your school education or psychology department; and 3) your state's professional psych organization. Good luck!
