Three New Chapters Inducted In Toronto

Suppose they gave a convention and nobody came. That almost happened in 1987 in Toronto, Canada where Alpha Phi Delta had the smallest convention crowd in history. With only 35 Alpha Phi Delta people registered in the huge, beautiful Sheraton Centre in downtown Toronto, it certainly was a quiet convention. But those who didn't come missed one of the **finest** convention facilities that has ever hosted our fraternity. The Sheraton Centre and the city of Toronto offered a tremendous amount of activities and sites to visit.

There were plenty of sites to choose from — many in walking distance. Some of the more famous were the CN Tower, Casa Loma (a huge 100 room castle), Eaton Centre, Yonge Street, Canada's Wonderland, the downtown underground mall (starting right at the Sheraton), Toronto Zoo, and more places than you can visit in a day at the CNE. Restaurants were in abundance and not expensive considering the 30% exchange bonus on American money. Getting around on the Transit System was easy — and the subway was the cleanest this writer has ever seen.

As a convention, this year's assembly lacked the distinction of being a National Council meeting (as that meeting has been moved to the winter to accommodate the undergrads) but it did convene an Executive Council meeting. One of the items discussed was to try to keep some National Council business at next year's summer convention to keep interest up in it.

The highlight of the meeting (and the highlight of the entire year) was the expansion of the fraternity. Three more chapters were inducted into the fraternity bringing the total number of chapters brought in this year to seven — the best year in fraternity history for expansion. The latest schools brought in under the Alpha Phi Delta umbrella are **William Paterson College** (Gamma Nu) in Wayne, NJ., **Stony Brook College** (Gamma Omicron) in Wading River, NY., and the **University of Southern Connecticut** (Gamma Xi) in New Haven, CT. These new chapters have 14, 7 and 7 colonists each. All three chapters were brought into the Third District, which is bulging at the seams. Since the Third District is undermanaged with 13 chapters and 5 alumni clubs, a moratorium was placed on further expansion in this area until a reassessment can be made — hopefully at the 1988 National Council meeting.

On the negative side of the ledger, the fraternity lost two

chapters during the past year. Gamma Epsilon at Cleveland State and Omicron at the University of Michigan were officially declared inactive. The loss of Omicron furthers the inability of Alpha Phi Delta to maintain an existence on the campuses of large universities.

The Ninth District was abolished. Beta Lambda chapter of St. Francis College of Loretto (the only entity in the district) was moved back into the Fifth District — where it had previously been for over 30 years.

Steve Hartman was appointed as Sixth District Governor. Past governor Vic Castro has recently moved out of that area.

Utica was selected as the site of the 1988 National council meeting. The meeting is to be held in early March. Joe Malecki, Second District Governor, was appointed as the convention coordinator. The two chapters in Utica are both celebrating anniversaries in 1988 — Beta Iota (Utica College) its 40th and Beta Chi (SUNY) its 10th.

Five sites were recommended for the 1988 National Summer Convention. A return to the resort conventions was favored, and The Granite in Kerhonksen, NY was chosen for further evaluation. The site will be advertised in The Kleos when it is selected.

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Scholarship Awards Total \$8,250

The Alpha Phi Delta Foundation Scholarship Division awarded a record \$8,250.00 in scholarships to eleven individuals. The amount and number of recipients are both an increase over last years total of \$7,500.00 awarded to 10 students. The total funds under the umbrella of the Scholarship Division nears \$150,000.00 (up from \$130,000.00 last year) and continues to grow. Major contributions were received in the last year from the Mohawk Valley Alumni Club (\$10,000), the Southern California Alumni Club, the Pittsburgh Alumni Club (\$2,000) and the Ladies Auxiliary of Alpha Phi Delta - Pittsburgh Chapter (1,500). Donations are tax deductible.

The 1987 year marked the end of the Scholarship Fund's chairmanship under Trent Ciarrocchi. After ten years of

chairing the Foundation and watching its assets multiply tremendously, Trent decided to step down and pass the mantle of leadership on to Stan Raffa, Past National President. Trent will remain on the Foundation as a trustee.

Scholarship awards are open to all members of Alpha Phi Delta, their wives, sons, daughters, sisters, brothers, grandchildren and friends. In order to be eligible, an applicant must be attending college or graduate school or be a high school senior planning to matriculate in the coming year. Scholarship applications for 1988 will be available next March (watch for the ad in the next issue of The Kleos) and must be completed by June 30th. The foundation encourages all eligible members and relatives to apply.

Where Have All The Alumni Gone?

This article is not about money. It is not directly for alumni only, either. Obviously, as an undergraduate fraternity, with our roots on the college campuses, most members of Alpha Phi Delta were undergraduate brothers before becoming alumni brothers. **That** is just the point and the whole focus of this piece. In recent years, many if not most of our graduating seniors are **not** becoming alumni brothers. One of the strongest points of pride of our fraternity, the one the bigger Nationals have long envied us for, our strong, organized alumni clubs, is now becoming a weak link at a rate that is now approaching a crisis situation.

This is not something that is necessarily cyclical, and it absolutely does not have to be. However, we can take a lesson from those graduates of the late '50s and early '60s. Where are these people now? This whole generation, now in their mid to late 40's, should be the leaders and shakers in the fraternity right now. Instead, by and large they disappeared. The current generation of leaders, those who graduated in the early and mid '70s, apparently got on the bandwagon just in time. Not so the current graduating classes of the '80s.

Why are we in the process of losing another generation of potential alumni, of potential leaders? Part of the blame can be placed on the alumni clubs themselves. Seven or eight years ago, we had 18 alumni clubs in the fraternity. We can count 12 now. And of those 12, criticism can be leveled across the board at all of them. Most do not go out and recruit recent graduates, even from chapters that have close ties to them. They wait for those new alumni to come knocking at the door, and it is just not happening.

To give two brief examples, several months ago, when discussing this topic with Kleos Editor John Russo, John indicated that at Duquesne in the early '70s, he considered it automatic that when he graduated, if he stayed in the area, he was going to join the Pittsburgh Alumni Club. The P.A.C. has not recruited a Psi graduate since 1981. In New Jersey, the brothers at Beta Xi had it hammered into them the same way that they would be going into the North Jersey Alumni Club upon graduation. Today, several are staying in the area and have not joined.

Of course, other alumni clubs have never gone in for "pledging on the graduate level". They believe in the "10 year rule" which I also call the "Randazzo Theory". I only refer to it that way because Joe Randazzo of the Long Island Alumni Club first explained it to me upon my own graduation in 1972. The theory goes, when a brother graduates, he gets a job, works his way into whatever career he chooses, gets married, buys a house in the suburbs, has two kids, and after 10 years he's now looking for something to do and remembers his fraternity, contacts his local alumni club, and becomes active. I've actually seen this work in some cases, but I'm willing to bet that for each man who falls out of the sky and gets back active this way, 100 others are lost forever.

The other side of the coin is the chapters themselves. They are not promoting the perpetuation of Alpha Phi Delta beyond graduation. As in many big National they "used to be in a fraternity". This shouldn't ever be part of any brother's mentality. You **are** still in Alpha Phi Delta and **can be** an active, productive member if you so desire. Personally, I was actually looking forward to it in '72. Hey, as an undergrad I was always broke. When I got out of school and got a job I could afford to go to all of the dinners, parties and conventions I couldn't before. The idea of perpetual membership is not being sold to pledges, nor is it being promoted throughout a brother's life-span in his chapter. Something must be done on this level to change attitudes.

The crisis we are facing is apathy from both quarters. The alumni clubs don't care and the graduating seniors don't care either. We are losing one of the main things that made us unique from the TKEs and the Theta Chis. We are also losing a generation of leaders of the 1990s. I believe it is high time for a turnaround.

Every alumnus must also set a goal or goals each year towards the betterment of the fraternity. Many great achievements have been made for the fraternity by small groups of brothers since Alpha Phi Delta was founded in 1914. Alpha Phi Delta is something worth caring about, and its existence today is an example of that. If more of our alumni became active, we could increase our strength dramatically, improve and expand.

"FACIAMUS!" That's our motto which is Latin for "Let's Act!" Remember, you **can** make a difference. It's up to you. **MAKE IT HAPPEN!**

Beta Chi Realizes Goal By Capturing Outstanding Chapter Award

Until now, we've never had a name for it; but the brothers of Beta Chi have been practicing and refining the use of **ACTION** since the chapter's inception in 1977. Among others, some of the true **ACTION** Masters are Brothers Gary D. Cuda, Glenn Sheldon, and this year's president, Randy Brown.

Under Randy's leadership, the chapter achieved goals that have been only talked about in the past. Among those efforts are the implementation of a test-file, which helps the brothers to better prepare for exams; and taking steps toward protecting the chapter both financially and legally by incorporating Beta Chi.

The chapter also took a step into community involvement to a degree that I doubt can, or will, be matched. The brothers became part of the General Casimir Pulaski Highway Improvement Foundation. Beta Chi brothers and alumni hold many seats on the board of directors. They successfully solicited over \$10,000 in grants and private contributions. They used most of this money to create rosebeds and plant trees along the 2 mile stretch of highway. In all, some 400 rosebushes, and 1200 little trees were planted by the brothers. The brothers worked religiously every Saturday for 2 months on preparing and planting. Weekdays they spent in committee meetings with the Utical Common Council, State Senators and Assemblymen, even a Congressman. Every group they came in contact with was both pleased and surprised that a fraternity would go this far to help a community where most of the brothers are transients. They received quite a bit

of recognition from the media and passing motorists who yelled praises and tooted their horns as they went by . . . Well . . . they yelled SOMETHING, and I definitely heard some horn blowing.

The brothers received immediate gratification for their good deeds, but more importantly, they worked together to achieve a goal that should last a lifetime. Just like pledging. Forty years from now, maybe the brothers will get together in Utica and look at the work they did back in 1987.

In addition to the aforementioned projects, the brothers of Beta Chi have also kept up their traditional obligations. This year, they successfully organized four blood drives, held their 3rd Annual Christmas Toy Drive, raised thousands of dollars for the school's foundation during this year's annual Phon-A-Thon, helped Jerry's kids by hosting a MDA Dance Marathon, and most importantly, initiated 10 new brothers into their ranks.

A small company with full-time workers would have trouble keeping up this schedule. To be a full-time student and still be able to accomplish all of this is truly remarkable. Something we can **ALL** be proud of. If you should come to Utica and wear your colors, you can rest assured that you will be warmly received by the people of this community, as well as the entire population of SUNY College of Technology.

It is my opinion that the brothers of Beta Chi have exemplified the true meaning of Alpha Phi Delta. They should serve as an example for other chapters to follow. A group that works this hard, must not go unrecognized. They've set their sight on the Outstanding Chapter Award, and have worked toward it for years. Now they have realized their goal.

Garry quickly took an active role in the chapter and the district even as an undergraduate. He held various leadership roles in the chapter and continues his activity with Beta Xi and the North Jersey Alumni Club (of which he serves presently as secretary).

I would ask the brothers, who might not be familiar with Garry (a.k.a. Deacon) to remember that the alumnus award reflects a brothers contribution to present date. While this past year may not have been his most visible, it was another year of fraternalism for him reflecting on his past deeds and accomplishments. Gary has given a lot to Alpha Phi Delta: stability, prestige, and more than most of us can realize. realize.

He served on various fraternity committees and is one of the few undergrads who is active and knowledgeable of National affairs.

On the chapter level, Frank was inducted at Beta Omega in the Spring of 1982. He has served as both President and Pledgemaster of Beta Omega and is currently President of Gamma Iota. He is active in the Pace University Greek Council at both the New York and Pleasantville Campuses. He organized many events for both chapters and the district, including the Pledge Bowl twice.

Frank Farina has had an outstanding year and an outstanding career as an undergraduate and is a worthy recipient of this award. This award runs in Frank's family — his brother Tom received this same honor in 1980.

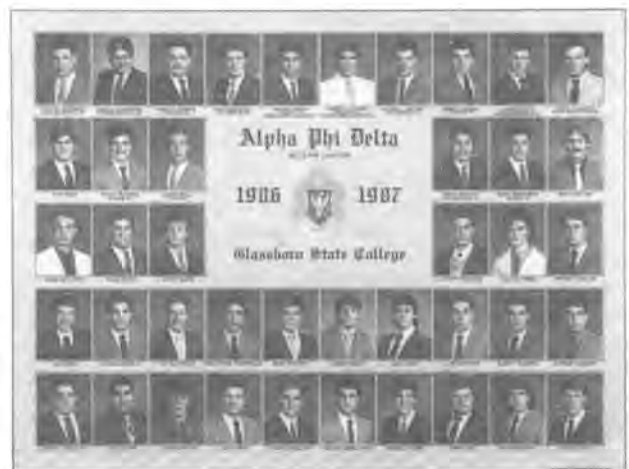

Three Beta Theta Men Honored By Alma Mater

In conjunction with its 40th Anniversary Celebration, the Franciscan University of Steubenville, Steubenville, Ohio (formerly College of Steubenville) initiated its first annual Alumni Awards Banquet since the founding of the College of Steubenville in 1946. This year, incidentally, marks the founding of Beta Theta Chapter, the school's first National Fraternity and still its strongest.

Out of the ten awards given that evening, three were received by men of Alpha Phi Delta, in recognition of outstanding achievement in their respective career fields. The gentlemen are Dr. John Mantica, Mr. Andrew Qualtire, and the Honorable John J. Mascio, J.D.

Dr. Mantica received the Fr. Dan Egan Award in recognition of a distinguished career in medicine. Dr. Mantica was a member of the first graduating class of the College of Steubenville (1950), the school's first graduate to enter medical school, and the first graduate to become an M.D. He has practiced medicine in Steubenville for 32 years, and served as Chief of Staff and Chairman of the department of medicine for St. John Medical Center in Steubenville.

Mr. Andrew Qualtire was first recipient of the Fr. Columba Devlin Award, in recognition of his success in the field of education. Since his graduation from the College of Steubenville in 1959, Mr. Qualtire has advanced through a notable career in education to his present position as Executive Director of the Ohio Mideastern Regional Service Agency, an educational computer research center, and as Chairman of the Board of Education for the Diocese of Steubenville school system.

The **Honorable John J. Mascio, J.D.** received the President's Law Award, given in recognition of outstanding achievement as a lawyer or jurist. A 1962 Steubenville graduate, Judge Mascio has practiced law both privately and in public service. He served as Steubenville's Law Director for 13 years, and is presently Common Pleas Court Judge for Jefferson County.

Both Brothers Qualtire and Mascio were President of Beta Theta Chapter during their undergraduate days. Brother Mascio was a recipient of the Outstanding Undergraduate Award in 1962, and his chapter, Beta Theta, the Outstanding Chapter for that year.

Dr. Valletutti Elected As New Executive Director of CIAA

Dr. Joseph F. Valletutti, Honorary brother of Alpha Phi Delta '74, was unanimously elected as the new Executive Director of the Coalition of Italo-American Associations.

Over the last 20 years, Dr. Valletutti has served the needs of the Italian-American community. As Executive Director of the Americans of Italian Descent Inc., he was committed to combatting discrimination, defamation and stereotyping as it affected graduate school admissions, recruitment, tenure and promotion in the educational system for university faculty. Dr. Valletutti has also committed time and energy towards promotion in government agencies; vacancies in public housing; and public benefits under welfare programs.

Prior to his ten years with the Americans of Italian Descent, Dr. Valletutti headed the first Italian-American organization to be federally funded, the Italian-American Center for Urban Affairs, Inc. This organization conducted the first demographic study of the characteristics of the Italian-American community living in New York City.

Dr. Valletutti has an outstanding reputation for his social service contributions and fundraising campaigns on behalf of Italian-American needs. As he puts it, Dr. Valletutti is "obsessed with the Italian language, its people, culture and history." He claims no greater loyalty than to his heritage and tries to live up to its exacting demands.

A priority for Dr. Valletutti is to revive the Italian language and culture to cultivate a sense of background and pride among Italian youth. He has "a personal affinity towards assuring education in young people because it is the only vehicle for upward mobility." Dr. Valletutti still feels there is prejudice towards Italians, but that its nature is more subtle, masked in the guise of reverse discrimination. "Italians are being passed over because of the affirmative action policies that exist," he said.

Report on A.P.D.'s 1986 Outstanding Alumni Club Brooklyn Alumni Club — IN TRANSITION

The Brooklyn Alumni Club was reactivated in 1976 by a group of recent graduates from Beta Sigma, Theta Beta and Beta Eta. During the early years, the club was extremely youth oriented; growing in size by attracting new members from each succeeding graduating class within the Third District. The activities included many social events such as trips to Atlantic City, Broadway Plays, Beach Parties, Nites at the Race Track, Sports and Bar Hopping. The average age of the club membership remained below 25 through the early 1980's.

Today, the core members of the BAC are still the founding brothers who signed on in the late seventies. The normal age of the active club member is now in the early thirties. As evidenced by the accompanying picture, these members are now involved in families as well as increasing career responsibilities. This has made it much more difficult for these members to maintain their past levels of activity within the fraternity. The BAC has responded to this change in its membership's status by offering a social calendar that includes more family oriented events such as pool parties, a Kiddie Christmas Party and Yankee Stadium trips.

While the BAC still attracts new members from the ranks of the recent graduates, they tend to be fewer and less active. The age gap and different interest present a real challenge in providing a club that responds to the needs of the recent graduates as well as the veteran membership.

The single most important stabilizing influence has been the BAC Softball Team which is in its twelfth year of organized competition.

It's unusual speaking of a generation gap between 23 year olds and 33 year old within the fraternity. It would seem to be much more appropriate to discuss for a club with an age span of 25-30 years between members. However, the BAC has found that there is a world of difference between the carefree 23 year old bachelor, fresh out of school, and the 33 year old family man who is working his way up the corporate ladder. What they are each looking for from an alumni club is extremely different. The BAC has recognized this issue and is faced with a very challenging transitional period.

ALPHA PHI DELTA FOUNDATION

The following article is a position paper that was published earlier this year by Anthony J. Carfang, Past National President, past Foundation Chairman and present Foundation board member.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Alpha Phi Delta Foundation is fourfold:

- To preserve, manage and grow the assets of the Alpha Phi Delta organization.
- To promote and fund educational, cultural and philanthropic activities.
- To encourage and support scholastic achievement, and
- To facilitate housing for undergraduate chapters.

GOVERNMENT

The Alpha Phi Delta Foundation is governed by a five person board of directors. The by-laws provide that the board be comprised of the current President of Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity, Inc. and the four most recent living past presidents. In this way, the board will be well informed of the needs and opportunities of the undergraduate fraternity yet removed from the short term pressures and politics of the fraternity. The board elects a chairman annually from among the directors.

ORGANIZATION

In order to achieve the purposes stated in its articles of incorporation, the Foundation has organized its activities into three distinct divisions. Each division is managed by an Executive Director and staffed by volunteers from within the fraternity. All members of the fraternity are welcome to participate in the activities of the three divisions. The three divisions are:

- Scholarship Division
- Housing Division
- General Division

SCHOLARSHIP DIVISION

This division operates under a pre-existing trust agreement. Annually, the Scholarship Division awards financial gifts to deserving student applicants.

The endowment level exceeded \$130,000 as of 12-31-86.

This is the most visible division within the Foundation. Fund raising is active and the annual presentation of the awards is a highlight of the summer convention. The high level of activity in the Scholarship Division reflects the commitment of both the Fraternity and the Foundation to scholastic excellence.

HOUSING DIVISION

The objective of the housing division is to facilitate undergraduate chapter housing, primarily through secured, market rate mortgages.

Upon the formation of Alpha Phi Delta Foundation in 1980, the Housing Division became responsible for the management of several properties owned by the "Alpha Phi Delta Building Corporation". Since 1980, the Division has refinanced, refurbished, and

sold all but one of the properties.

The Housing Division has recently implemented a pilot mortgage program designed to encourage local alumni to invest in housing for their chapters. Secured financing is provided by the Housing Division as a supplement to local sources. Currently, two alumni groups, the Beta Xi Foundation and the Beta Lambda Alumni, are participating in the program.

The division had a book value of approximately \$120,000 as of 12-31-86.

GENERAL DIVISION

This division accomplishes a number of functions. Among its functions, it

- Provides grants for educational, cultural and philanthropic activities,
- Conducts alumni fund raising activities,
- Handles the administrative affairs of Alpha Phi Delta Foundation, and
- Conducts research and planning activities for the Foundation's Board of Directors.

The General Division had assets of approximately \$8,000 as of 12-31-86.

GOALS

Alpha Phi Delta Foundation, in mid-1987, will embark upon a major research and planning process. This will result in a set of strategic goals for each of the three divisions. Although still in the formative steps of the process, the Directors are optimistic that a strong, new vision will emerge.

BACKGROUND

Following its formation in 1980, the Foundation was required to resolve numerous administrative matters. Although these matters consumed considerable time and energy, they were resolved favorably. The next step was to build and staff a working organizational structure. Now that such a structure is in place, we can look to the future.

The following is a brief account of some of the Foundation's activities since 1980.

Tax Related Matters — For several years prior to 1980, the Fraternity's corporate charter had lapsed and income tax returns were not filed. With considerable assistance from the National Interfraternity Conference and an outside law firm which we hired, we were able to reinstate the Fraternity's corporate charter. We successfully petitioned the Internal Revenue Service to grant the Foundation tax exempt status.

Housing Cash Flow — In 1980, the Fraternity ran a housing program which consisted of five undergraduate houses. In a typical year, cash outflows exceeded inflows by \$10,000. This was due to rent delinquencies, high utility bills, maintenance requirements and an inadequate rent structure. The Housing Division instituted a multifaceted program which restored a positive cash flow by

1982.

Refinancing — To finance the maintenance upgrade program and to take advantage of falling interest rates, the Housing Division was recapitalized. In some cases, mortgages were renegotiated, additional funds were borrowed at favorable rates, and high cost mortgages were repaid.

Liquidation — The long term objective of the Housing Division is to provide supplemental financing to local alumni groups for chapter housing. The secondary objective is to discontinue the prior policy of owning properties outright. Since 1980, four of the houses have been sold; two to alumni groups and two to outsiders. Only one house, at Beta Rho chapter, remains under Foundation ownership.

Scholarship — With the IRS tax exemption in hand, the Scholarship Division undertook a major fund raising program. Assets which stood at \$20,000 in 1977 grew to over \$130,000 in 1986.

The tax exemption was the catalyst for several local scholarship funds to merge with the Scholarship Division. Individual contributions grew as well with the largest, individual gift of \$10,000 received in 1986.

Grants — The General Division reviews applications for grants and makes recommendations to the Foundation board. In three of the last four years, grants have been awarded to Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity, Inc. for chapter management training and educational publications. In 1986, a grant was made to Omicron chapter for membership education.

Publications — The General Division recently received a \$6,000 contribution from the Pittsburgh Alumni Club to begin an endowment for educational publications for the Fraternity.

Research — The General Division commissioned Gatto Training Associates to conduct an attitudinal survey of Alpha Phi Delta alumni. The results are now being tabulated. They should provide considerable direction for the strategic plan.

SUMMARY

Since its inception in 1980, the Alpha Phi Delta Foundation has been gaining momentum in its quest to position all Alpha Phi Delta entities for the 21st century. After expending considerable time, energy and resources to lay the ground work, the organization has fallen into place. We are optimistic that substantial gains are now within sight.
