'89 CONVENTION OUTSTANDING

The 1989 National Council meeting of Alpha Phi Delta was held over the weekend of February 17, 18 and 19th in Pittsburgh with a huge attendance. For the first time in recent memory, every undergraduate chapter in the fraternity was represented at the two-day sessions of meetings. Under the leadership of National President Al Fafara, the meetings were run smoothly and relatively quickly considering the large amount of business conducted.

Not only was every chapter present and seated with two delegates for the meetings, but many chapters came with groups of brothers. Two of the largest contingents were Beta Pi from St. John's (they came as a group on an Amtrak train out of New York City) and Gamma Eta from Trenton State. Both chapters came with about 15 brothers. Also well represented were Gamma Kappa, Gamma Lambda, Beta Beta, Gamma Nu, Beta Delta, Beta Eta, and Gamma Omicron. One of the new expansion groups, Baruch College, was also in attendance although not seated as delegates.

In addition to all chapters being represented, nine out of our fourteen alumni clubs were represented at the meetings. All Past National Presidents since 1970 (except for Santo Barbarino) were present at the meetings. Seven out of eight District Governors were there. All told there were over 190 brothers at the weekend convention. A grand and glorious representation of brotherhood.

Along with the excellent attendance, all chapters were current in their financial obligations to the fraternity. This was another point that would have to be researched to find out when was the last time that no outstanding bills were due to national. These two points put the fraternity in a good position to make 1989 an outstanding year — a fitting 75th Anniversary.

Al Fafara was elected to a second term (year) as National President. One of the surprises of the weekend was the election for National Vice-President. Joe Rahtelli, incumbent to the position, was initially up for re-election and unopposed (which is typical for a second term). However, days before the meeting, Gary Cuda, who is a Beta Chi alumnus and President of the Mohawk Valley Alumni Club, threw his hat into the ring. After some debate and discussion, Rahtelli survived the election for a second year as Vice-President.

On a negative note, the fraternity is being sued by a young man who was partially paralyzed at an accident in Glassboro, New Jersey. He is suing Alpha Phi Delta and two other fraternities for allegedly getting him drunk at rush parties, and then allowing him to drive home (at which point he had an accident in his car). This incident occurred in 1987. President Fafara has authorized \$10,000 to put a lawyer on retainer to defend the case. Stemming from this incident, the fraternity also authorized the expenditure of \$4,251 to buy Liability Insurance.

On the legislation end of the meetings, only a few items were passed. A provision to abolish "Little Sister" groups among the chapters passed. All existing groups are to be phased out, and no new ones are allowed to start. Life membership was also abolished. An amendment to bring back National Alumni Dues had been circulated, but was not brought up for legislation. Instead Life Membership was dropped to allow the Foundation to solicit for annual contributions among alumni. An alumnus in good standing with the fraternity will now be determined by alumni club membership. Foundation mailings will explain this in more detail. Legislation defining an undergrad as a student enrolled in school as an undergraduate and an alumnus as someone who is not an undergraduate passed. (If you're confused about that one, it was brought up to define status of undergrads who drop out of school and still want to participate with their chapter.)

Pledging Does NOT Have To Be A Dying System

During the summer of 1988, Zeta Beta Tau National Fraternity announced that it was abolishing pledging and a pledge period as a means of recruiting, indoctrinating, and screening potential new members for its brotherhood. Instead, it would be replaced by a non-formalized "screening" process during its chapters' rush periods. What it means basically is, sign your name, pay your fees, and if you're not proven to be an axe murderer, you're in. The reason given for this was primarily the hazing problem. What ZBT stated was that they could not control it, it could not be controlled, the potential liability exposure was too great, so let's just say the hell with it.

At our own recent National Council Meeting in Pittsburgh this past winter, several of our own distinguished alumni went on record as saying that by the year 2000, pledging would also cease to exist in Alpha Phi Delta, as well as in the entire Greek Fraternity System. Though not stated, I assume their reasoning is similar to that of Zeta Beta Tau's. To those alumni and other National Fraternities who are of the same valition, I say bunk.

What has traditionally made the fraternity system different, stronger, better, and more lasting than most other college social groups is that the fraternities never were "open admissions" organizations. All candidates for membership had to go through a trial period where they proved themselves worthy of belonging. During the course of this trial period, the fraternity membership had the right of refusal or "blackballing" over any candidate. Let's face it, not all college students fit in with a fraternity, and I do not mean that in a negative or discriminatory way. Each fraternity has its own "personality" and has the right to take in those members who will "fit in", get along and work side by side with the current brothers. The great sticking point, and that which has everybody up in arms about, is what exactly goes into this trial or pledge period?

Pledging should be a time where the brothers get to know the pledges and vice-versa. Pledges are taught to respect the brothers which is understandable, since they must respect them later on as peers. Another thing pledging teaches is self restraint which is important later on. We cannot have brothers beating the hell out of one another over every little disagreement. In a non-pledge "screening" process how is one to know how a prospective new member will react to an adverse situation? Pledging also teaches self discipline which is important in all aspects of college life, not just the fraternity. Many pledge groups have had their grade point averages **improve** during their indoctrination period. Also, they are taught not to buckle under, quit or throw their hands up in the face of a problem. Working together is the method by which most problems are solved.

All of these positive aspects of pledging can be realized without hazing, demeaning or embarrassing anyone, or by beating them to a pulp. A simple lecture on the importance of respect can be a good one for starters. There are many other activities which promote the ideals of Alpha Phi Delta, such as community service, charity projects, visitations to other chapters, library hours, group work projects, and others too numerous to mention.

In the 20 years I have been a member of Alpha Phi Delta, a lot has changed as far as pledging goes, most of it for the better. I was hazed as a pledge and found little merit in it. The objective then was to try to make the pledges quit, and those who wouldn't were good enough to get in. It doesn't work that way any more. Most would quit under these circumstances, and I wouldn't blame them. However, fortunately for us, most of this nonsense has gone by the wayside. Our pledge periods are more educational and intellectual. None of them are perfect yet, but we're working on it. The im-

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THE TRAITOR

It felt as if I had returned to civilization after a long long time spent in the wilderness of a desert. Milan still kept its cosmopolitan look of the pre-war time. Here and there, some destroyed homes could be seen, yet life appeared already to have returned to normal, though it was only a week after the hostilities has ceased on the Italian front. This was my first furlough since I had joined the U.S. Army three years before in Los Angeles, California.

Over ten years ago I had visited here in Milan some of my relatives for the first and last time. I could hardly expect to find my way; however, I had no difficulty in asking directions, Italian being my natural language. I forced myself into the overcrowded streetcar, happy even, of the thronging people around me. A few stops later, being close to the door, I helped a green uniformed man on to the car. He was obviously a blind ex-Italian soldier. Under his thick dark spectacles the sockets were empty. He was jovial and thanked me profusely with the best adjectives — the Italian language is so rich in them.

That momentary happiness I had felt was somehow upset by the presence of this grateful invalid. I almost resented him. He did not, however, perceive my egotistic emotion; very soon he started to address me. He pointed out that it was a beautiful day, but maybe the last before a cold approaching winter. I couldn't understand how this poor blind man could speak so frankly of anything as being beautiful. Soon he directed his conversation on the effects of the war. I didn't answer.

Then, misinterpreting my silence, he cheerfully said: "You don't have to feel sorry for my eyes, I always find good people like you, and everybody helps

me. You just help me down at Piazza del Duomo." Since I did not know where this place was I asked the nearest person, who said he would tell me when we got there.

"Oh! You're not from Milan! Where were you born then?" he inquired.

"In Venice," I said.

"You must be here on business. Where are you going?" he continued.

Many people, I noticed, paid indirect attention to the conversation, probably out of mere curiosity. I was in my summer uniform, and then replied that I was a soldier with permission to visit some relatives, and maybe — La Scala. "You are still in the Army?" he asked. "I wasn't in very long because this happened in Africa. Were you over there? For another Duce . . ."

"Yes, in Tunis and Bizerte." I didn't like this conversation, where replies were difficult to make.

"Where did they send you after the big disaster over there, to Sicily or Calabria?" . . . If the war had not been over, I would have sworn that this innocent blind man was nothing but a smart informer. I told him that I had been sent to Naples and Casino.

He paused for a while looking into the air as if in quest of fresher ideas. He soon started again. "You know, I was in Venice many times before the war. Mussolini had ordered lower prices for the trips all over Italy. A wonderful idea. I loved the Laguna, the blondes with dark eyes, and the fresh sea-food at the Place San Marco. Those were the days of youth and sunshine, full of dreams and new Empires — a new strong nation. But now, now all is dark and it looks even darker for the future. It is a nightmare come true. It has been another premature fall of the risen Italian Empire."

His voice had become raucous and discordant. He tried hard to hold his tears, but not enough; from his eye sockets a big tear fell on his shoulder, down on my trousers. Now I wanted to talk; I wanted to tell him of another dream come true — that Italy had not lost its glorious past. Italy was now free, free to make a new lasting history. Its people free to compete with the rest of the world with its fine arts, sciences and above all, with the once again free literature. But I could not speak. My mouth opened and there was no sound.

He spoke first with a cheered tone in his voice. "Are you going to return to your outfit again?"

"Yes," I replied. "I must."

"What regiment are you in," he asked anew.

"I'm with a hospital," I said softly.

"You must have seen many people like me in there. There was a time when I envied the medics, but I changed my mind as I went in there. What Army do you serve?"

I don't know why but I could not answer for a few seconds. I think I was even trying to evade the question. Just then the man near me whispered that we were at the Place del Duomo. I felt relieved and as the door swung open I took the blind ex-soldier by the arm and murmured in his ear, "I serve the American Army."

"Oh! A hero, eh; a real liberator," he shouted.

As his feet reached the ground he jerked my arm. In a low voice he thanked me, then shouted, "Thank you, Traditore." (Traitor).

provement is being noted. With proper education and supervision we can continue this system without having to alter it drastically or abolish it.

Have we eliminated hazing in Alpha Phi Delta today? I'm not naive enough to think so. But compared with 20 years ago, we are light years ahead of where we were. And I am not of the opinion that "nothing can be done about it". Pledging can continue to be as much a part of our fraternity as it's always been. The only way it can be taken away from us is if we destroy it ourselves, and I don't mean by legislating it out of our Constitution. If we return to the barbaric period of, say, 1969, we're asking for it. If we continue the improvements over the past two decades we'll keep it. The choice belongs to the brothers of today.

James S. Lentini of Brooklyn, New York, was born on December 19, 1961, the second of three children born to Pasquale and Gloria Lentini. Jim graduated from high school in 1979, and then matriculated at St. Francis College of Brooklyn the same year. In 1981, Jim pledged Beta Sigma chapter and was initiated in December 1981. During his undergraduate years, he served Beta Sigma as Secretary, Vice-President and chapter President. He has attended all National Council and Executive Committee meetings since he was inducted. (Anyone who has been to a convention in recent years will remember Jim as the guy in the green "Ormond Beach" sweatsuit.) He was also chapter representative to the Third District meetings from 1982-84.

Jim graduated in 1984 and immediately became a member of the Brooklyn Alumni Club. He started his fraternal correspondence by becoming alumni club secretary and issuing the club's newsletters. He has since joined the New York Alumni Club (1987), and the Lower Hudson Valley Alumni Club (1988).

He worked at the **Bay News**, a Brooklyn based local paper after graduation; then he worked for six months at Morgan Stanley Investments as a researcher. He became a teacher in the fall of 1985, at P.S. 167 in Crown Heights, Brooklyn, where he is today.

Fraternity-wise he ran for Third District Governor in 1985 and lost to Frank Racano. In 1986, he was elected to that position. He became the first governor of the newly created Third District East in 1988. He has also served the fraternity as Vice-President of Expansion since July of 1988.

He began to publish *The Oracle* as a district/national monthly newsletter in August, 1988. He has tried to fill a timeliness void of fraternal information that *The Kleos* cannot do. Jim has purchased his own personal computer and is able to work with his own printing format. He considers his best issue as the October, 1988, one which was 16 pages in length, and, like others, contained interviews with District and National Officers, surveys, charts and graphs on various Alpha Phi Delta statistics (several of which were reprinted in *The Kleos*.) This publication covers chapter and alumni news, both local to the New York City area and across national as well.

Jim's best memories of the fraternity include the installation dinner in October, 1987, where three new chapters he helped start formally received their charters. On a negative note, he remembers the tragic camping accident of July, 1988, where his friend and

fraternity brother Joe Minerva was killed, and two other brothers of Beta Sigma were seriously injured. He feels the most pressing problems facing Alpha Phi Delta today are the lack of qualified new district governors, and the top-heaviness of the National Executive Committee.

At present, Jim is still a bachelor. (How else could he devote so much time to Alpha Phi Delta?)

Now in his fourth year as editor and publisher of *The Oracle*, Jim has been doing his best work. For his faith, devotion and steady service to Alpha Phi Delta, **The Kleos** honors Jim as the fifth recipient of the Vincent Larcy Communication Award.

Several items were brought up for legislation but failed. The big one, which was highly anticipated and discussed, was the establishment of Alumni Associations. These groups would be distinct from Alumni **Clubs** as they would be chartered by chapter — not area. (Such as the Beta Lambda Alumni Association — a group of Beta Lambda brothers who exist to help the chapter and to perhaps hold reunions. Currently Alumni Clubs are chartered one to a county and can be joined by alumni from any chapter.) This amendment failed by five votes.

A resolution was passed to have all fraternity clothing be made using the fraternity colors of purple and white. Presently some groups have different color schemes (black, blue, etc.). A resolution is not binding, however.

The fraternity budget was passed to allow for increases in upcoming expenditures (including the previously mentioned insurance). To meet the budget, an increase in revenues was necessary. Effective July 1, 1989, initiation fees will be \$120 and chapter assessments \$400 per year.

Beta Theta Discourages Alcohol During Pledging

Dear Central Office:

As President of Beta Theta Chapter, I would like to inform you about some legislation our chapter has passed concerning alcohol and pledging.

A few weeks ago, we took steps to protect our pledge period from the influence of alcohol. From this point on, no brother is permitted to drink alcoholic beverages during a pledge activity or five hours before a pledge activity. Any brother caught in violation of this rule shall lose his pledge privileges for the remainder of the pledge period.

We find this policy a positive step for the chapter. It not only provides better safety for the brothers and the pledges, it also prevents any relational problems that could occur between a brother who is drunk and a pledge. We want to build brotherhood during our pledge period not tear it down.

We would encourage other chapters to look carefully at their alcohol policies. In a time when fraternities are being frowned upon, we must take measures to protect ourselves.

SEMI ANNUAL REPORT (JANUARY, 1989)

The Directors of Alpha Phi Delta Foundation, Inc. are pleased to submit the following report.

MISSION

In order to properly evaluate the Foundation's progress, it is important to review the mission statement. The Foundation was incorporated in 1980 with four primary objectives. Simply stated, they are:

- To preserve, manage and grow the assets in its custody,
- To promote educational, cultural, and philanthropic activities,
- To encourage and support scholastic achievement, and
- To foster and encourage alumni sponsored undergraduate housing.

To accomplish these objectives, the Foundation is organized into three divisions: General, Scholarship, and Housing.

GENERAL DIVISION

GRANTS — The Foundation awarded \$11,000 in grants during the first half of the fiscal year. A \$6,000 grant was awarded to Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity in support of educational publications ranging from the Kleos to chapter management literature. A \$5,000 grant was awarded to Central Office for the purchase of printing equipment dedicated to chapter educational and leadership materials. This second grant was made possible by a \$5,000 gift from the Alpha Phi Delta Resort Association of NY.

ALUMNI DATA BASES — In October, 1988, the Foundation assumed responsibility for all alumni data bases. These records were sadly outdated and incomplete. However, we have made great strides in updating the records. Since October, we have:

- located 1,152 alumni whose addresses had been missing,
- purged 1,598 incorrect addresses, thus lowering printing and postage expenses,
- eliminated 648 duplicate records,
- added a data base of employers containing 2,317 alumni,
- added a data base of donor history for the 1,391 different alumni who have made contributions since 1975,
- Increased the completeness of over 4,900 alumni records by adding phone numbers, chapters, initiation date and middle initials.

FUNDRAISING — We are well along the way to meeting the four goals set for the year. By year end, it appears that we will have

- increased the total number of contributors. We are currently at 96 versus a total for all last year of 145,
- increased the total non-major (less than \$250) donations. We are currently at \$3,896 versus \$6,300 for all last year,

- increased total donations. We are currently at \$8,896 versus \$7,850 for all last year, and
- improved donor retention. As of this writing, 43% of all last year's contributors have made a donation for the current year. Since 1975, we have never exceeded a 44% retention rate.

VISA CARD — This program continues to build steadily. Income for the first six months was \$1,054. There are currently 181 cards outstanding. We have not been nearly as successful with our older alumni as with recent graduates. As a result, average purchases (on which we receive \$1 per \$200) are below expectations.

HOUSING DIVISION

OPERATIONS — Housing continued to run smoothly during the first half. We currently operate the Beta Rho house in Erie and are seeking a local buyer. We service mortgages on the Beta Xi house in Newark and the Beta Lambda house in Loretto, PA.

FINANCIAL STATUS — We are gratified that this division, which had been a constant source of red ink, has been operating with a positive cash flow for five consecutive years!

SCHOLARSHIP DIVISION

AWARDS — Our scholarship division awarded a record fifteen scholarships this past year. Fourteen \$750 stipends were awarded. A \$1,000 award was made to the applicant deemed most outstanding.

FUNDRAISING — Contributions continued at a torrid pace, reflecting the generosity of many of our alumni organizations. First half contributions reached \$25,331, representing gifts from alumni groups in New York, Pittsburgh, Columbus, Cleveland and Southern California. \$10,000 was contributed from the Alpha Phi Delta Resort Association of NY.

APPLICATIONS — Applications are now being prepared for this summer's awards and are due by June 1.

As all of you know, this is the 75th anniversary of Alpha Phi Delta. Born in Syracuse on November 5, 1914, the Fraternity is going back to a reasonably close proximity of that city, Lake Placid, New York, for its Fraternity Summer Convention, August 21-25, 1989.

For the celebrated November date something special is being established to commemorate the event. Meanwhile, for the summer convention, we expect to get a whale of a big crowd to pre-celebrate the day. For example, we expect all of the Past Presidents who can make it to be there. We expect a large contingency of alumni club members to be there, and hopefully we can get a large contingency of undergraduate members to be there and enjoy the pleasures of Lake Placid. We expect those Brothers to come who have not been at a convention in a long time.

It wasn't too long ago, sixteen years to be exact, that we celebrated with a whopping crowd at The Picasso, 498 of

us. We haven't had such a convention before or since, and it has gradually shrunk even as we shifted to the mountains of the Catskills or to the seaside of Wildwood. This year, the committee, which includes Lorri Derrico, Convention Chairman Joe Fabrizi and National president Al Fafara, has been discussing an agenda that will please everyone. It includes several items in which all would be interested, ranging from a "Things Change" theme to a moonlight boat ride. The hotel, The Hilton, is also very accommodating, as is the site itself with its many shops along its streets.

I urge everyone who can make it to come and join us in Lake Placid this summer. I guarantee you will like it, and you have the opportunity to meet old friends again and to make new ones in a Fraternal atmosphere of spirit and conviviality.
