FOUNDATION SETS LONG TERM GOALS

The Alpha Phi Delta Foundation has recently unveiled its long term goals. Through a process of meetings, discussions and debate, the board has identified a series of long term needs which it feels must be met if Alpha Phi Delta is to continue to serve its undergraduates and alumni. The recently announced "Chapter Leadership Challenge" is the funding vehicle which will make these goals possible.

Since its founding in 1981, the Foundation has been quietly building a strong infrastructure for Alpha Phi Delta. Several thousand alumni have been located, the housing division has been revamped, recordkeeping has been computerized, activity within the scholarship division has accelerated, and the general division has been able to provide annual grants to the fraternity.

With that rebuilding effort substantially complete, the Foundation is now turning its sights to the future. Its goals, to be funded through the "Chapter Leadership Challenge" are the following:

CHAPTER LEADERSHIP

One of our toughest challenges is to mold our young men into respected leaders. The experience and training we can provide these young men will last them a lifetime.

Chapter Officer Training Fellowships — Teaching leadership skills to our young men is one of the most important missions of Alpha Phi Delta. These fellowships will enable chapter officers to attend our leadership seminars. This will include travel expenses for the workshops plus the cost of training materials.

Chapter Management Manuals — Each officer needs a day to day operating guide. This helps our young men to become more effective leaders. At the same time, it provides much needed standardization across our chapters. Funds will be used for development, printing and distribution.

ALUMNI LEADERSHIP

Alpha Phi Delta has always had a heavy reliance on our alumni volunteers. Their giving and their commitment shines through. We don't want to lose such a proud tradition. However, we cannot cast these fine men into difficult and trying situations without training and guidance. The programs in this category will provide our volunteers with the preparation necessary to succeed.

Alumni Training Fellowship — Our alumni volunteers are very generous in overseeing and nurturing their chapters. The demands are great and the challenges difficult as they work with their chapters. They face a variety of issues including academics, discipline, politics, and, unfortunately, drugs and alcohol.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Each man's experience in Alpha Phi Delta is unique. Our job is to provide the encouragement and motivation for our younger brothers. By creating the proper environment, our young men will flourish and grow into adulthood.

Career Referral Guide — Our undergraduates and alumni represent an incredible talent pool and our alumni include several prominent employers. The career referral guide can be an effective clearinghouse for both our undergrads and our alumni. Each year, we will solicit resumes from our graduating seniors and interested alumni. These resumes will be summarized and organized. Once printed, this guide will be distributed to alumni, alumni clubs and major employers.

Alcohol Abuse Education Program — Alcohol abuse is a reality and we can help our members understand the problem and the solutions.

Drug Abuse Education Program — We would like to think that this is not our problem but know that that would be naive.

SCHOLARSHIP

Covering today's sky rocketing tuition bills is no easy matter. Alpha Phi Delta is committed to assisting worthy students with their educational expenses. For many, the sacrifice of parents plus earning from summer and school year jobs still isn't enough. We need to be there for these deserving students. Each year the number of applicants greatly exceeds the number of available awards. We can overcome this problem by endowing more scholarships.

ORGANIZATION MANAGEMENT

Our successful reliance on alumni volunteers is one of our hallmarks. However, at the national level, professional input is critical to our continued development and growth. Unique skills are required and the workload is full time. We hope to endow at least two full time staff positions to help us carry out our mission.

Office Administrator — Central Office is Alpha Phi Delta's nerve center. A smoothly functioning office is critical to efficient chapter service and alumni networking. This individual will oversee Alpha Phi Delta's day to day clerical activities, handle our printing needs and coordinate routine communication.

Training Coordinator — The training coordinator will oversee development of all chapter management manuals, organize the undergraduate and alumni training workshops and identify outside programs that our members should attend.

CULTURAL AWARENESS

Alpha Phi Delta is open to all students without respect to ethnic background. However, our Italian heritage is one of the richest in America. As the first Italian-American organization devoted exclusively to college students, Alpha Phi Delta played a pivotal role in I/A ascendancy. We should foster a greater awareness among our members and within our communities.

RETAINING ITALIAN WEDDING TRADITIONS

In the past Italian-American weddings were very special and steeped in tradition. Starting from birth we Italian-Americans celebrate all the milestones in one's life. One of the biggest celebrations are weddings. We received, from our Italian ancestors, beautiful and memorable wedding traditions. In Italy, in the past, the wedding day began with the bride and groom receiving communion together at a morning Mass, (the bride is not dressed in bridal splendor). Even today most Italians are married in a church ceremony and at a Mass. Great importance is placed on the blessing of the gold bands or *FEDE* (faith). The bands are usually very plain, solid gold, with no diamonds or jewels adorning them. I think it is quite a unique custom to see the bride walk to the church, rather than be driven.

Many of the wedding customs we see around the Western world were first Roman customs. If it is a small town, the entire community after the Mass wish the bride good luck (*Auguri*). In some areas the bride and groom go directly to the groom's family house where the groom's mother welcomes the bride into the family by giving her a *PALMA* made out of confetti (Jordan Almonds). Arranged in a leaflike formation, the almonds are covered with colored cellophane.

The *Pranzo* (sit-down dinner) later on is served to many wedding guests. Hard feelings occur when relatives and friends are not invited. We certainly have had that problem in our family; no wonder we had close to 400 people at our wedding. The Wedding feast is just that! The feast begins with cocktails and Italian hors d'oeuvres and then appetizers (usually melon with prosciutto ham) and then the wedding soup (little meatballs and spinach in a delicious chicken broth). Then three courses of pasta are served (varioli, lasagne, cannelloni, etc.) Then comes the three courses of meat (veal, poultry, and pork). Sometimes a course of fish is served with, of course, cheese and fruit. *Asti Spumante* is offered for the wedding toast and coffee is also served. Then comes the cutting and eating of the elaborate wedding cake.

After the dinner, the *Bomboniere* are given. The *Bomboniere* are given one

per family and a fluff is given to each guest. The Fluff is a very elaborate adornment of the confetti candy; it includes a disc, circles of tulle, confetti candy, with colorful flowers and bows. It is attached to a gift of silver or ceramic items. In Italy it is called a "*bomboniere*"; in America it is called a favor. A *confetto* is an almond protected by a shell of hard sugar. The Italian custom is to distribute *confetto* (the candy) for all occasions. Only white *confetto* is used for Weddings, Christenings and Confirmations, as white is the color of purity and innocence.

Bombonieri are cherished in Italy, and if you go to an Italian home, you often will find a credenza filled with beautiful ceramic pieces that were given to the family and are a reminder of a wonderful celebration. Finally trays of Italian cookies are passed among the guests. Many take a handful to take home.

In rural Italy you still will see Italian folk dancing at weddings. Recently I went to an Italian-American wedding where 90% of the music was rock and roll and about 9% slow music. Only 1% of the music was Italian. When the Italian music was played, young and old had a ball. Who is going to teach our young our customs? Of course the answer is, we must do it! We had an Italian band at our wedding and everyone had a wonderful time. Oh, how I miss those memorable Italian weddings of the past. Even when sandwiches were served in a rented hall. I still can see my grandfather dancing the *Tarantella*. The dance floor was crowded when it was time to do the *Tarantella*. What a happy dance it is, and a must at an Italian wedding. Once our weddings were steeped in tradition. I am sure our young people would carry them on once we expose them and teach them the beauty and value of our traditions and customs. For example, their Italian Wedding Serenades, in some places a newly-wed's bed is decorated, while they are away, with confetti in a heart-like design with coins in the center. In southern Italy women are invited to bride-to-be's home to see the wedding gifts on display. There are many more beautiful and unique customs, but I am limited by time and space. Keep our weddings steeped in tradition!

2001-A FRATERNITY ODDSSEY

With the dawn of a new decade, it is time to bring out the crystal ball and make the predictions for Alpha Phi Delta into the 21st century.

1990: National President Al Fafara is tarred and feathered and run out of Cherry Hill on a rail. Cries of, "take your four letter words and shove them up your three letter word", are heard. Theta Beta Chapter moves that Fafara's name be stricken from the roster of National Presidents.

1991: National President Joe Rahtelli suspends 6 chapters for allegedly giving their pledges non-Italian nicknames. The Delaware Valley Alumni Club endorses Rahtelli for Outstanding Alumnus.

1992: Alpha Phi Delta expands to the University of Missouri, North Dakota State, and Texas Tech. Al Palazzo immediately moves that these new chapters be placed in the Third District as according to him, "they are not too far past the Hudson River."

1993: The 13th lawsuit is brought against the Fraternity as Beta Beta Chapter is accused of sending a pledge out to get coffee. National President John Russo immediately declares this "a local matter" and not one for the National Fraternity to be concerned about.

1994: Alpha Phi Delta Foundation assets grow to \$5,785,336.72 and their grant to the Fraternity remains at \$6,000. Tony Carfang explains that out of the 12 separate accounts, this is the only one which draws interest earmarked for the Fraternity. Mike Zerega flies to Acapulco for a winter vacation.

1995: National President Joe Rossi accedes to pressure and closes the door to non-Italian members, exempting only Eskimos, American Indians, and Green Card holders. Gamma Rho Chapter at Baruch is unaffected.

1996: Alpha Phi Delta expands to San Jose State, Washington State, and the University of Alaska-Anchorage. Al Palazzo requests that Central Office look into frequent flier discounts from Northwest Airlines and to put these chapters in the Third District.

1997: The 37th lawsuit is filed against the Fraternity and the assets of the Foundation are attached. Stan Raffa immediately withdraws the \$873,236 from the Scholarship Fund in unmarked \$5 and \$10 dollar bills, buys 1,771 coffee cans and 500 shovels and invites the Scholarship Committee to "redeposit" the funds in his backyard.

1998: National President Mike Flott withdraws the Fraternity from the N.I.C. and reinstates hazing as an official policy. "It's about time we got rid of all of the wimps and pansies", Flott is quoted as saying.

1999: The 22nd judgement is entered against the Fraternity, and the homes of PNP's Joe Rahtelli and John Russo are sold to satisfy part of them. Also garnished is the entire wardrobe of Al Fafara, which nets \$16.33. The Foundation proposes to build a shelter for homeless Past National Presidents.
