ΑΦΔ Brothers Serve Country In Operation Desert Storm

At least three Alpha Phi Delta brothers are among the American troops serving their country in the Persian Gulf during Operation Desert Storm, and for each of them there is an anxious family waiting for his return.

Lt. John Broderick (Gamma Lambda, 1989), assigned to the 8th Cavalry Regiment of the 1st Cavalry Division, lead a squad of five tanks and 25 men in the U.S. military's successful mission to liberate Kuwait from Iraqi troops.

His mother, Theresa Broderick, said she didn't know where in the Persian Gulf her son

was stationed. She said he had written to his family, telling them that his main concern was bringing the men under his command home safely.

"No news is good news," she said. "That's how we get through every day."

Pvt. Omar Brimfield (Beta Iota, 1989) is a Communications specialist with the Marines' 2nd Surveillance, Reconnaissance and Intelligence Group. According to his mother, Renetha Brimfield, he relays orders from Command to the front.

uncle at least once, and I know the feelings they created between each other will be with them wherever their journeys take them.

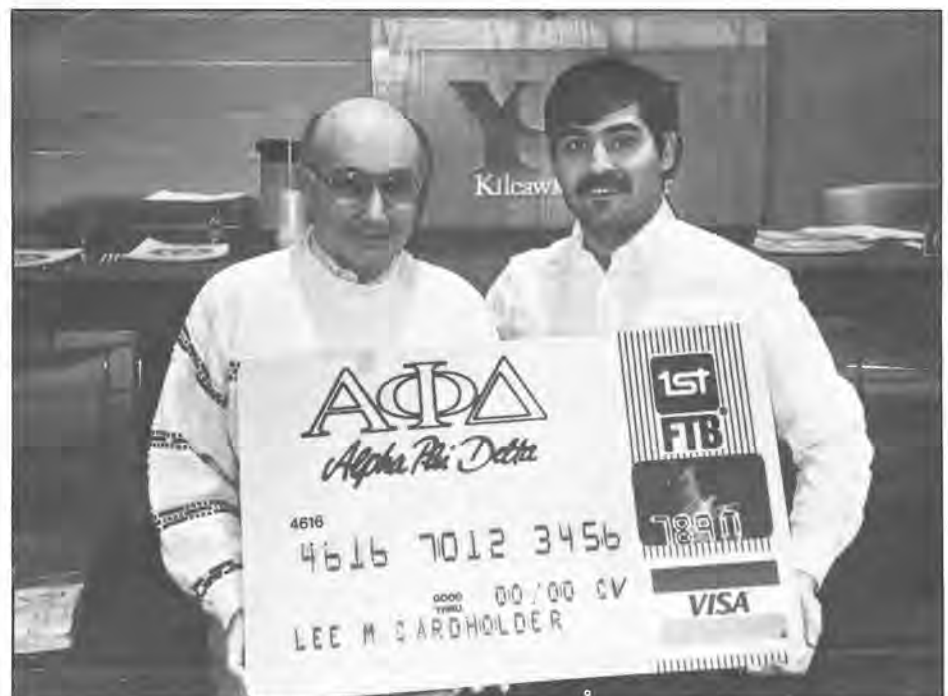

Brotherhood Profile

Beta Zeta's Dominick Capilongo

Dominick "Cappy" Capilongo has been a battler for most of his 78 years.

The Brooklyn-born son of Natale and Jesu Capilongo struggled with the death of his mother when he was eight years old. He overcame the Italian oppression of his collegiate years at Ohio University, the depression and the turbulent war years of his young adulthood. Today he battles to cope with the mysterious disease of Alzheimer's, which has afflicted his wife Sheila.

Capilongo, a retired federal employee, joined the Beta Zeta chapter of Alpha Phi Delta in 1933 and served as chapter president in 1934-35. "Dominick Macedonia of Xi chapter initiated us," said Capilongo, now a Minnesota resident. "We became close because we were both Brooklyn boys."

Capilongo graduated in 1935 and went to Italy to attend medical school.

Shortly after he began studying at the University of Bologna medical school, Capilongo went to London for a performance by "The Jackson Girls," a famous troupe of chorus line dancers. One of the dancers was Sheila Everett, who would later become his wife.

Capilongo left medical school when World War II broke out and he worked with the London County Council Civil Defense and later directed a United Nations camp for people who were bombed out of their homes.

He resigned from the U.N. position in 1947 and lived in Florida before returning to Brooklyn in 1951. He then found work traveling across the country as a quality control inspector for the federal government. One of his stops was Washington, D.C.,

where he met up with Alpha Phi Delta men from various chapters, including Michael Zerega, a recent Psi alumnus. They founded the National Capital Alumni Club in 1973.

"Cappy was the heart of the group. He opened his house. He served sausage, peppers and peas," said Zerega. "Even if you didn't work on fraternity business, you went because you didn't want to miss his hospitality. He has a deep-seeded love of the organization."

The Capital Club established Beta Psi Chapter at Catholic University in 1979.

"I was always interested in getting back with the boys at Alpha Phi Delta," said Capilongo, who is now working on a Beta Zeta history.

Capilongo retired in 1981 after 30 years of federal service. Just before his retirement, he started noticing his wife's memory lapses. Sheila's condition steadily declined and her eyesight faded. Capilongo consulted with his daughter and son, Chris, before moving Sheila to a nursing home. Despite struggling to meet the staggering costs, Capilongo knew it was best for his wife.

Capilongo gathers with Beta Zeta alumni annually at the Ohio University homecoming. The men share their nostalgic heritage.

"Naturally, people of the same heritage are very close," he said. "We're Italian. It's what we are. I've always been proud."

National Council Meeting

National Council Elects Lentini Executive V.P.; Del. State, U.Conn., U.Ga., Garden State A.C. Chartered;

James S. Lentini (Beta Sigma, 1981), AΦΔ's Vice President for Expansion and Third District East Governor, was elected Executive Vice President by the fraternity's National Council Sunday, February 17, 1991. He'll take office July 1, 1991.

National President Joseph Rahtelli (Beta Beta, 1982) was elected to a second one-year term, which begins July 1.

The elections capped a National Council meeting that brought significant changes to AΦΔ. The Council approved a revision of the fraternity's constitution, which reduces the 41-page document to about four pages, and moves large sections of the constitution into a 20-page set of by-laws. It also approved a constitutional amendment

creating chapter-based Alumni Associations, and chartered new chapters at Delaware State College (Gamma Chi), the University of Connecticut (Gamma Psi), and the University of Georgia (Gamma Omega - See page 10), and the Garden State Alumni Club in Mercer County, New Jersey.

The Undergraduate Coordinating Committee, made up of the chapter representatives to the National Council, elected Craig Velez (Beta Pi, 1988) to a one-year term as Vice President for Undergraduate Affairs, beginning July 1.

Rahtelli was first elected National President at the National Council meeting in Cherry Hill,

N.J. last February. He served as Executive Vice President for two years under President Alexander Fafara. Rahtelli also served as Vice President for Expansion and as Undergraduate Affairs V.P.

Lentini is in his third year as Vice President for Expansion. During his term, the national fraternity has seen unprecedented growth: expanding from 22 to 40 chapters.

Lentini was elected Third District Governor in 1986. The district grew from six to 13 chapters under his leadership, and the district was divided into three segments. Lentini became Third District East Governor.

Velez becomes the fourth consecutive Vice President for

Youngstown, Ohio Creates Alumni Associations; Trims Constitution Craig Velez Elected New Undergraduate Vice President

Undergraduate Affairs to emerge from Brooklyn's Xaverian High School. Velez follows current V.P. Nicholas Franki (Gamma Lambda, 1987), Andrew Cozzolino (Beta Beta, 1987) and Joseph Narciso (Gamma Lambda, 1987).

The National Council approved the tightening of the constitution after a five-hour meeting of the Legislative committee the previous afternoon. The advantage of the revision, proposed by Lentini, is that both the National Council and Executive Committee can revise the by-laws more easily, without the need for a constitutional amendment.

The purpose of the Alumni Association amendment is to keep more alumni active by adding the bond of a common chapter to alumni activity, and to strengthen alumni support for undergraduate chapters. The

amendment was proposed by the Vice Presidents for Alumni and Undergraduate Affairs, Michael Iacovelli and Nicholas Franki.

Alumni associations will be made up of brothers from a single chapter, and will bear the name of that chapter (For example, The Beta Chi Alumni

Association).

Each alumni association will have one representative on the National Council, and will pay an annual assessment equal to half of that paid by alumni clubs.

Fraternity leaders took advantage of the gathering of national and local officials to educate them in leadership skills and risk management. The Executive Committee participated Saturday, February 16, in a team building workshop conducted by Rex Gatto, Ph.D. (Psi, 1967) and Ned Cash, Ph.D. (Psi, 1962). Later that day, under-graduate chapter leaders took part in a risk management workshop conducted by Kappa Delta Rho Fraternity Executive Director Don Stohl.

National President Joseph Rahtelli announced that the site of the 1992 National Council Meeting, February 15-16, is the Westchester/Rockland County area of New York State.

T.V. Producer Truncale Airs Prison Documentary

Joe Truncale (Beta Phi, 1986), with fellow Suburban Cablevision producer Todd Goodman, returned to Rahway (N.J.) State Prison, subject of the 1976 documentary film "Scared Straight," for another look at the Juvenile Awareness program conducted there by the longterm prisoners called the Lifers Group.

The result is "Second Chances," a documentary which debuted November 20, 1990. The film reacquaints viewers with the program, which confronts incorrigible juveniles with the spectre of prison life.

Dr. Peter Sammartino (Psi, 1959) was honored by the New Jersey Historical Commission with an Annual Recognition Award for his

achievements in promoting education and intellectual pursuits in New Jersey, including the study of history. The founder of Fairleigh Dickenson University, he is author of *Of Castles and Colleges* (1972), *I Dreamed a College* (1977), *A History of Higher Education in New Jersey* (1978), *Demanage Higher Education* (1978), and *Of Colleges and Kings* (1985). He

has been instrumental in organizing and/or promoting such organizations as the American Institute of Italian Studies and the American Society of the Italian Legions of Merit.

Jerome Jurenovich (Beta Rho, 1978) is an on-camera sportscaster on *Cable News Network*, and is the colorful voice of sports reports on *CNN's Headline News* channel.

Penn State's Chi Chapter Reactivated

On November 25, 1990, nine men at Pennsylvania State University, State College, Pa. were officially sworn in to Alpha Phi Delta Fraternity by Vice President for Expansion James Lentini. Upon taking the oath of brotherhood, these men became the first pledge class of the reactivation of our Chi chapter at Penn State.

According to fraternity records, Chi Chapter was founded in March of 1929, and became inactive in 1985.

The group was organized by current chapter president Matthew Homsher, a PSU student who was interested in forming a fraternity. While looking through information about fraternities in the school's student activities office, he happened upon a letter

from the Expansion Office of Alpha Phi Delta, which was placed on file for future expansion hopes. Homsher then called brother Lentini - and the rest is Chi history.

At the National Council meeting February 16-17, 1991, Chi chapter was officially seated and deemed reactivated. Three of the chapter's brothers attended.

The chapter is still going strong with a four-man spring pledge class and, more than likely, IFC recognition at any moment. *(Submitted by James Lentini)*

Gamma Omega (Univ. of Georgia)

The first nine members of our colony at the University of Georgia were sworn in on

October 20, 1990. These men, plus one brother who transferred in, set the cornerstone for ΑΦΔ's quest for expansion in areas heretofore uncharted by us.

The colony was chartered as the Gamma Omega chapter at the National Council meeting February 16-17, 1991. (See page 4)

The group was started by transfer student Constantinos Economopoulos (formerly of the University of South Florida), who, upon arriving at Georgia, began building a group of interested men. The pledge class was quickly formed and a pledge program was started by brother Economopoulos. By October, the group was ready for initiation, so Vice President for Cultural Affairs Sam Catanzano and Vice President for Expansion James Lentini visited and initiated the group.

Since that momentous day, the colony at Georgia initiated five more gentlemen, bringing their roster to 15. The chapter is expected to have another pledge class in the spring and is likely to break the 20-man mark in its first year of activity. *(Submitted by James Lentini)*

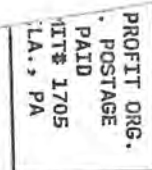
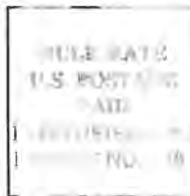
Mangano was a very active brother of AΦΔ. His was recognized as Beta Delta's Outstanding Alumnus of 1964, and the Philadelphia Alumni Club's Man of the Year in 1976. He was also recognized in 1964 by the Philadelphia Alumni Club for outstanding service to the club's housing committee.

Mangano received his B.S. degree from Temple in 1930, and earned his L.L.B. from Rutgers Law School in 1934. He practiced law in Hackensack, N.J. until 1942, when he joined the Intelligence Division of the Internal Revenue Service. He stayed with the I.R.S. until 1972, then entered into private practice.
