Gamma Iota, L.H.V. Alumni to host National Council Meeting on Presidents Weekend



The National Council of Alpha Phi Delta will elect a new National President and Executive Vice President at its meeting February 14-16 at Pace University in Pleasantville, N.Y.

The National Council of Alpha Phi Delta will again shape the fraternity's future when it elects new national leaders and adopts a fiscal 1993 budget at its 72nd annual meeting February 14-16, 1992 at Pace University in Pleasantville, N.Y.

The Gamma Iota chapter, active at Pace since 1987, and the Lower Hudson Valley Alumni Club, established in 1986, are designated as the host entities.

This will be the seventh time the National Council has met separately from the National Convention, a practice it began in 1986, when the National Council met in February and at the Summer Convention in August. The National Council consists of two representatives from each active chapter and alumni club, one from each alumni association, and the voting members of the Executive Committee.

Nearly 170 brothers and guests got together December 15, 1991, for the 56th annual Alpha Phi Delta Tri-State Christmas Dinner Dance at the beautiful Micali Terrace in Brooklyn. On hand were numerous National Officers and many other undergraduates and alumni.

The Christmas Dance is a New York area tradition tracing its roots back to the 1930s, and is always well attended by area brothers and dignitaries. This year's attendance was slightly off, but the number of officers present boomed. On hand were Executive Vice President **Jim Lentini**, Executive Secretary **Joe Rossi**, V.P. for Financial Affairs **Aldo Del Sorbo**, V.P. for Alumni Affairs **Christopher Perfetto**, V.P. for Good and Welfare **Jerome Cashman**, Kleos Editor **Andrew Cripps**, District Governors **Joseph Hughes**, **Nicholas Franki**, **Andrew Ovanessian**, **Joseph Sanelli** and **Anthony Cerrone**.

The evening consisted of a cocktail hour - a gastronomically delightful spread of hors d'oeuvres and appetizers, a dinner featuring Chicken Cordon Bleu and Prime Rib of Beef and followed by a phenomenally delicious dessert of cake, pastries and tortoni. The entertainment for the evening, as usual, was provided by the incomparable **Bob Chevy** (Beta Eta 1957) and his orchestra. Brother Chevy has been a staple of the Christmas Dance

for over a quarter of a century. He is to the Christmas Dance what **Guy Lombardo** was to New Year's Eve.

The entertainment highlight of the evening was the traditional caroling, led by brother Chevy. Eight score of brothers and their dates gathered around the dance floor and joined in singing solemn tunes like "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear," "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," "We Three Kings," "O Come All Ye Faithful" and "O Holy Night." In memory of all our brothers who departed this past year, all sang "Silent Night, Holy Night." Following this, a light-hearted medley of seasonal tunes, such as "Santa Claus is Coming to Town," and "Jingle Bells," helped brothers form a Christmas train dance line around the room.

The best chapter showing was from Gamma Sigma (32), Gamma Kappa (27), Gamma Iota (25) and Beta Pi (21). The numbers include alumni. The best alumni club showing was New York - a total of 19 present, followed closely by North Jersey with about a dozen.

The evening started at 8 p.m. and ended around midnight when the brothers went on their way. Afterward, most of the alumni head home, while many of the undergraduates took their dates on the town - ah, youth. All in all, it was an excellent evening of fraternalism and Christmas rejoicing for one and all.

As of press time, only Executive Secretary **Joseph Rossi** (Beta Phi, Glassboro State College, 1980) had declared his intention to run for the office of National President. **Joseph Malecki** (Beta Chi, S.U.N.Y. College of Technology, 1983) has expressed his desire for the office of Executive Vice President. Nominations will remain open until the end of the first day of the National Council Meeting.

The National Council will also vote on the national organization's fiscal 1993 budget, the first presented by new Vice President for Financial Affairs **Aldo Del Sorbo** (Delta, Polytechnic Institute of New York, 1974). Del Sorbo is owner of Aldo Del Sorbo Tax Services in Brooklyn, N.Y., and Treasurer of the

New York Alumni Club. He was appointed by National President **Joseph Rahtelli** in October.

As part of its continuing efforts to provide its undergraduate leaders with guidance and training, the national organization is sponsoring workshops for chapter leaders attending the National Council Meeting. The workshops will deal with such topics as communications, chapter finances, rushing and pledging.

Also on the National Council's agenda is a resolution establishing a new national award, The **Joseph A. DeGuglielmo** Community Service Award, designed to promote community service among chapters and alumni organizations. Named for Alpha Phi Delta's 16th National President, it would honor the entity which demonstrates the greatest awareness of and response to the needs of its community. If approved by the National Council, the award would be presented each year at the Summer Convention.

Brotherhood Profile

Curielli shares heritage in Windy City

Even in the busy life of lawyer **John Peter Curielli** (Beta Mu, 1966), his Italian-American heritage doesn't take a back seat.

Curielli, a prominent attorney with law offices throughout the Chicago area and a home in Barrington, Illinois, with his wife Cathy, has been active with Chicago's Joint Civic Committee of Italian Americans since 1966. While a student at DePaul University, he became the founder and first President of its Young People's Division. He has served on its Anti-Defamation Committee and its Executive Board.

In 1978, he was invited to join the Columbian Club of Italian-Americans. Since then he has served as a director for two two-year terms and as Chairman of the By-Laws Committee, and was just elected Treasurer. He became a life member of the Italian Sports Hall of Fame in 1979. Curielli is a Past President of the Italian Cultural Center for the Chicagoland area. He just finished his second term as President of the Italian-American Chamber of

Commerce of Chicago.

"It goes back to the pride my parents took in their heritage," he said. "My father, founded the Giovanni Pasquale Society to build an old people's home back in Italy for people who wanted to retire back there, and my grandmother was President of the Maria Adelaia Society, kind of an Italian 400 Club in Chicago. So it was a family that never was ashamed of its Italian heritage."

With a background of pride in his heritage, it was only natural that he would pledge Alpha Phi Delta at DePaul. While an undergraduate, he served as Beta Mu's Pledgemaster and Historian.

After graduating from DePaul's law school, Curielli continued his awareness of the Italian heritage, joining the Justinian Society of Lawyers.

His free time isn't limited to the Italian community, as he has served as an officer in his local Kiwanis Club and Shrine Club, and is a constant supporter of the DePaul University Alumni movement. Curielli is Chairman Emeritus of the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, and founded the Barrington Bar Association.

Beta Mu chapter closed its doors in 1982, but Curielli says the brotherhood established at DePaul has remained strong. "When I was working out of offices in downtown Chicago, we had a luncheon group of about ten of us who got together on a fairly regular basis," he said. "We've had an alumni group here, thanks to **Johnny Fiore** (Beta Mu, 1956), who every year has a Christmas party. Now we've started having a summer picnic as well. I also see many of the brothers in the various Italian organizations I'm in."

It's apparent that along with his successful law practice and his leadership in the community, John Peter Curielli takes great pride in his Italian heritage. Alpha Phi Delta and the Italian community can also take pride in him.

"Some of the people were sleeping on the benches or floors, and we'd wake them up and give them the food," said **Michael Safara '89**, charity committee chairman.

The brothers distributed clothing to the homeless as well. After their work was done on the Staten Island side, the brothers boarded the 10:30 a.m. ferry to do the same at the Whitehall ferry terminal and at Battery Park in Manhattan.

According to chapter president **Jeff Breen '89**, chapter brothers have performed more than 600

hours of community service since May 1991.

Beta Lambda cleans up Loretto

The Beta Lambda chapter at St. Francis College in Loretto, Pa., joined six other greek organizations in a massive clean up of the city. The students walked the streets picking up trash from the curbs and from residents' properties.

Italian-American leader John LaCorte dies

Brother of first National President, Salvatore LaCorte

John LaCorte, brother of Alpha Phi Delta founder **Salvatore LaCorte**, died on November 22, 1991. He was 81.

John LaCorte was among our nation's leaders in promoting the awareness of Italian-American culture. He was nearly single-handedly responsible for the establishment of Columbus Day as a national holiday in the United States in the 1930s.

In the 1960s, he mounted a drive to name the Brooklyn Narrows Bridge after the Italian explorer Verrazano. In 1965 the bridge was renamed the Verrazano Narrows Bridge.

In later years he continued his promotion of Italian-American culture by lecturing.

Citing a rise in sexual activity among young women, LaCorte in 1977 offered \$1,000 to any young lady who signed an agreement to remain a virgin until age 19. The project failed, but gave LaCorte a great deal of public attention.

Alpha Phi Delta also mourns the loss of brother **Joseph Solita** (Psi, 1954), who passed away in October 1991 in Hilton Head, S.C., due to a heart attack. Brother Solita had retired as manager of MONY Financial Services in Poughkeepsie, N.Y.

Condolences to **Chuck Liberatore** (Psi, 1960), whose wife, Carole, passed away on December 9, 1991.

Get well soon to Past National President **Adam DiVincenzo** (Psi, 1932), who returned home from the hospital December 7, 1991.

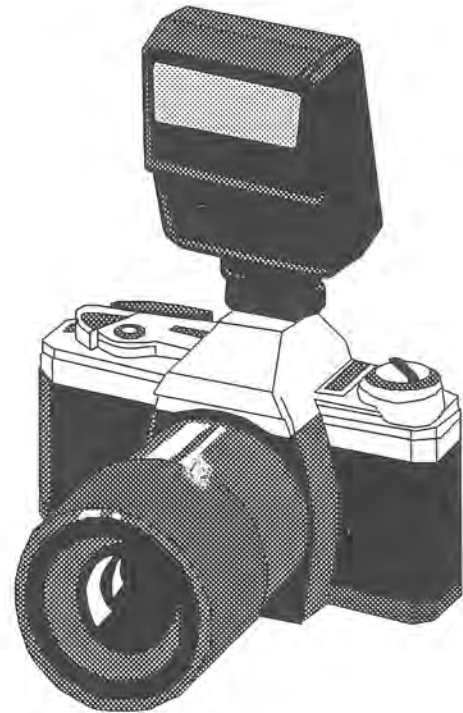
