Small, Magliocco to lead Alpha Phi Delta Through 1996-1997

In what turned out to be a landslide victory (uncontested races *do* very often result in landslide wins), National Vice President Glenn Small (Beta Xi '76) was elected National President of Alpha Phi Delta National Fraternity at the most recent meeting of the Fraternity's National Council, held this past February in Trenton, New Jersey. Small takes office as the 45th President of Alpha Phi Delta on July 1.

His second-in-command is Vice President-Elect Ed Magliocco (Beta Delta '50), who earned his position in a hotly contested race against Brooklyn/Staten Island District Governor Evan Sottosanti (Beta Eta '88). The hotly-debat-

ed contest was decided by a single vote. Todd Halbert (Gamma Mu '90) was elected UCC Chairman over Felipe Martinez (Gamma Sigma '94) in another close race.

President-Elect Small wasted no time in making several appointments to the Executive Committee. James S. Lentini (Beta Sigma '81) was reappointed Executive Secretary, as was Matt Vislocky (Gamma Iota '88) to the office of VP of Financial Affairs; Gary Kosteck (Beta Xi '71) was appointed Acting National Chaplain in the absence of former National Chaplain Father Ronald

Falotico (who resigned early this year); Joseph Piras (Beta Omega '89) was named VP for Expansion, and Chris Pasocello (Beta Pi '88) was chosen to be the new Kleos Editor. Small elected to leave all other offices vacant for the moment.

In other Winter Convention developments, the budget for the coming fiscal year which passed makes use of the "per capita" method of taxing entities; chapter assessments, chapter insurance assessments, alumni club fees and alumni association fees were all subsequently abolished.

Editorial

More Commitment Needed

As some of you probably know, PNP Al Fafara recently underwent hip replacement surgery. His recovery from this operation has meant that he has had to skip several important Alpha Phi Delta functions, and this has, in many instances, left him 'out of the loop.' His editorial in the March edition of the NJAC Newsletter began by lamenting about some of the problems brought on by aging (like poor health), and went on to explain how he can't do as much as he would like to do for Alpha Phi Delta, since his health isn't cooperating at the moment. But Big Al continued on about how the whole situation is only worsened by the fact that while he is forced to sit back and watch events/occasions/etc. go by in the Alpha Phi Delta world, he is also forced to witness the actions (or non-actions) by those who *can* do for Alpha Phi Delta but *choose* not to. In any case, Al said all of this better than I ever could, therefore, I thought it appropriate to reprint a portion of Al's editorial here. Without further ado:

"...it's the physical part that bothers me, the old "the mind is willing, but the body is weak" garbage. I wish I had the opportunity to do more for Alpha Phi Delta. Contrast that to those who do, but don't care, or "whenever I get around to it and if I don't, oh well." And the sad, but true fact is that these people are in the majority right now.

This is not just a problem with the North Jersey Alumni Club or Alpha Phi Delta. It is an organizational plague affecting

the entire nation. Surveys have been done indicating that there are more people bowling in this country than ever before, but bowling leagues are down. Why? Because nobody wants to commit to showing up one or two nights a week at a specific time. I don't feel like it tonight. I'd rather do something else tonight. Why should I commit to having to be somewhere or having to do something.

For those of us who grew up believing that organizations such as Alpha Phi Delta are good things and ways to meet good people, this is a bitter pill to swallow. Without commitment, organizations collapse. With half-assed commitment, they die a slow death. And when physical or other restrictions keep those who care from doing what we can do to fill the void, all we can do is sit and watch. And if we can't cop the same attitude and stop caring, that's a very painful thing to do. "



Our Italian Heritage

Where has the ethnicity gone?

As many of my brothers from Alpha Phi Delta know, I am involved in several local and national Italian-American groups. One of these groups, which is geared towards business people and professionals, limits its membership to one hundred members; additionally, each profession represented is only allowed three members. The eventual admission into this group of members' children was recently discussed. It was noted that with all of the restrictions placed on membership, it might be quite a while before these children would be able to join this group (if at all). As discussions on this topic ensued, several factors which had the potential to discourage some individuals from wanting to join this organization were brought up; a growing trend towards inter-marriage with non-Italians and financial limitations were just two of these stipulations. Another mentioned was a lack of interest in Italian heritage, which was accompanied by the comment, "maybe it's a good thing that we're losing this Italian image thing." Needless to say, I was shocked and disheartened.

It seems that America is on its way to once again embracing the "Melting Pot Theory." A "Melting Pot," in my opinion, creates a bland entity, without any particular

personality. Pride of heritage, on the other hand, helps a person or organization to stand tall; it gives an individual roots to hang on to.

Some might ask negative questions like 'What can we do?' and 'Is the battle worth it?'. The answers to these questions are 'There is a lot we can do' and 'Yes, of course it is worth it!' One poignant thing we can do is demonstrate to our children how proud we adults are of our heritage. I encouraged my son to become involved in the Young Adults Division of the Italian Cultural Center in the Chicagoland area. He attended functions there right up until the time he left for college; to this day he is still quite proud to say that he is of Italian heritage.

Something else we could try might involve a fraternity-sponsored trip to Italy. With our large numbers, we should be able to book a very economically-reasonable travel package, one which would even allow us to bring our children. Maybe we should look into selling Italian language tapes through the Kleos (I currently own a set of Berlitz instructional tapes which I play regularly in my car. I have spoken Italian since I was a child; my grandmother taught me, but I feel I still lack the refinements necessary to communicate intelligently in Italian. By using



these tapes, I am trying to preserve a part of my Italian heritage). The Italian Cultural Center located just outside of Chicago has a whole library of tapes and papers documenting the comments of immigrants from various regions of Italy. How about simply asking our own parents/grandparents to explain how they feel about being of Italian heritage? These comments, once recorded either on tape or in writing, could be shared and passed down for generations to come, and would certainly enhance any similar collections kept in libraries/cultural centers in your own area. And what about forming an Italian heritage society in your town? Whatever you decide to do, try to do something in your own way to preserve what our seven founding fathers worked so hard to promote. Let's not have a "Melt Down" of our Italian heritage.

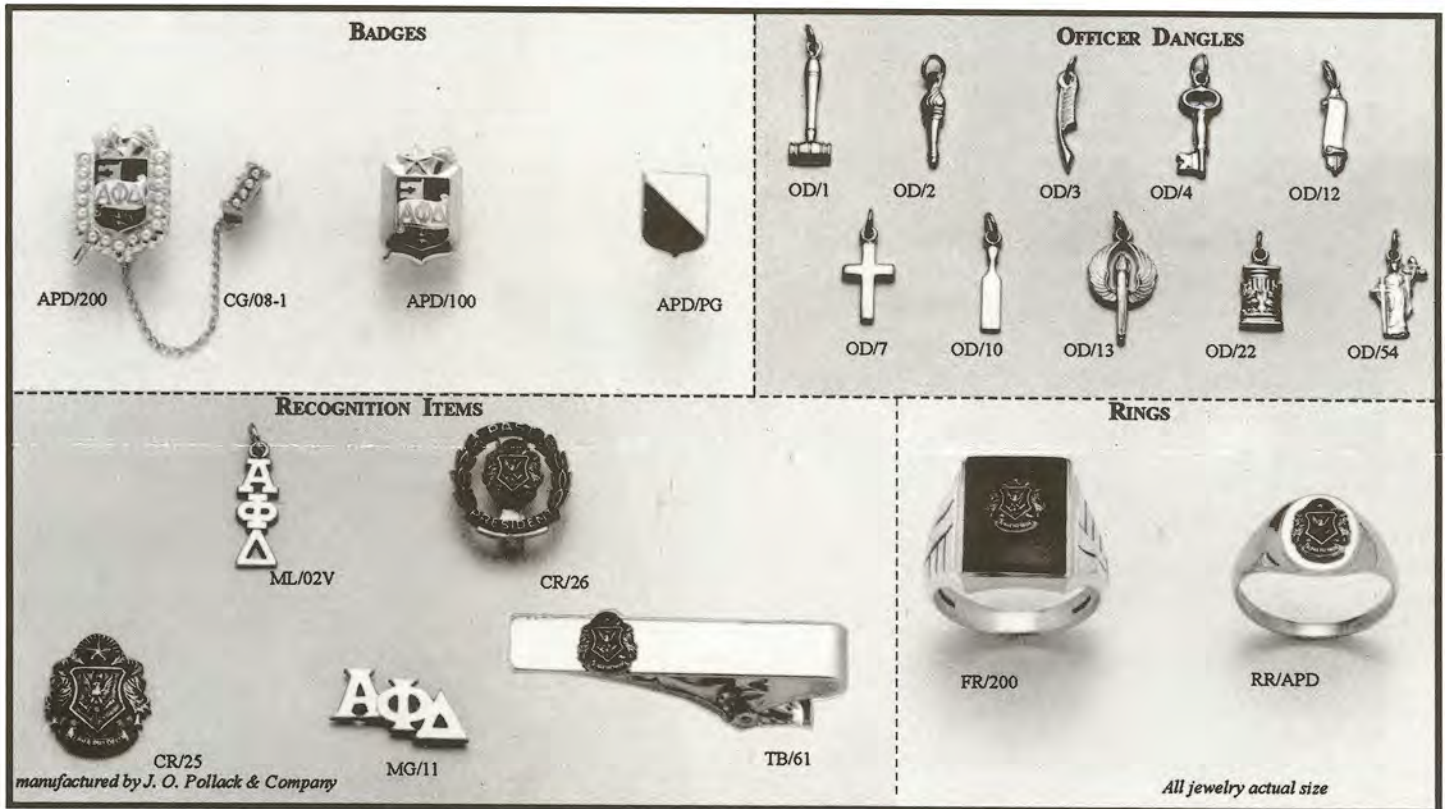

National Alumni Dues Due

It is time again for all Alpha Phi Delta alumni to help support their Fraternity through payment of their alumni dues. The dues appeal last year (the first since annual alumni dues were reinstated in lieu of alumni club/association assessments) was considered a great success by many; it is hoped that this year's response to the call for financial support will even be more widespread. Alumni dues help the fraternity meet necessary expenses, help promote educational programs; support our publications; etc.

All alumni are required to pay their dues each year, except for those who choose (or have already chosen) to purchase a Life Membership (more details below). It is at this time of year that the phrase "Membership in Alpha Phi Delta is eternal, and carries with it the obligation of

permanent activity and support" seems to take on a new level of poignancy. The two payment options are outlined below.

Option A: Paying Alumni Dues of \$25.00 annually. This payment entitles a brother to:

- A 1996-97 alumnus member card which shows that he is in good standing with the Fraternity (it is necessary to be in good standing to be a part of any organized Fraternity entity, i.e. alumni club, alumni association)
- All Kleos issues this coming year (those who don't pay will cease to receive the Kleos regularly)
- Alumni Chapter information (along with membership card)
- The inclusion of his name on an "alumni in good standing" list which is sent to his entity

Option B: Buying a Life Membership at \$250.00. When purchasing a Life Membership, a brother receives:

- A lifetime exemption from national alumni dues (Alpha Phi Delta boasts almost 500 Life Members currently);
- A lifetime subscription to the Kleos;
- A Life Membership card (numbered) which places him in perpetual good standing;
- A fraternity pin (the badge of Alpha Phi Delta);
- A copy of our current Directory/Handbook (Ecce Signum);
- Alumni chapter information
- The inclusion of his name on an "alumni in good standing" list which is sent to his entity

Look for a dues request from Central Office to arrive in your mailbox soon.

Gamma Sigma Tops in Community Service

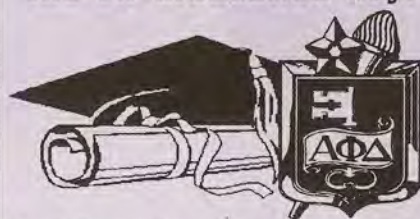

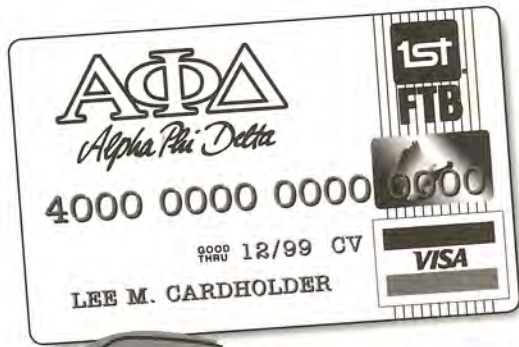

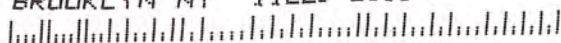
